Careers in Home Economics require a broad background of practical talent which is gained from the program of the Department of Home Economics. The department studies sewing, home decorating, food preparation and house management.

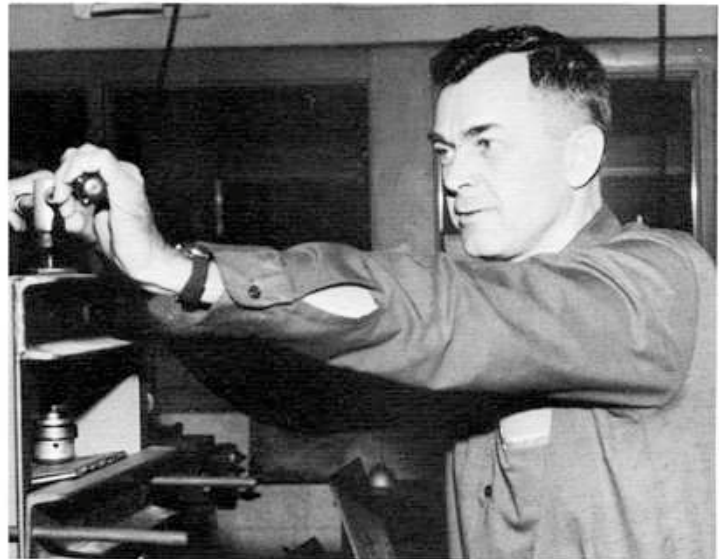

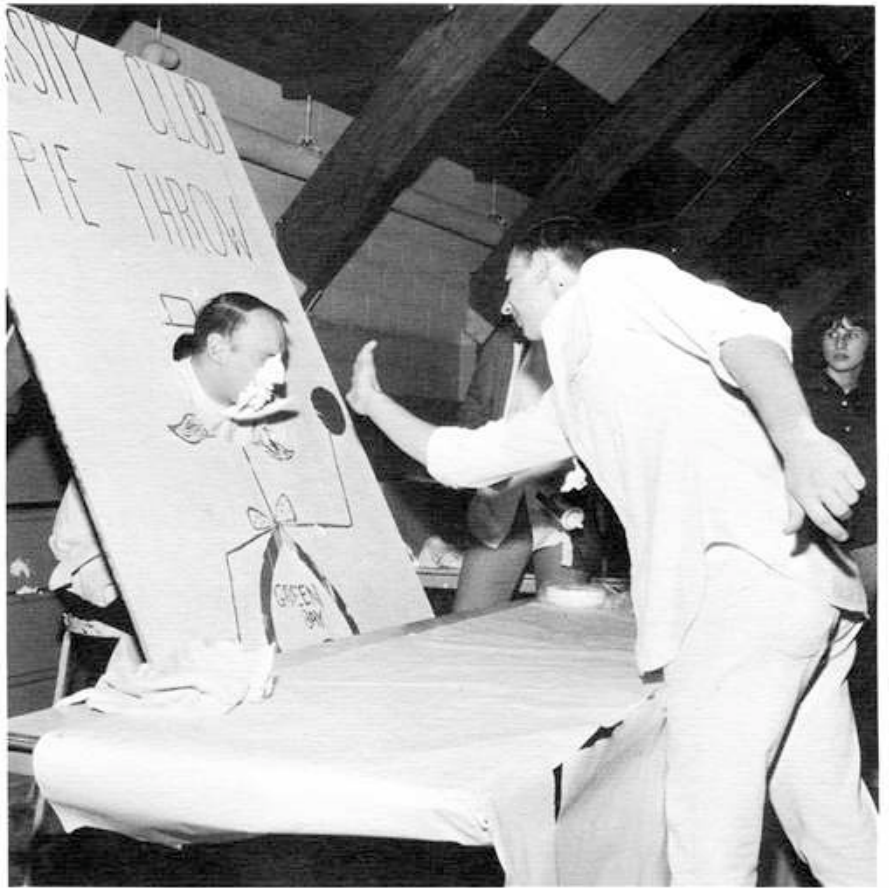

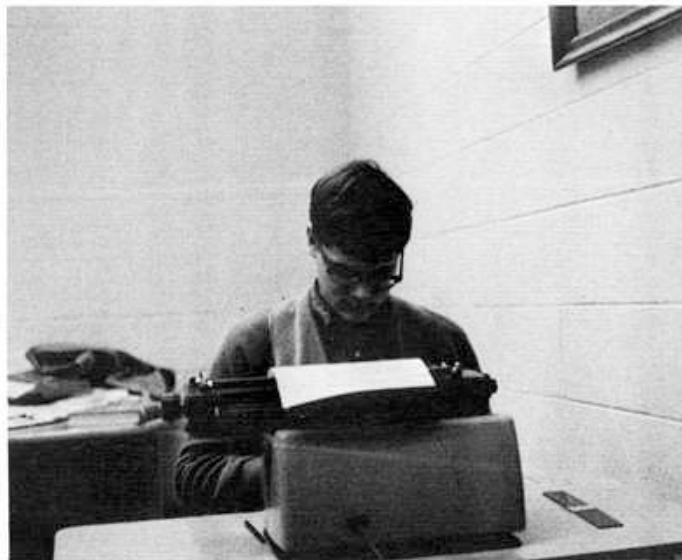

While Art Club is responsible for the covers, Commercial Club is in charge of the content of programs for concerts, plays and programs.

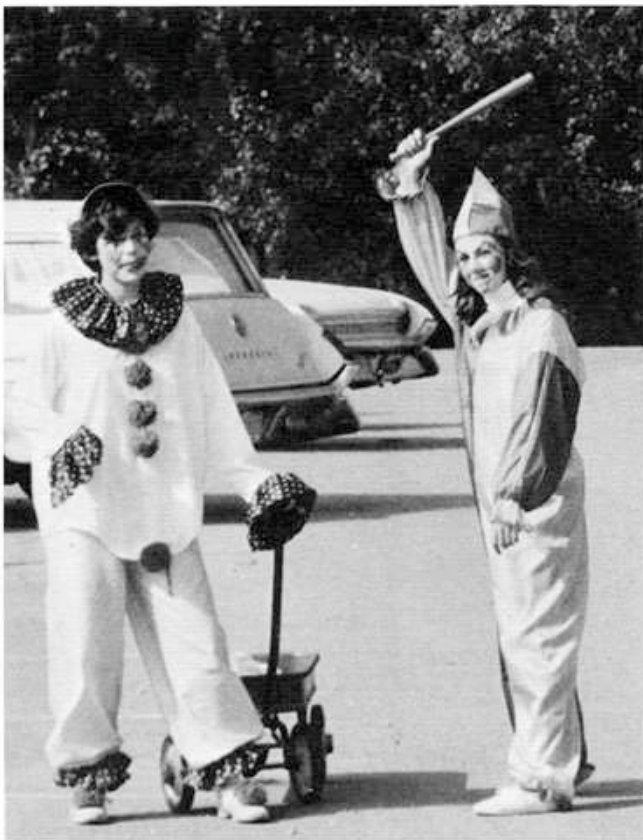

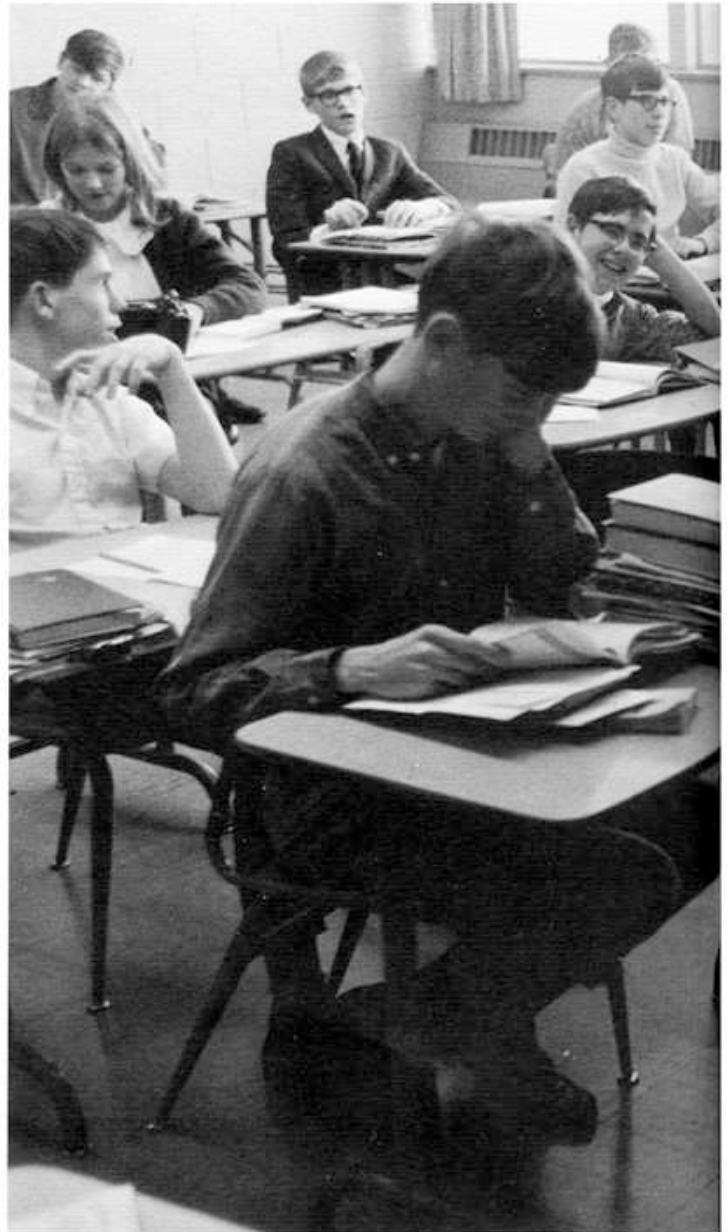
Students Plan For Their

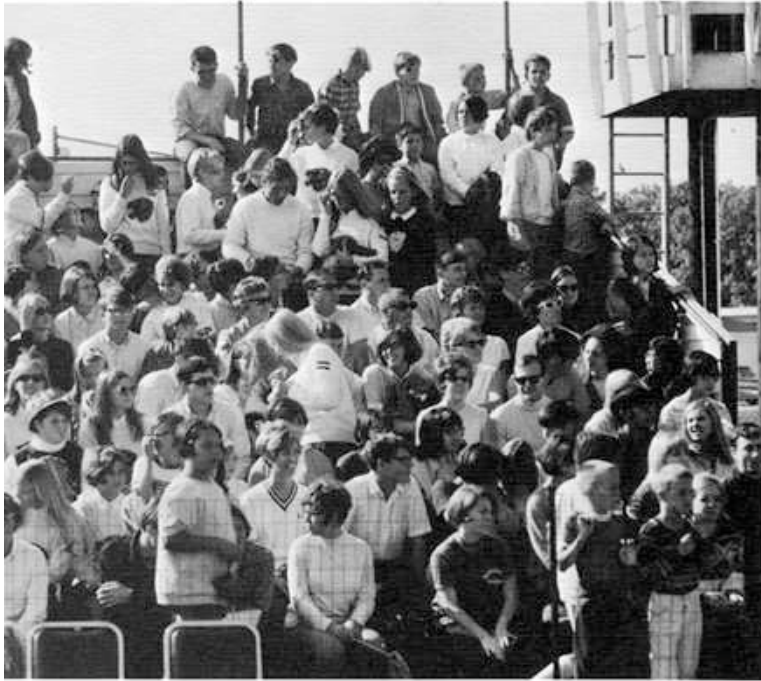

arranging books, checking in and out books, and keeping the library generally neat.

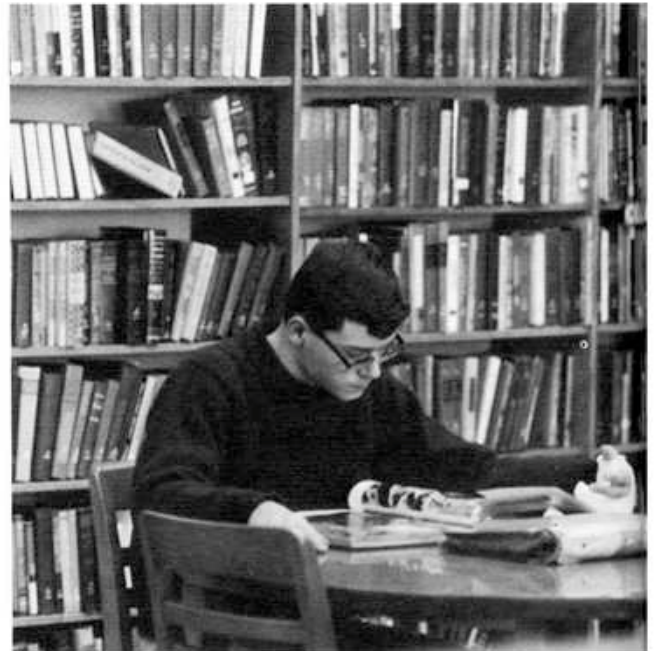

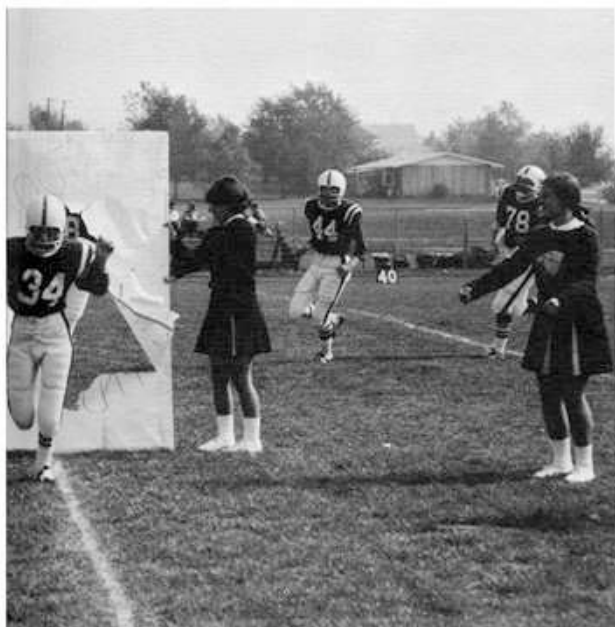

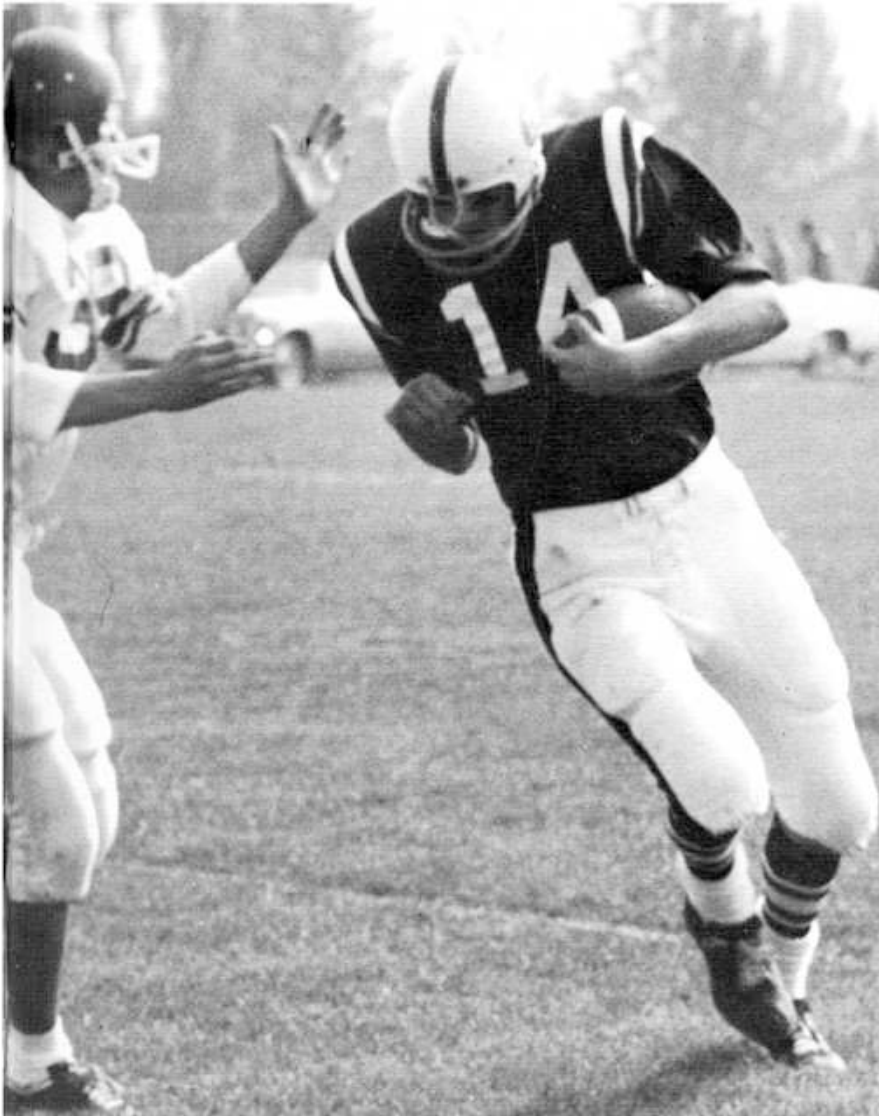

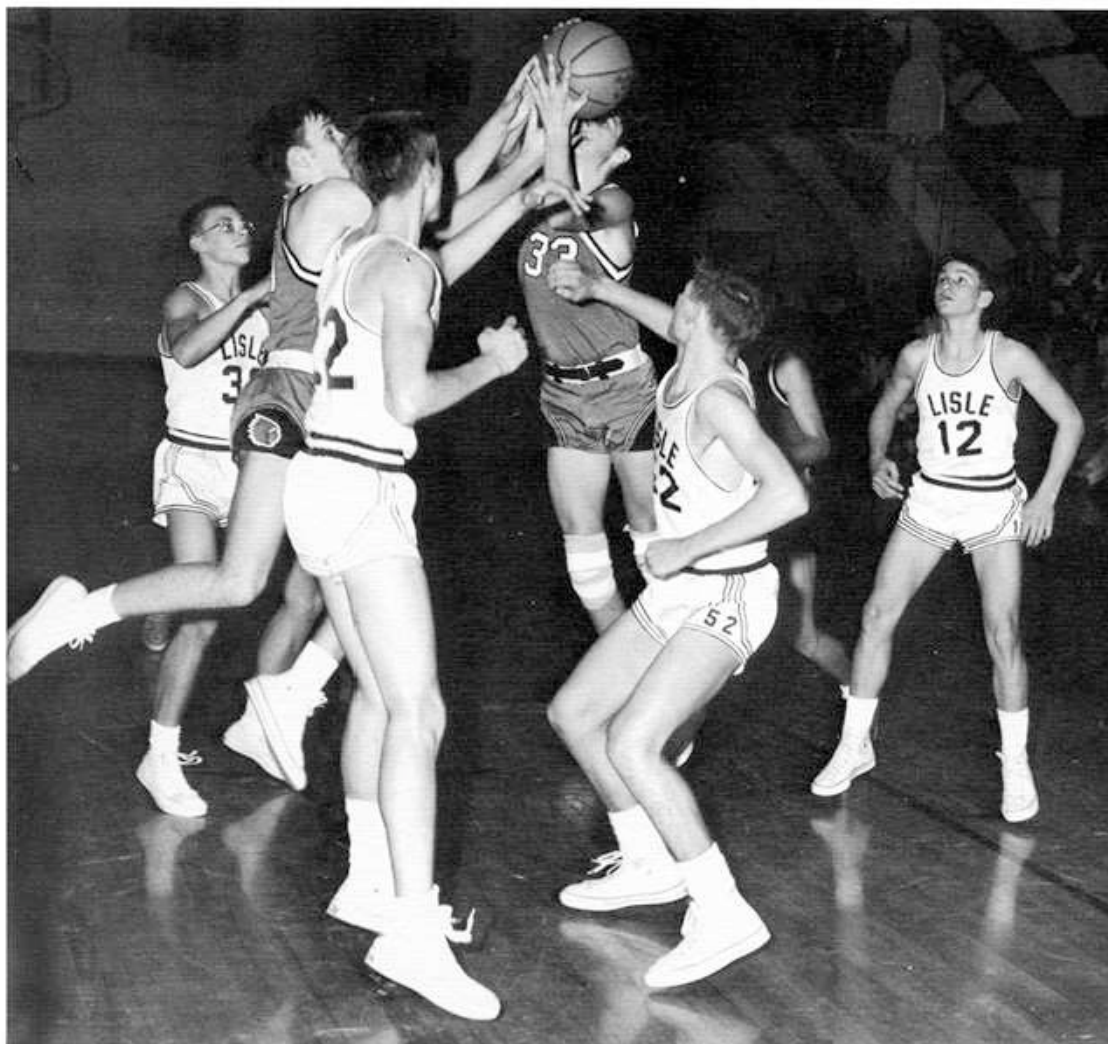

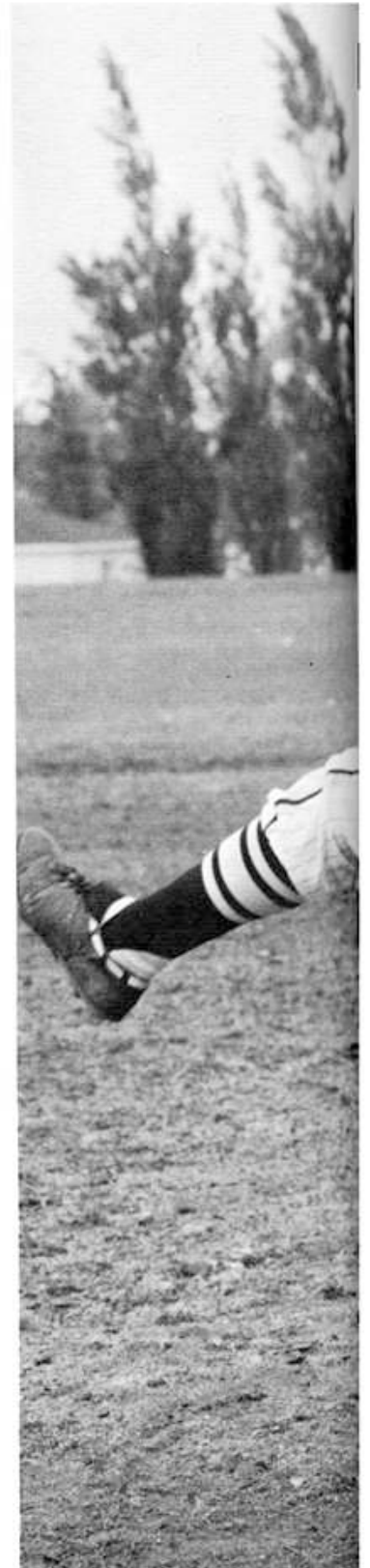

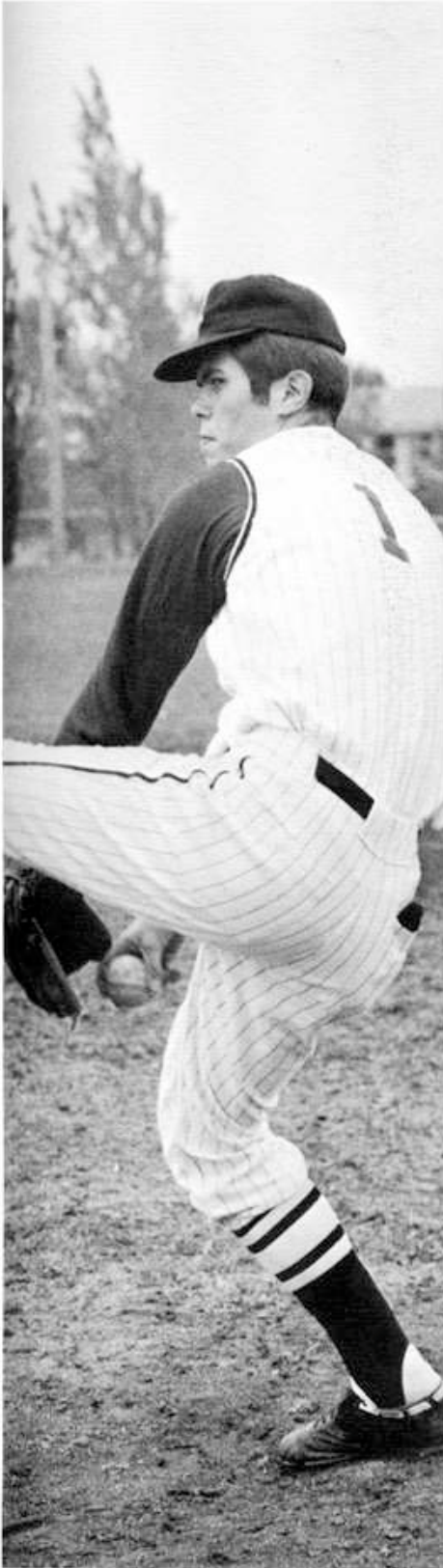
