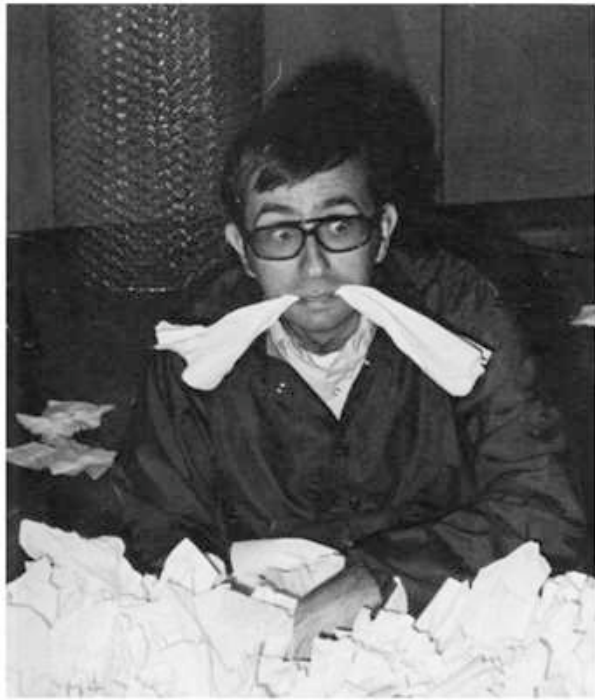

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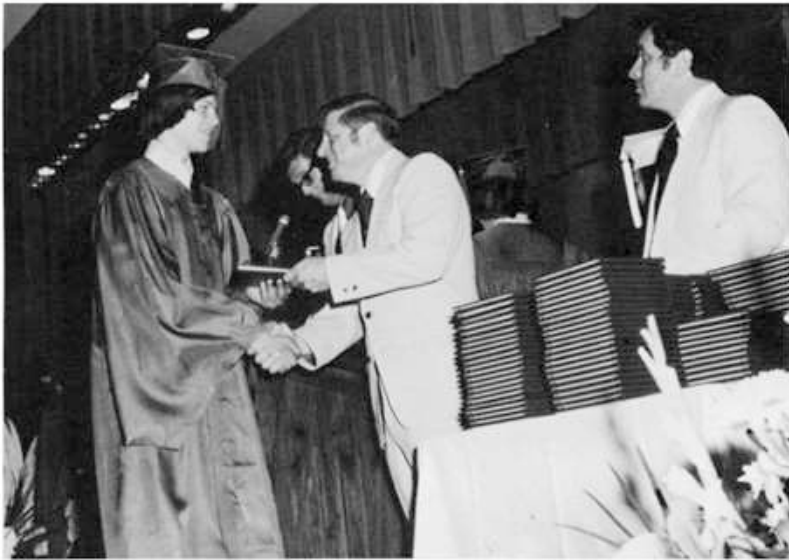
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# Only Just The Start

For seniors, graduation marked not only a reflection of the past, but also a reaching out to future dreams. . . . 1975 was truly a vintage year!



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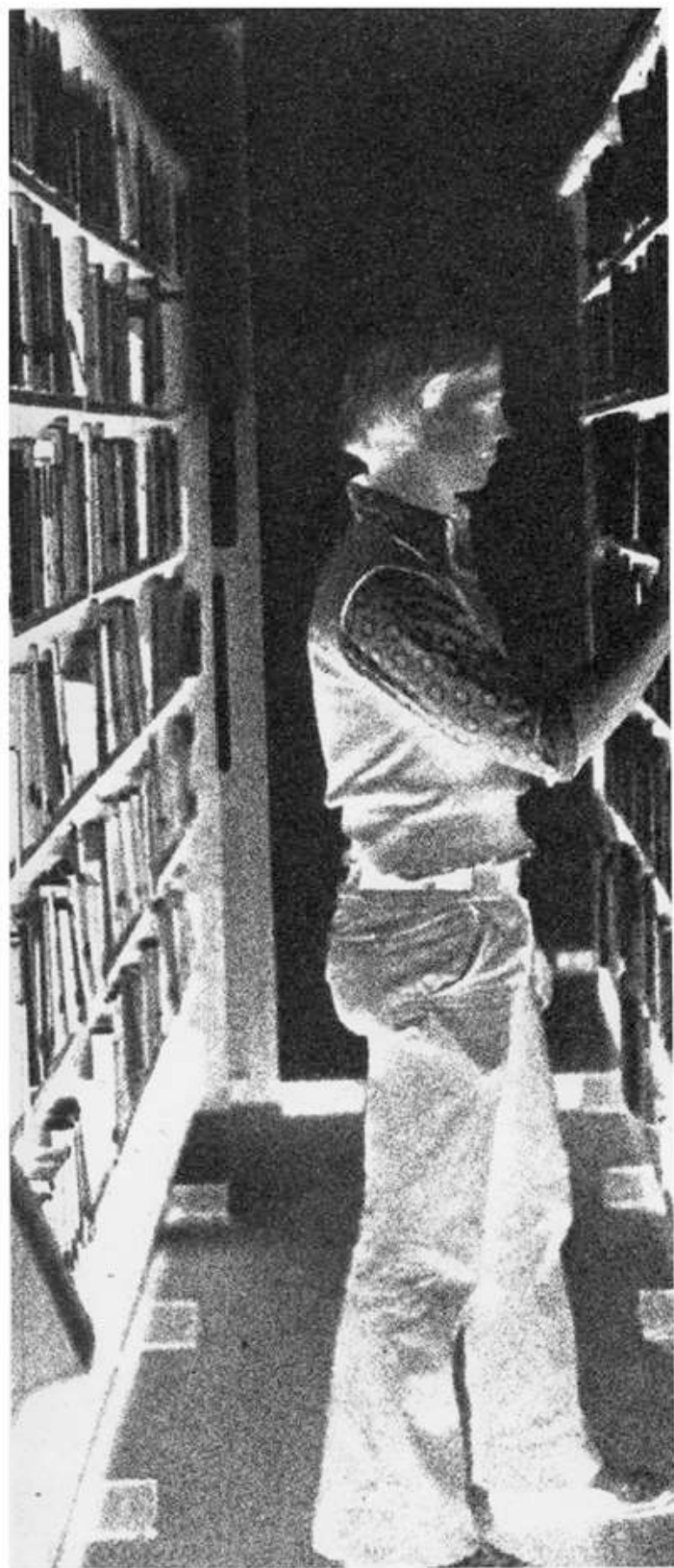

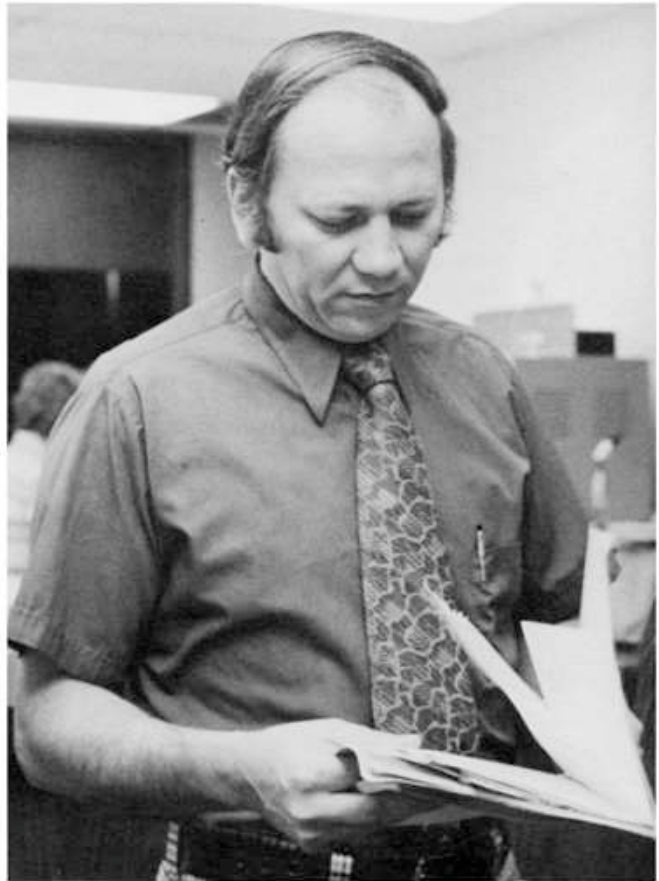

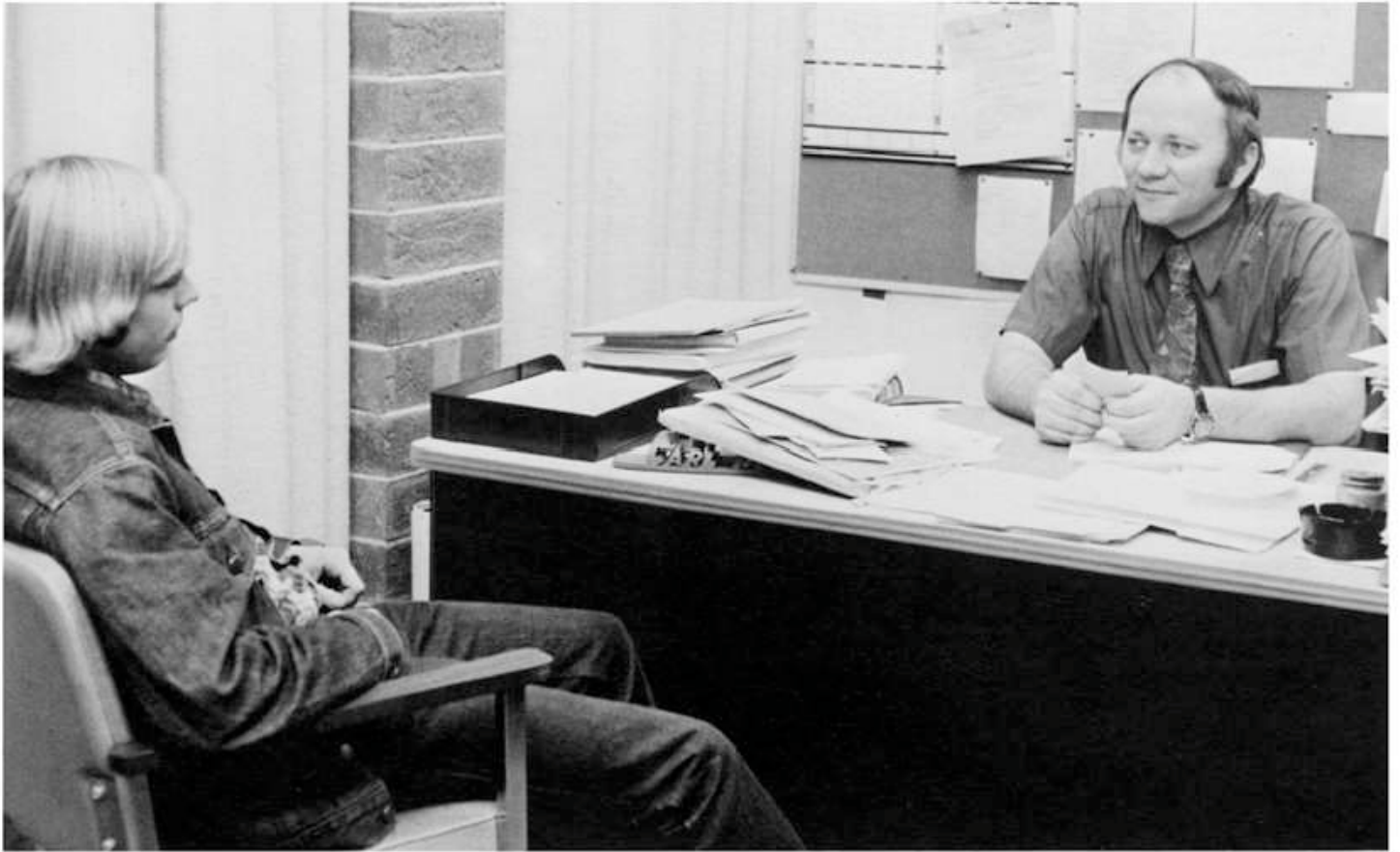


# Administration Is Busy And Efficient This Year

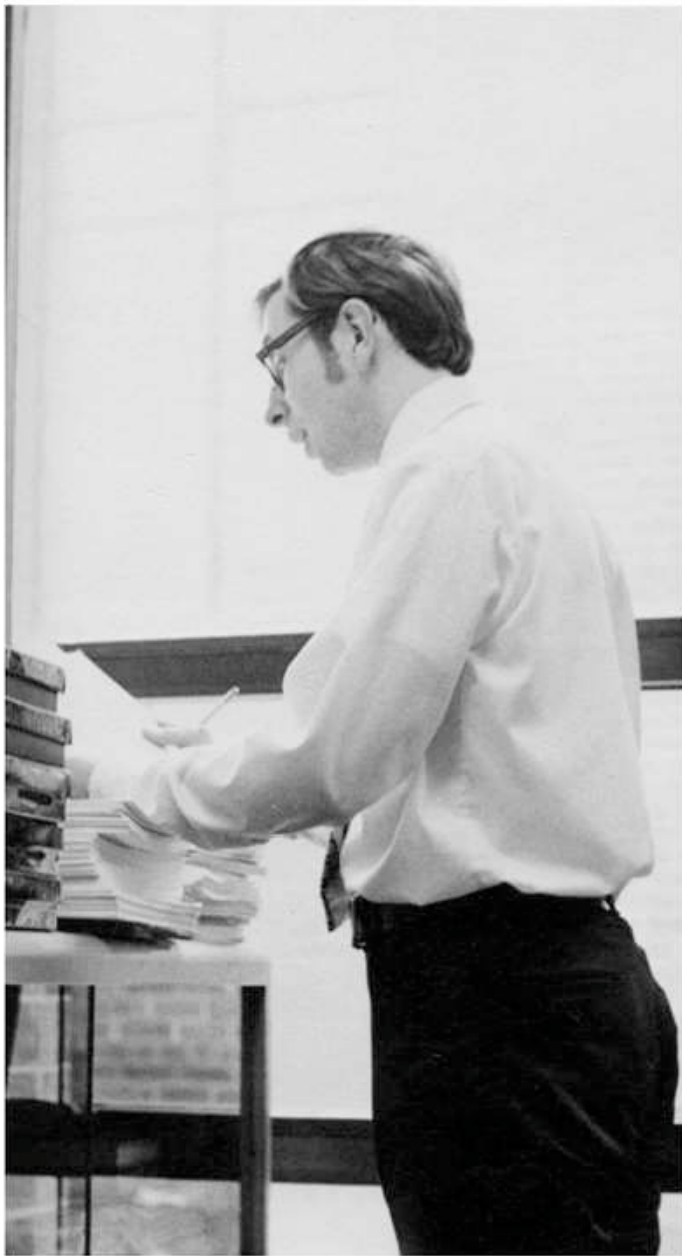




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## Counselors Wisely Guide The Way

The English department, largest of all departments, had another change this year with the addition of Mr. Flaherty. He taught sophomore English classes as well as two Spanish classes.



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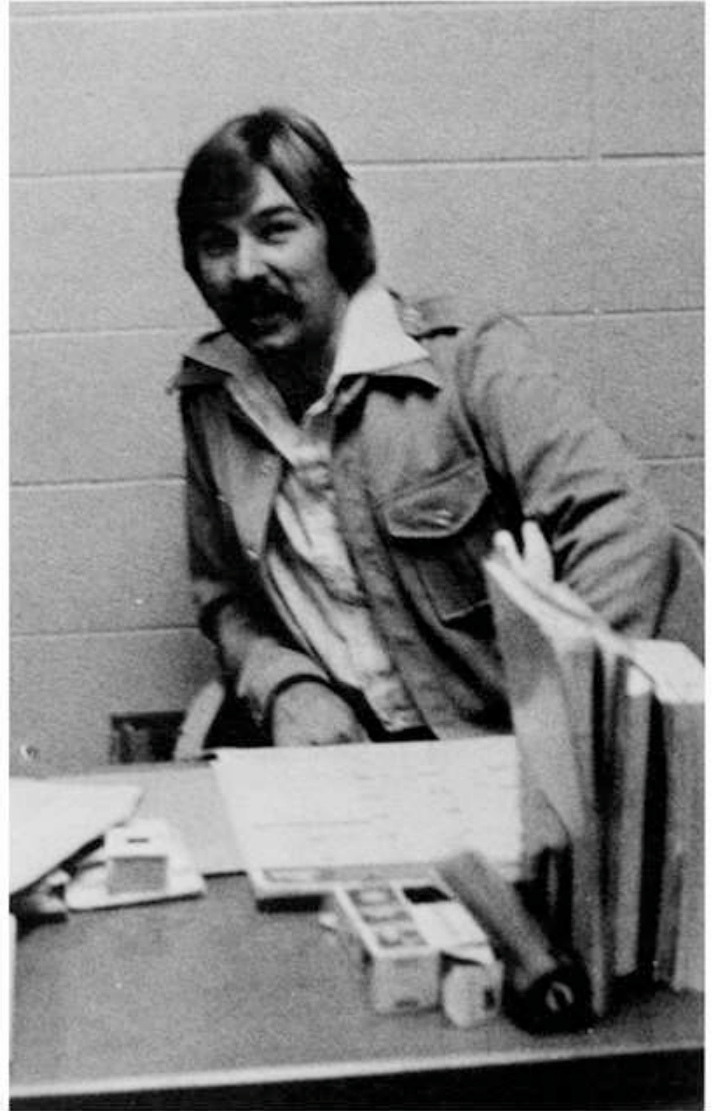

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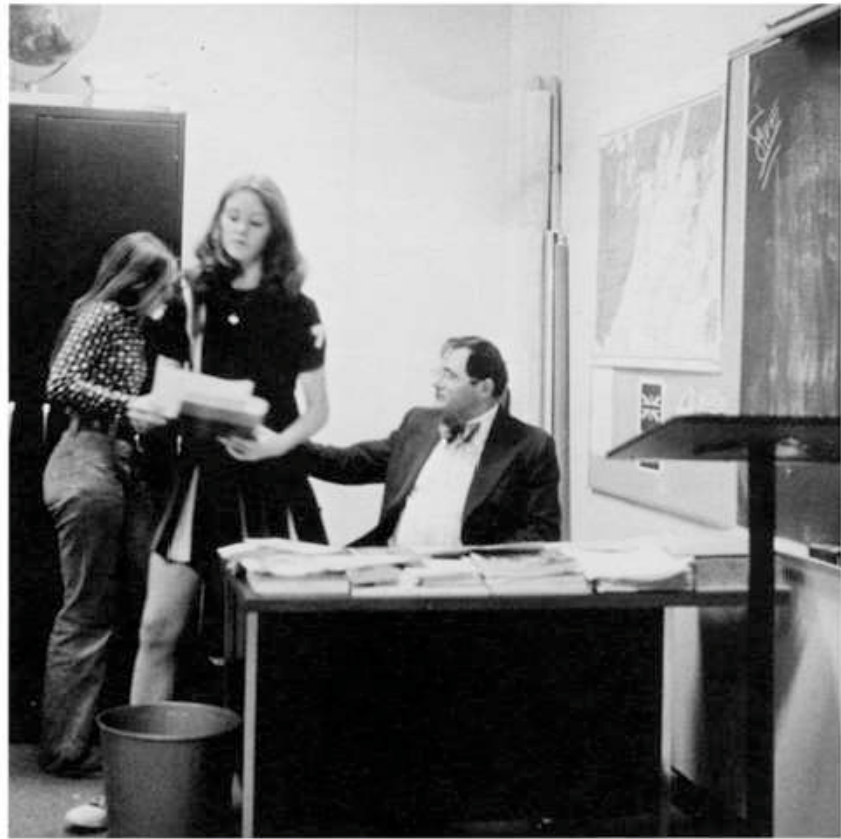
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# '76 Makes History

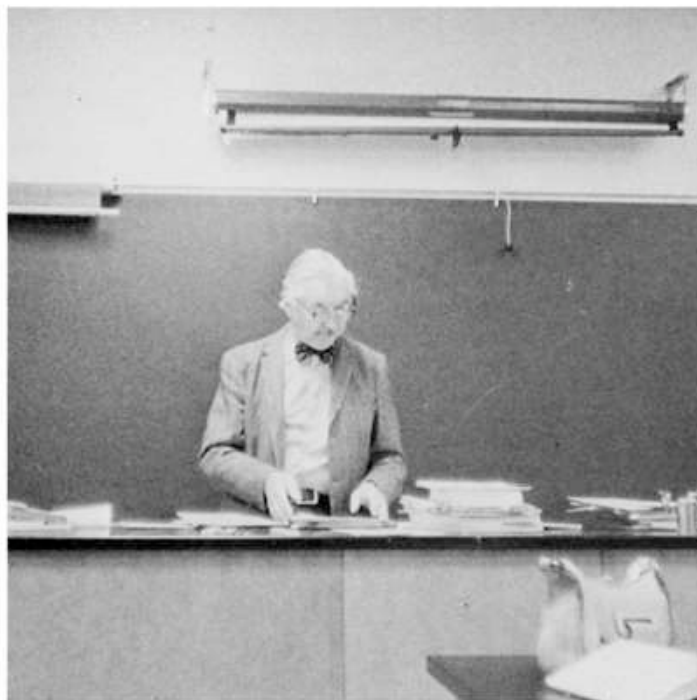


# Calculators Save Time

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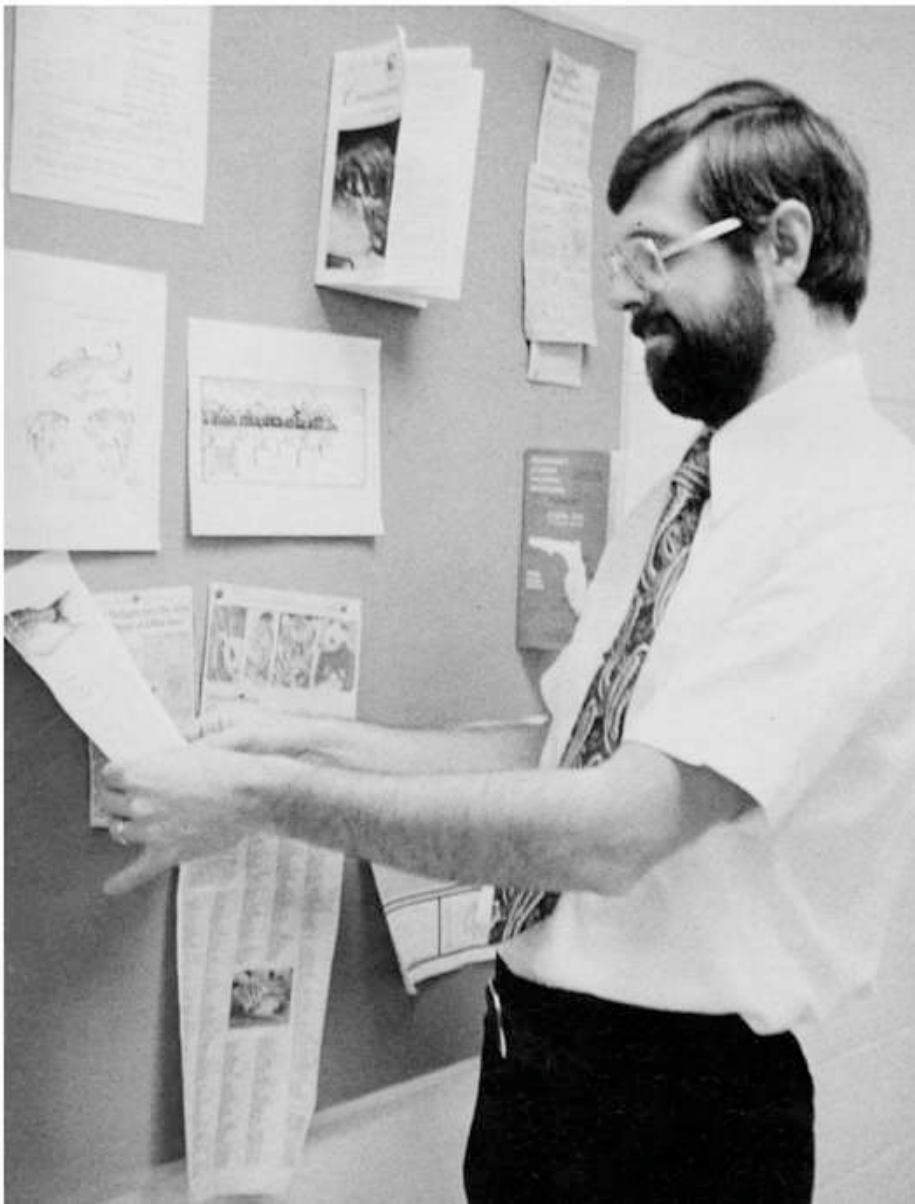
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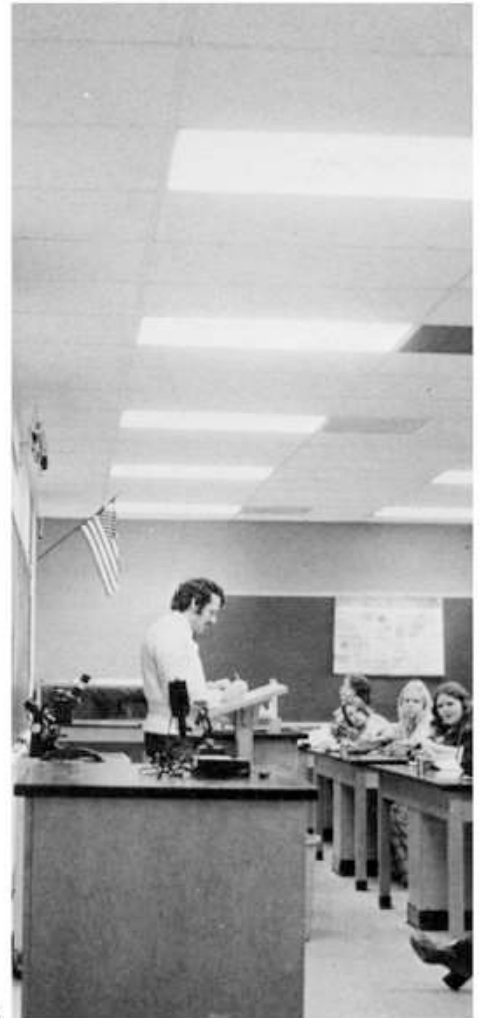

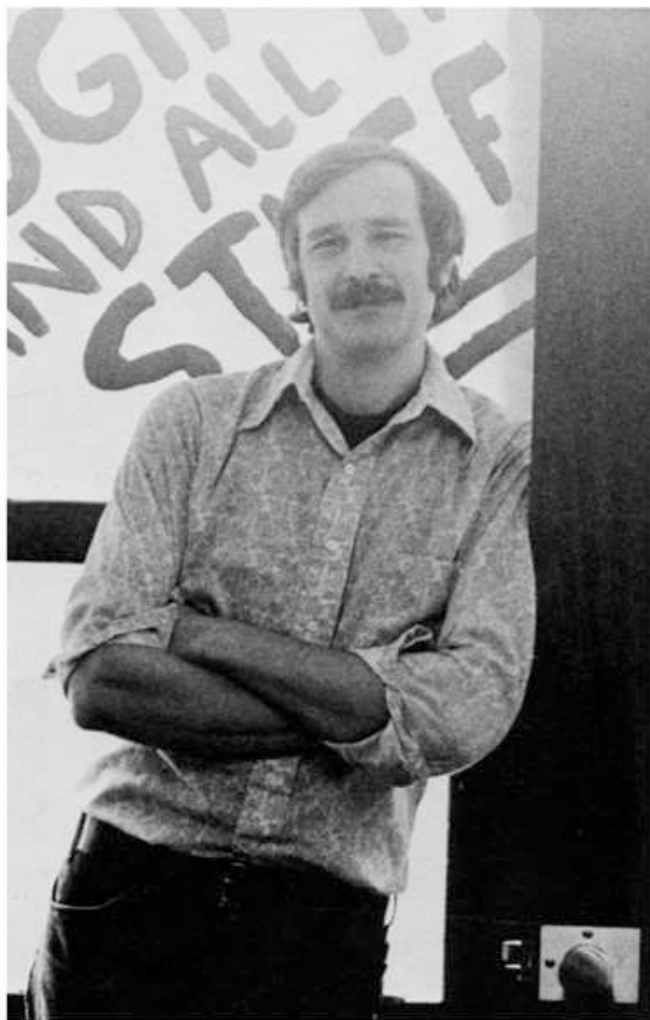
## Math Computes Ahead

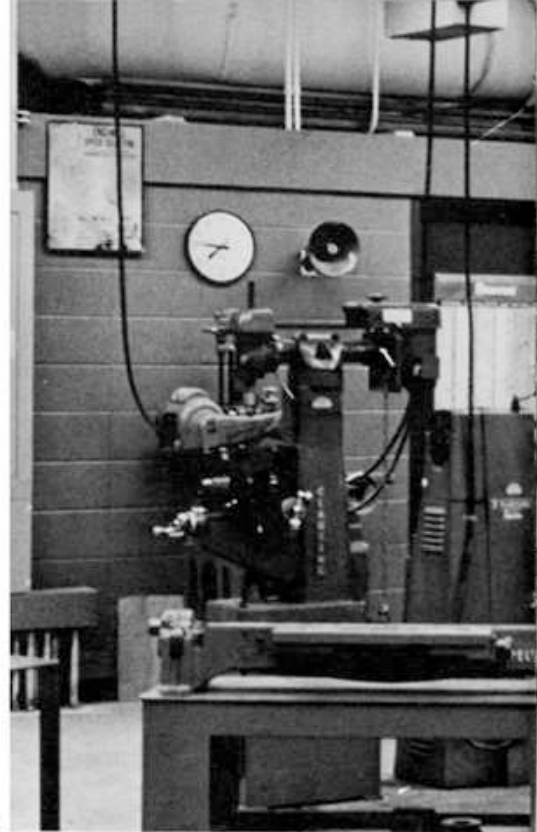

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## Five Ways To Learn

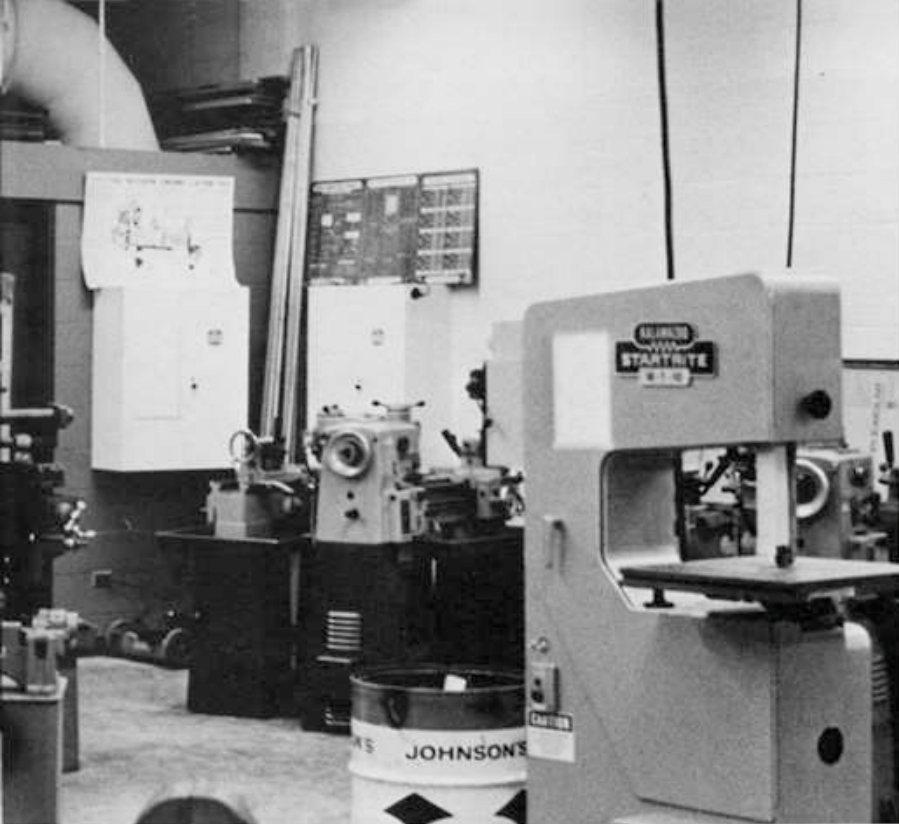
Students enrolled in vocational classes were always aware of the five senses within the human body.

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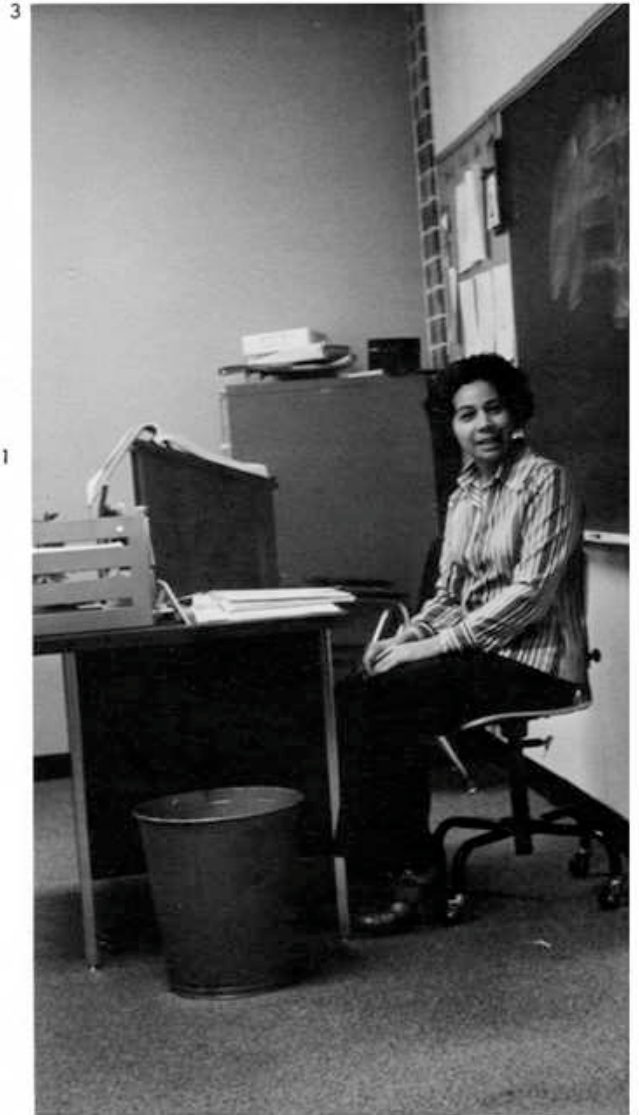

The occupations offered in the program were business and office, distribution, and marketing, health, trade, and industrial and home economics.

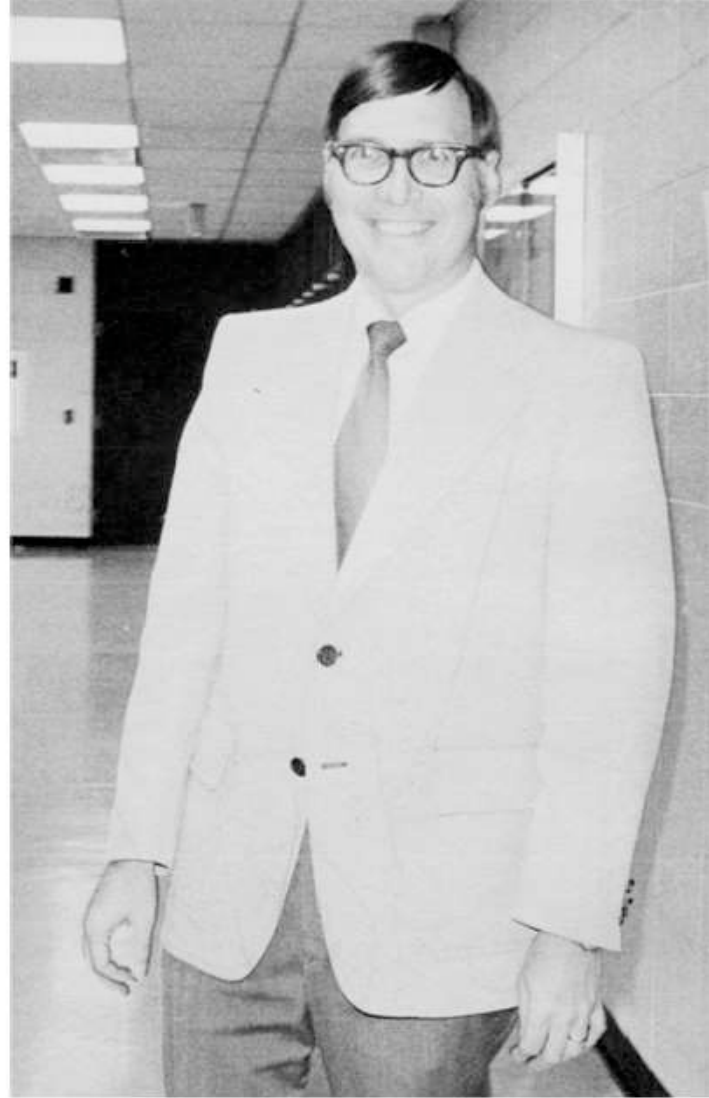

# DAVEA Offers Skills

The DuPage Area Vocational Education Authority gave each student learning opportunities with "hands-on" experience in the thirty different programs offered. The main purpose of the DAVEA Center was to offer practical advanced training which would head students towards certified employability. 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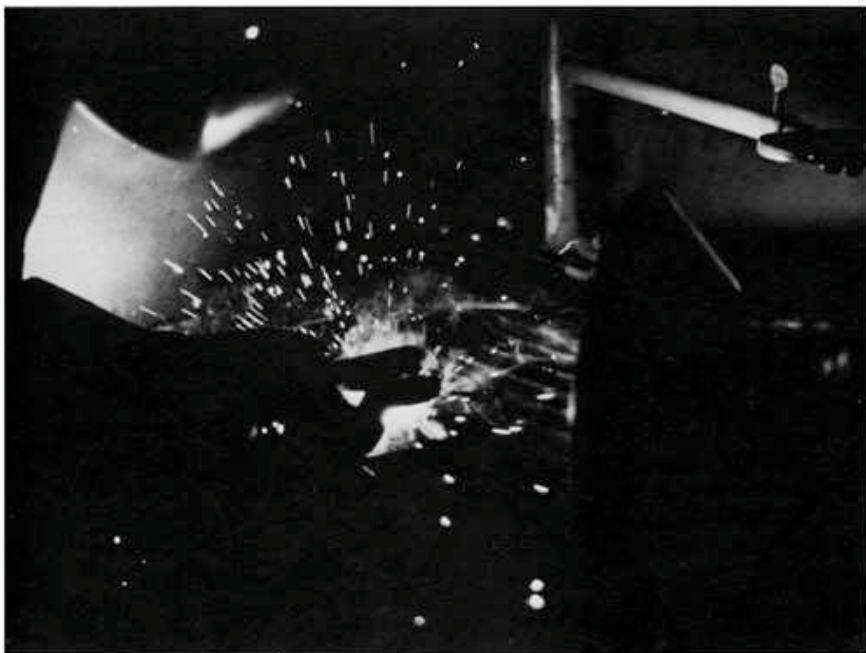

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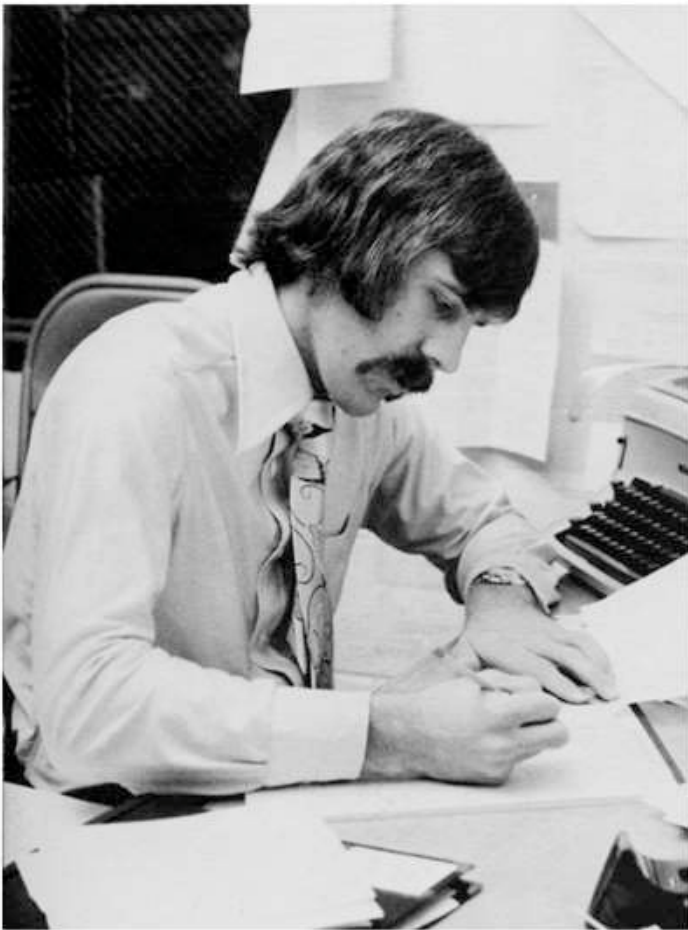

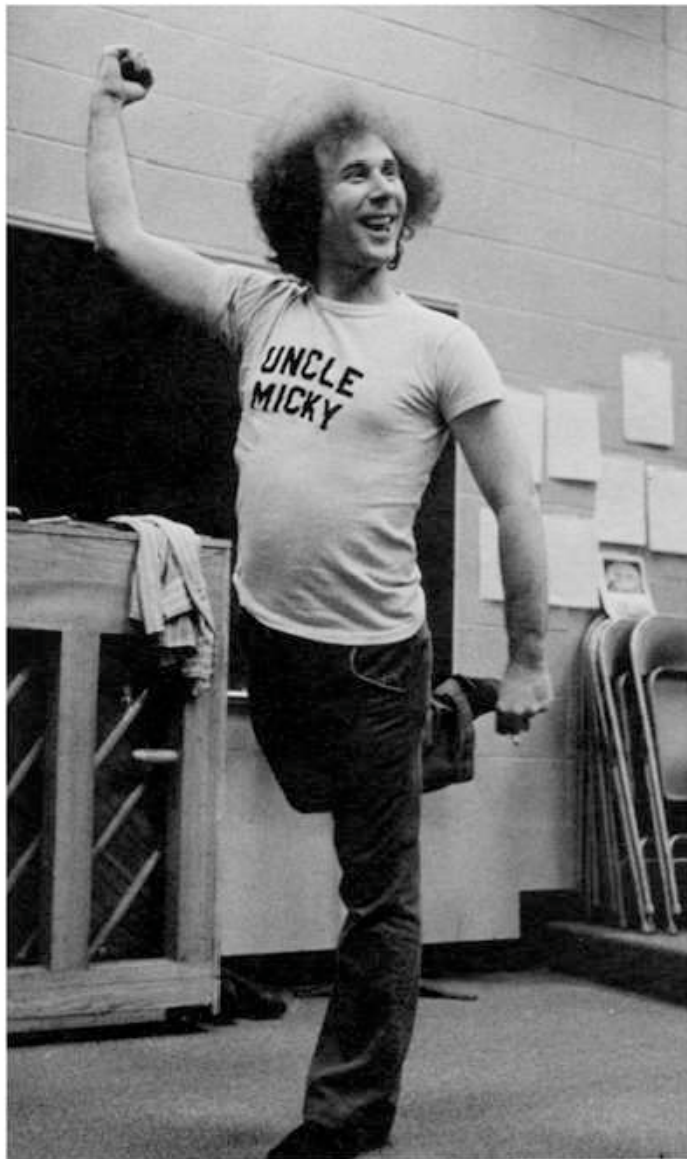

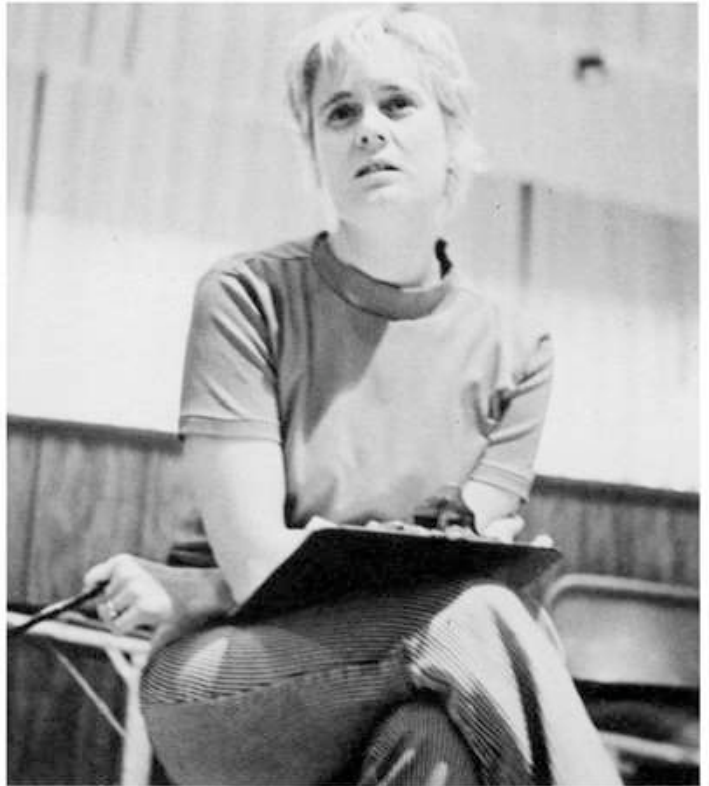
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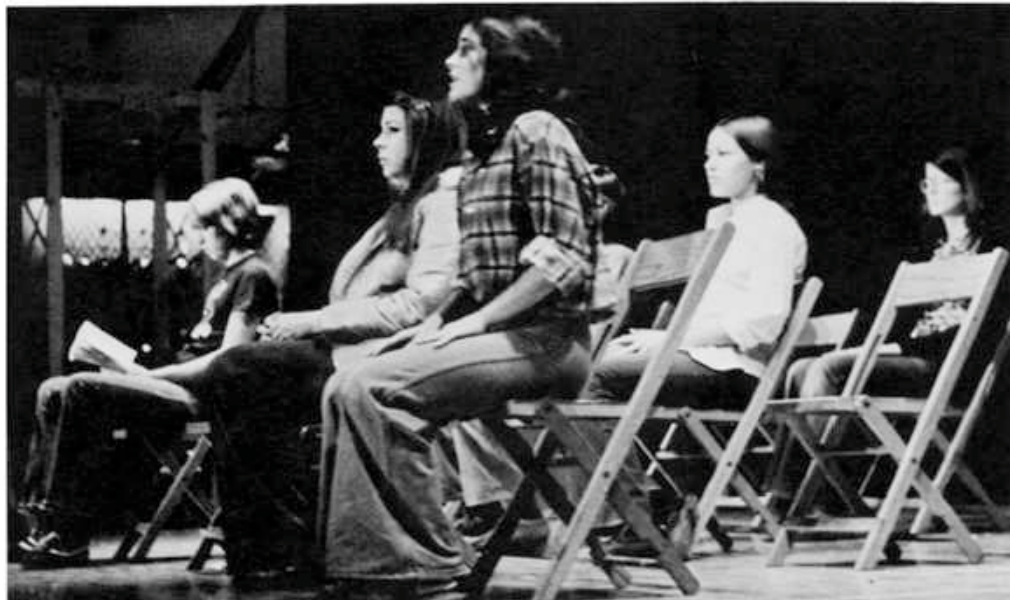

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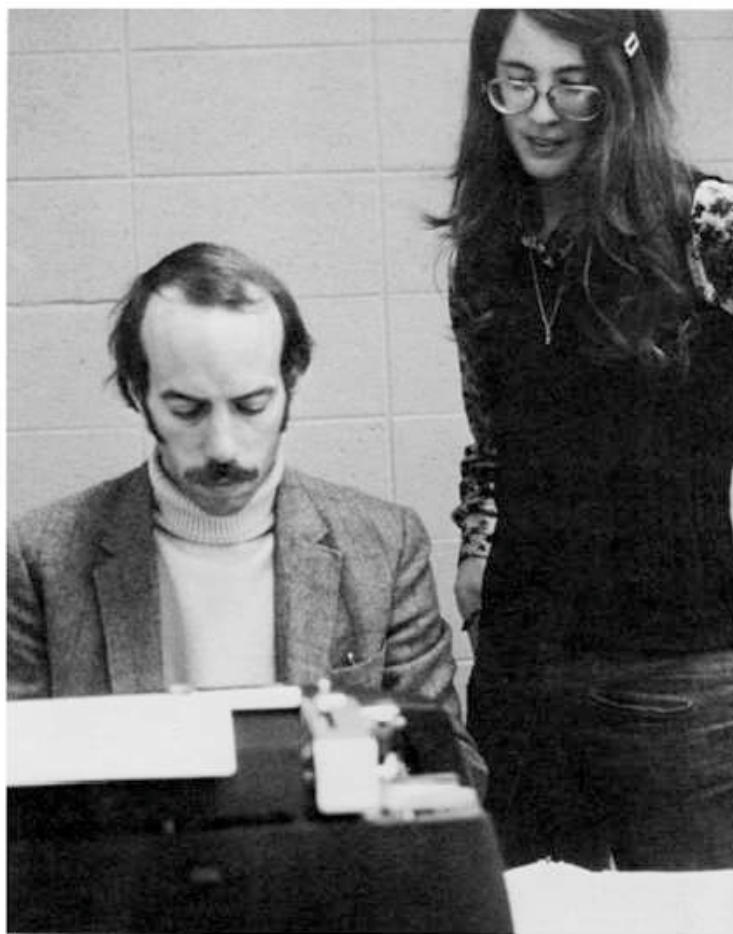


## Beginning Journalists Join The Lion PRIDE

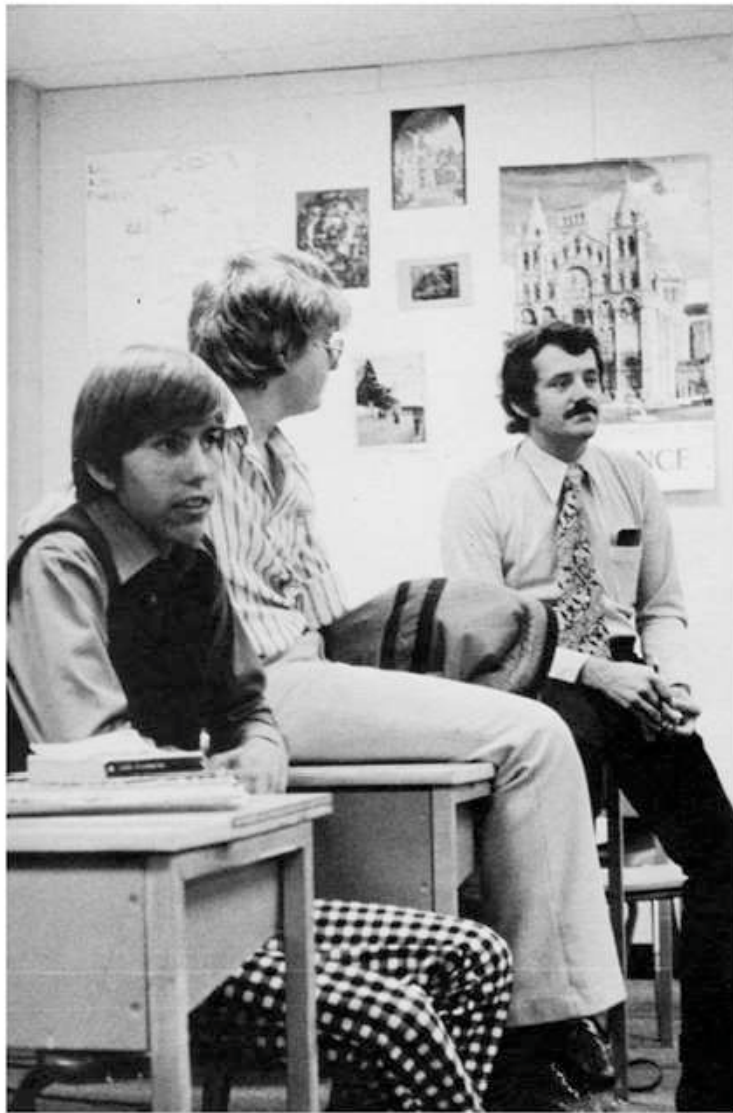

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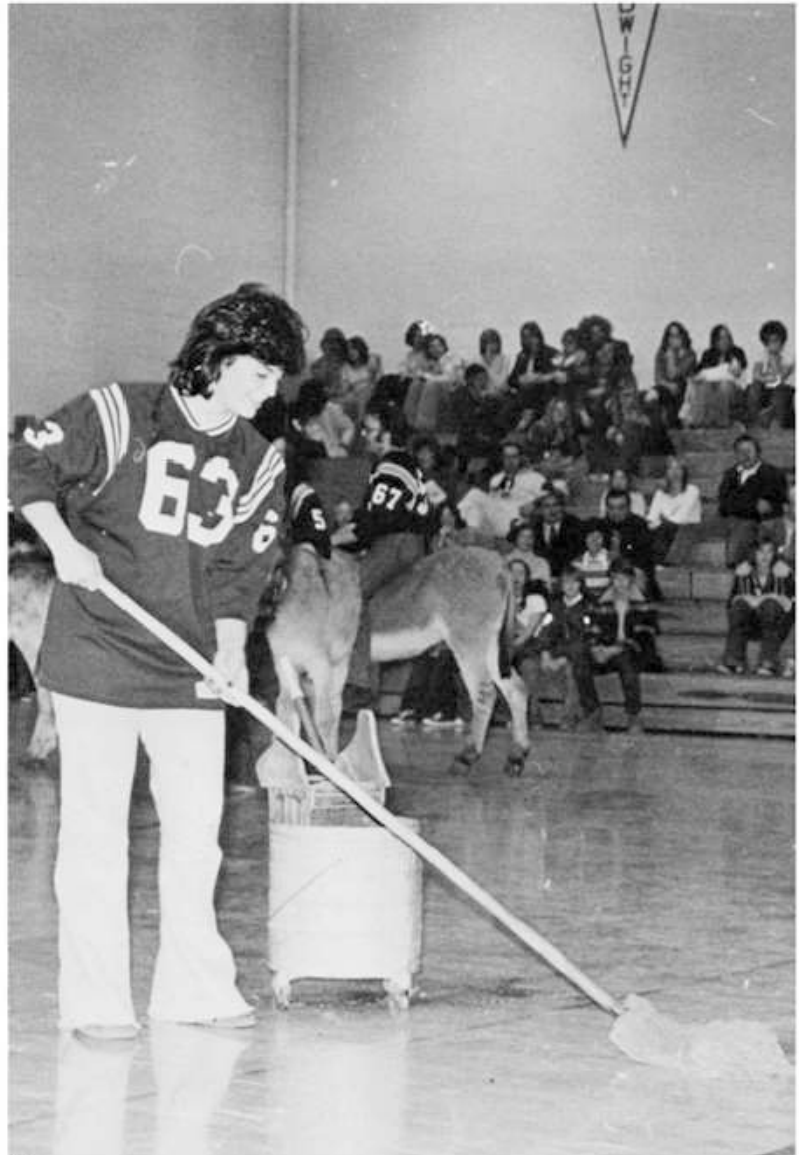
## Science Is Discovery

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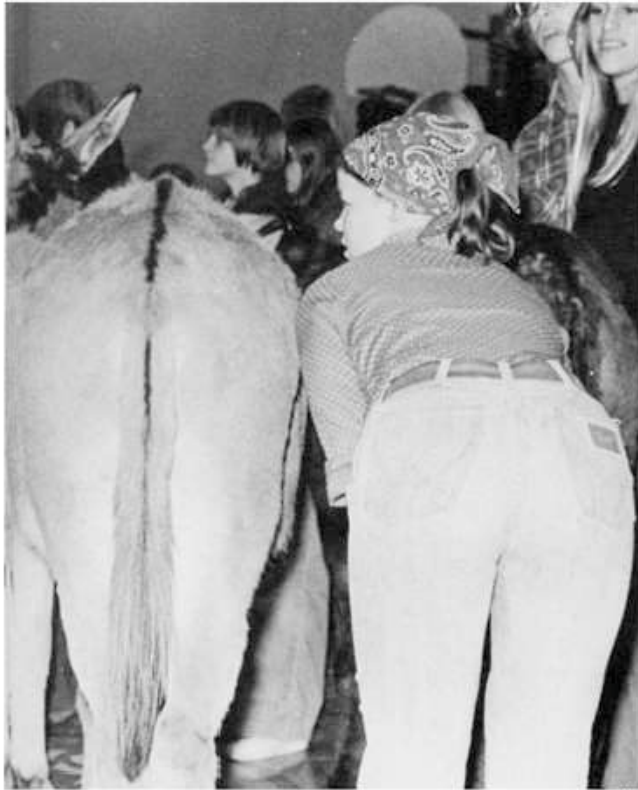

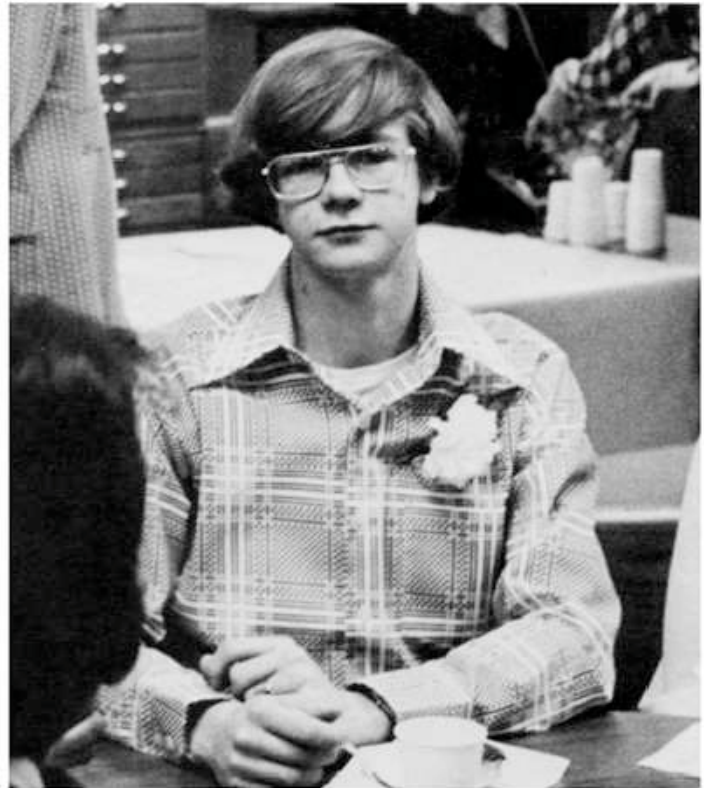
Nine days later, FBLA sponsored a Donkey Basketball game. The students lost to the faculty. A cake raffle was also held at the game.

All of this money was being saved for one goal — a weekend trip to a business convention in Springfield. The club had a successful trip.

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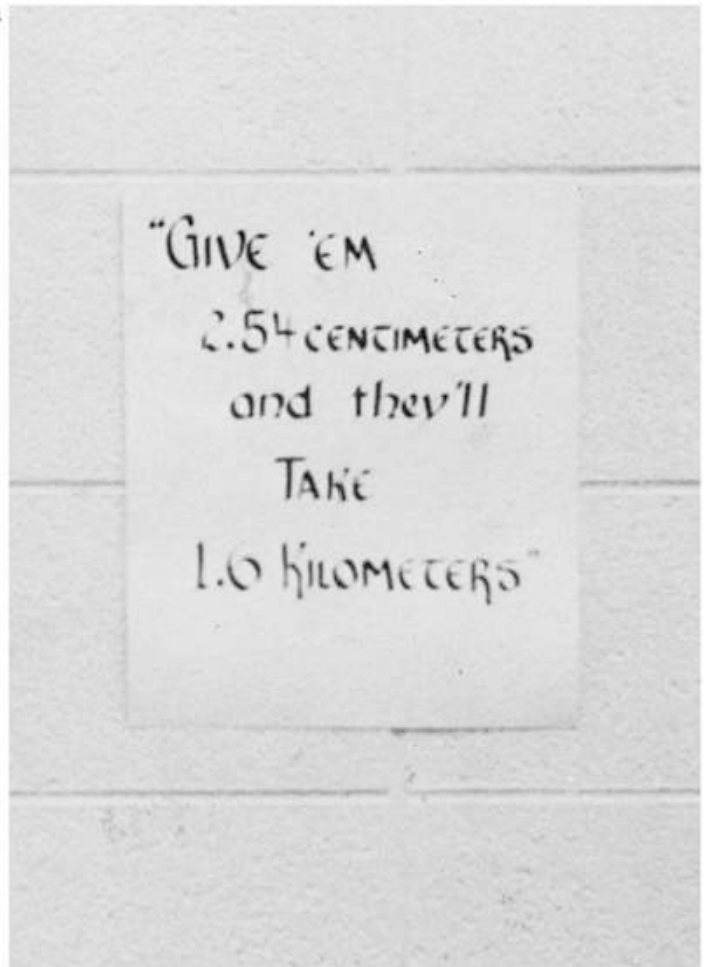

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
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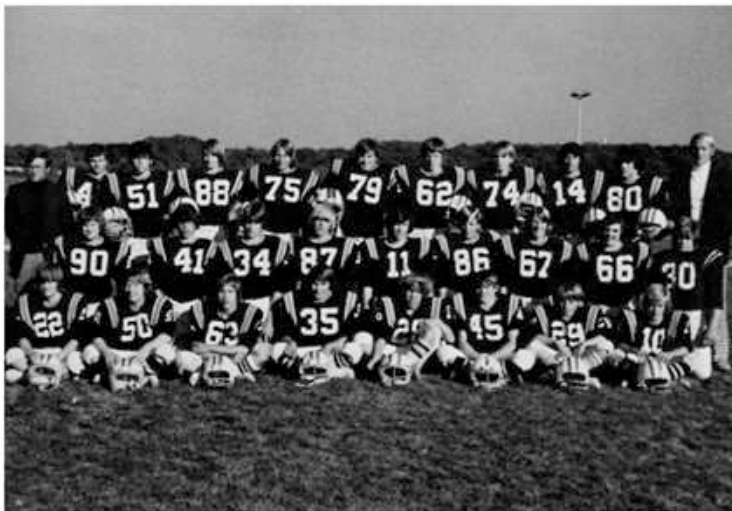


## Sophs Share Glory

Since Coach Nalley has introduced the wishbone offense in 1972, he and Coach Nehaus have compiled a 28-9-1 record at Lisle.



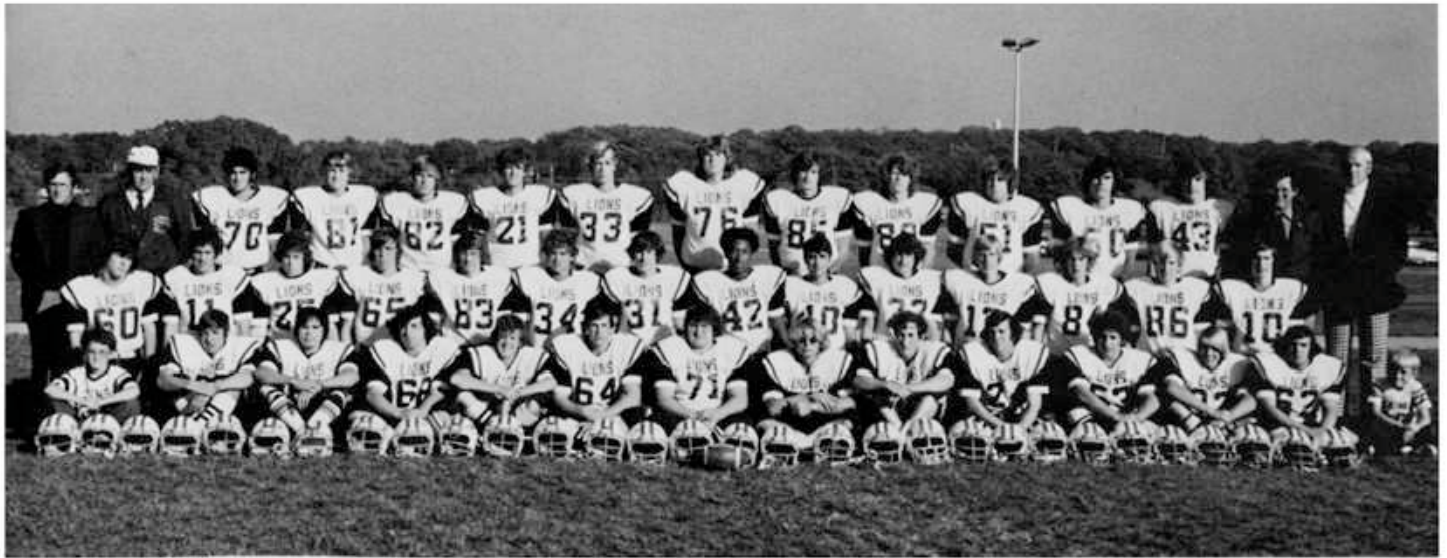

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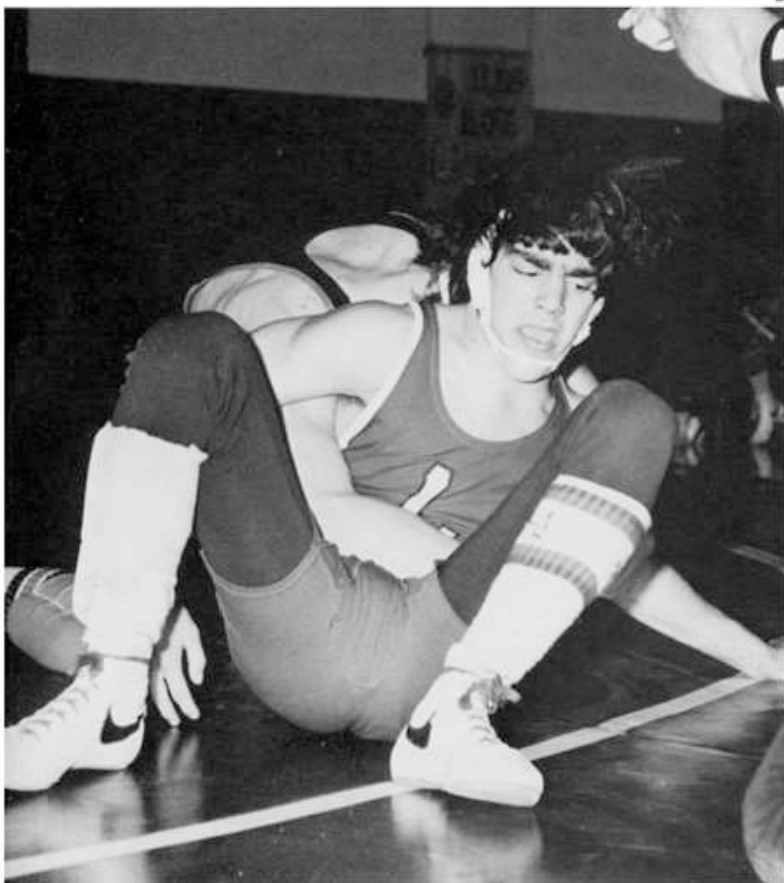
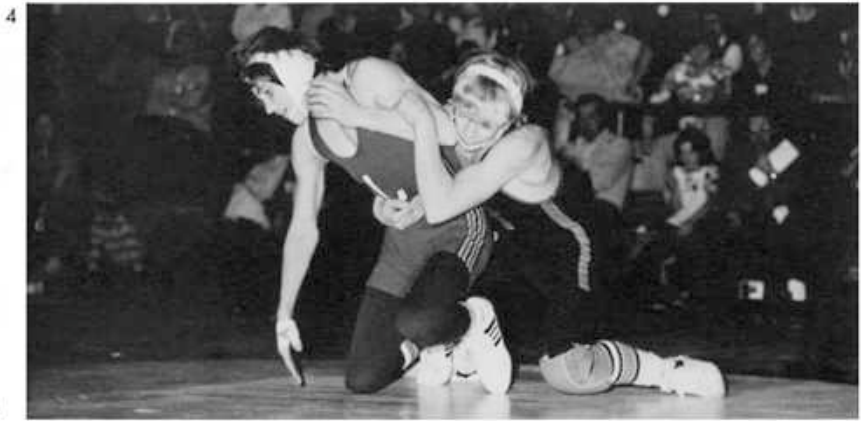
# Sophs Find Range

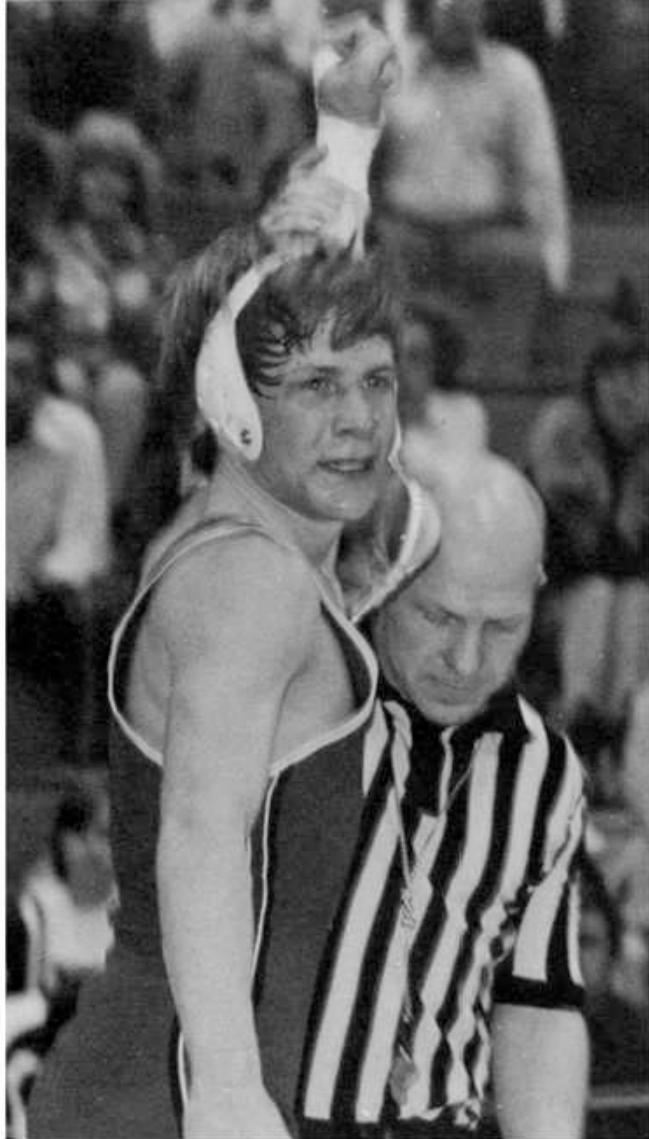




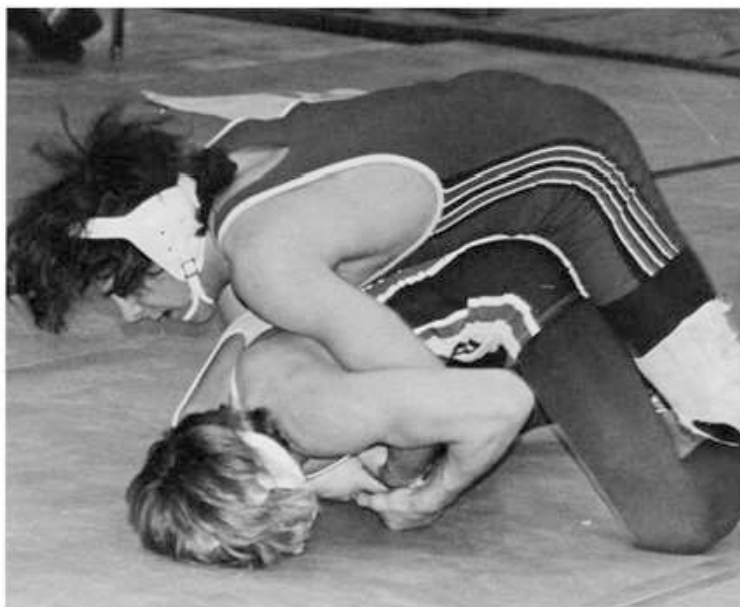
## Wrestlers Show Winning Desire

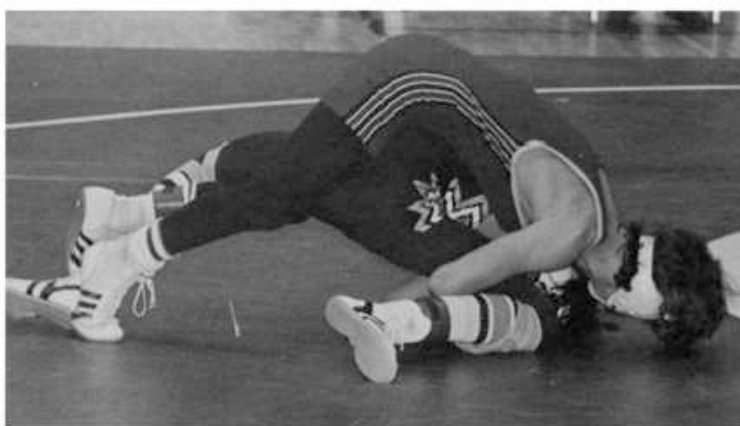

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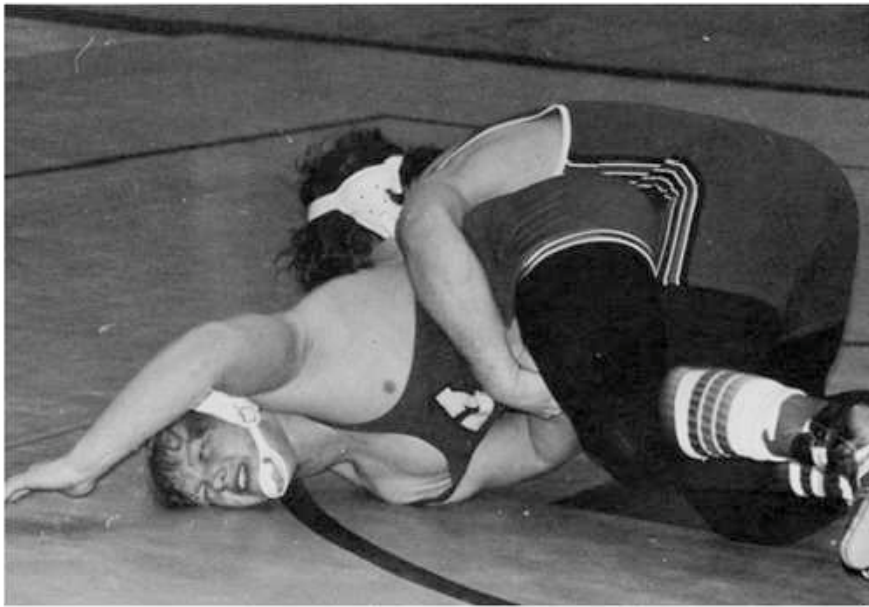


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# Wrestlers Finish Second In NEC

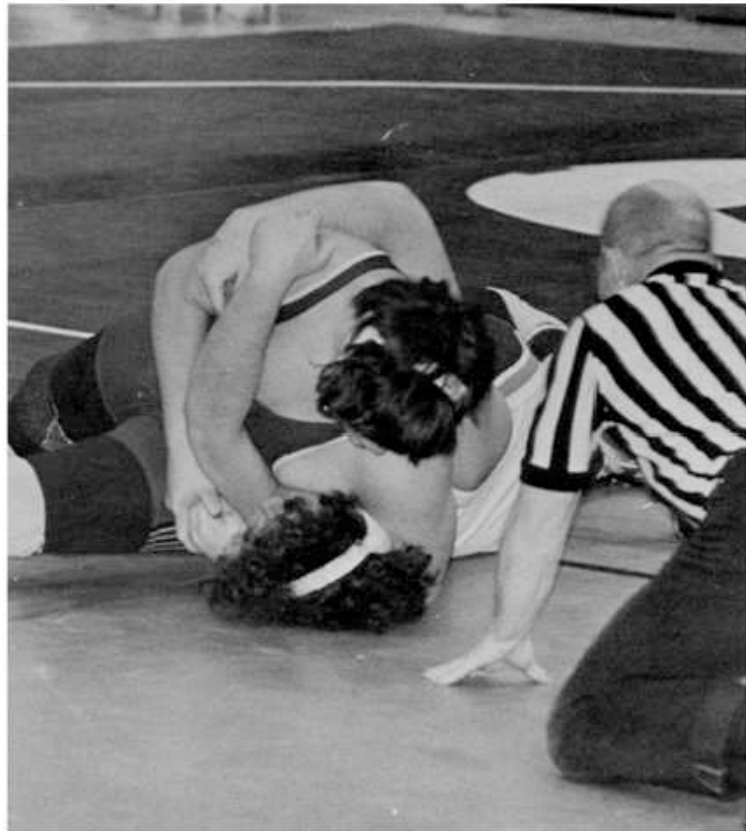

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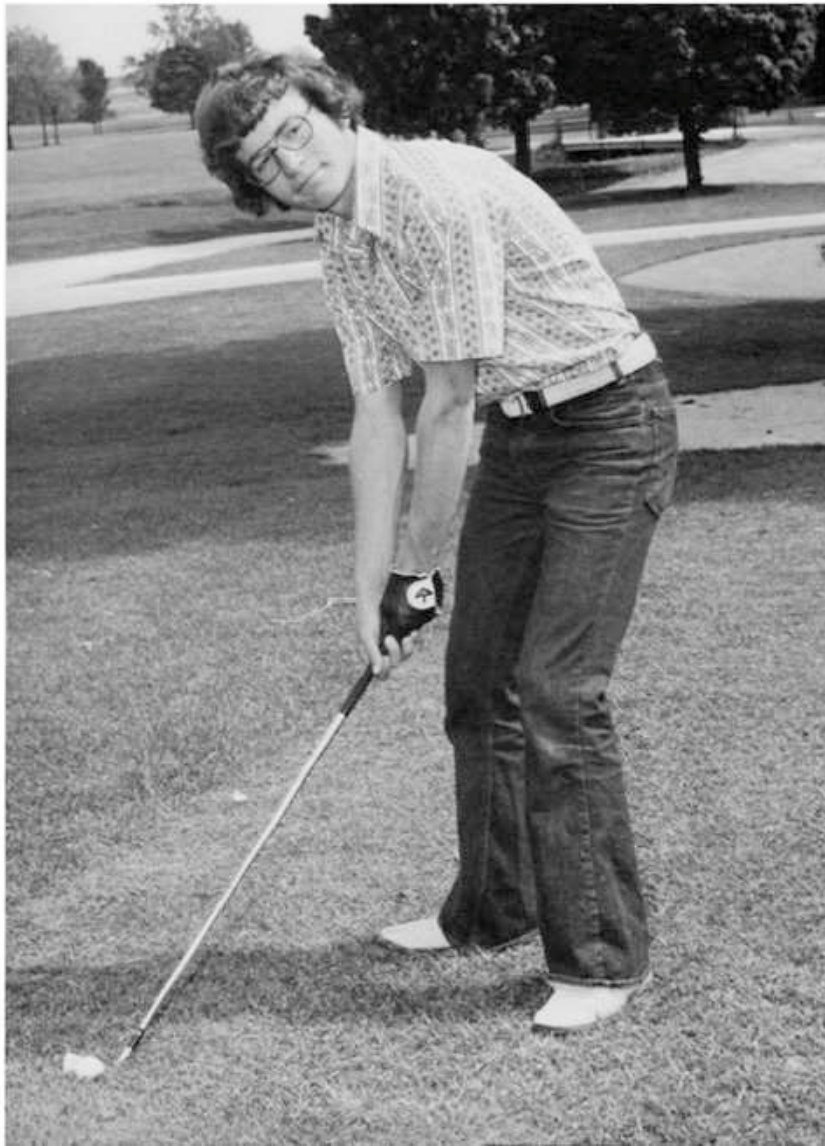

According to Coach Pippen the key to Lisle's success was good hitting, fielding, pitching and a total team effort. The team's hope for a good season was definitely fulfilled.



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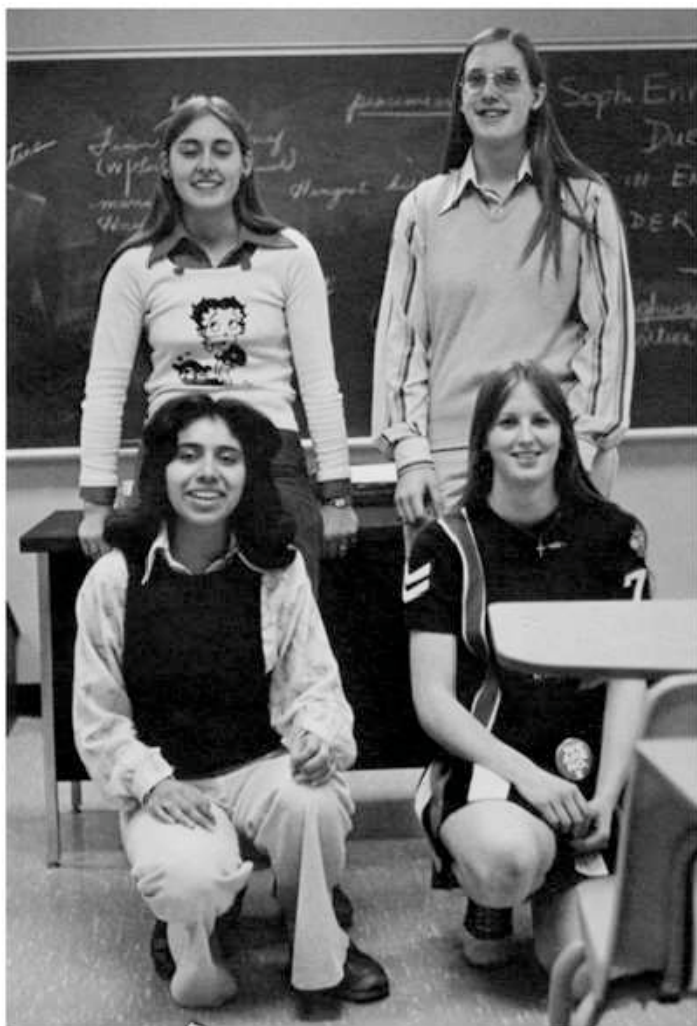

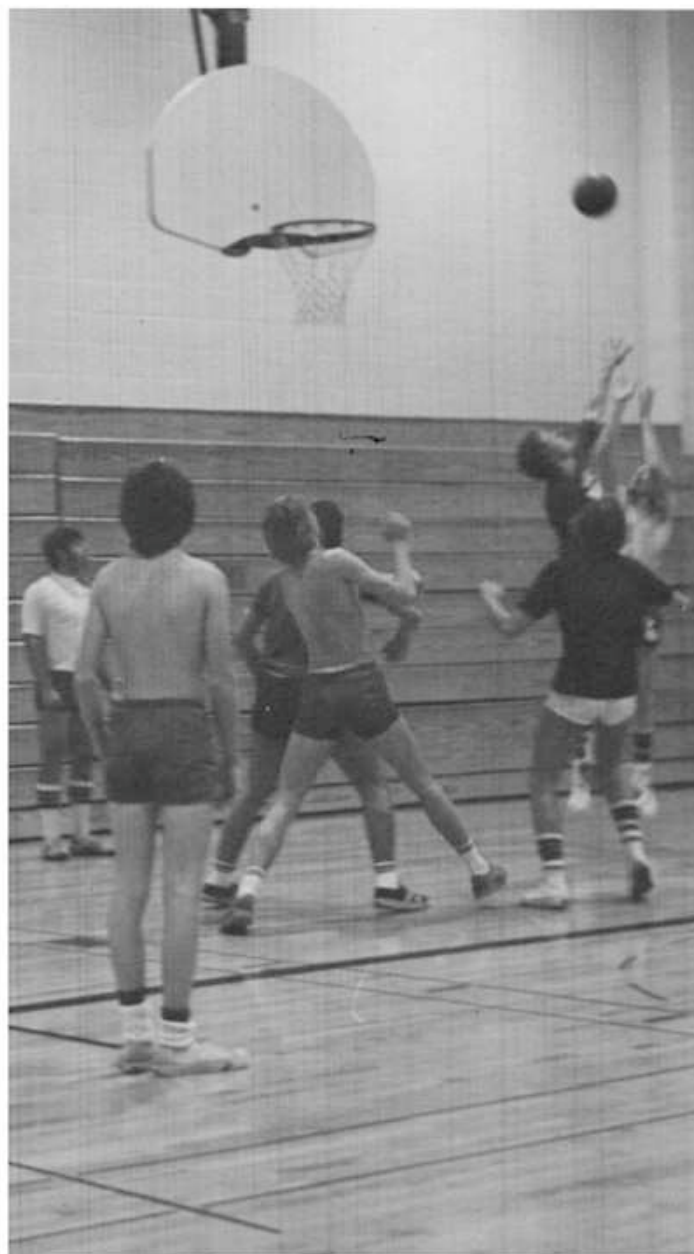


## BAA Is Basketball
