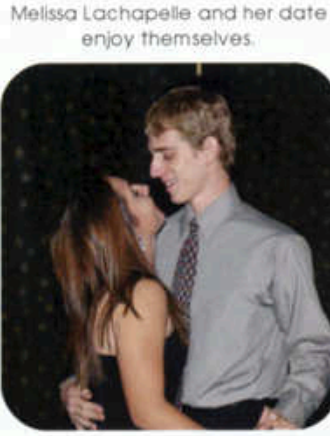

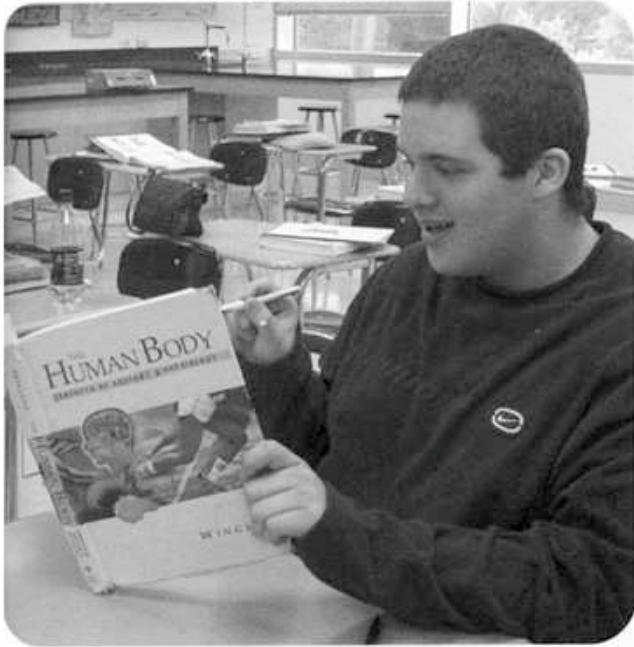
Throughout our schooling, there were many different levels of math for students to study. Upon entering, Freshmen were placed in different levels of classes. One option of placement was Applied Math, where students learned the basics behind previously learned concepts. Freshmen could also be placed in Algebra I. Alternatively, they could have been placed in Algebra I, Part I, followed by Part II, which covers all the same material as Algebra I but over a two-year span.

Beyond their first years in math, students could proceed to Geometry and Algebra II, and have the option of taking Problem Statistics, Pre-Calculus, and Calculus. Taking these classes would exceed the minimum requirement of only two years of math.

For those more advanced students, they had the opportunity to be chosen to take an explorations class. These classes are more individually directed classes that act as honors classes. The courses are available for Geometry, Algebra II/Trigonometry, and Pre-Calculus. In every class, activities were given as a daily assignment. Students also completed a problem set each week as homework. The main difference was that no book was used. Everything was done through handouts that students kept in a binder as their book.

A.P. Calculus Honors was also available for those advanced students looking to receive early college credit. by Kristi Pawlowicz

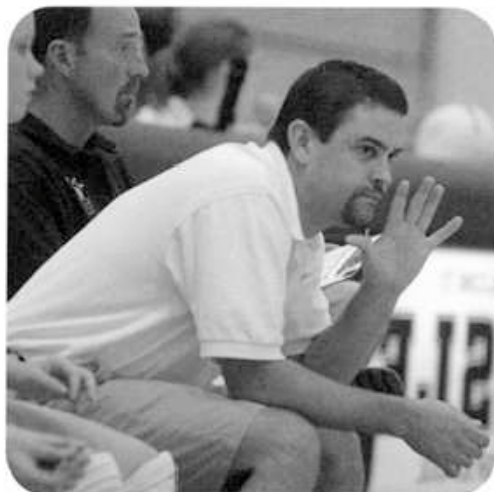

Senior Ben Whitnell leads the team through the tunnel.

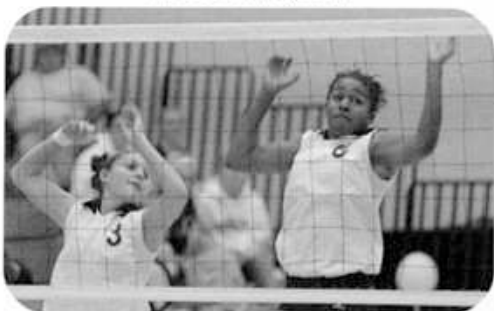

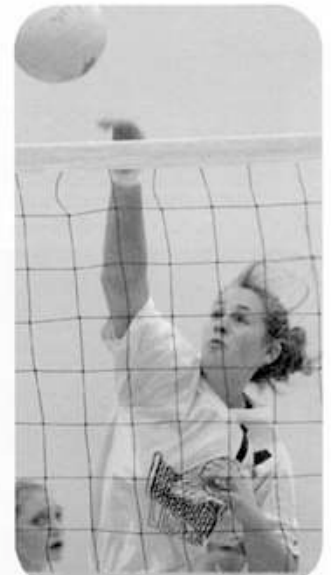

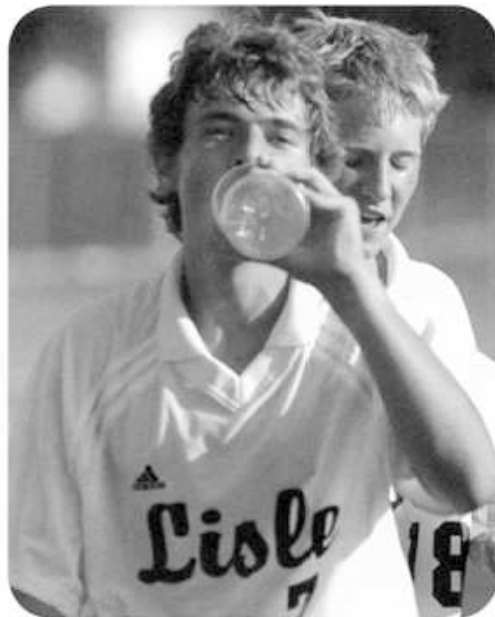

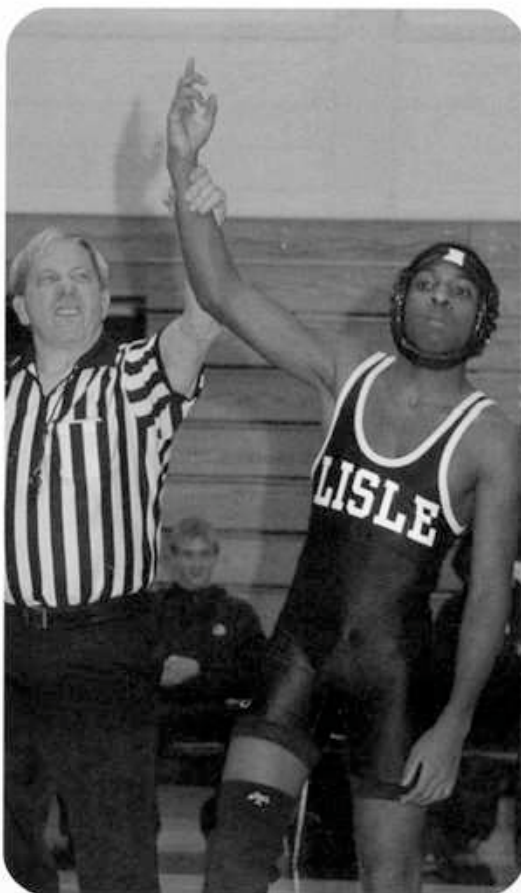

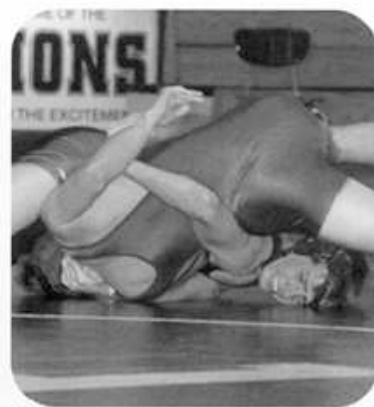

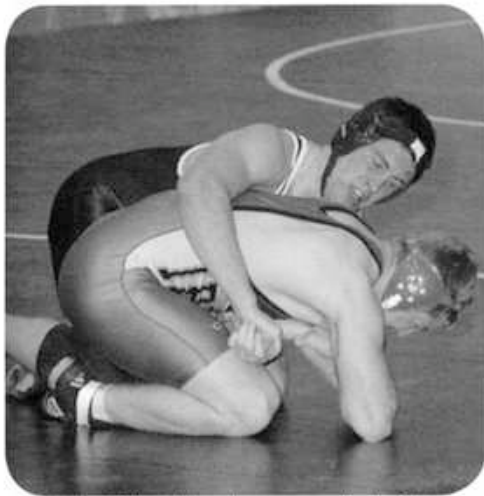

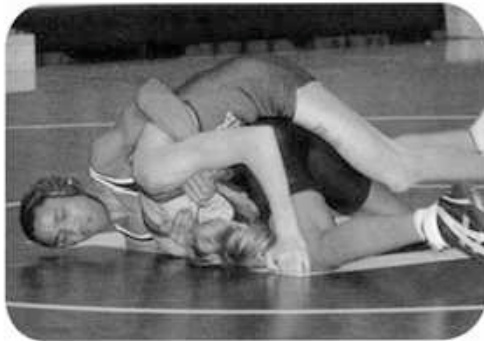

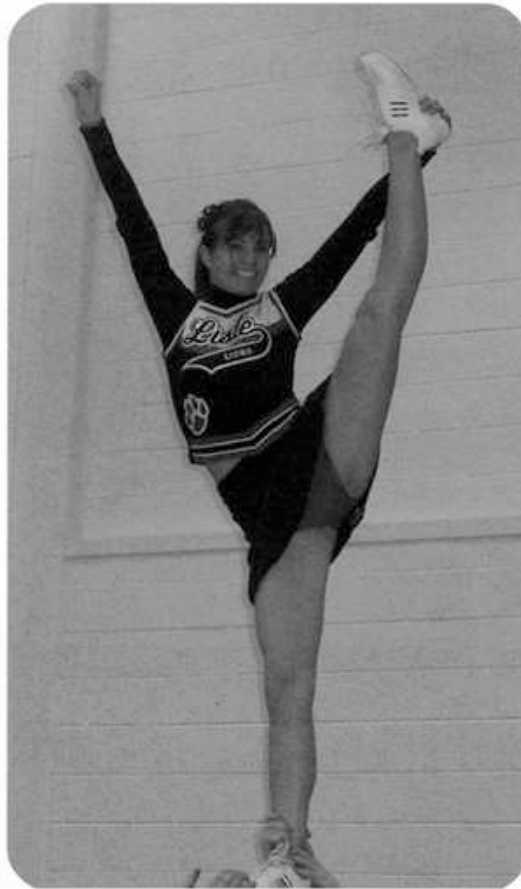

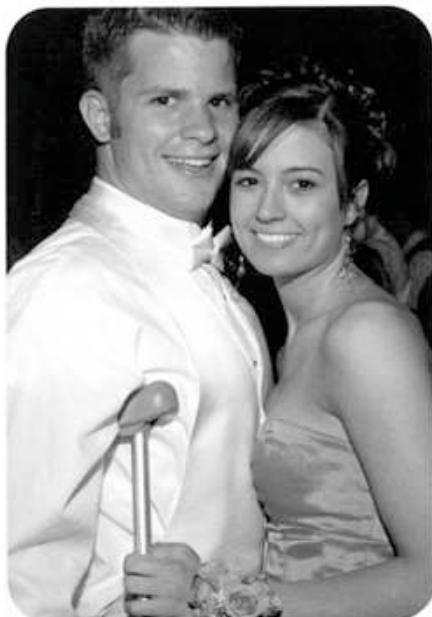
