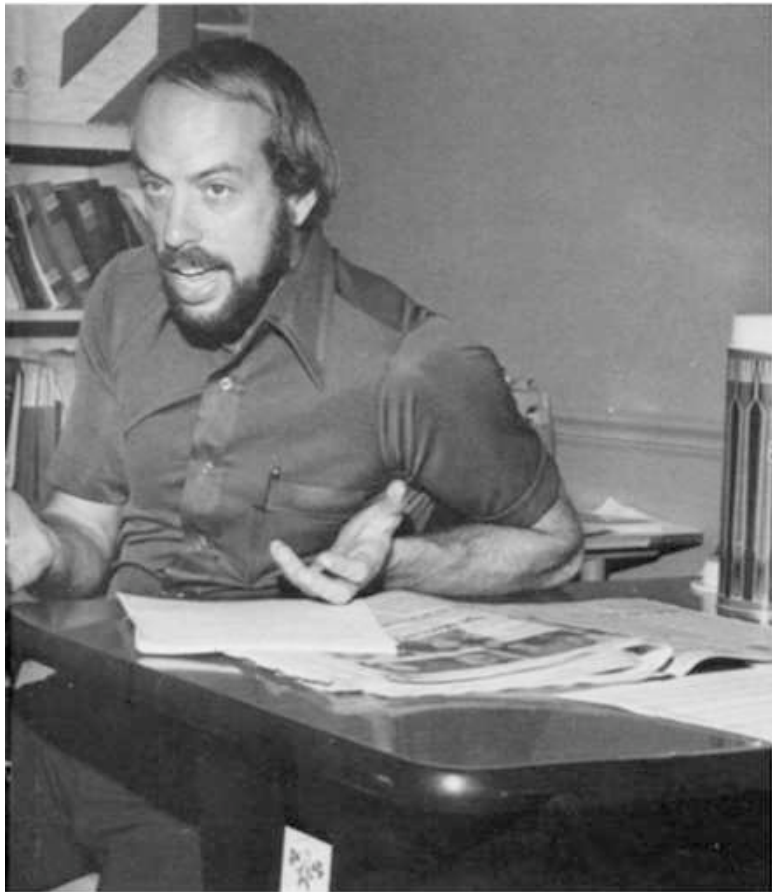

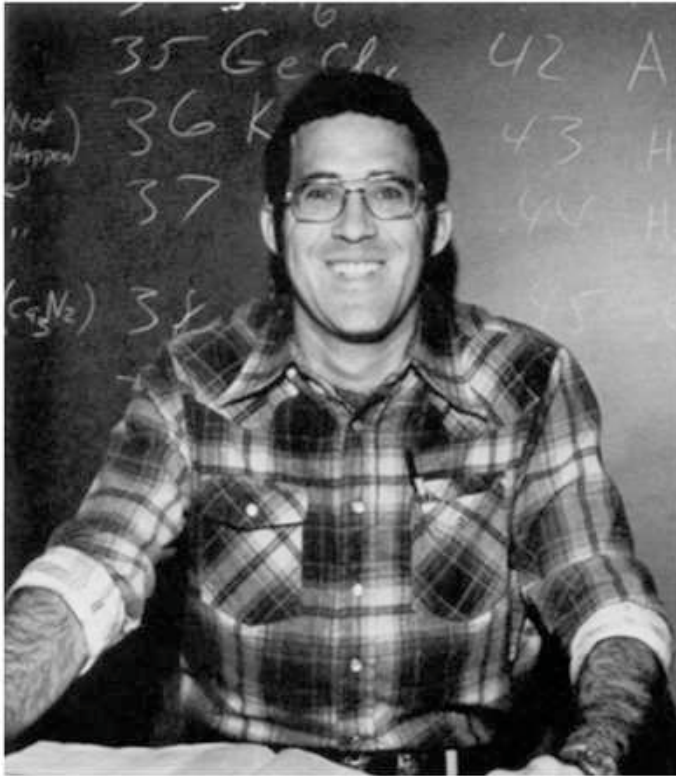

During the year each student was required to take the Physical Fitness Test which included a variety of events. Also, in May the junior and senior girls went on a golf outing.

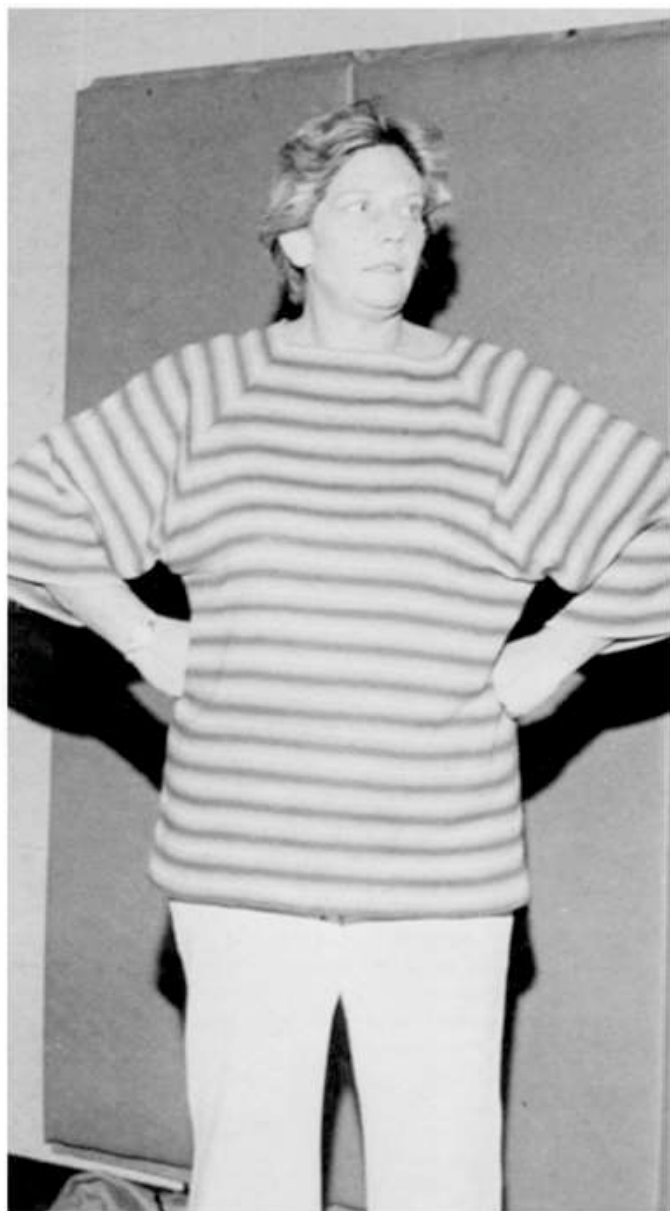
Students commented that gym classes provided a change of pace from the regular schedule during the day.

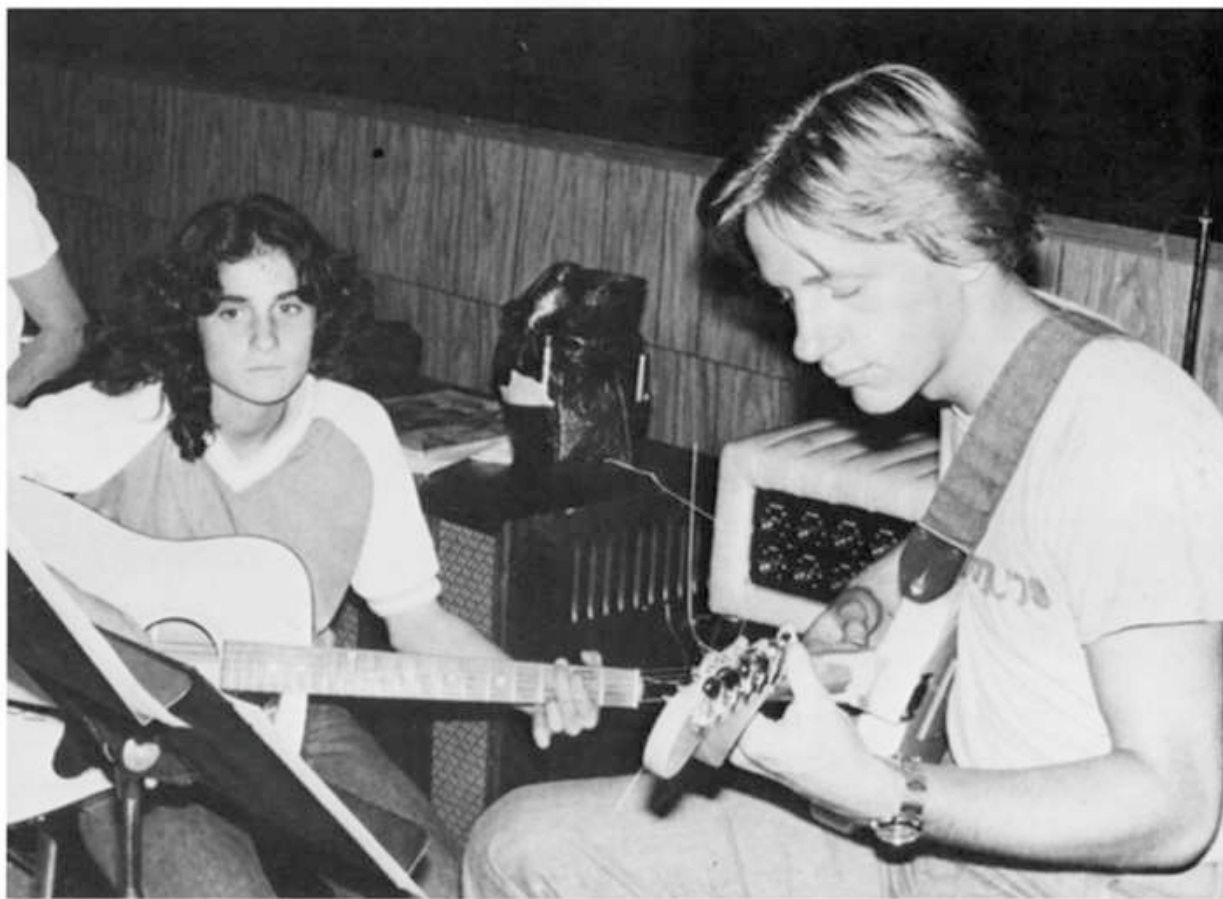

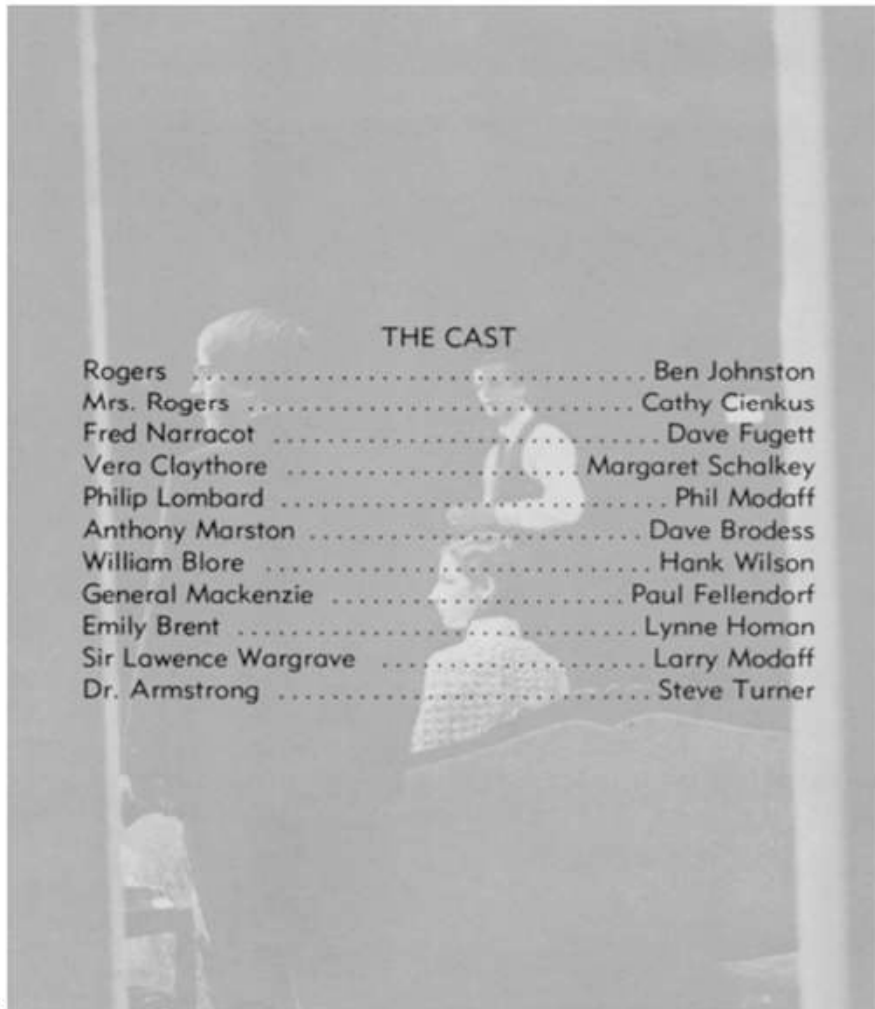

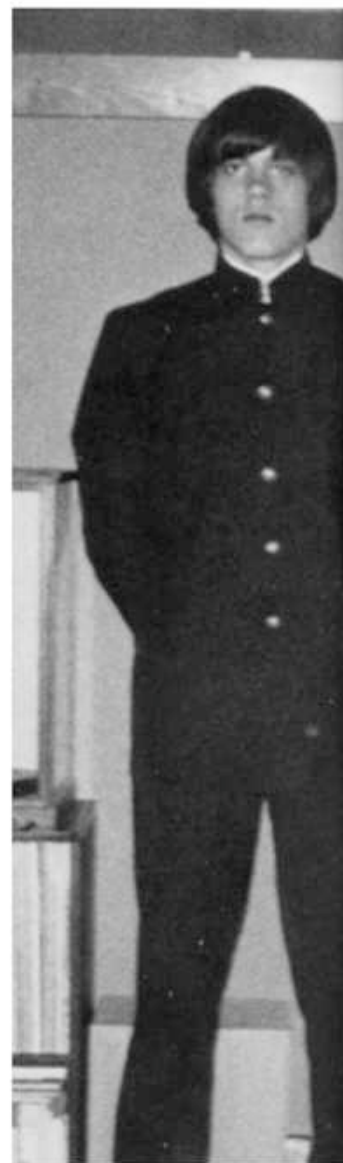

Lions Wrestle Tough: Vodicka Takes State

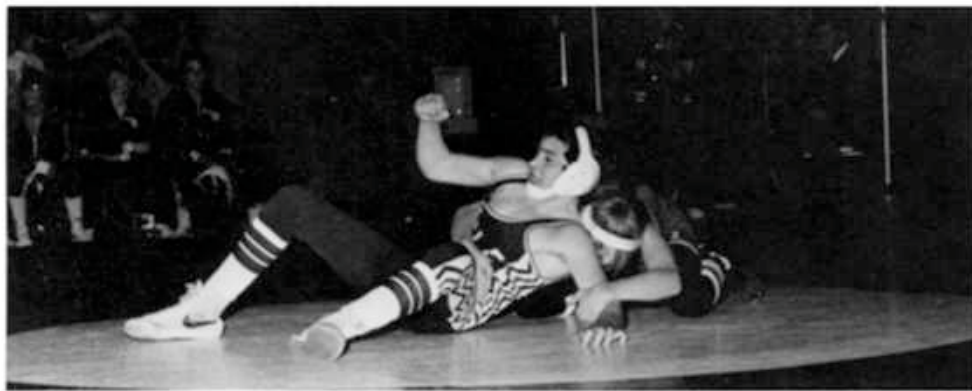

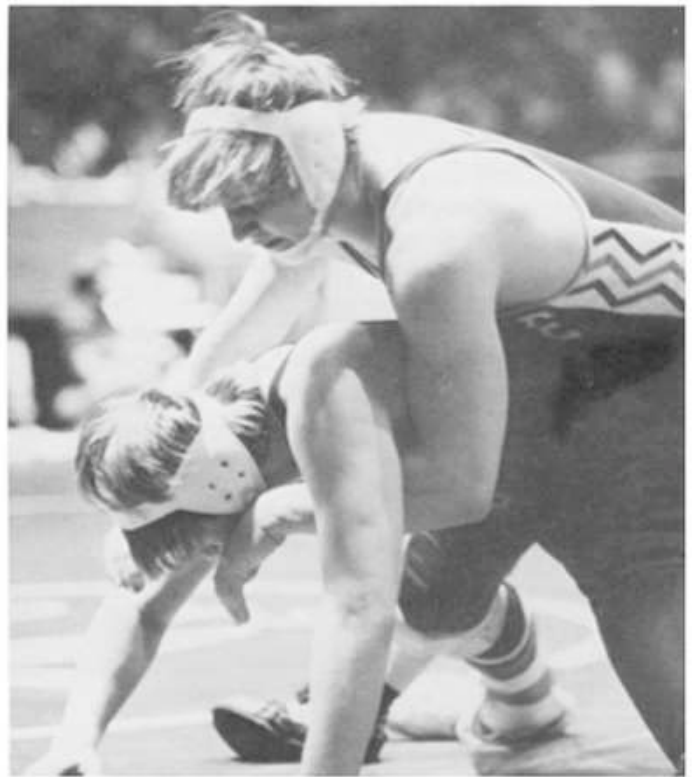

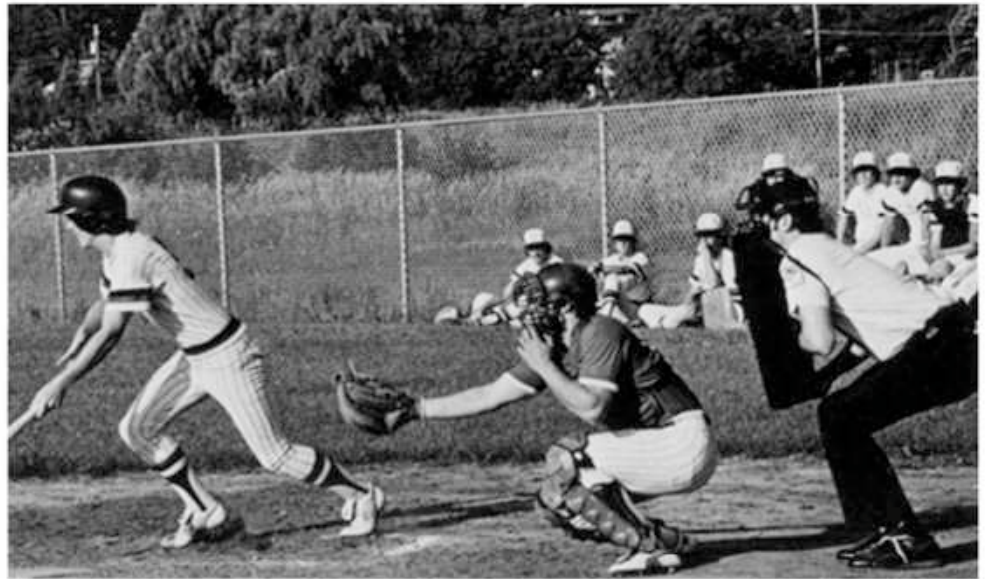

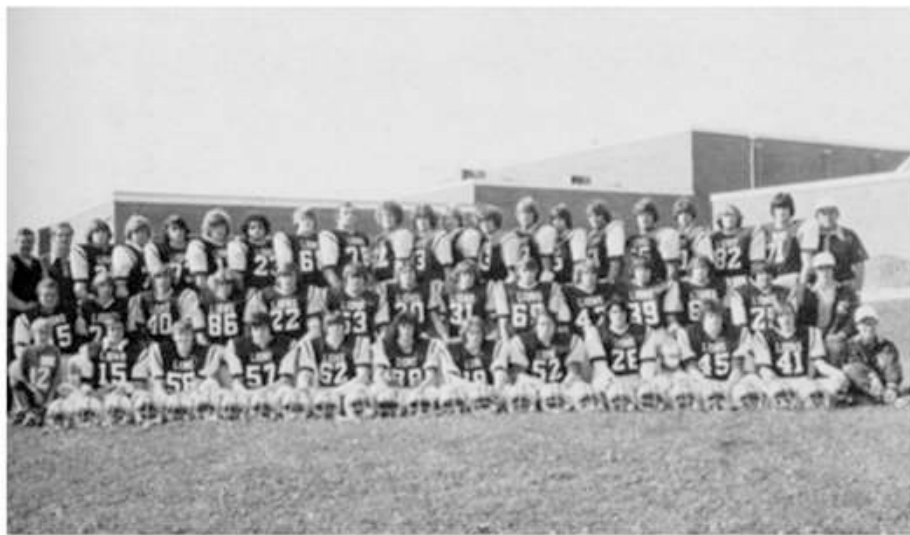
