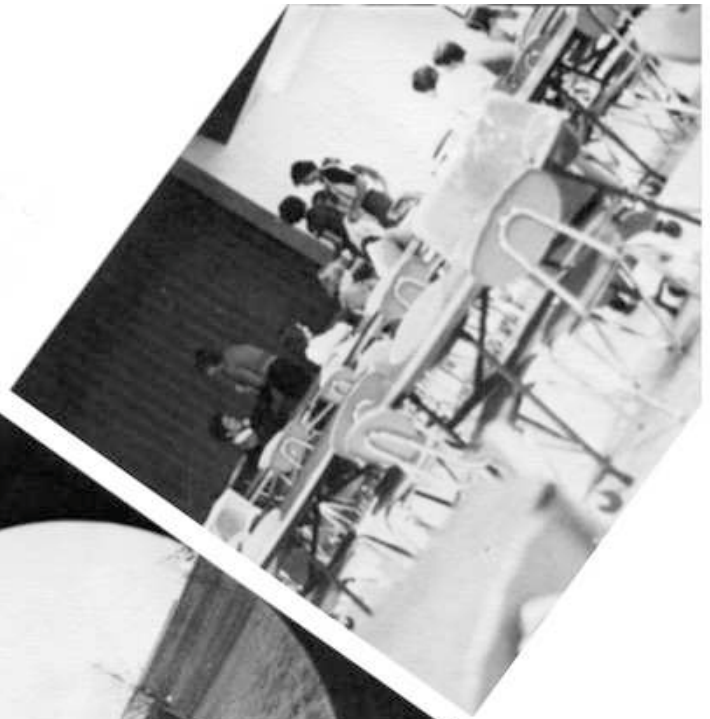

The band Razias Temple provided entertainment prior to the coronation of Kitty Espersen as Queen and John Nalley as King.

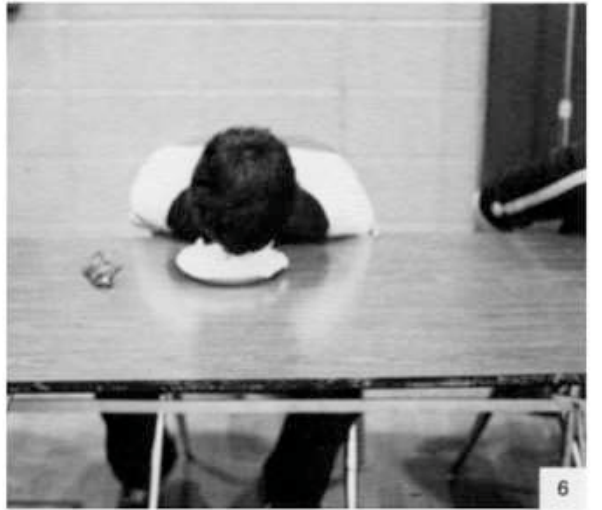
The week ended on Saturday with the parade and the judging of the floats. Seniors took first place in the float building which brought them to first place for spirit week.

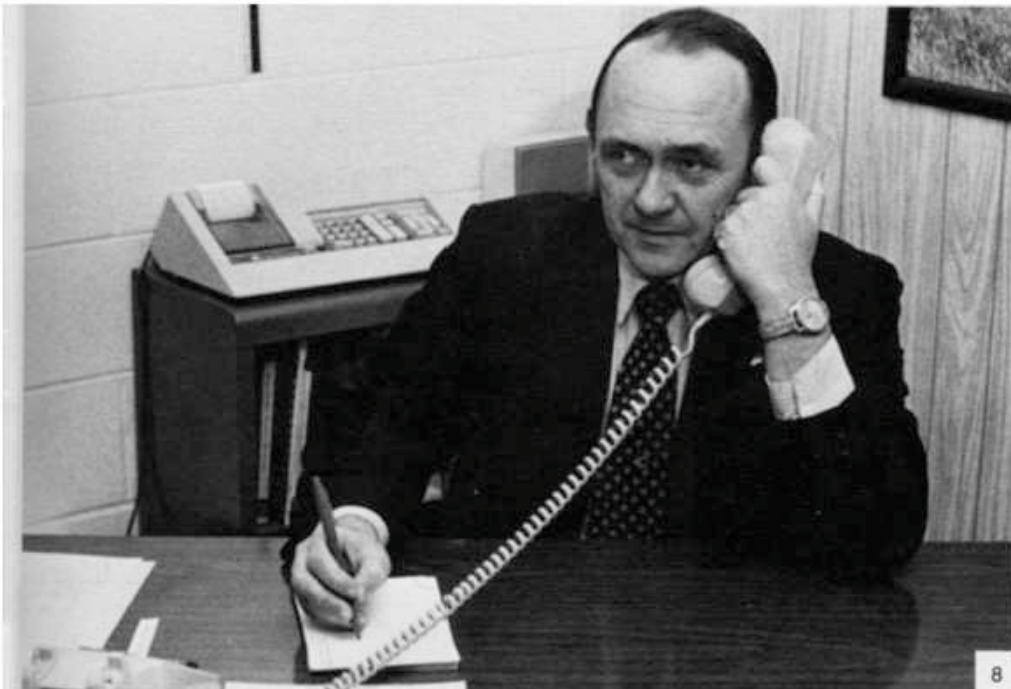
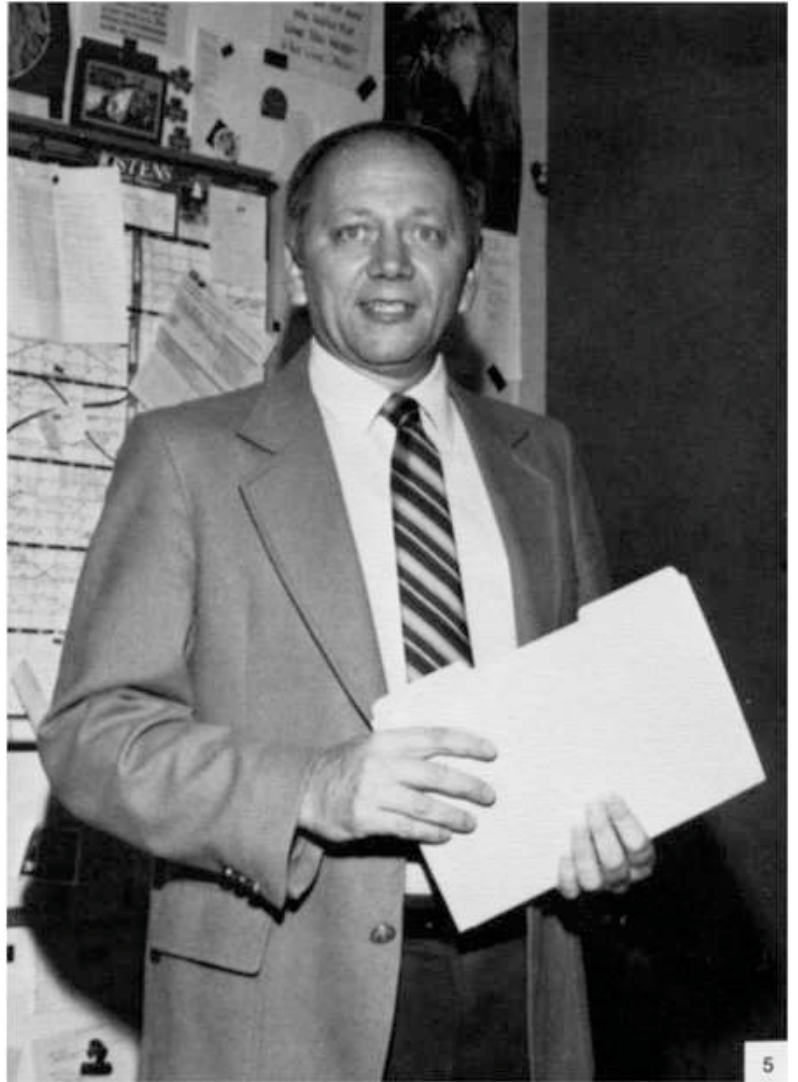
New Members Elected

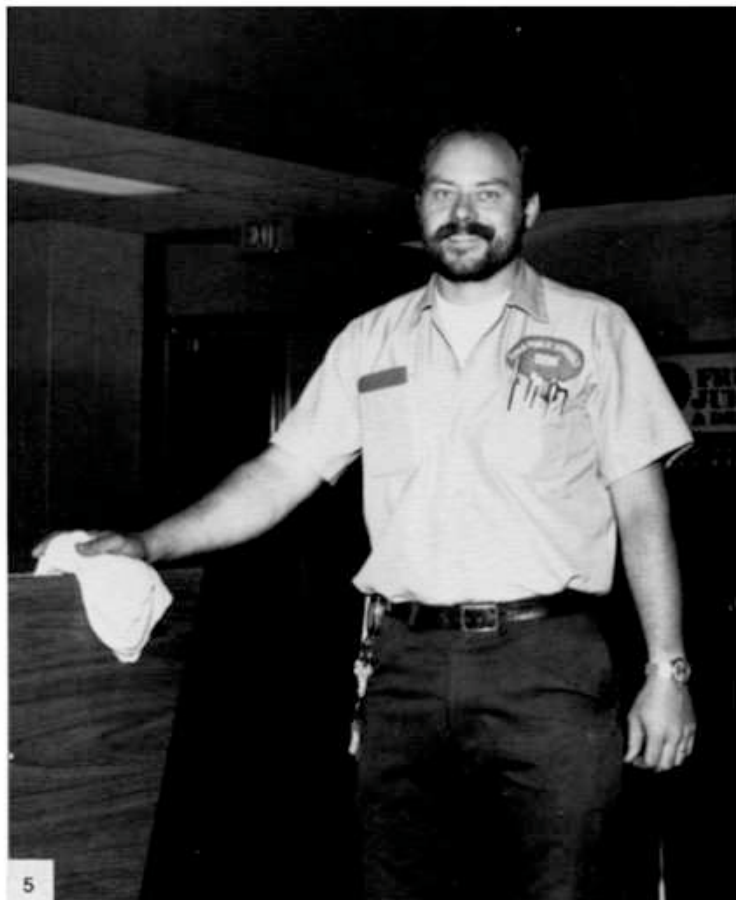

The custodians worked hard to keep the school in working order. In order to do this, they had to learn about the new equipment installed over the summer.

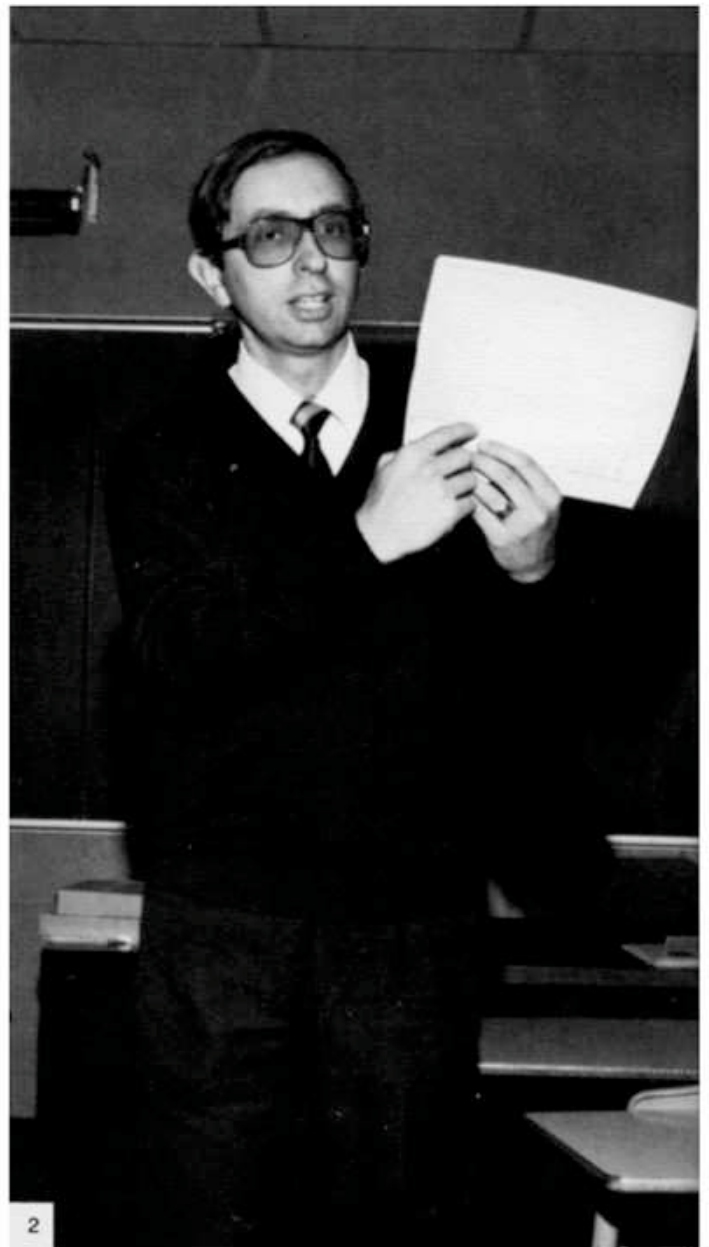

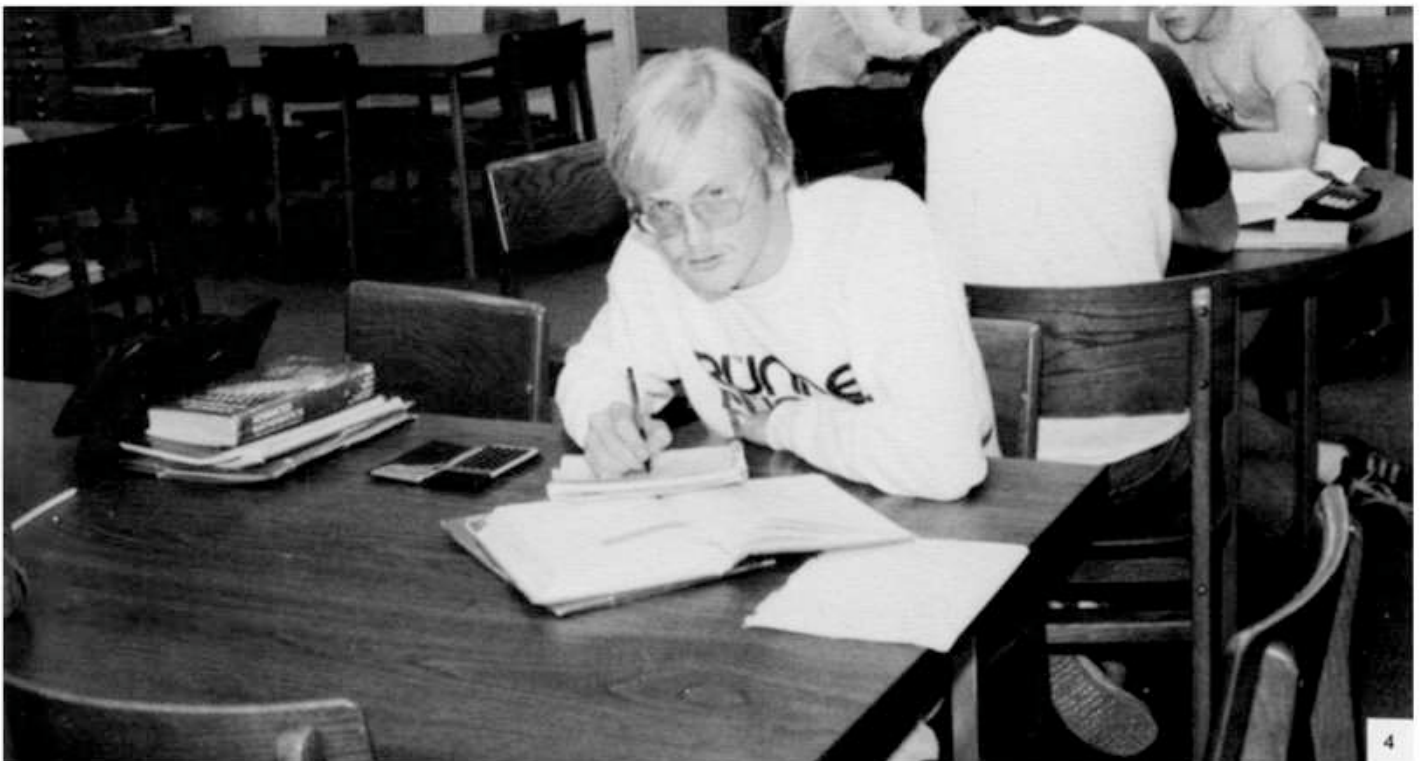

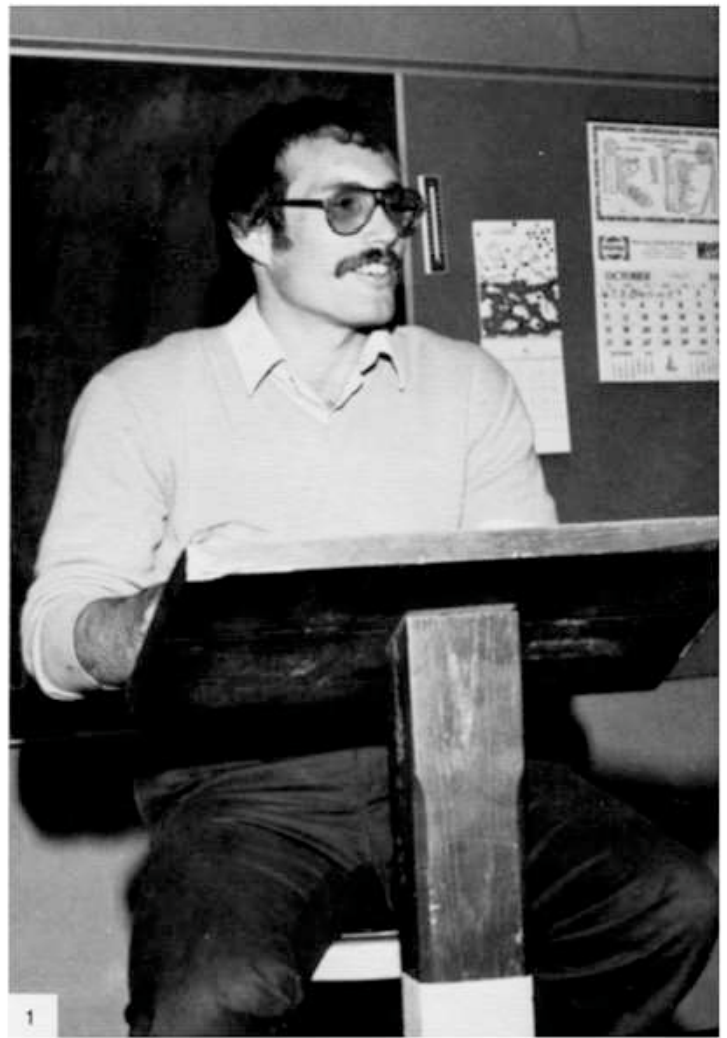
Organizing Books

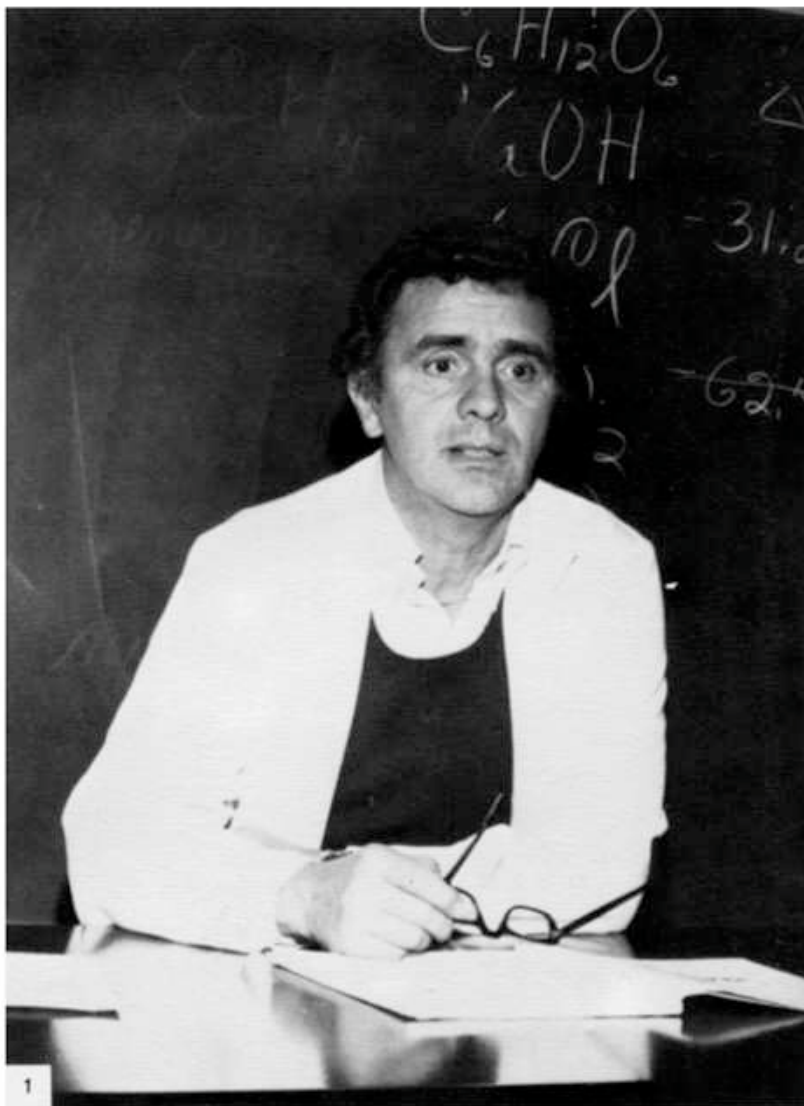
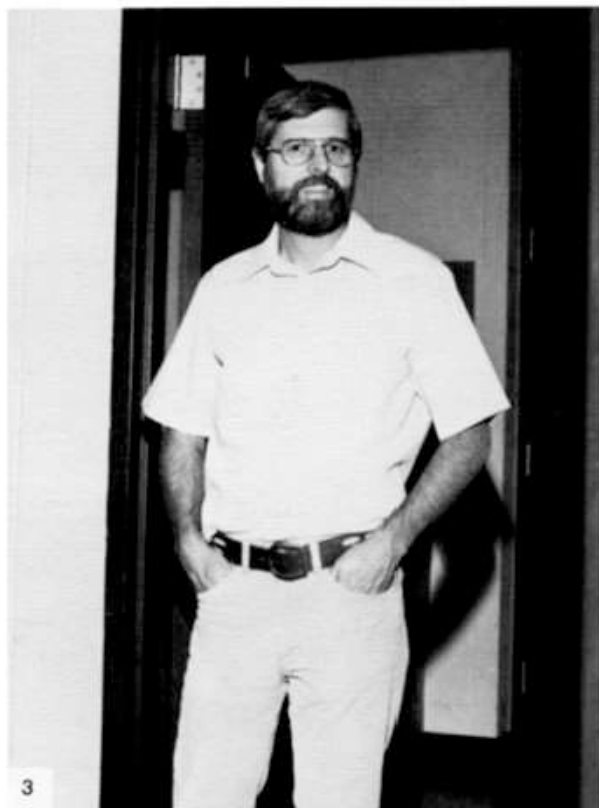

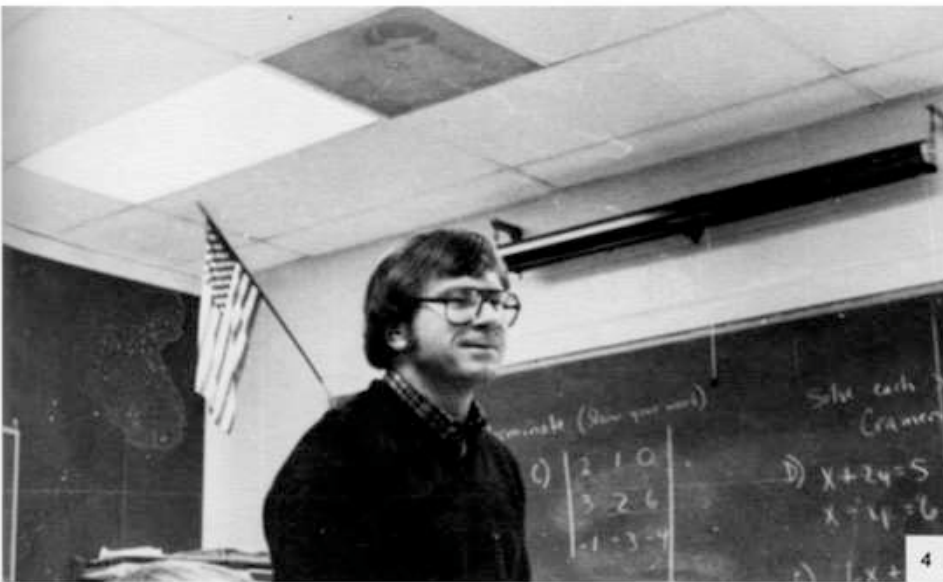
Team Does Well

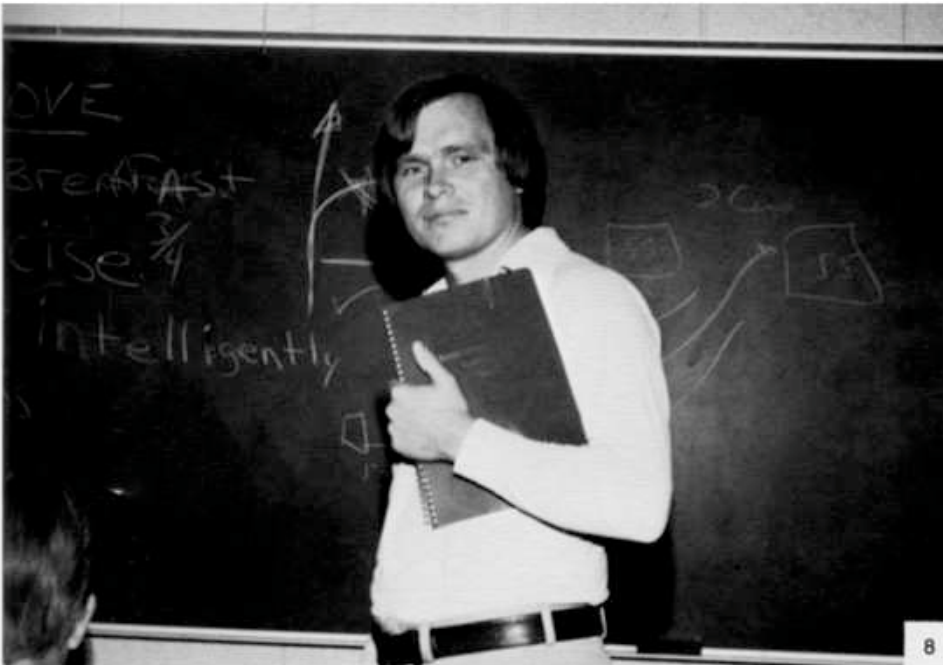

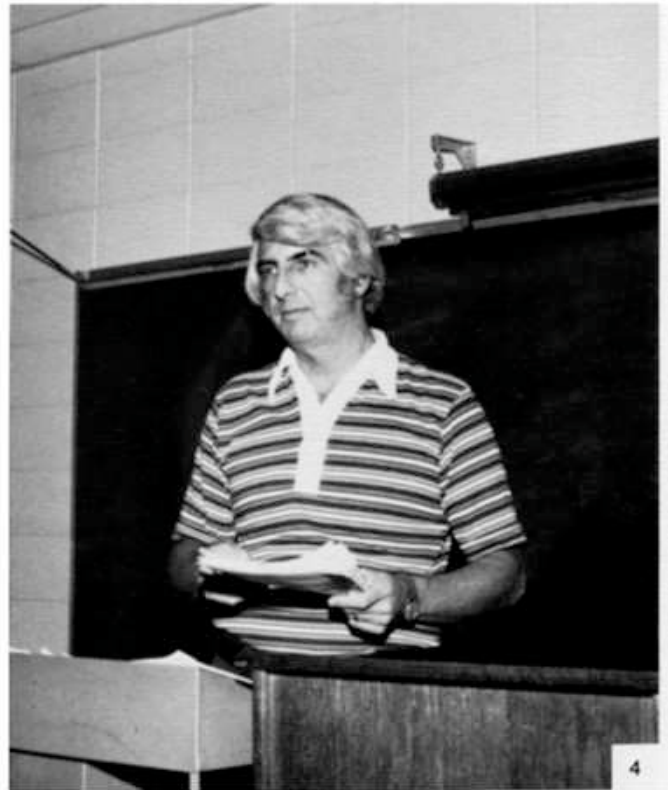




Three Required of Sophs

Get Down To Business

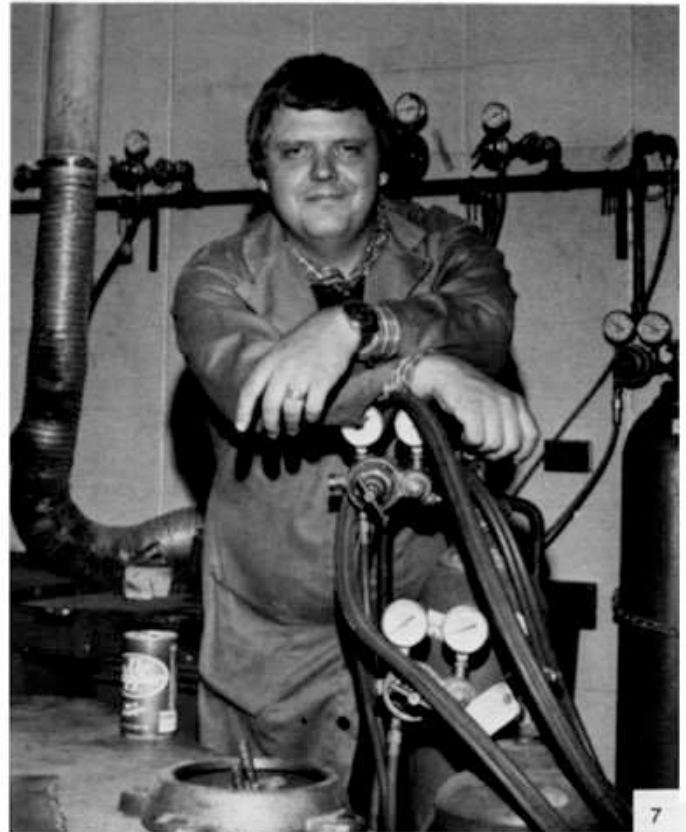

Work And Study Go Together

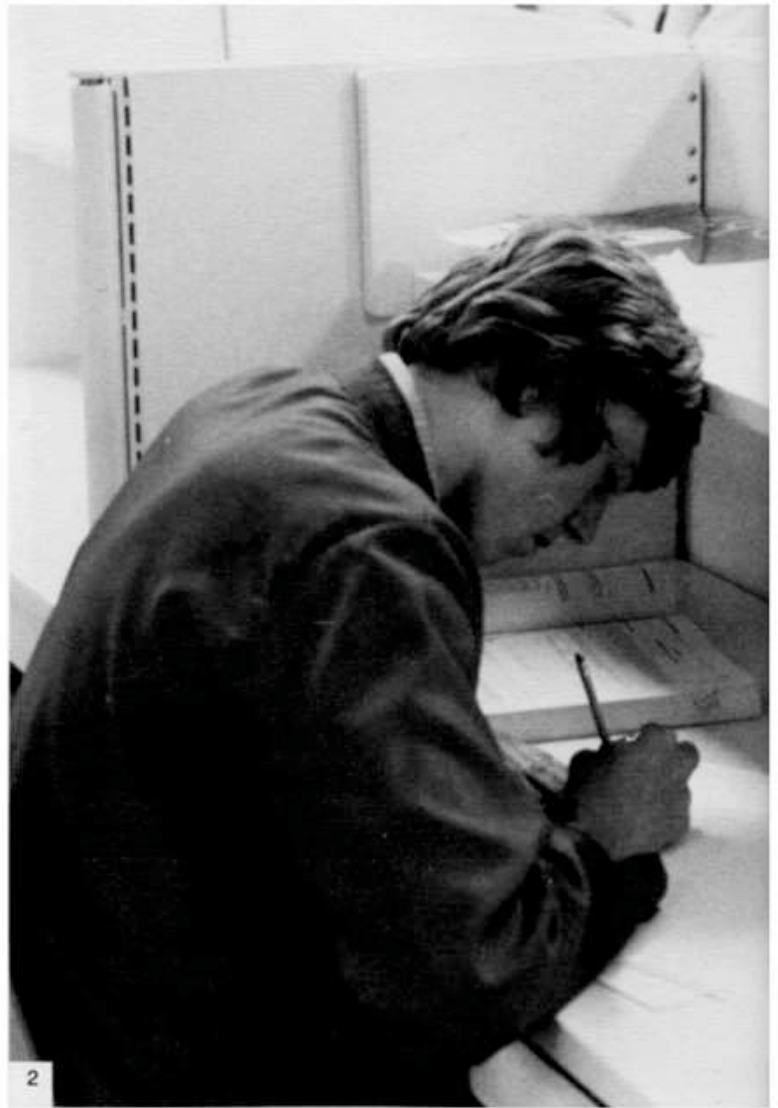

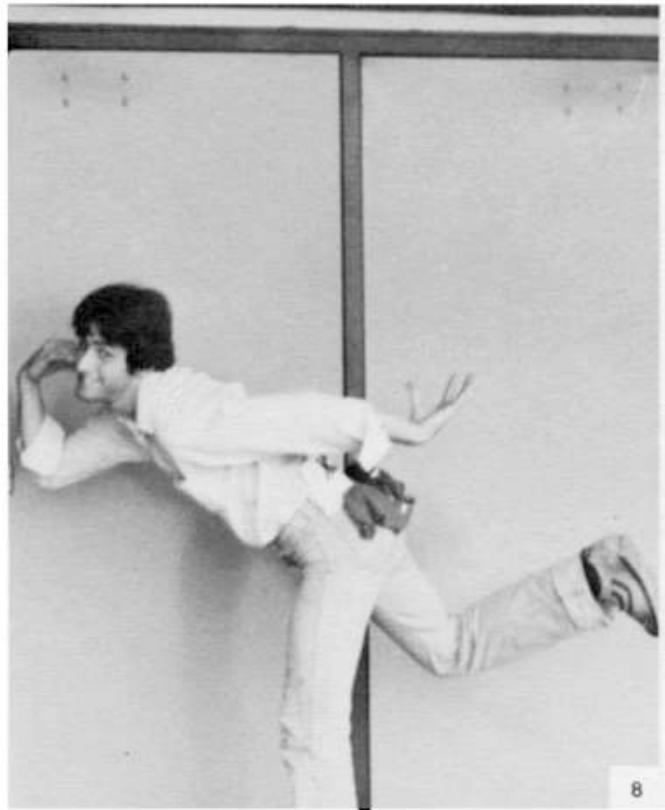

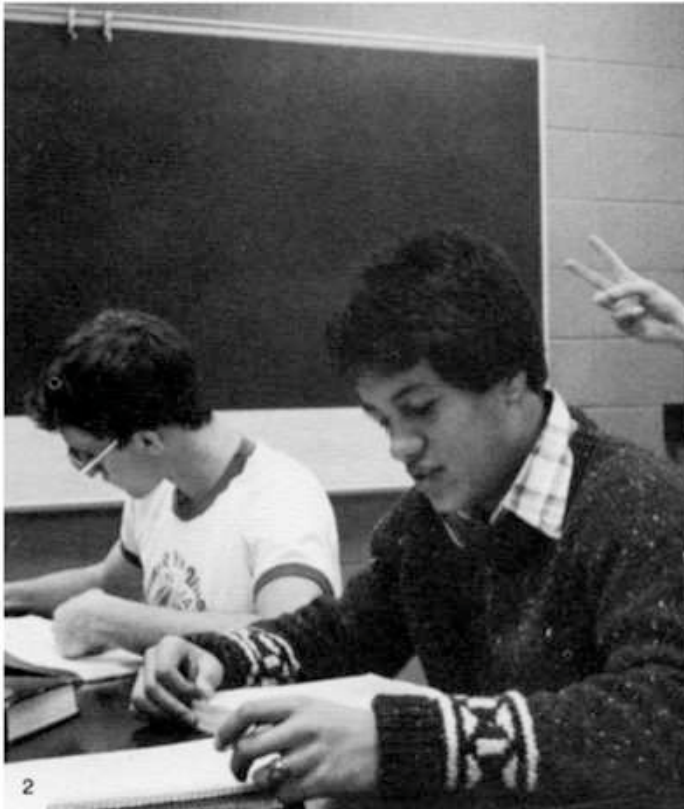

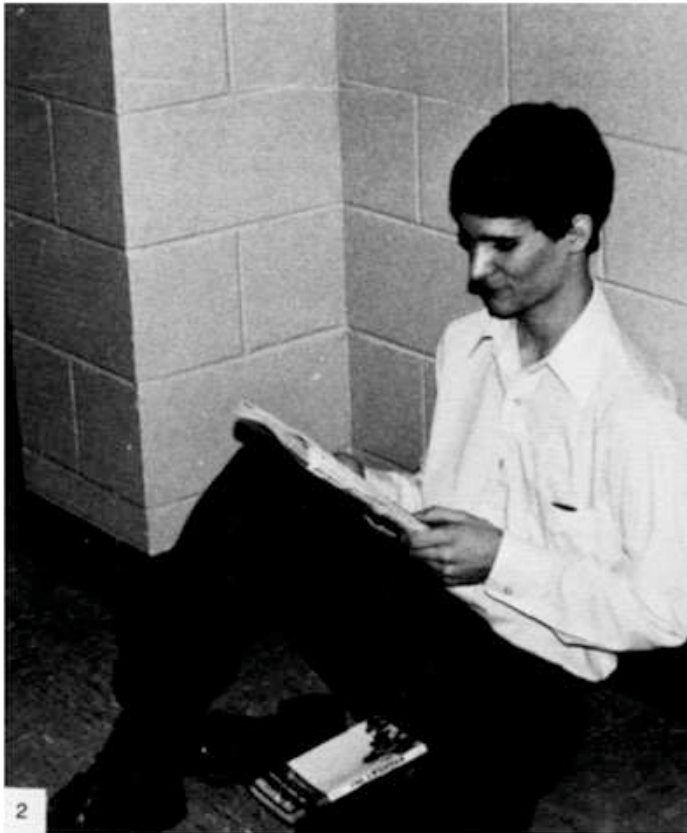


Honor Society Donates, Student Congress Leads

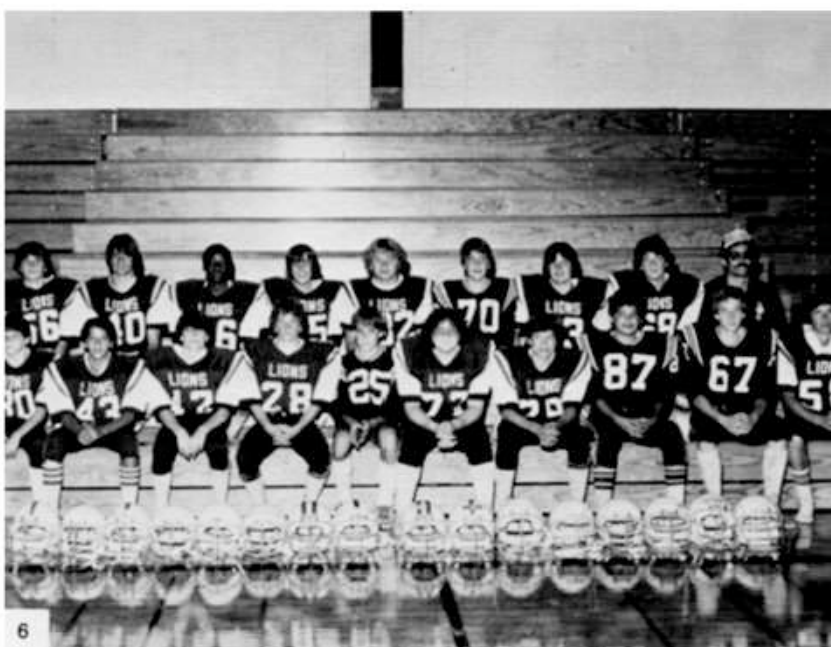
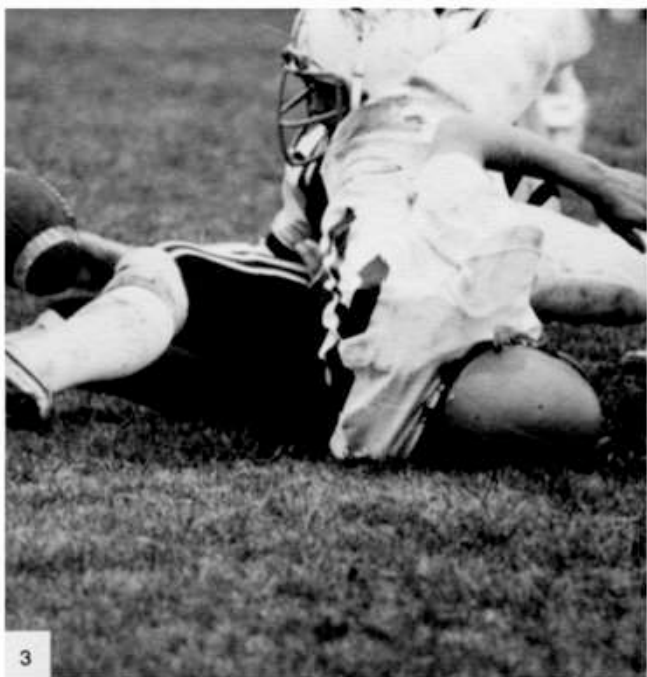

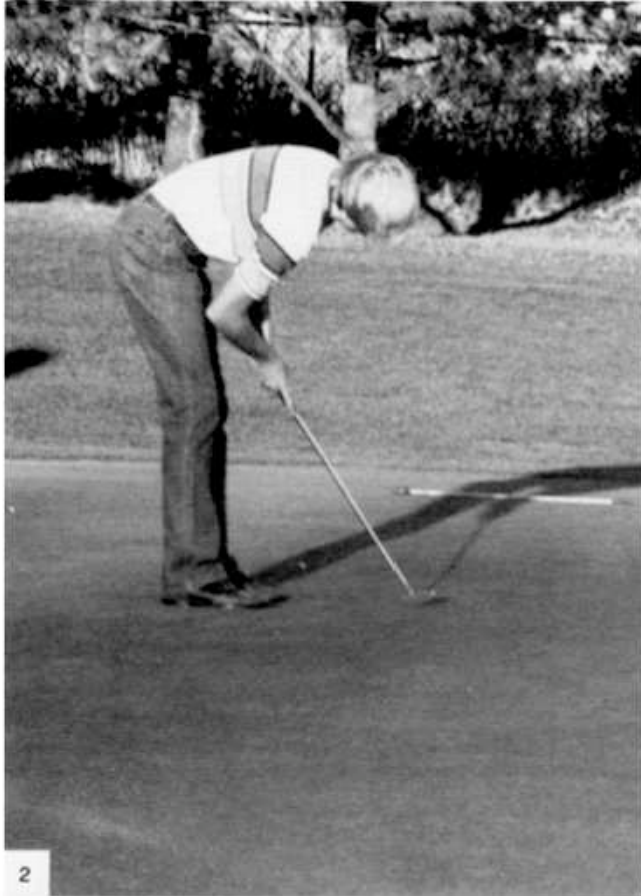

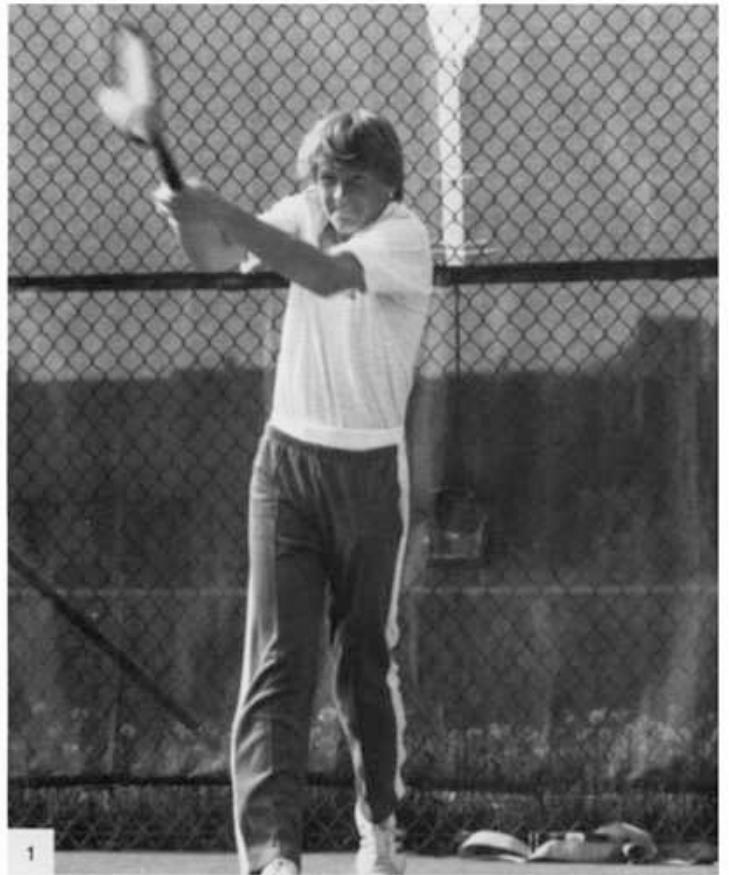

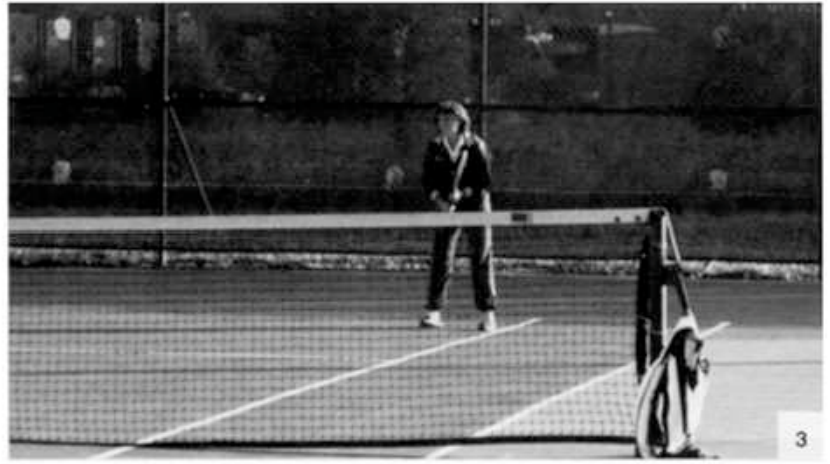

The team played alot of close games, the opposing teams were tough. Sophomore coach, Mr. Logoman, kept the action going by playing all the players.



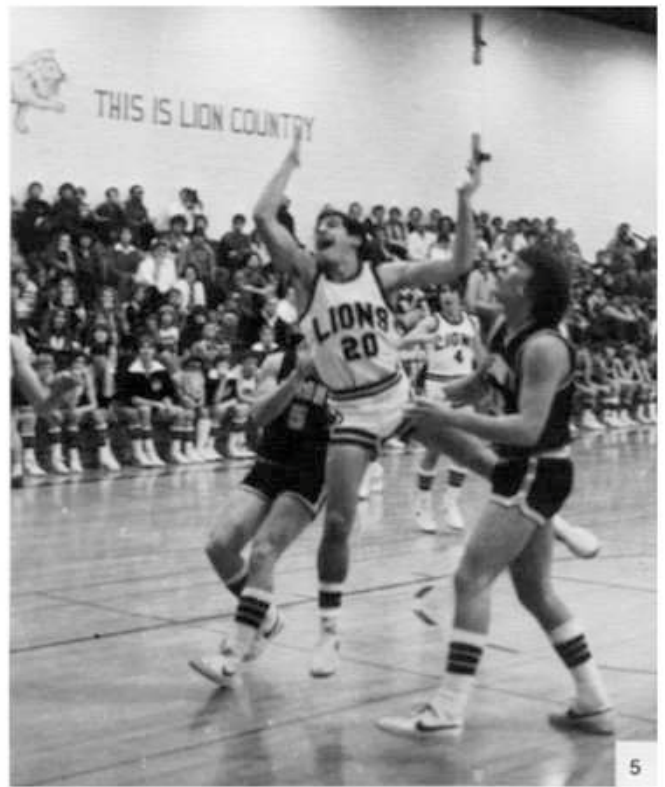

The frosh-soph team also had a new coach. Coach Bierman hopes for a much better season next year and is confident they will have one.





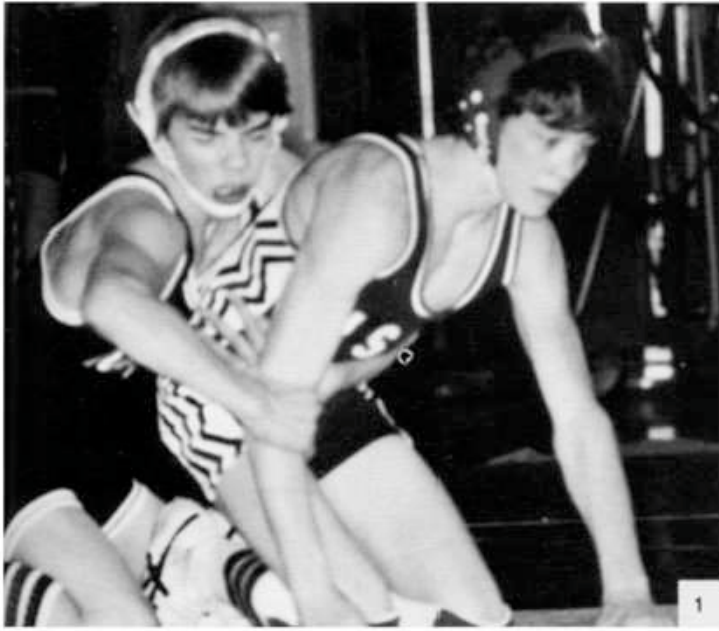

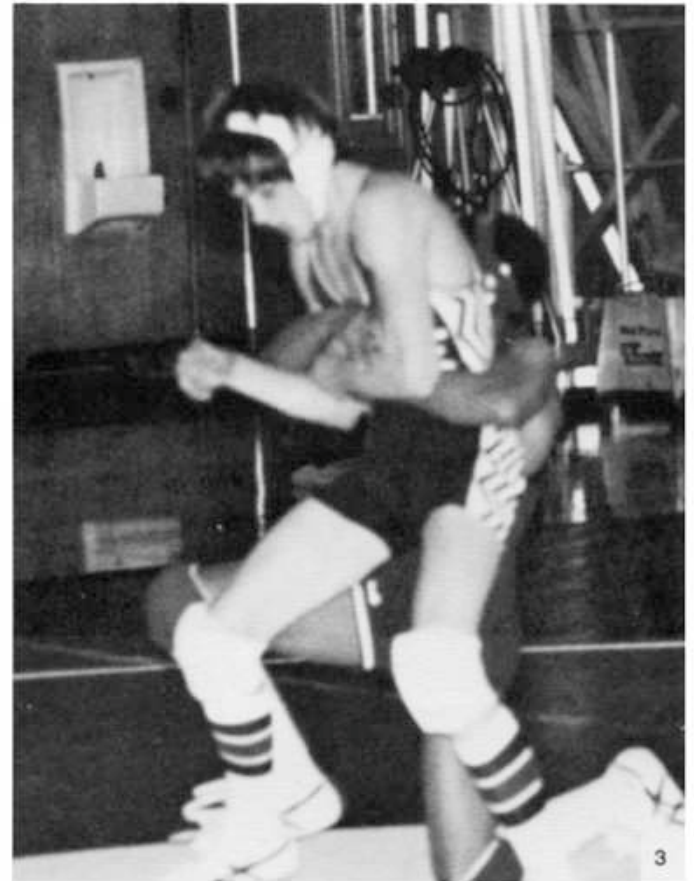

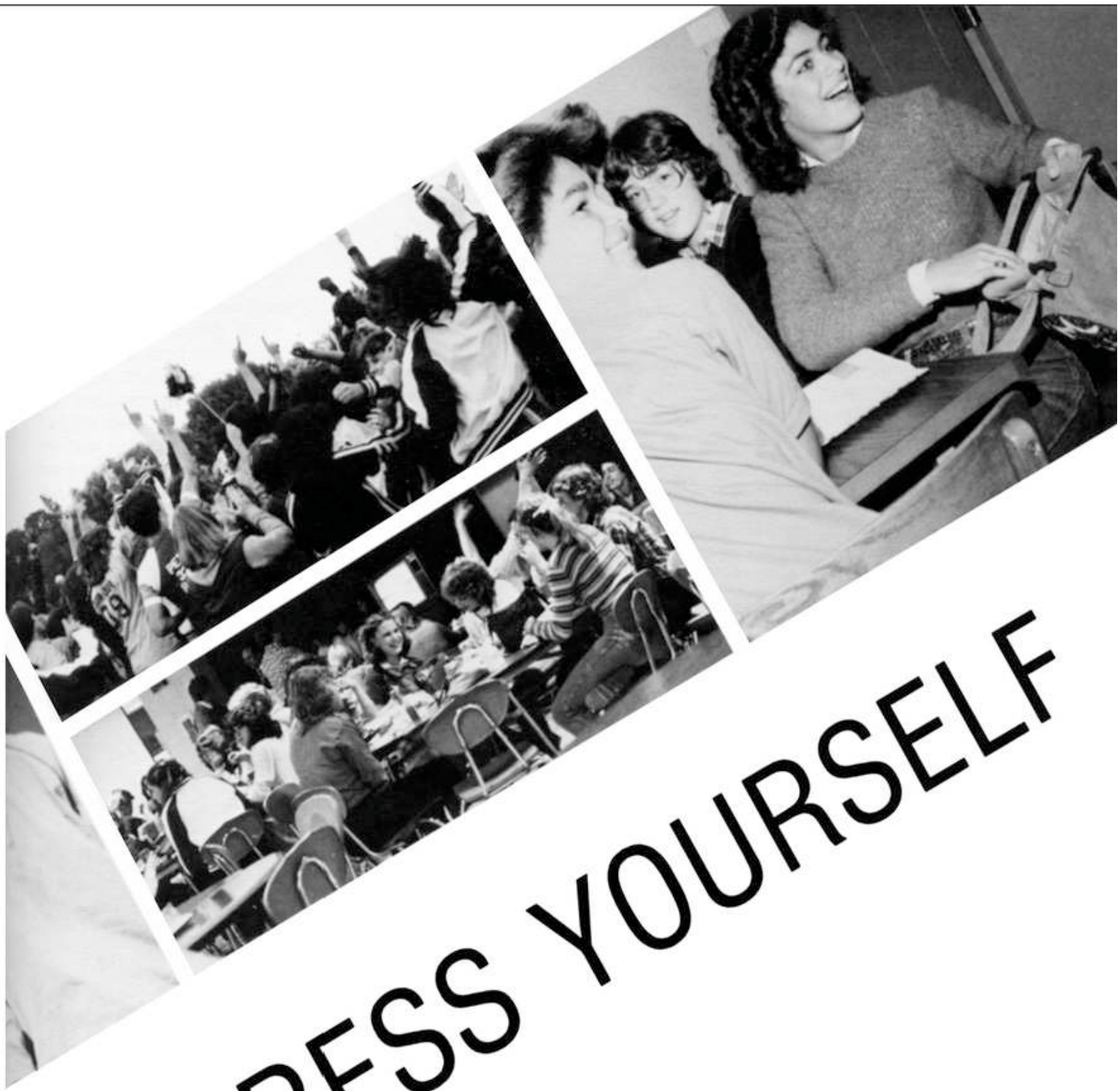

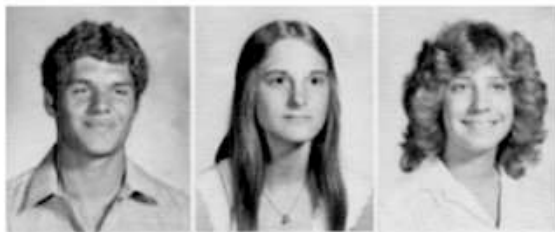
