Pantomime was very important in this play because of the lack of properties or lighting effects. The class had based much of its activity on pantomime during the semester and had become quite familiar with its uses.

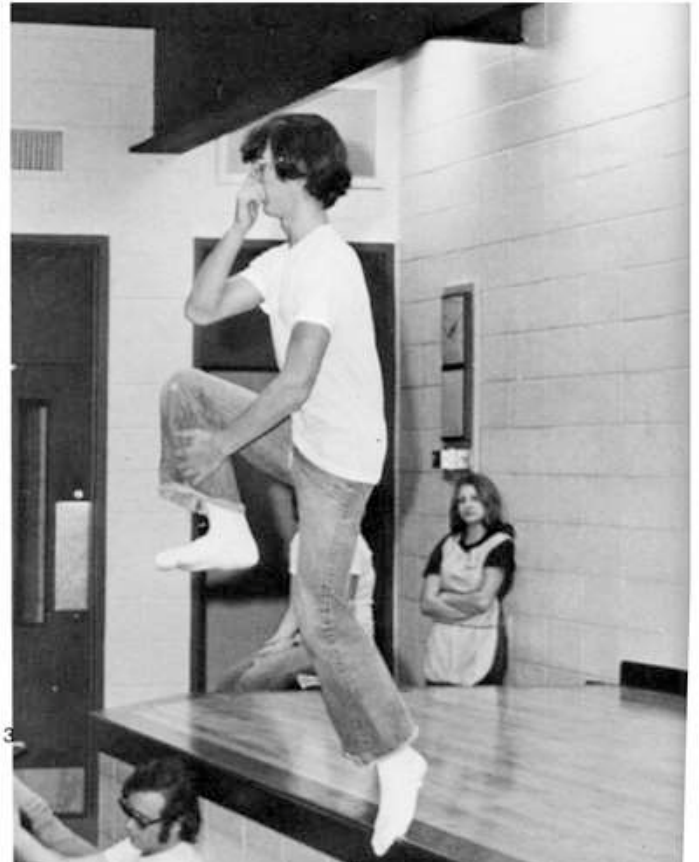
Admission to the show was free. The class played to an audience of about one-hundred people.

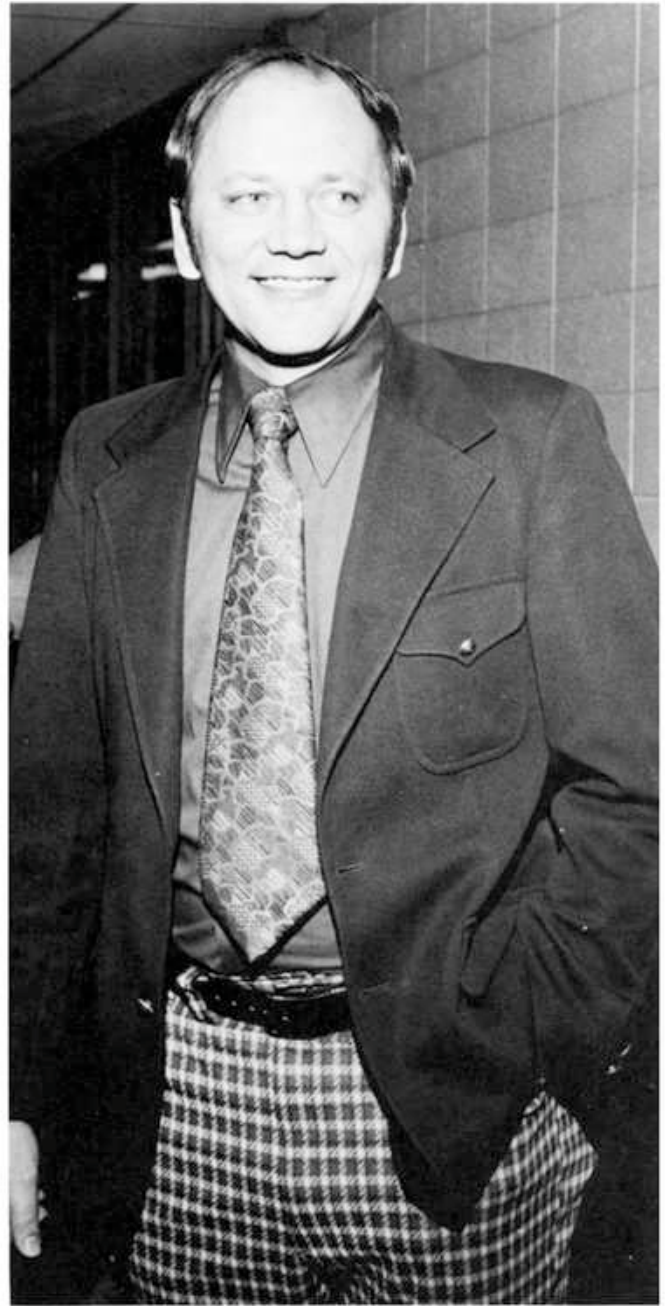

Mrs. Jason and Mrs. Burkman managed the Instructional Materials Center, and have great expectations for its success.

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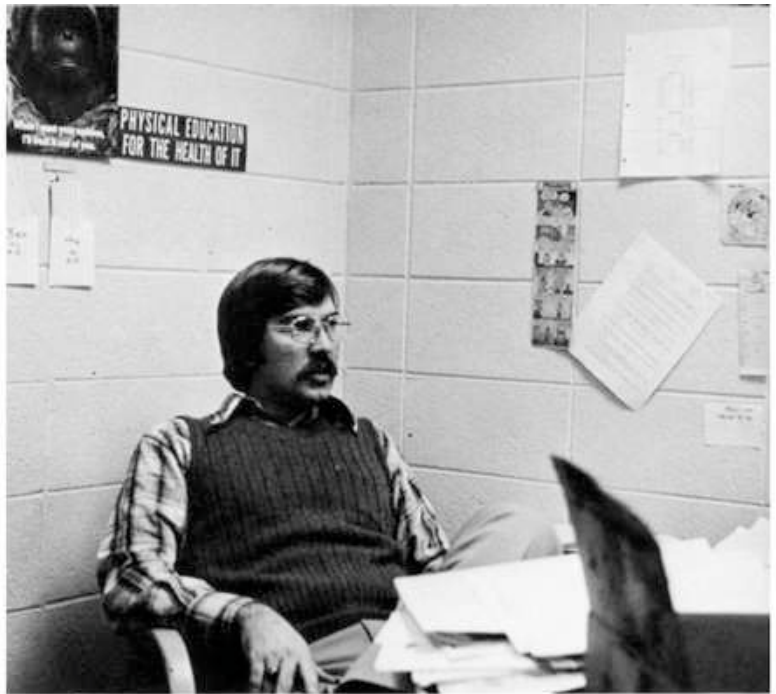

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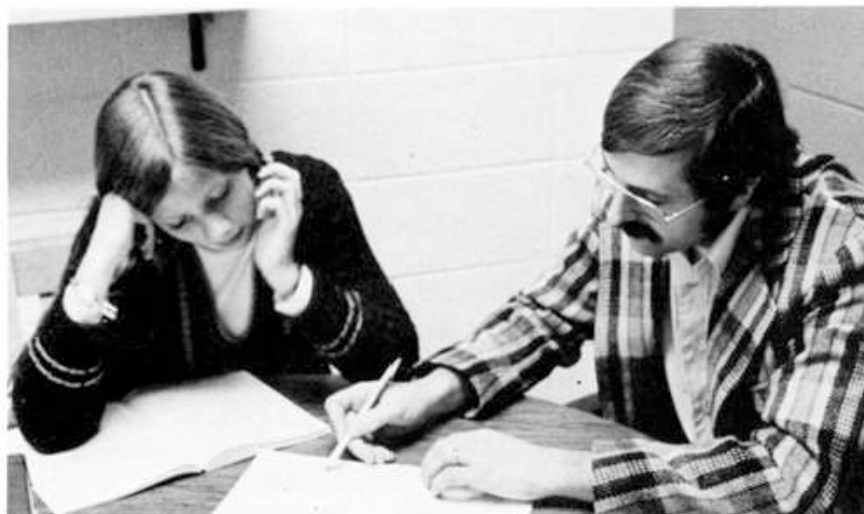
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Opportunities Arise For Science Students

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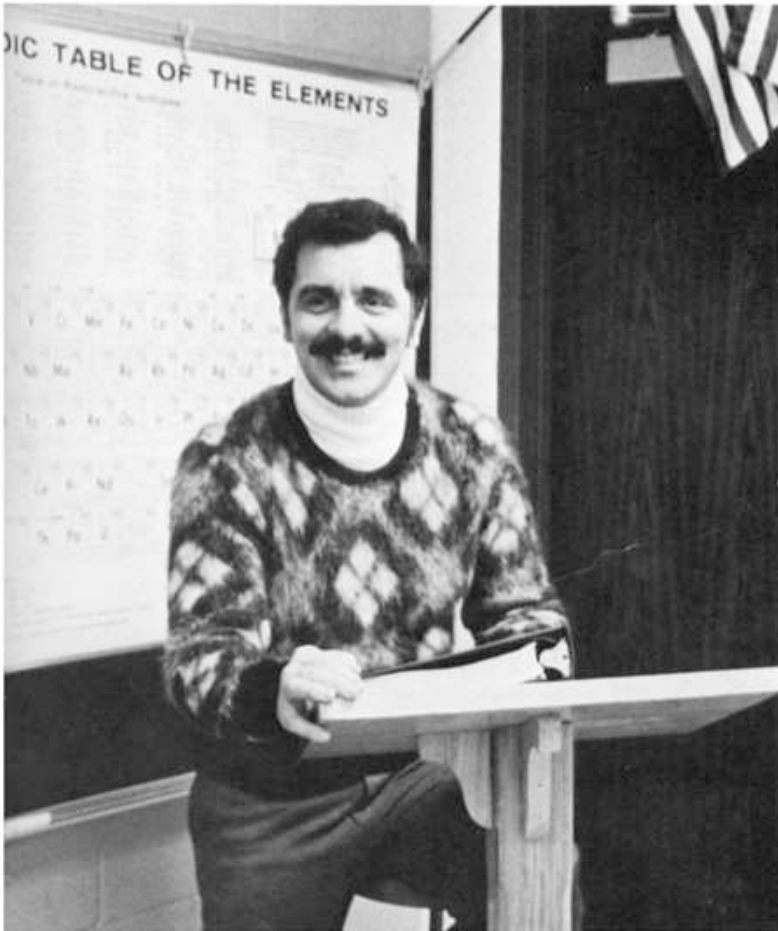

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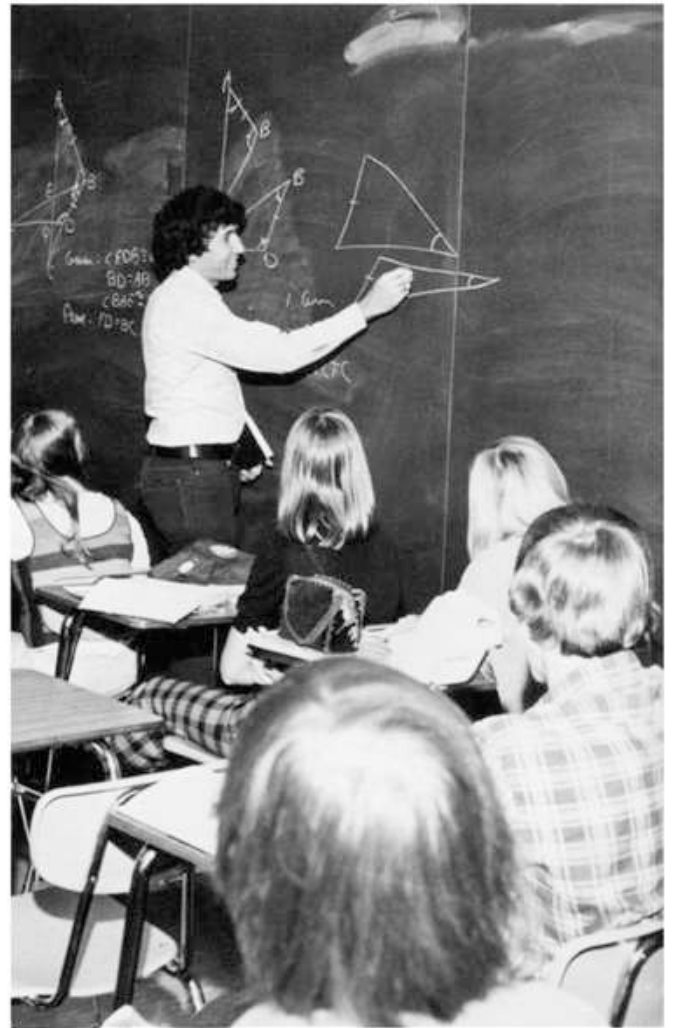
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Mathematics Gains Increased Interest

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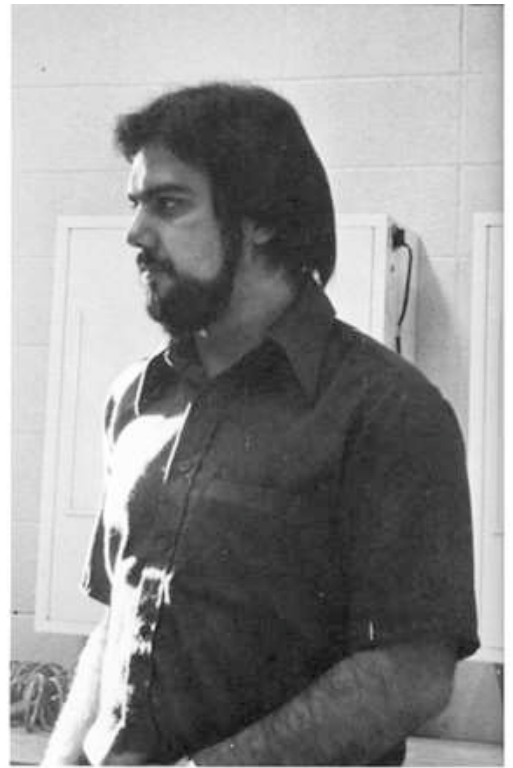
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More Room To Learn

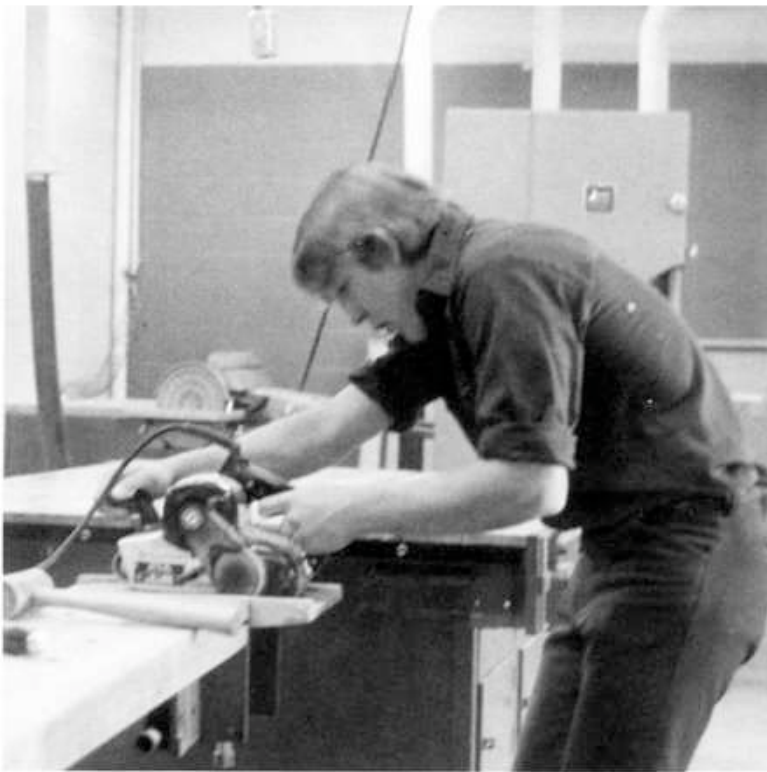

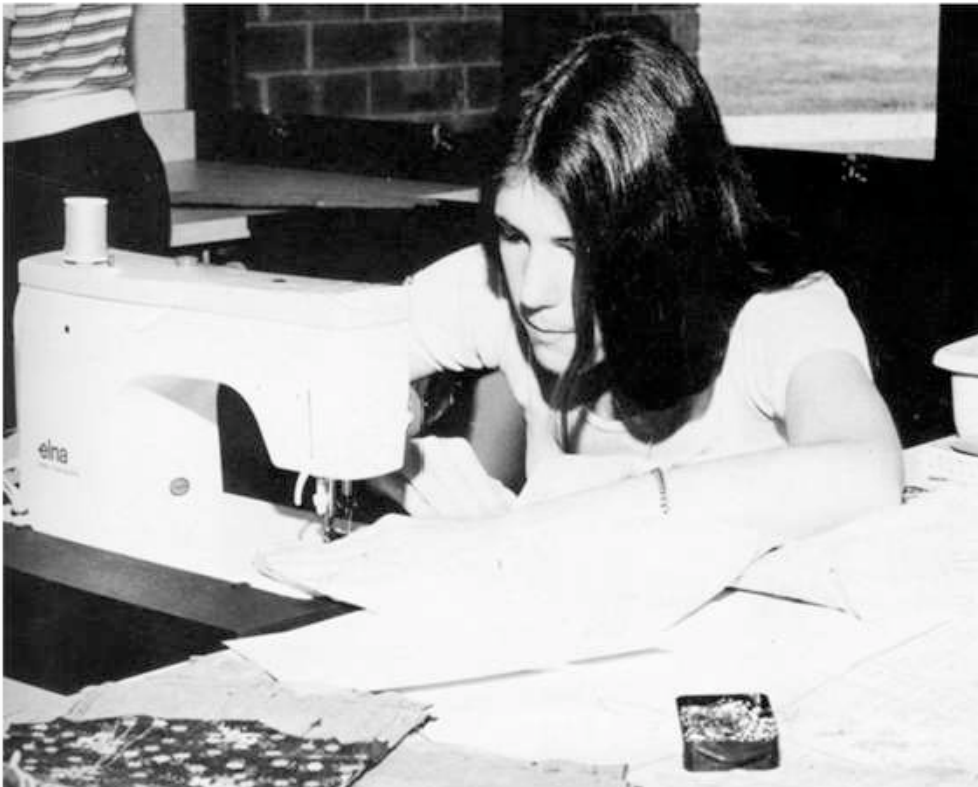

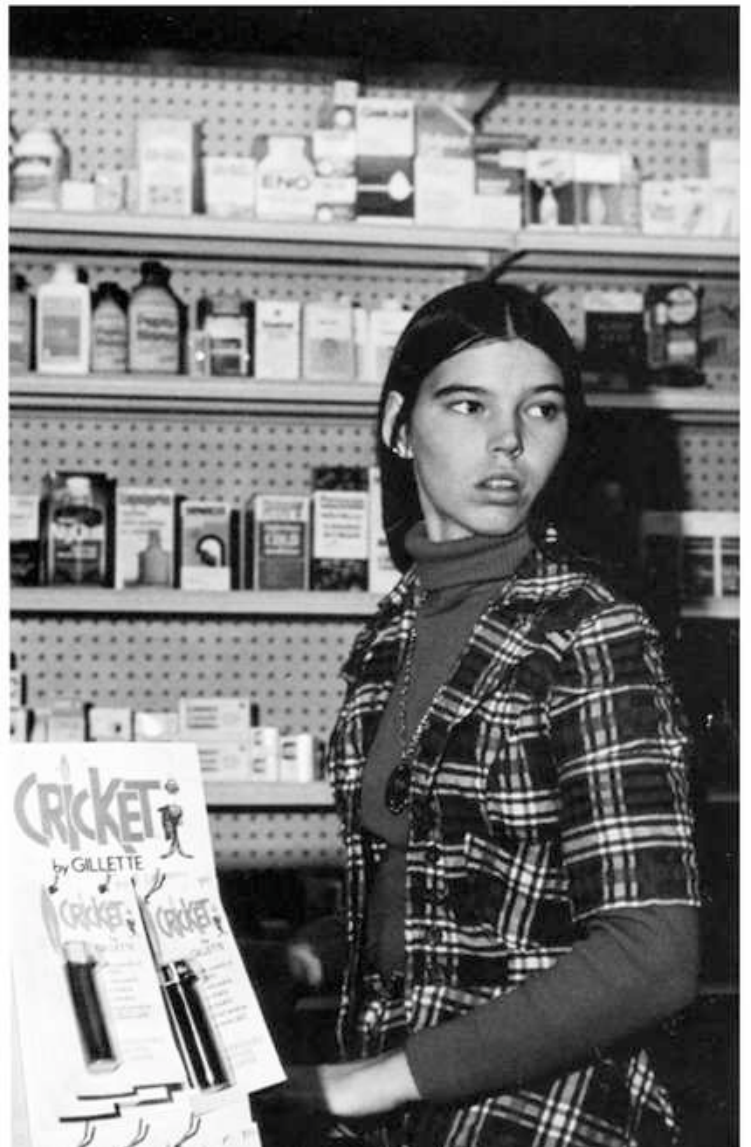

The Co-operative Education class, under the direction of Mr. Jones, offered the opportunity to gain credit by working part-time. This gave students a chance to get a head start on their future careers.

Aside from on-the-job training, Co-op taught personality development and solutions to common problems while providing an opportunity to study in a specific area. This program has been a successful part of the curriculum since 1969.

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DAVEA Opens

Thirty-four new courses were offered at Lisle as DAVEA, the DuPage Area Vocational Education Authority, went into operation. DAVEA was organized to offer training which would provide students with certified employability in a career of their choice.

DAVEA allowed students to learn by doing as it is done in business, by use of individually selected learning programs. Each instructor at the center earned a living for at least two years working at what he is now teaching.

This year ninety juniors and seniors from Lisle attended DAVEA. Classes met temporarily at the College of DuPage until the DAVEA center in Addison was completed. Students were able to transfer during Thanksgiving break.

This year's team was a young team consisting of seven underclassmen and two seniors. Coach Jones felt the experience of this year's team should bring about a better season next year.



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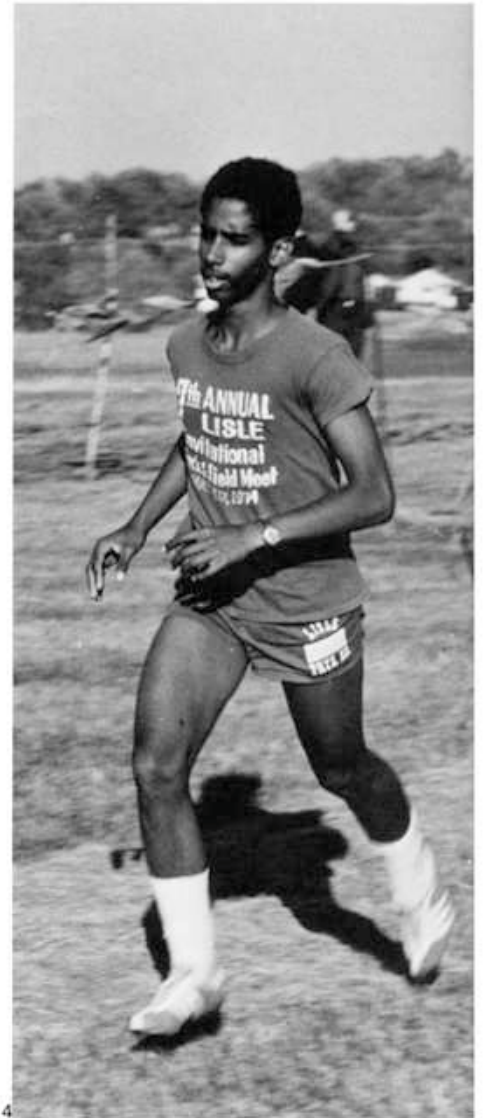

The Sophomores continued their unblemished record and won their second conference football title.

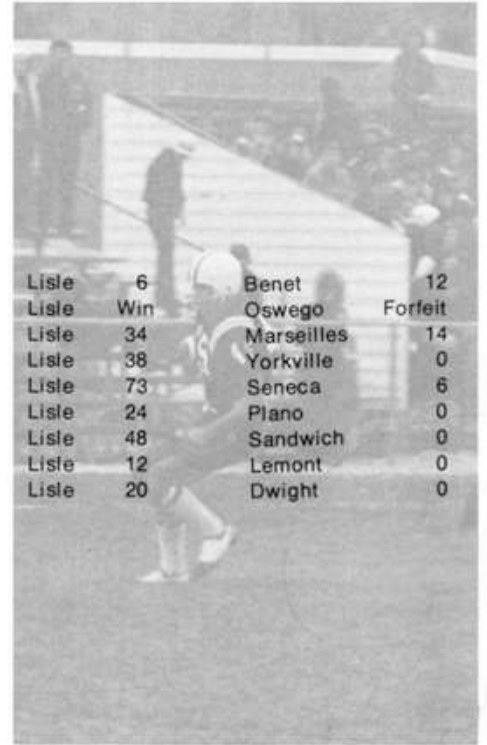
This was accomplished by thoroughly defeating every conference opponent. In addition, the team achieved five shutouts, which included the championship game against Dwight.

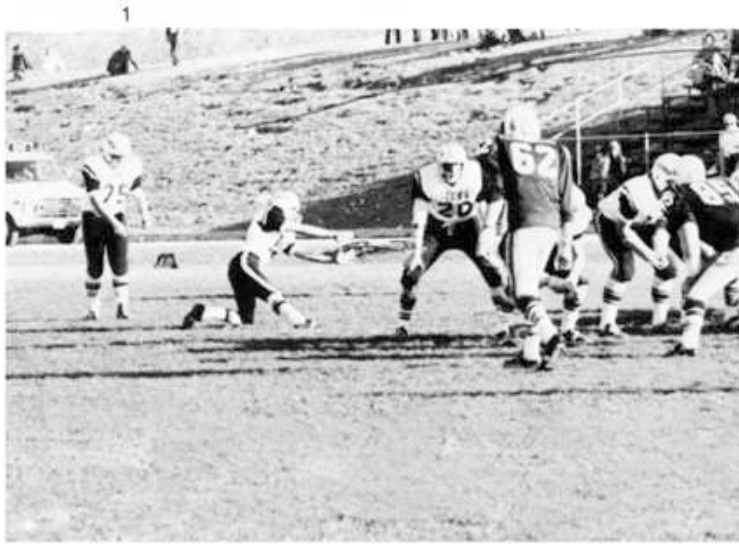
The future of football at Lisle looks bright with a tradition of Conference Champions, and the 1974 Sophomore Lions show promise for this to continue.

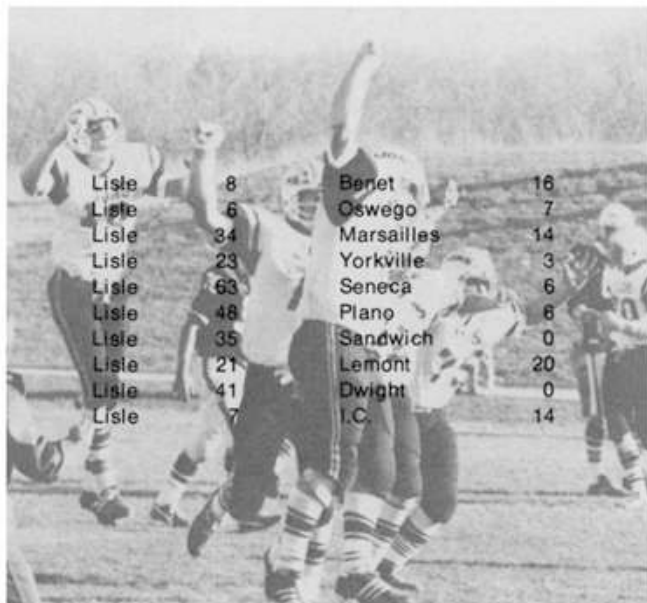

Lisle dominated the all-conference team with seven selections. Taking the honors on defense were Kevin Maxwell, Brian Montague, and John Shamet. Offensive players selected included Bob Andrzejewski, Rich Hampton, Paul Lennon, and Jeff Payne.

This was indeed the year of the Lion; a year when a favorite Coach Nalley exclamation was disproved and Lisle placed first in the NEC.

Lion Cubs Have High Finish

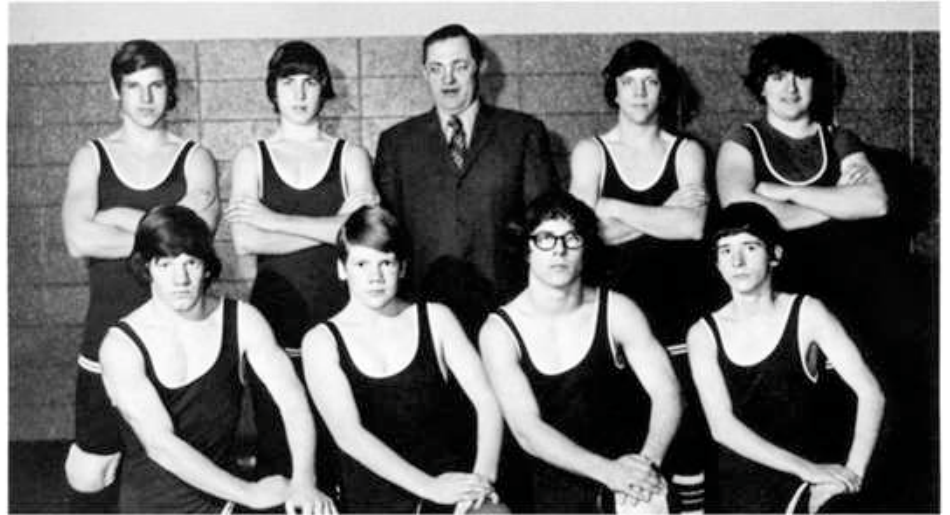

ence tournament, the Lion cubs flexed their muscles and carried away second place honors.

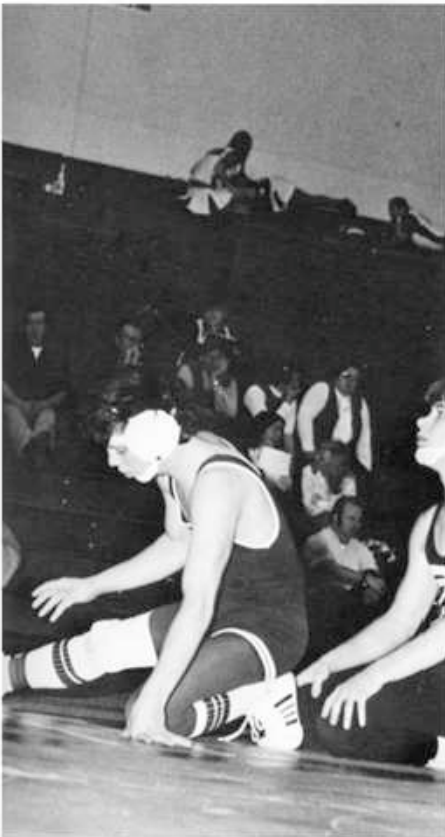

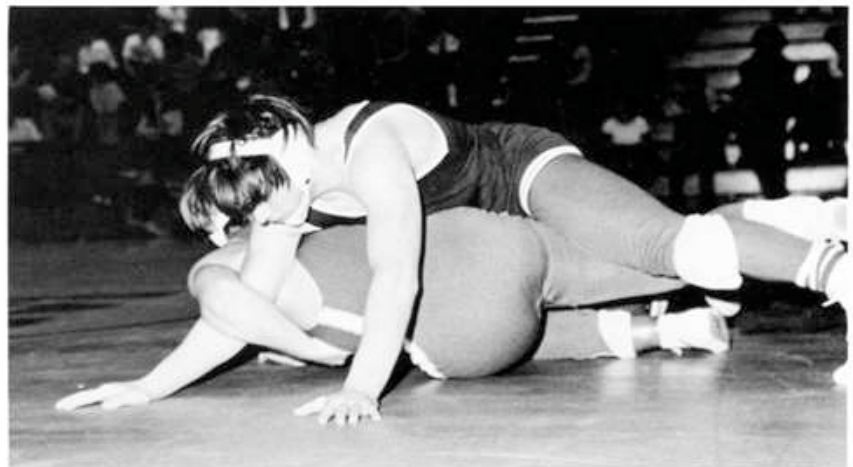
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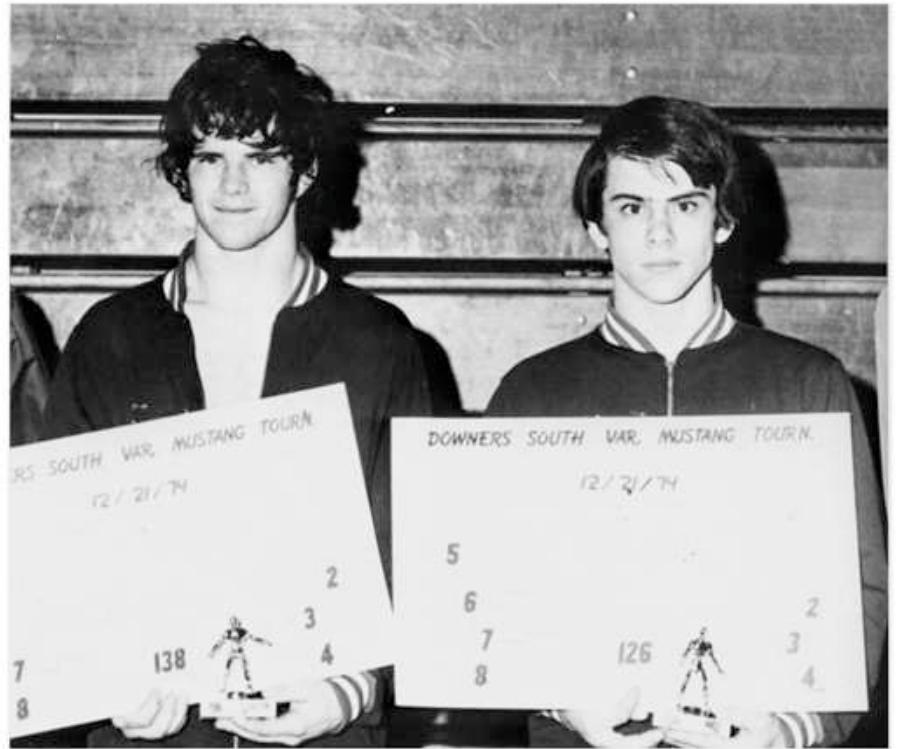

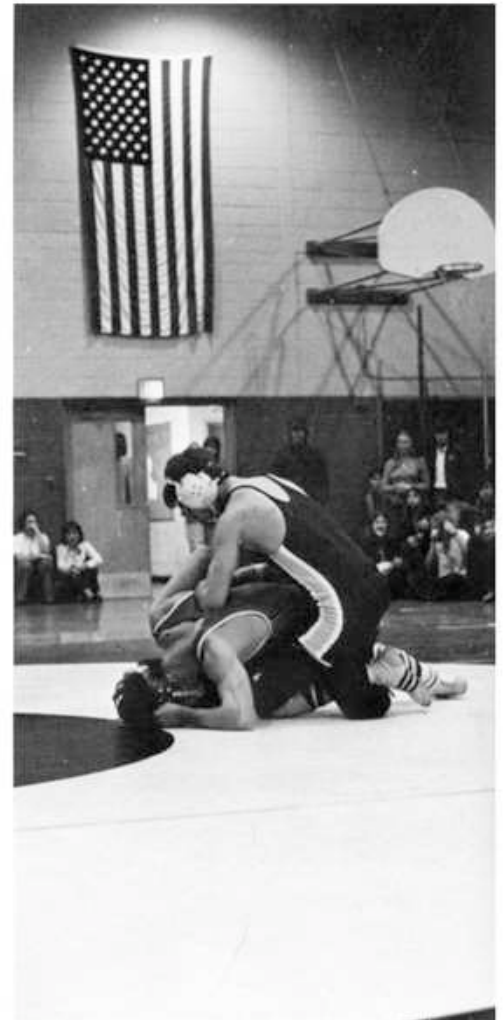
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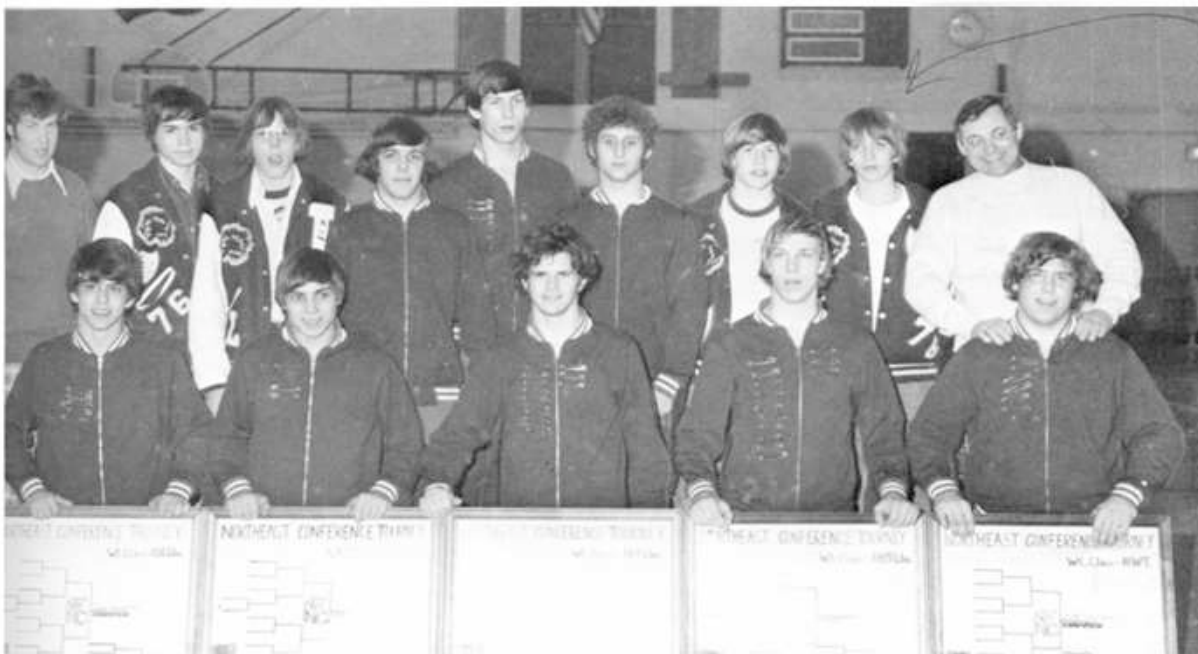

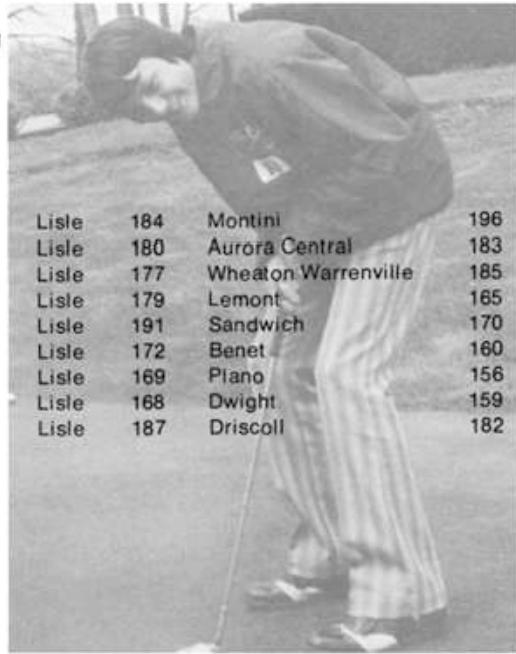

Sponsor Mrs. Dilacova is looking forward to having many new members next year.



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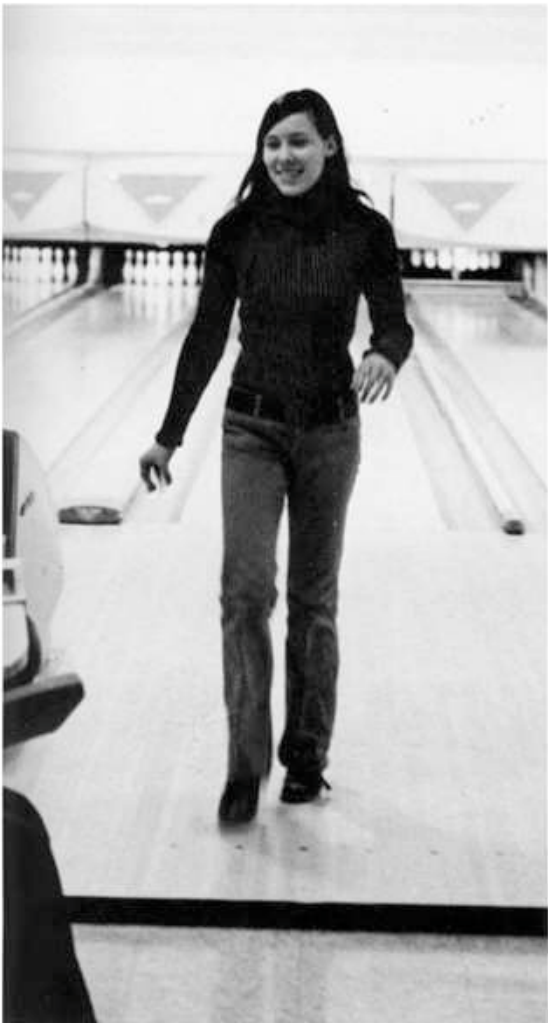


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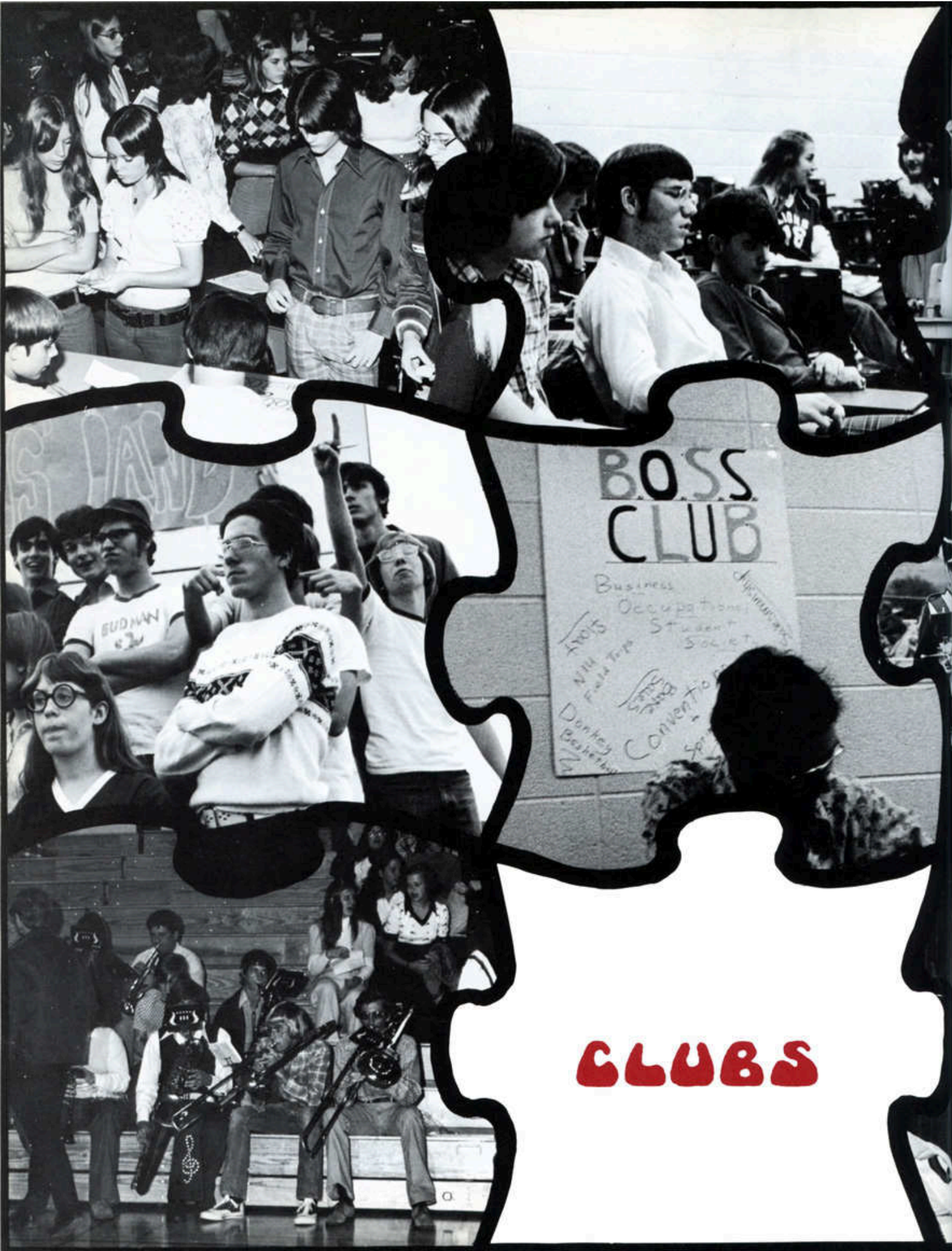

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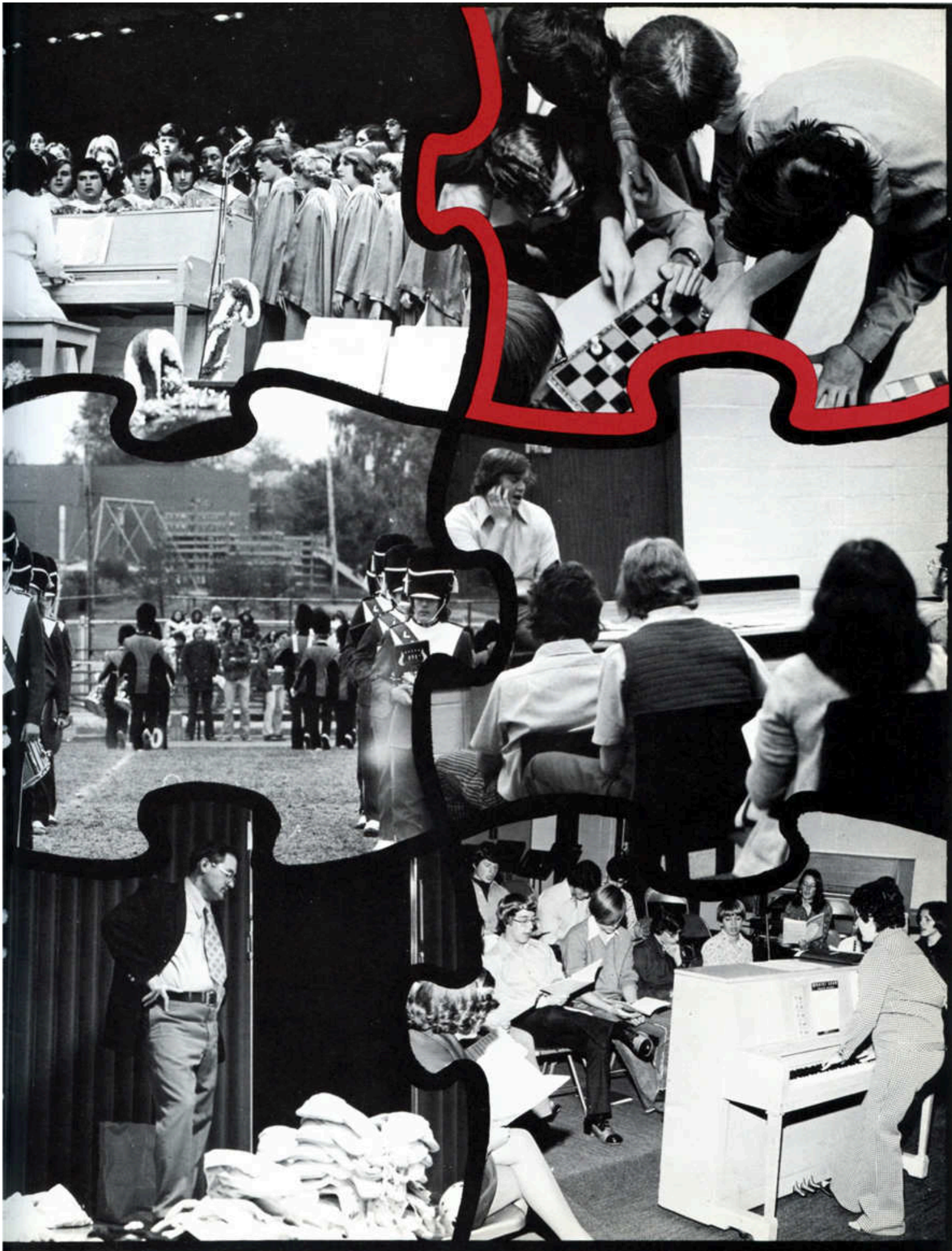

There was no registration requirement for voting. All students were able to vote in all school elections.



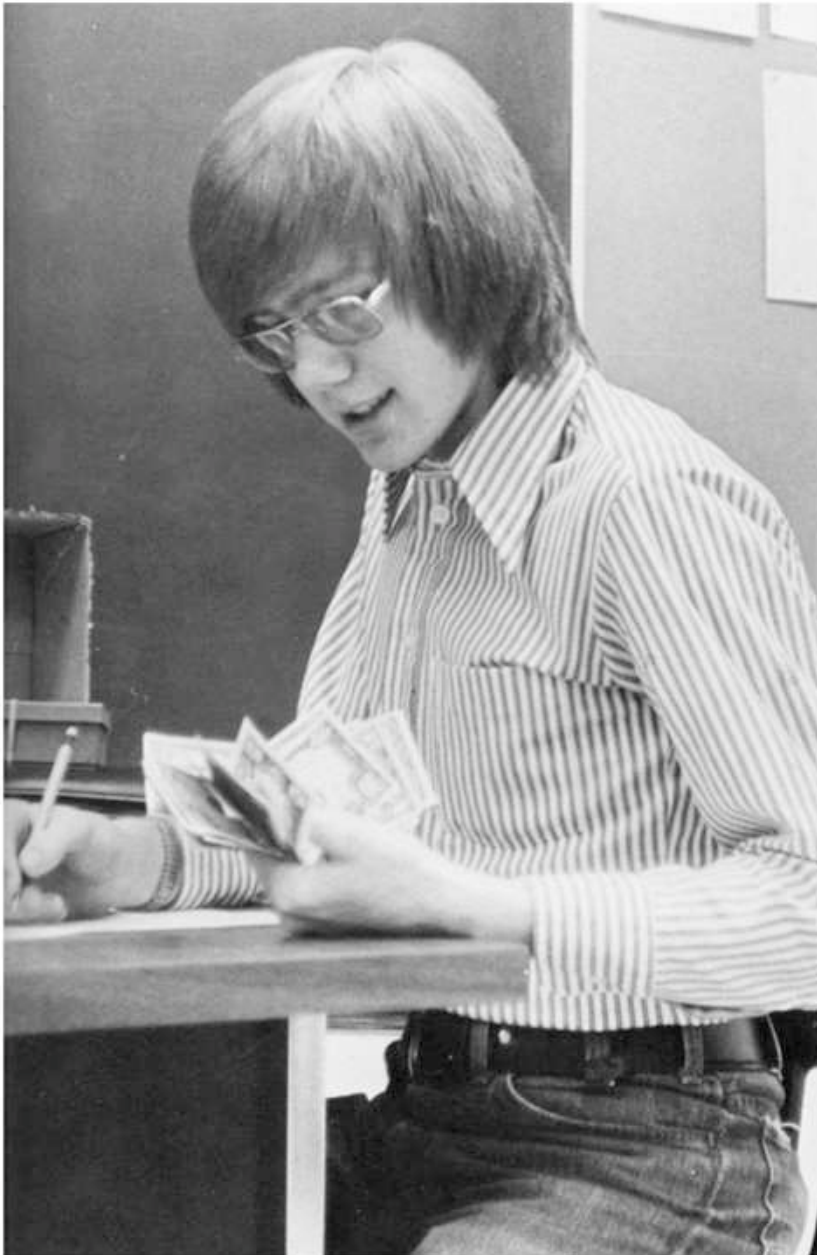

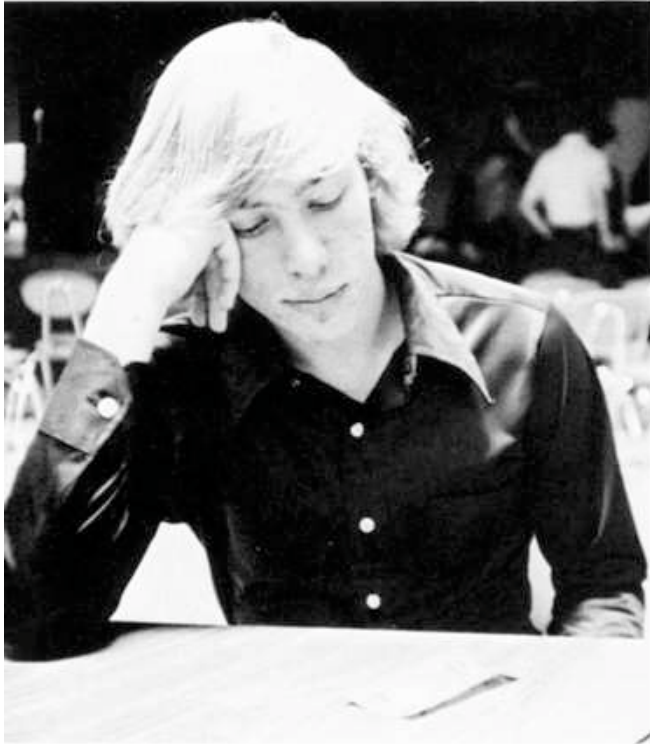

The activities of the Lisle Chapter of AFS this year included the Dinner Theater with the Thespians on November 22 and 23 and an International Potluck Dinner on December 15.

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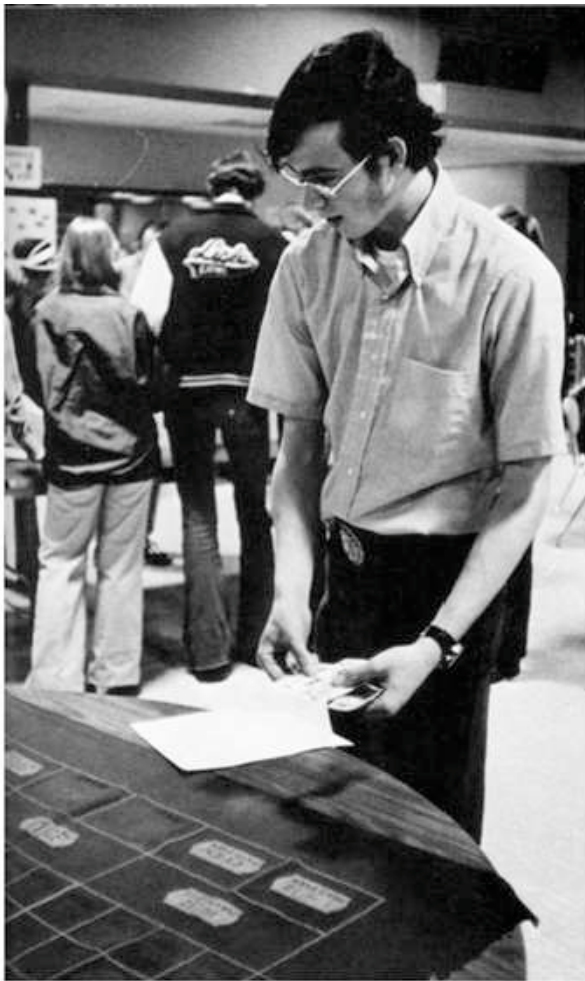
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New Night Spot Created By MLC

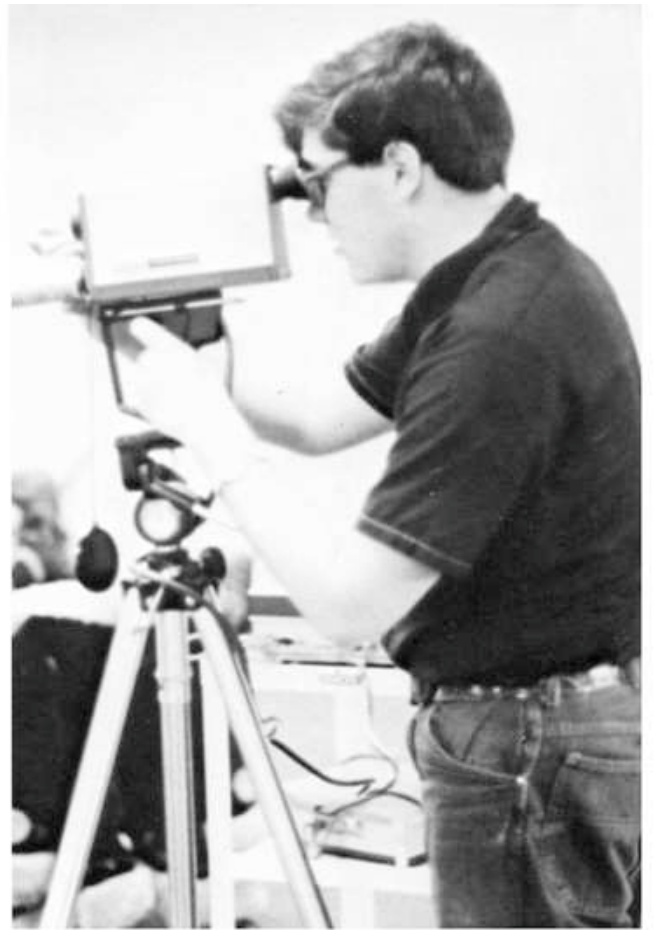

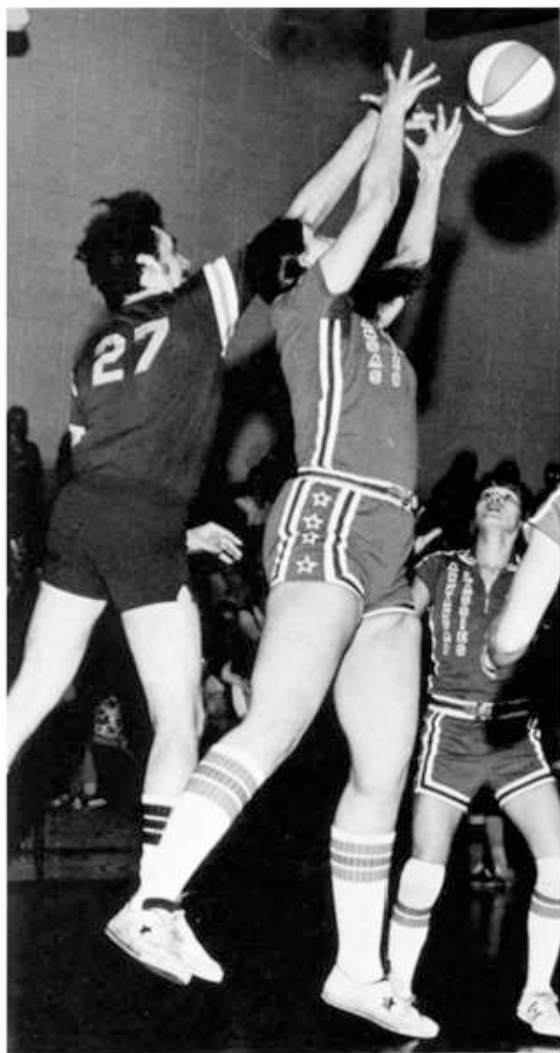


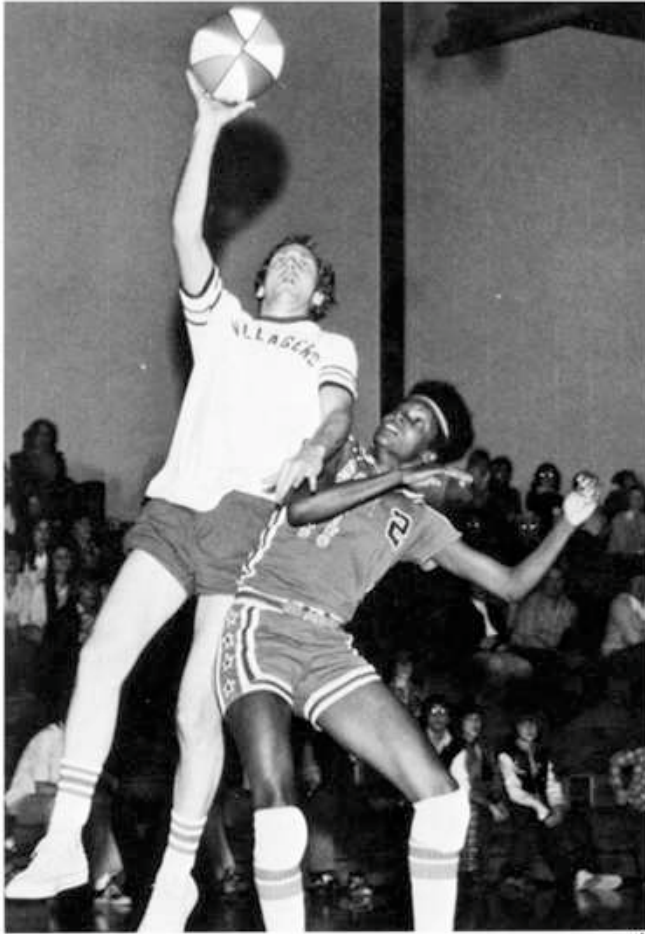

The project was financed by selling copies of the yearbook and collecting contributions from local businessmen.

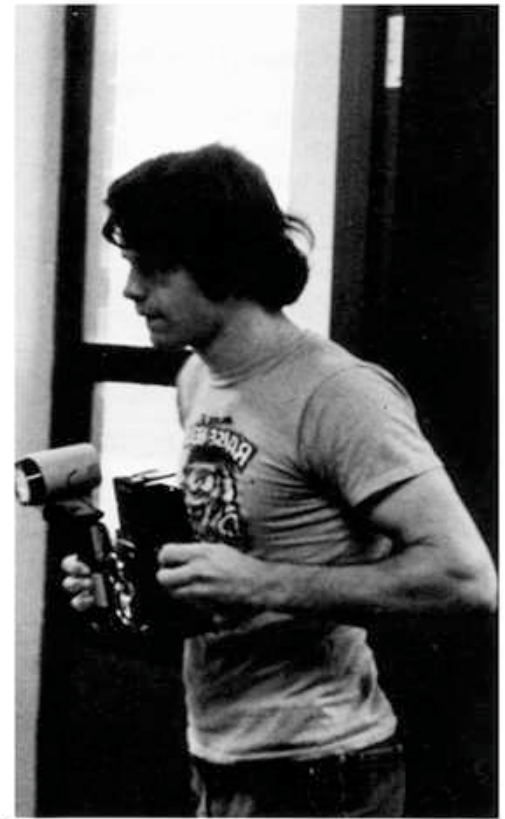
Editor Jeanne Wilson attended a summer workshop at the University of

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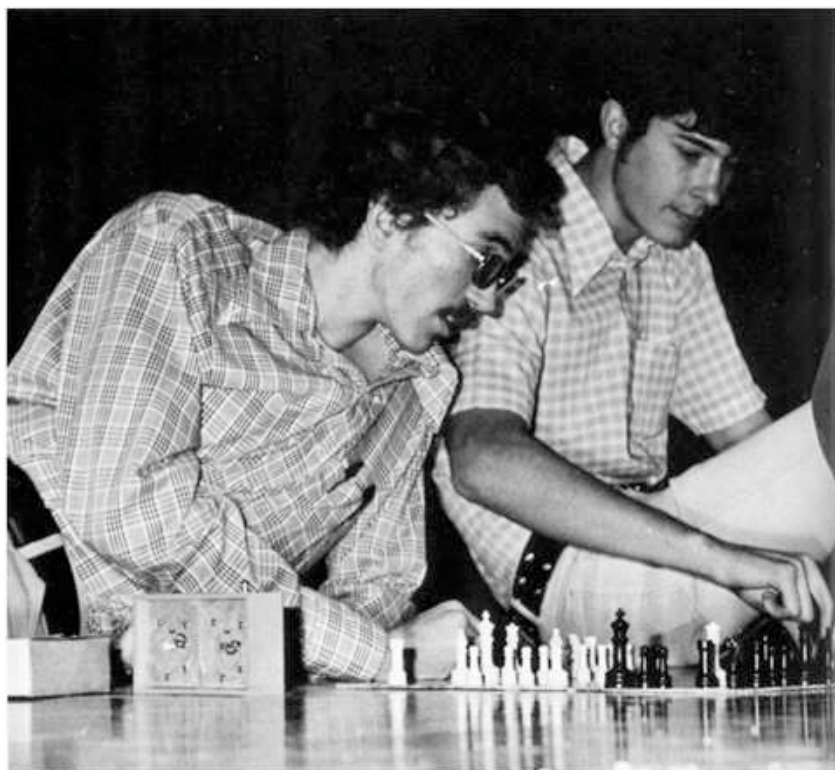

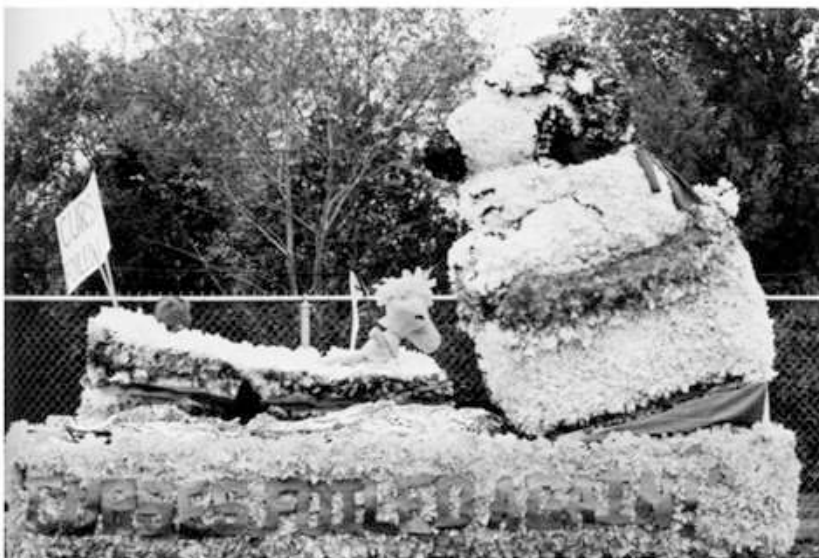

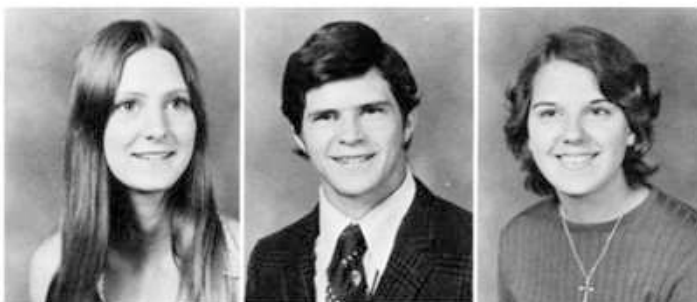

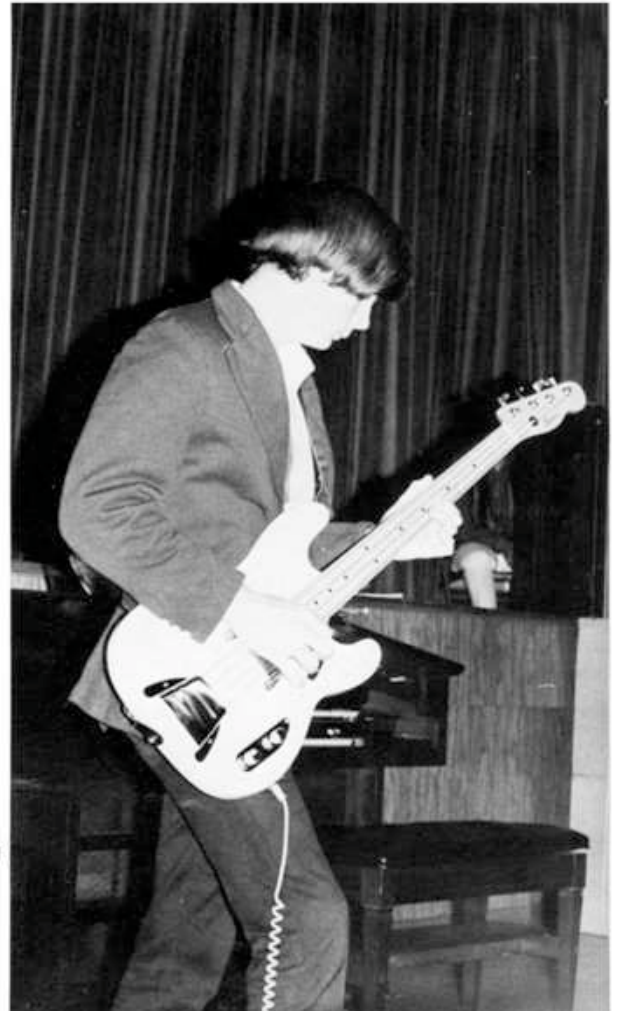

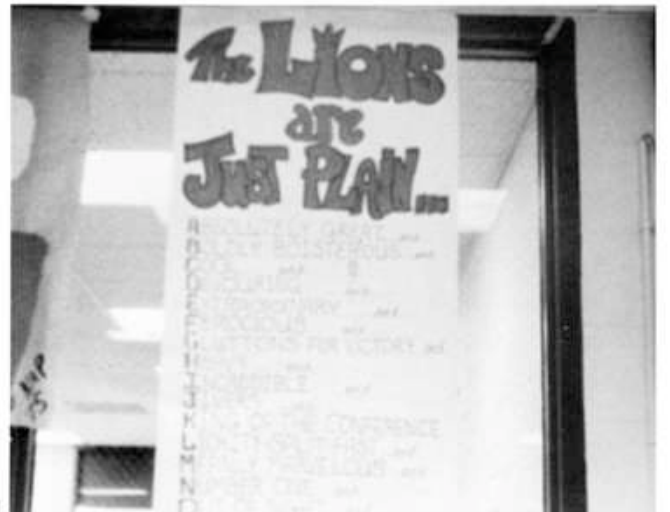
