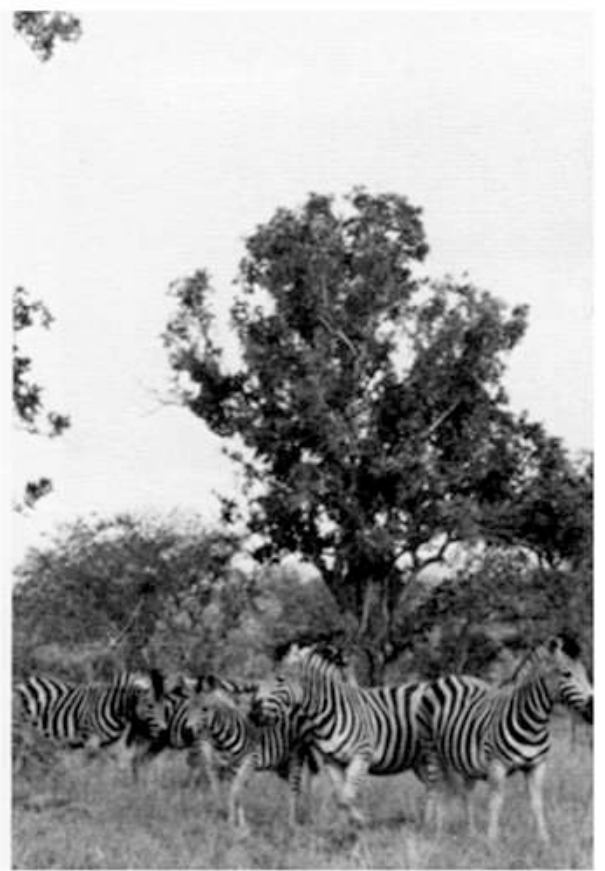
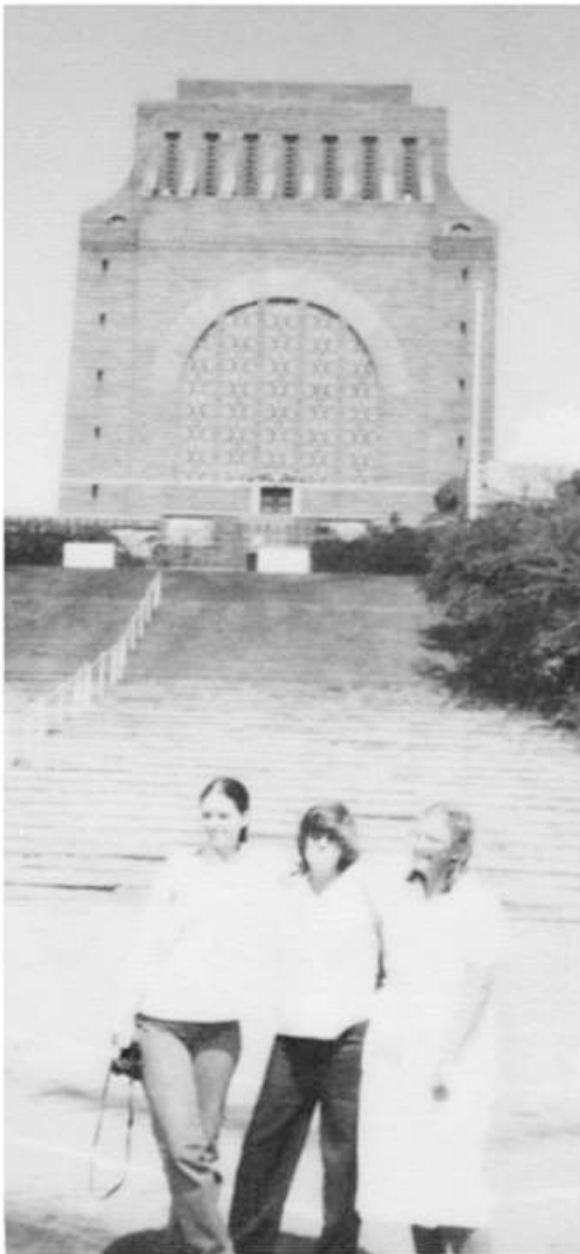
## Eileen Is Back

This year student congress was run in a representative form. There was one representative chosen from each club. As soon as school started, student congress was already planning activities for homecoming week.

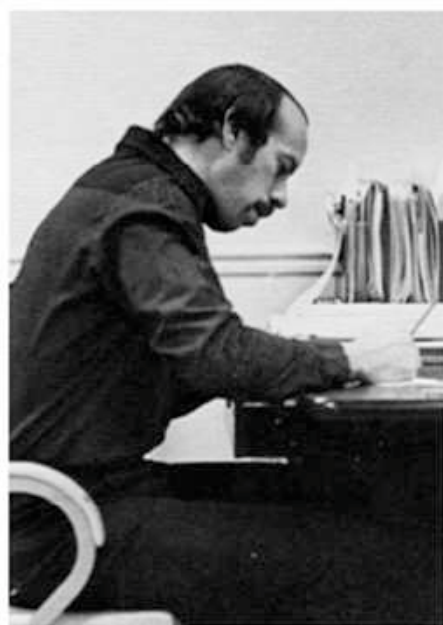

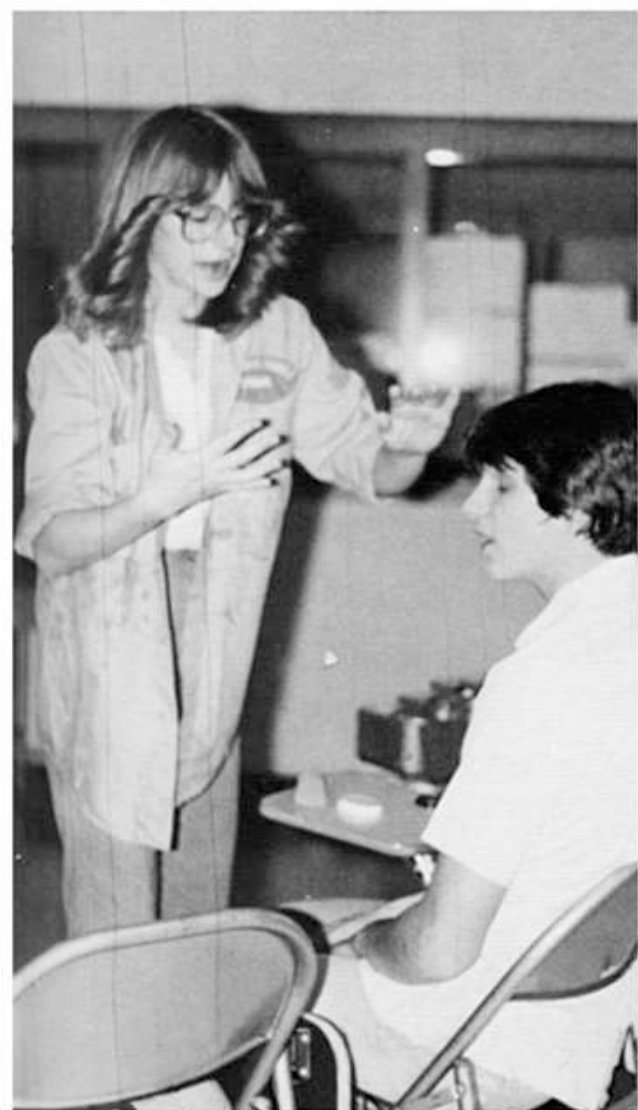

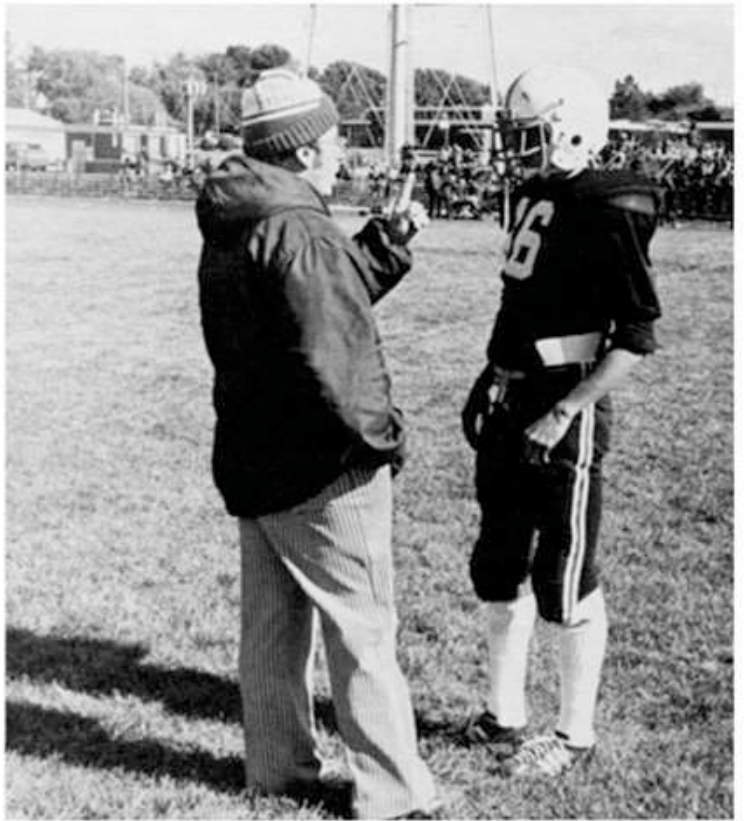


## Soph's Push Forward

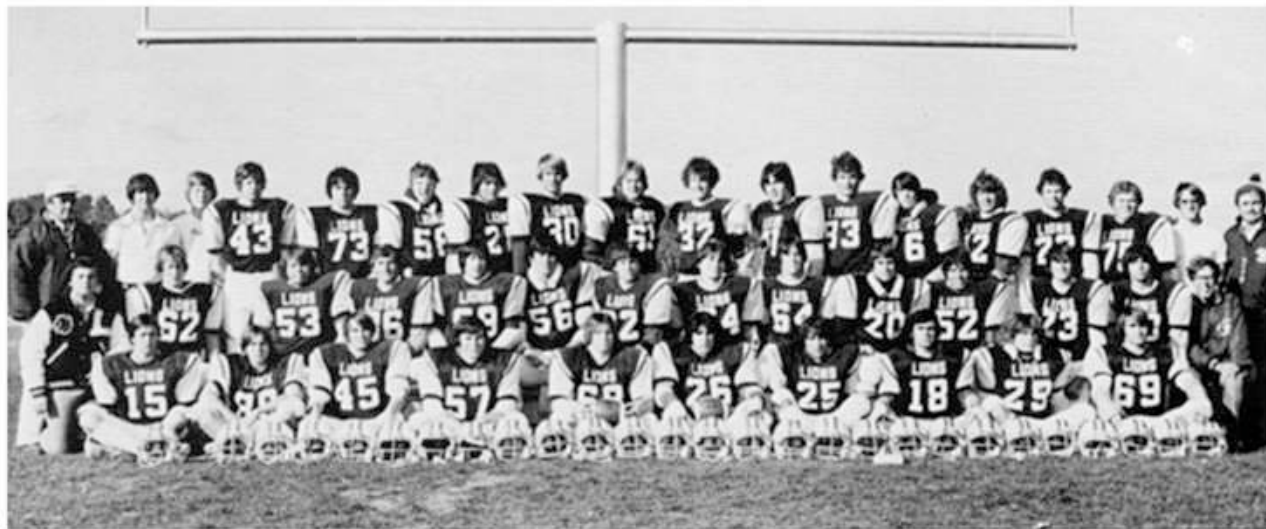

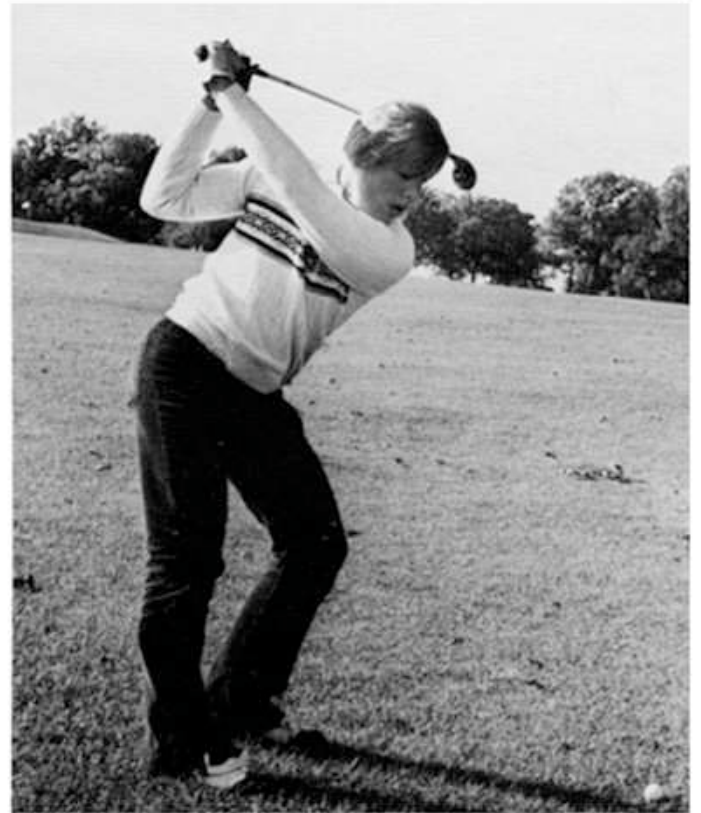

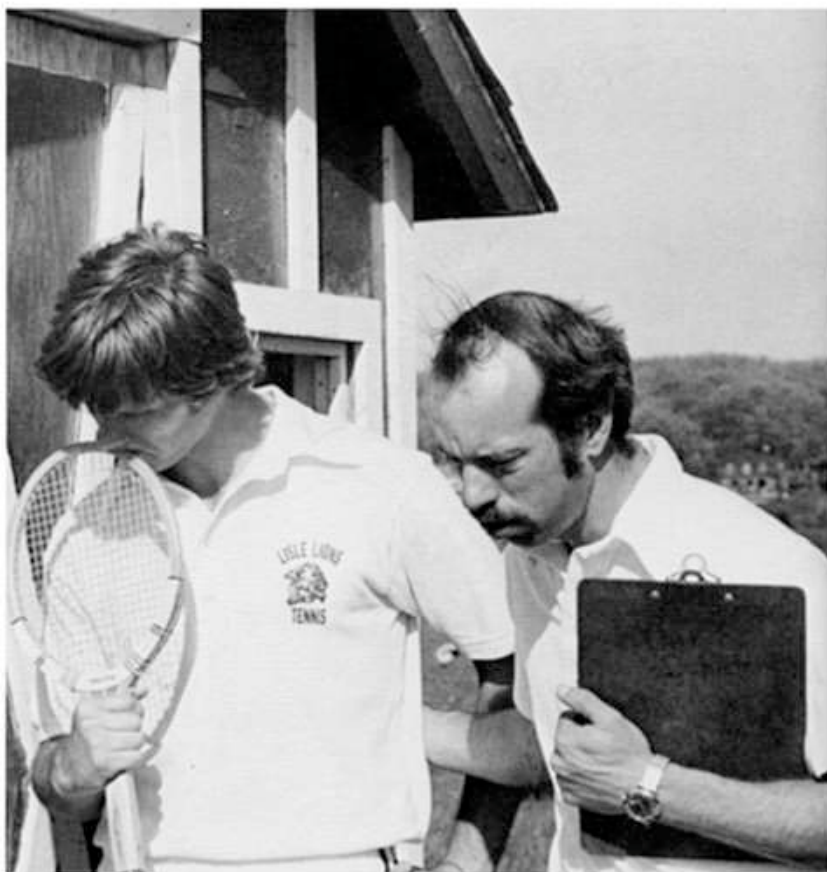
## Tennis Keeps Going

## Staff is Busy

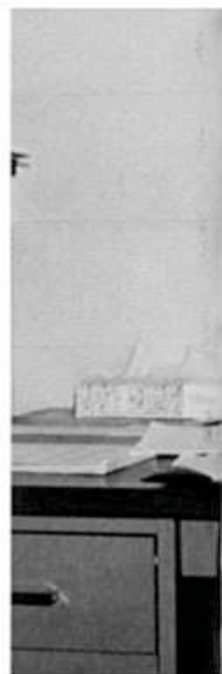
Our staff jobs were held by eighteen men and women.

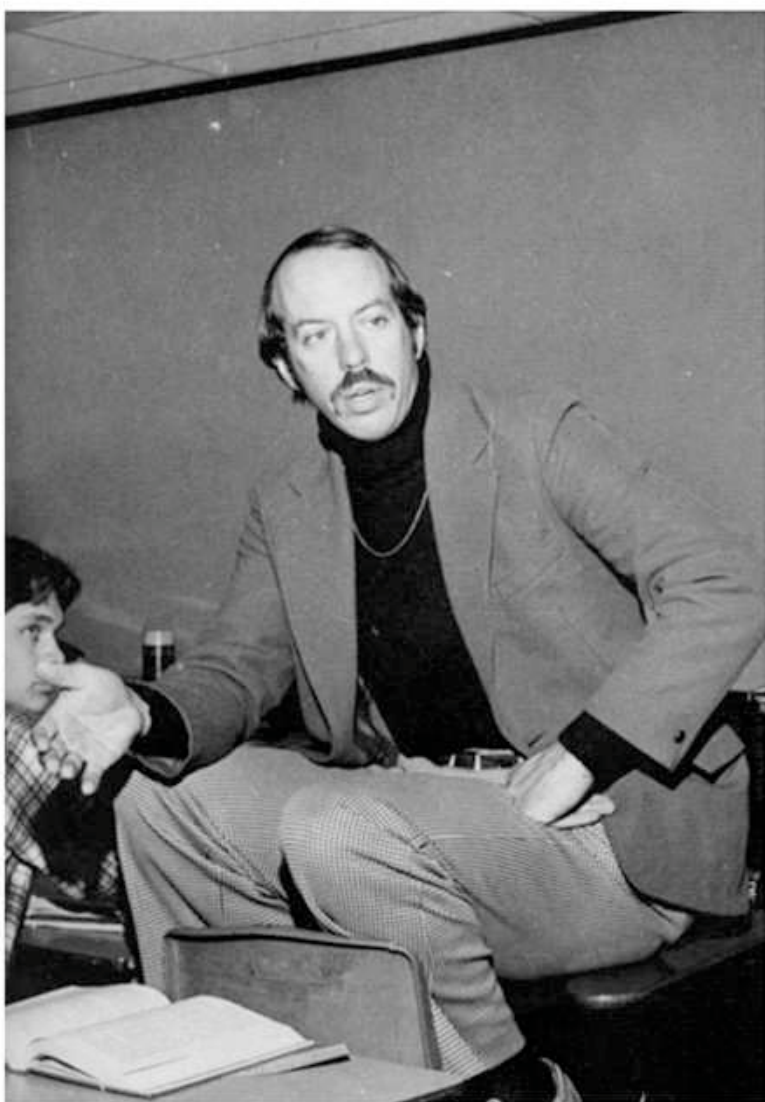

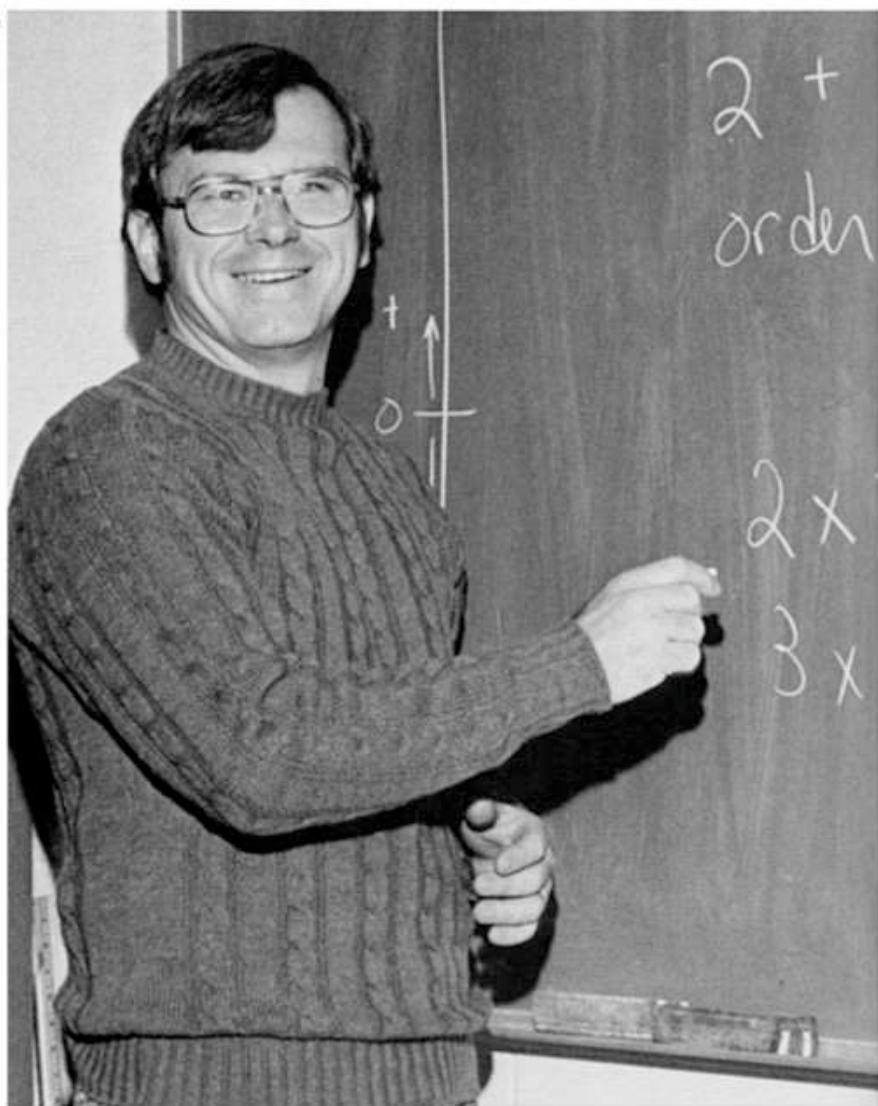

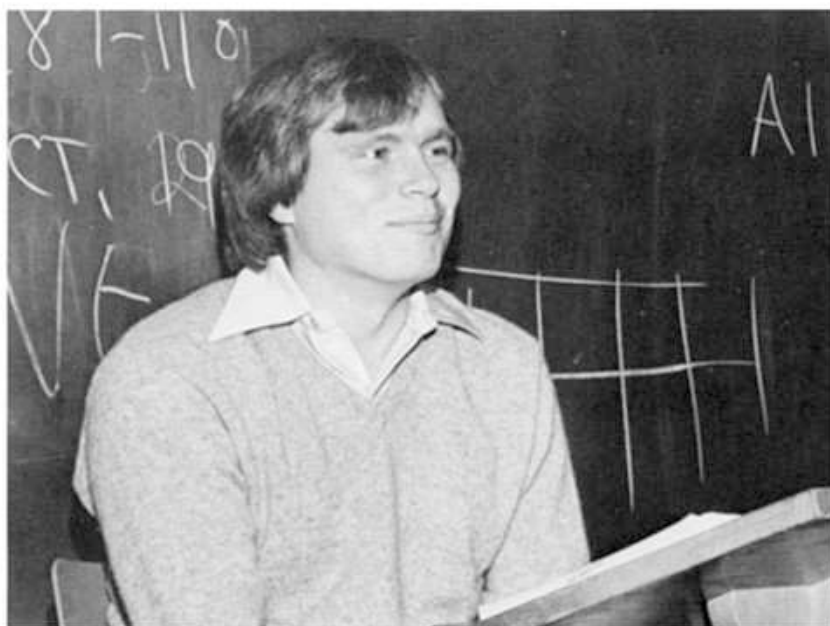
## *New Science Laws*

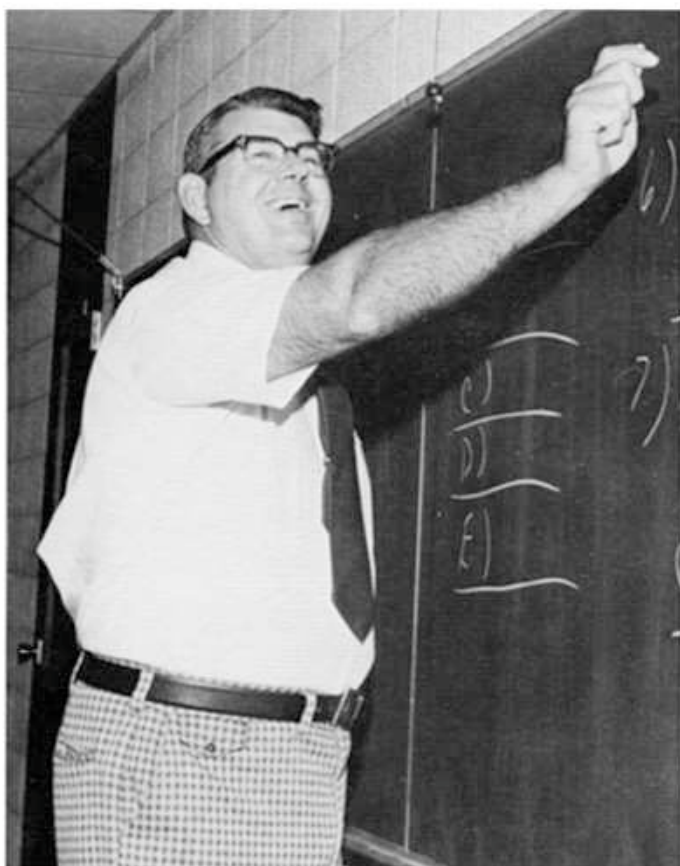

## Activities Promote Interested Students

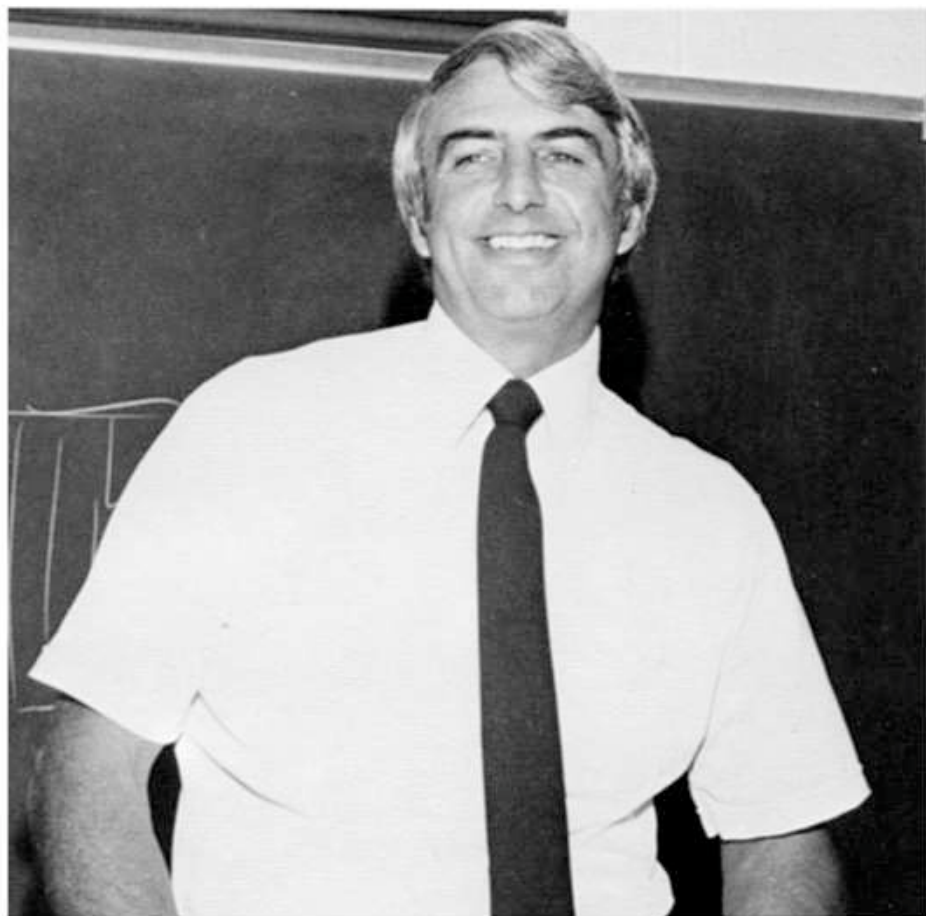

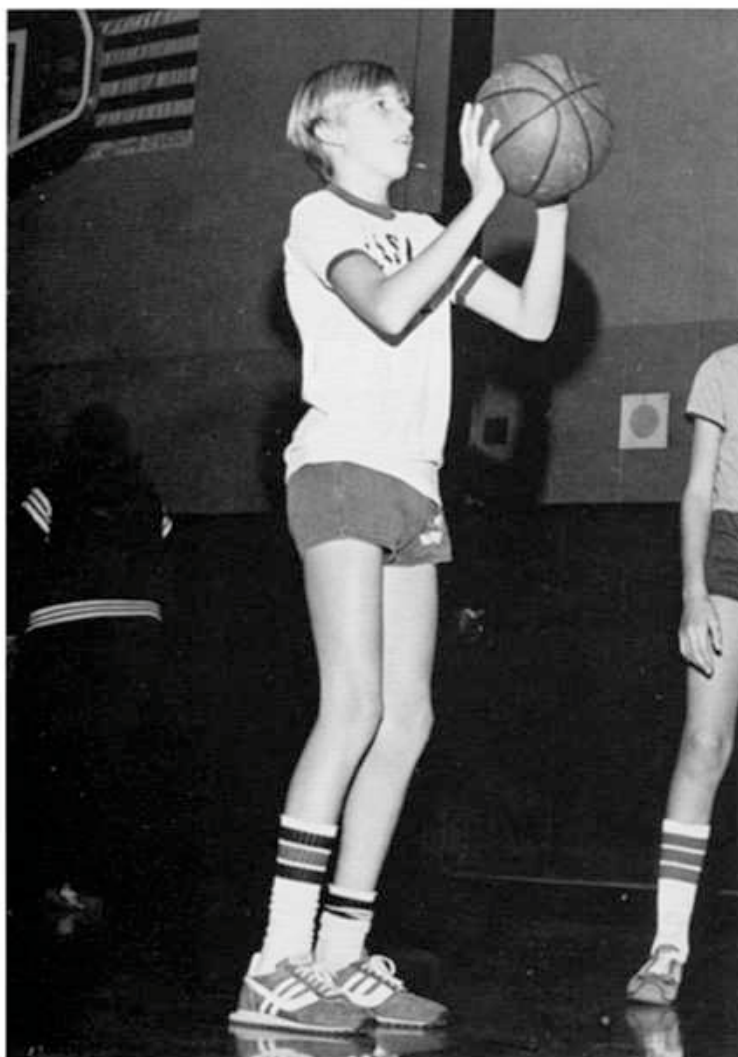
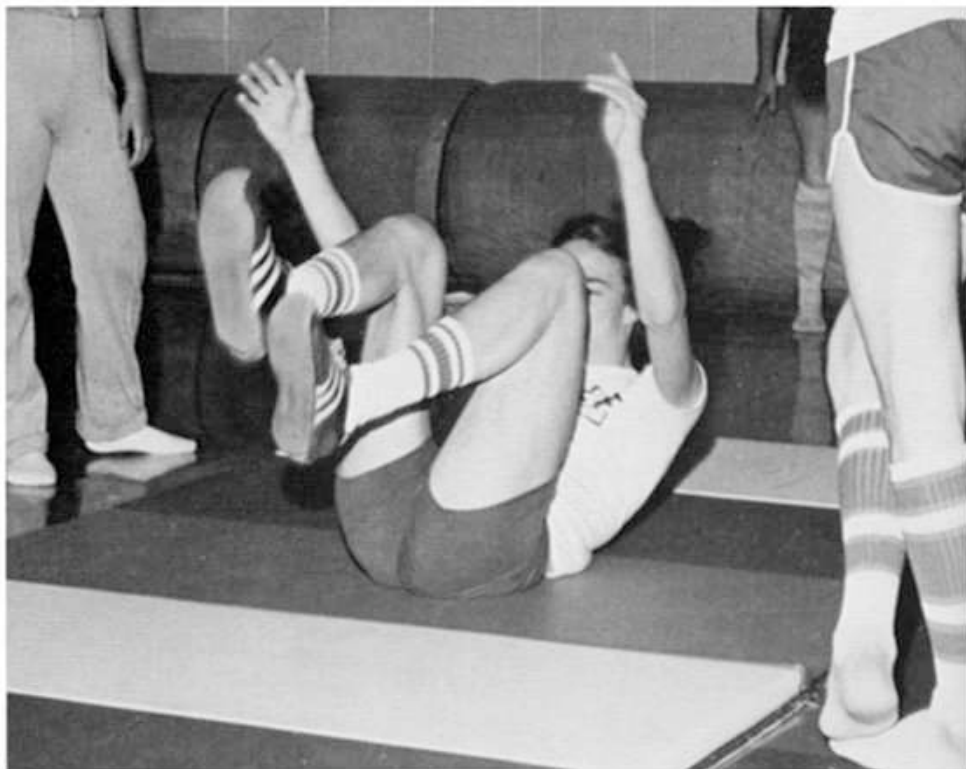
# Gym Classes Become Co-ed

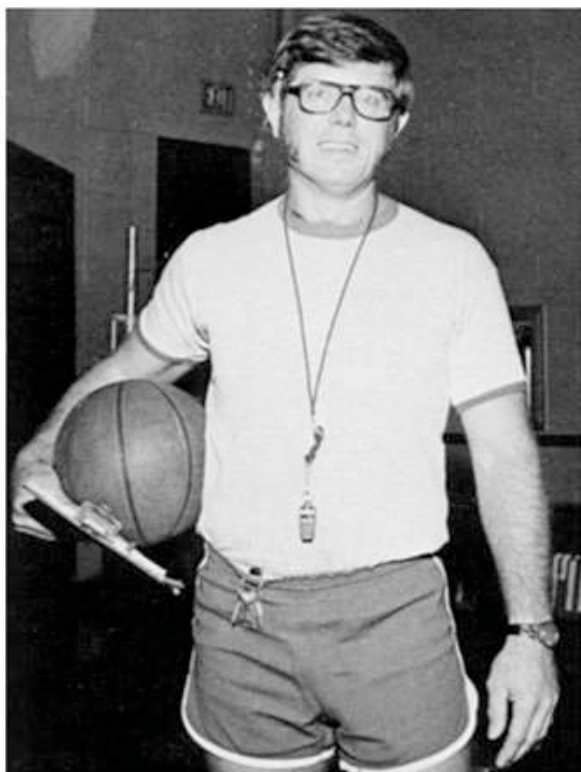

# Seniors Win All

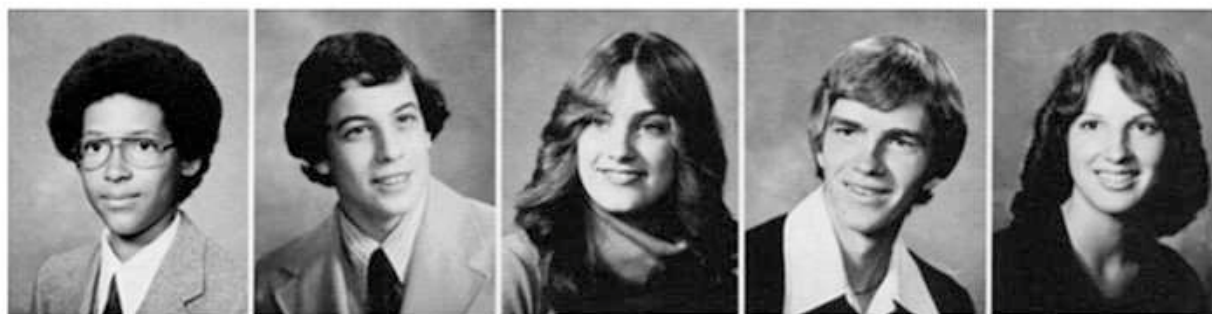
