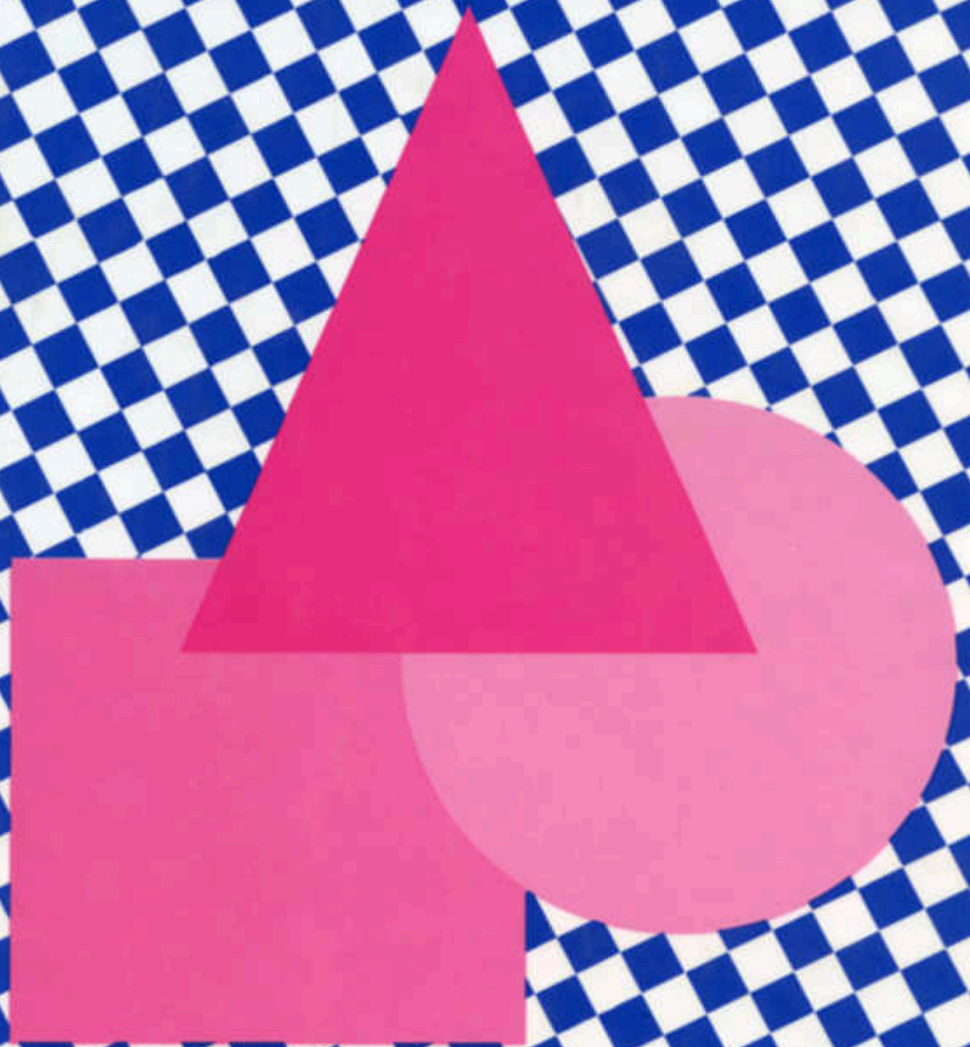

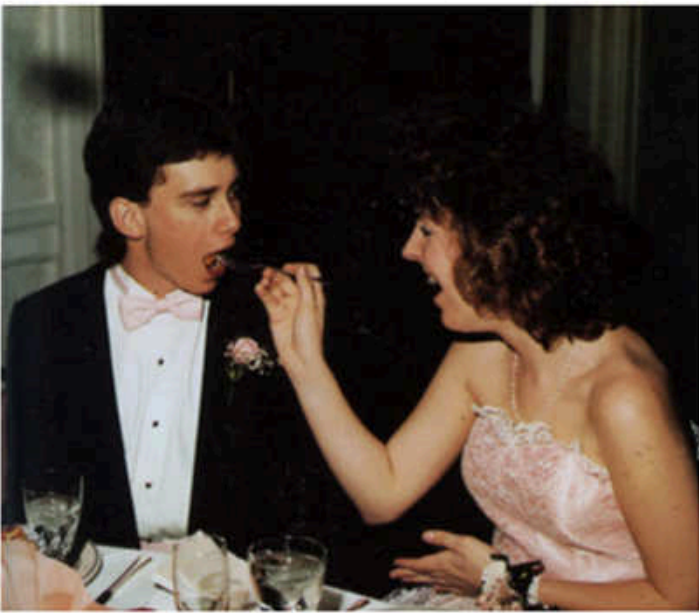
# Just You and I

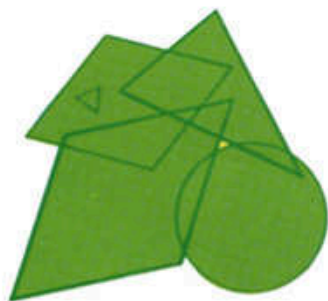
# Leaving With Style

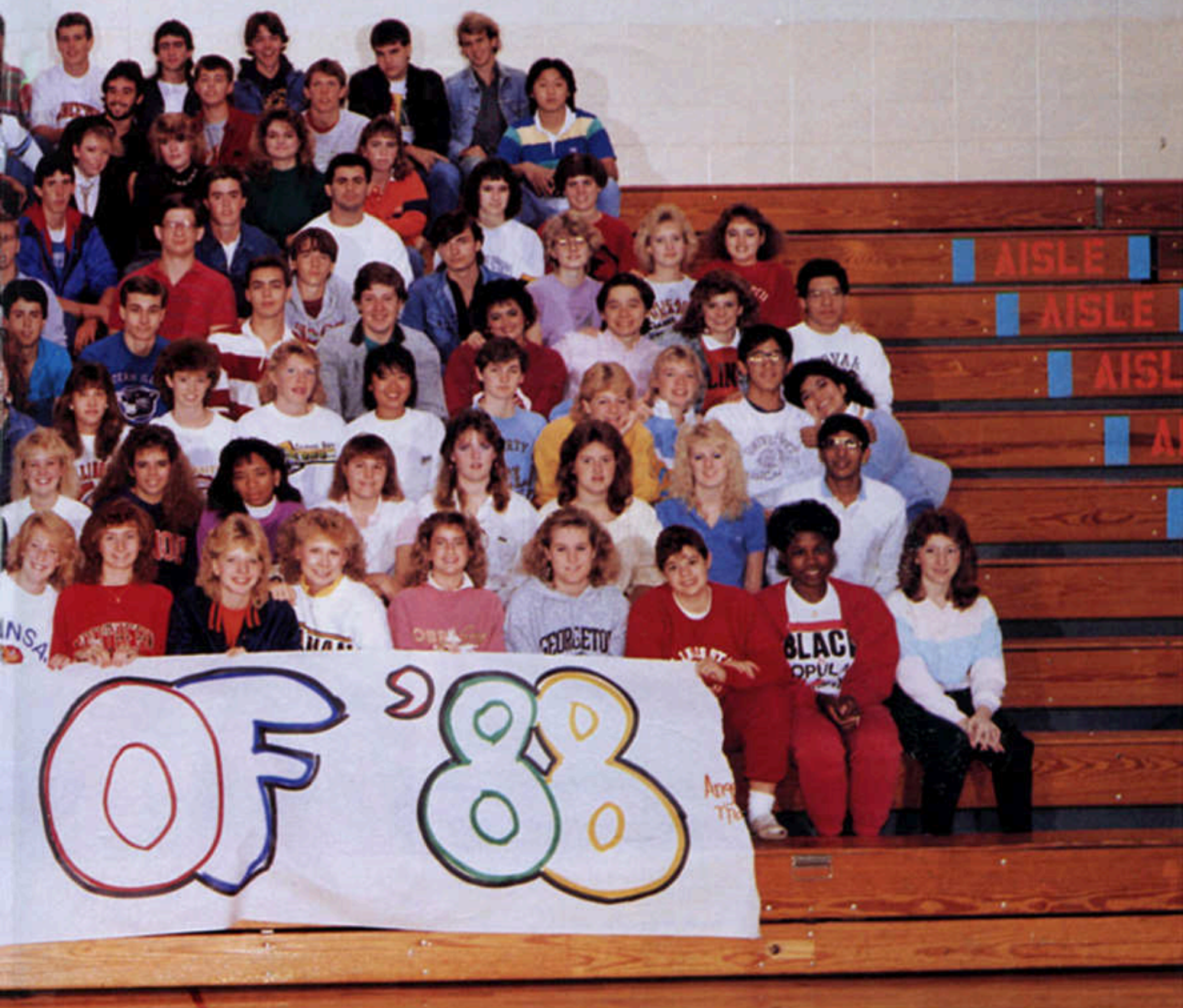

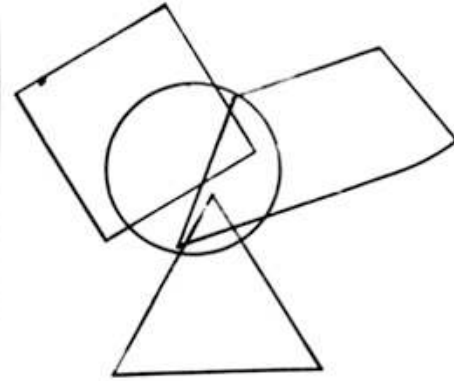

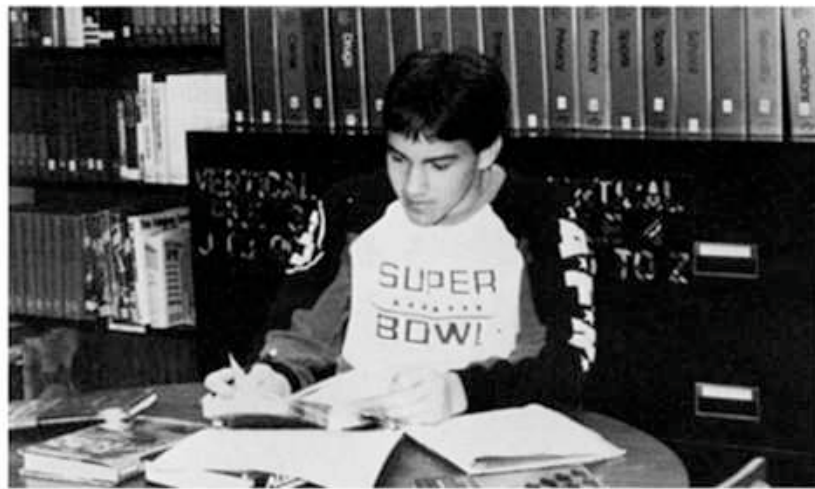

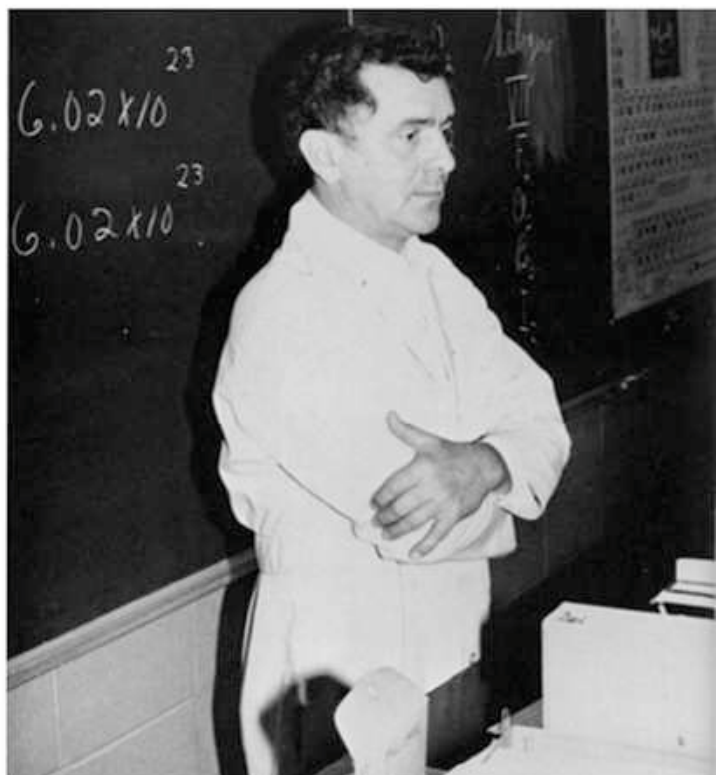
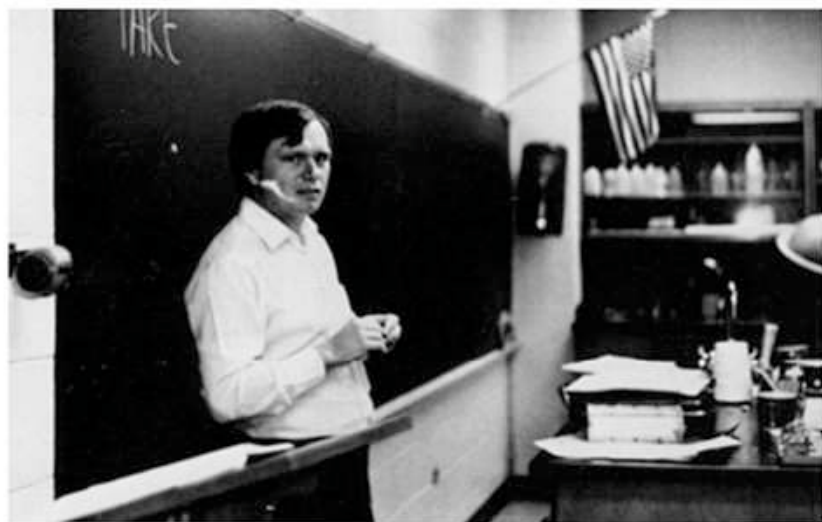

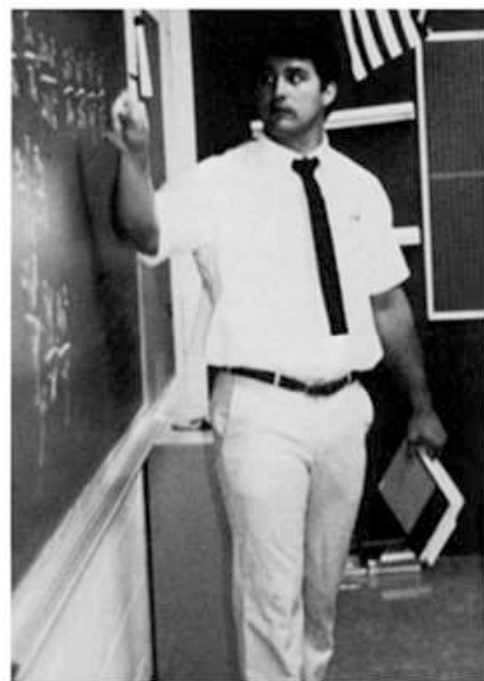

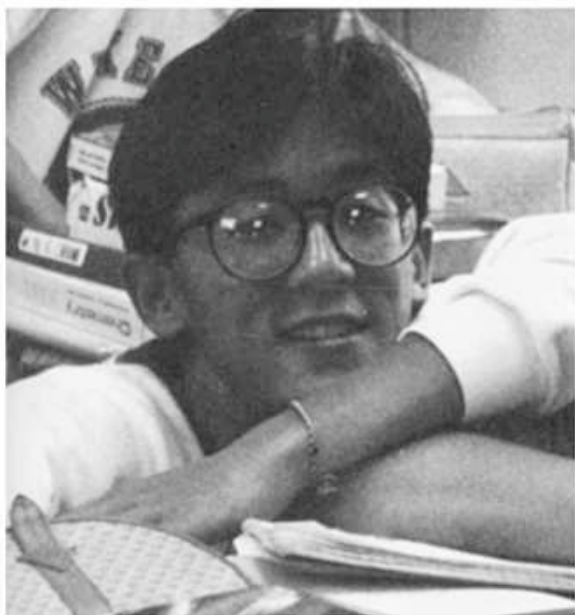
# Mathematics 101

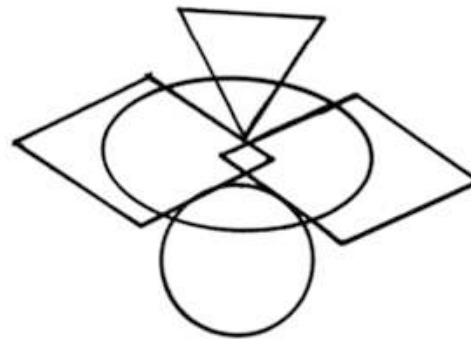


# Special Ed.

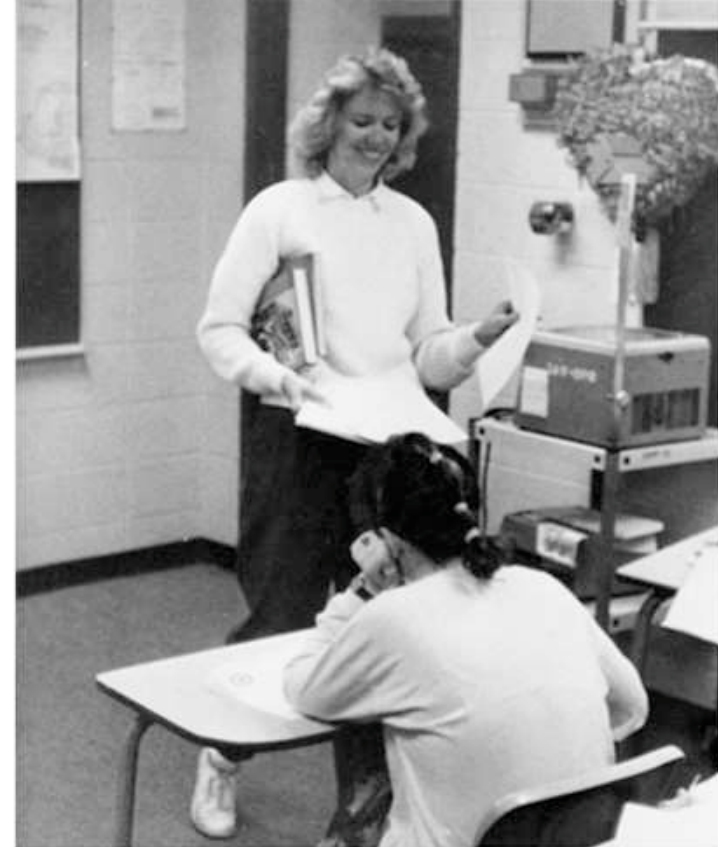

## Foreign Affairs

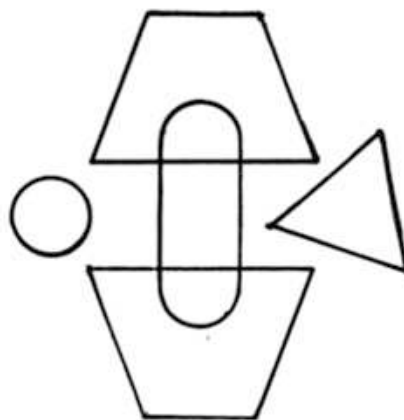
Taking a foreign language is considered a necessary evil by most high school students.

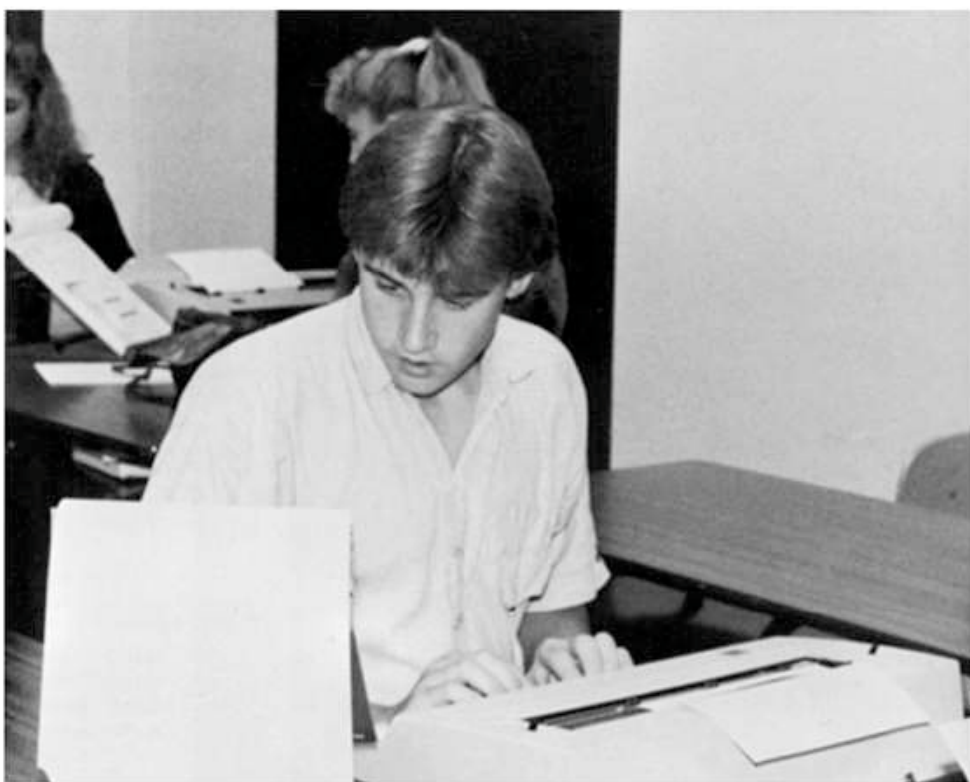

# Just the Right Type

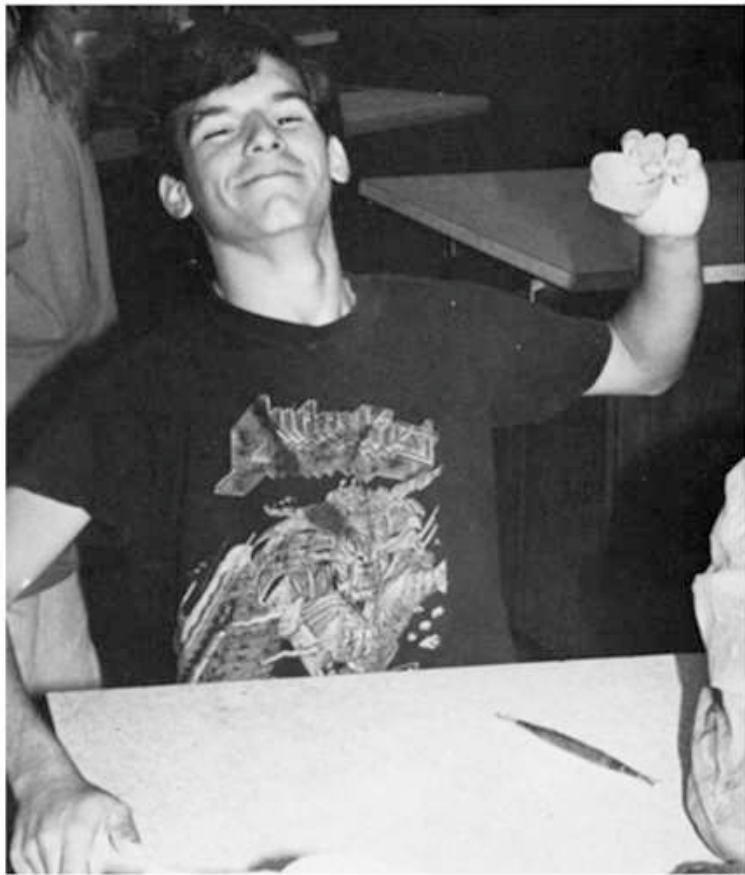

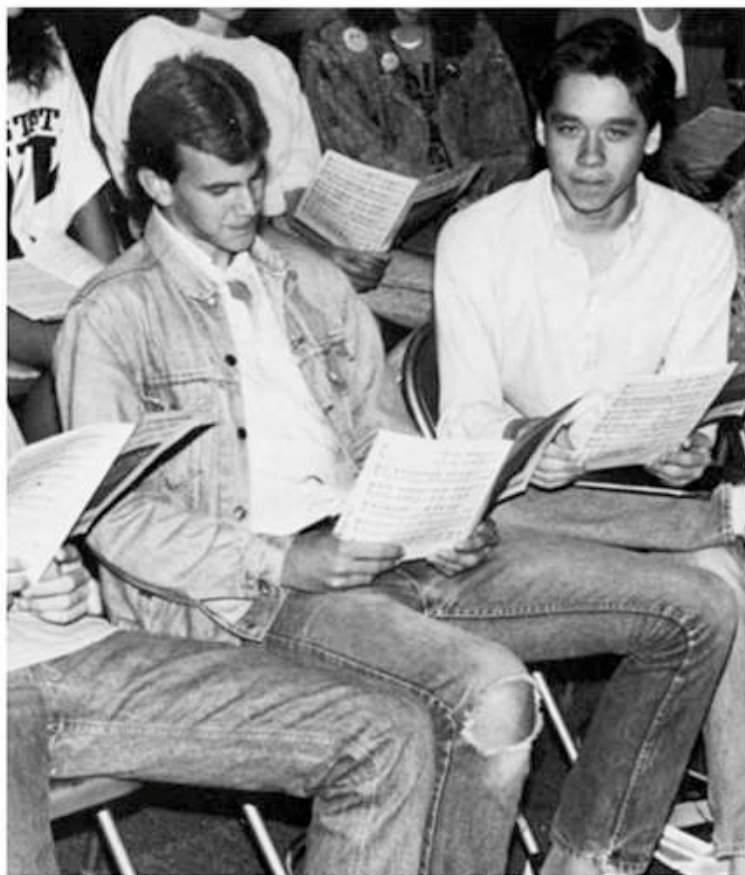

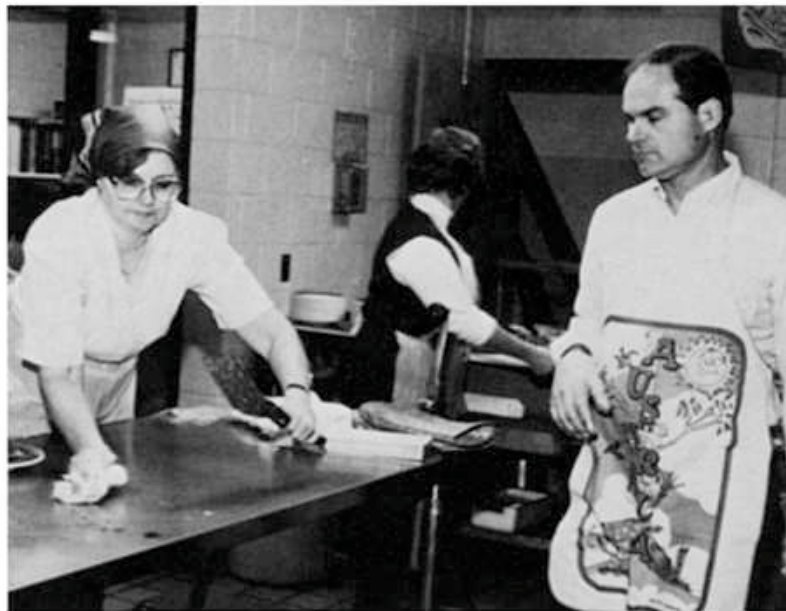

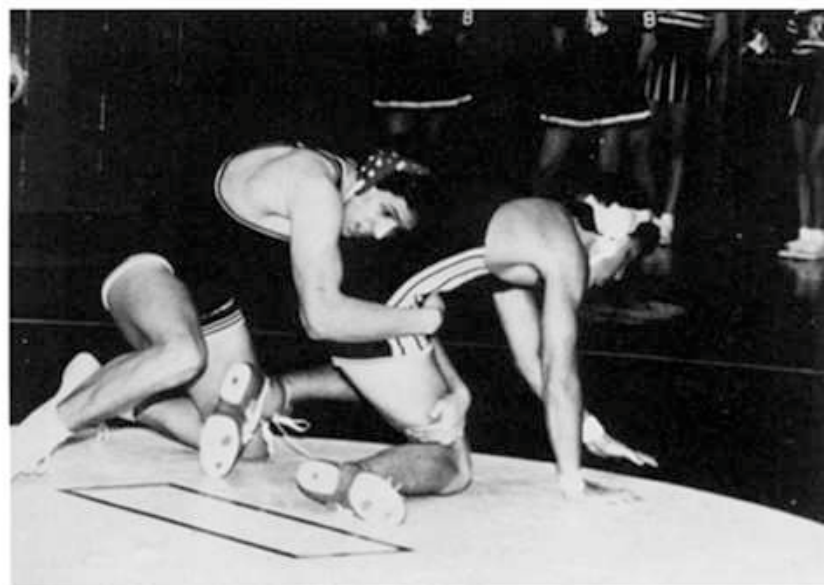

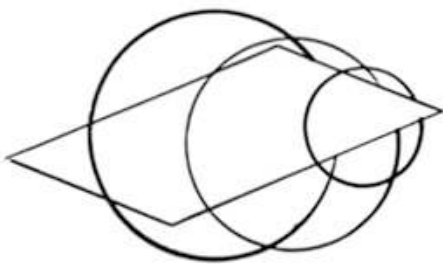


# Cropping Out

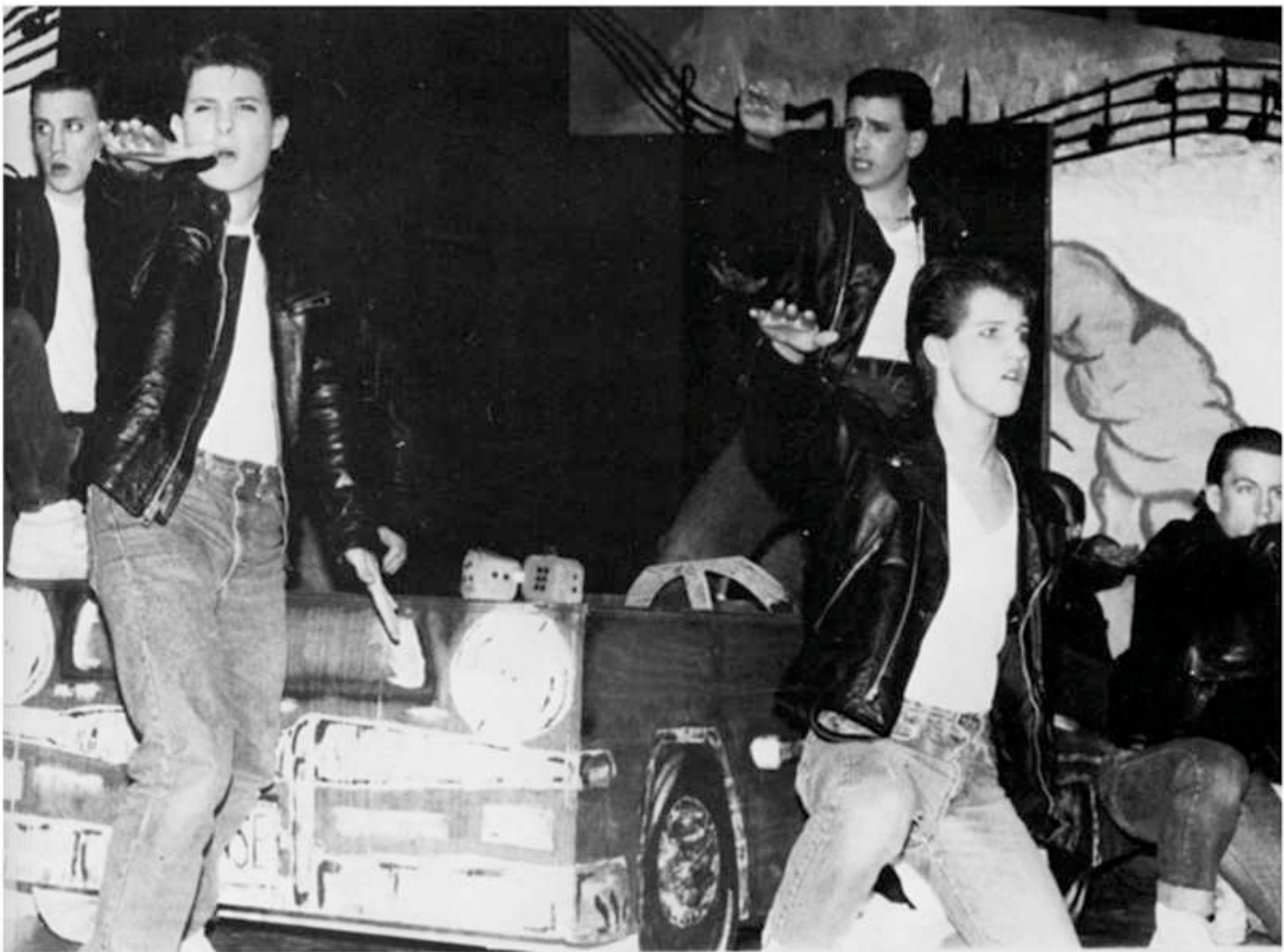

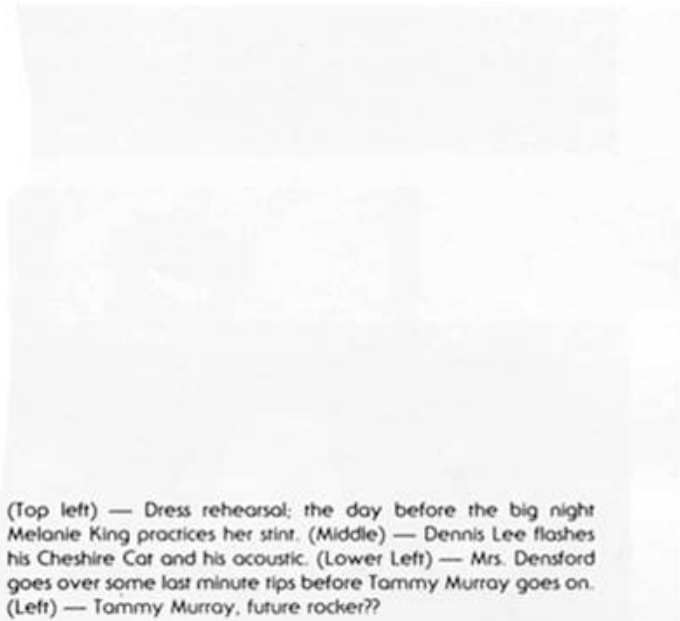

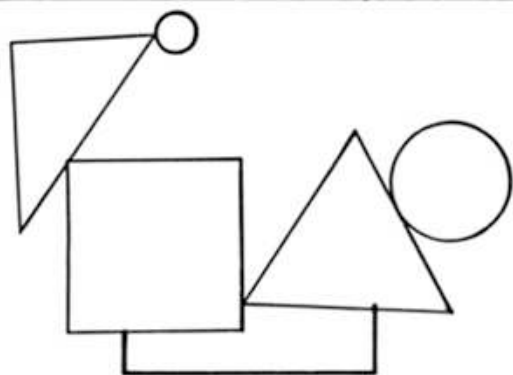

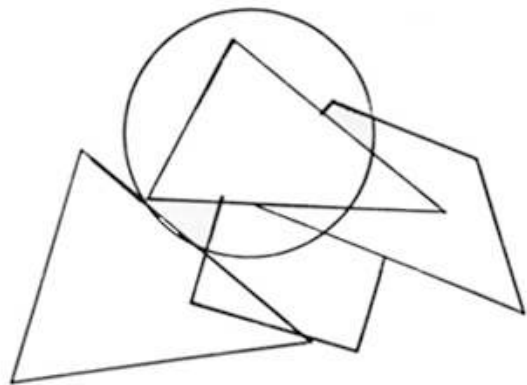

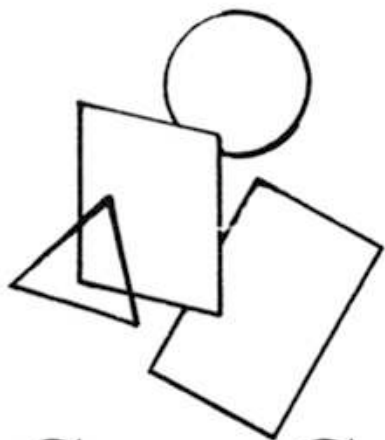

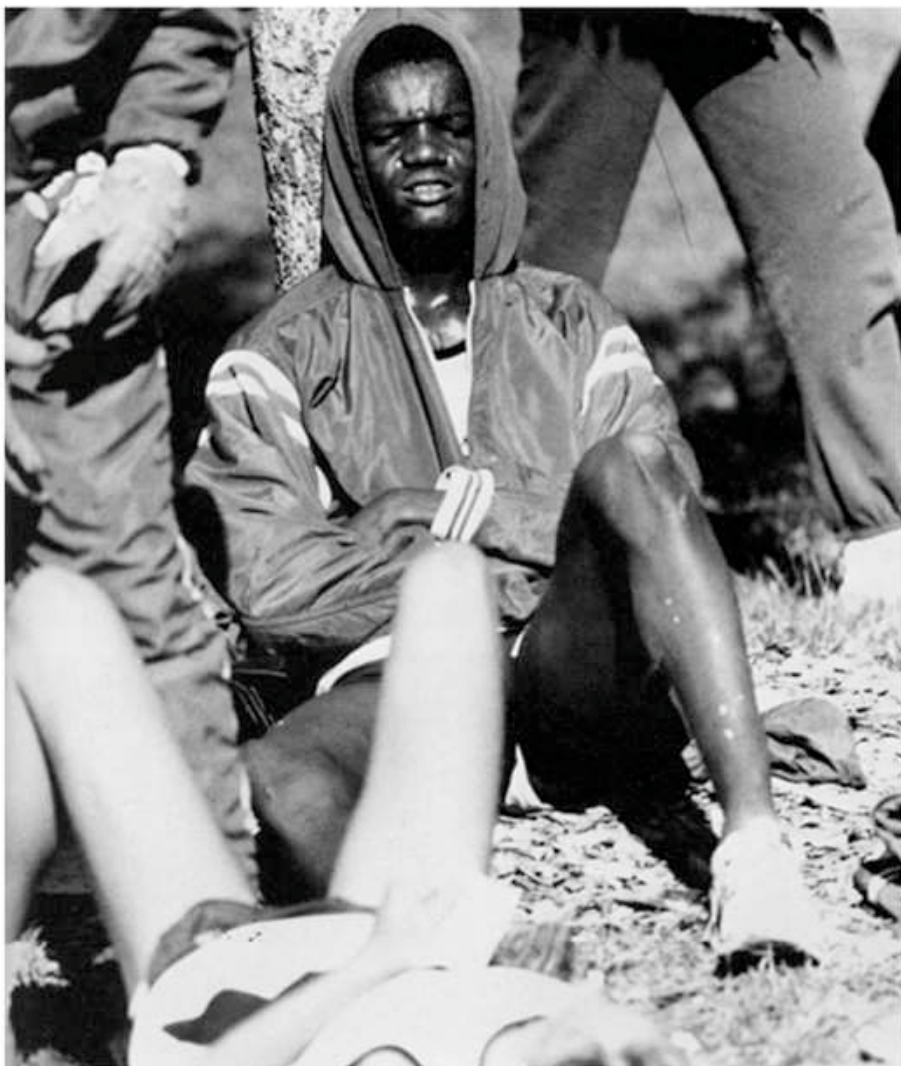


# The Cross Country team shapes up in "88".

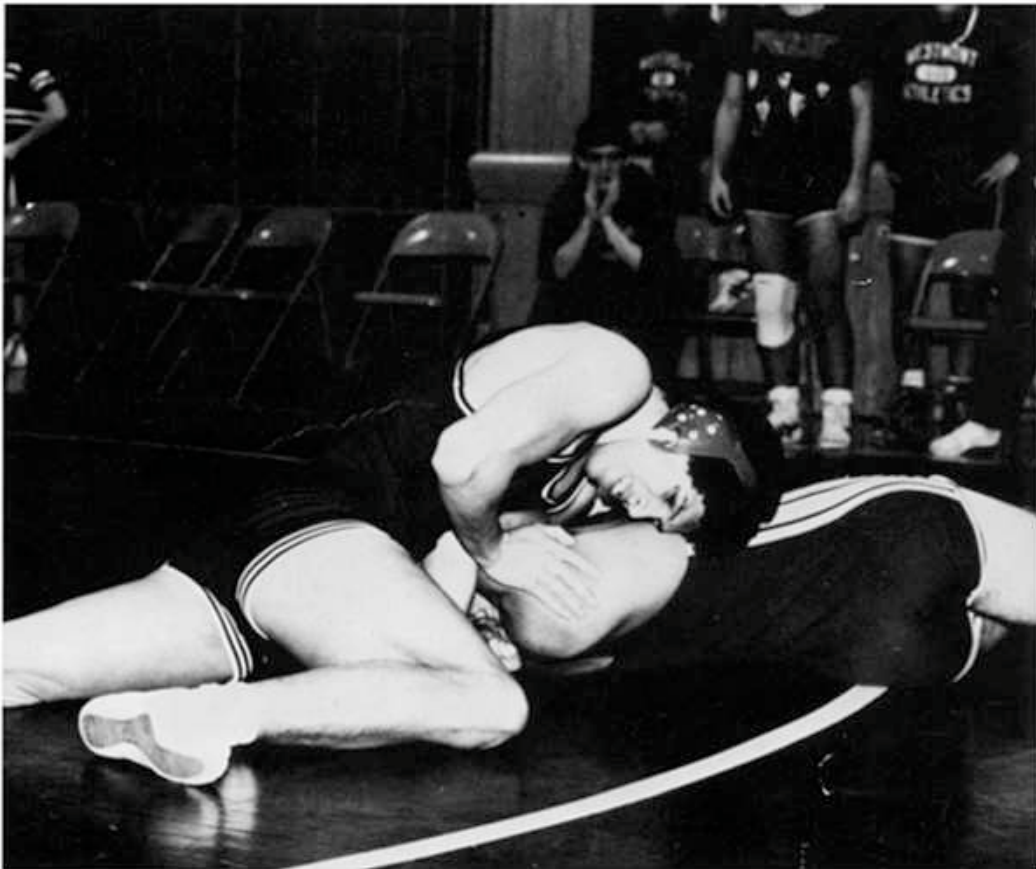
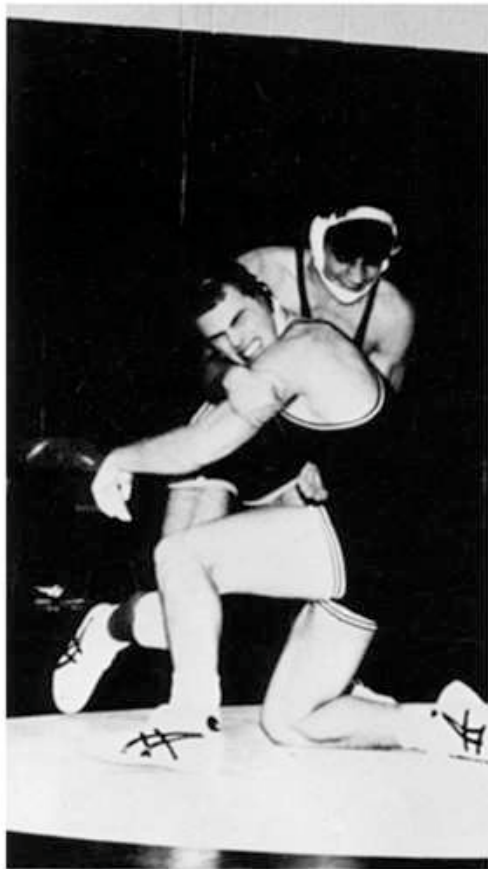
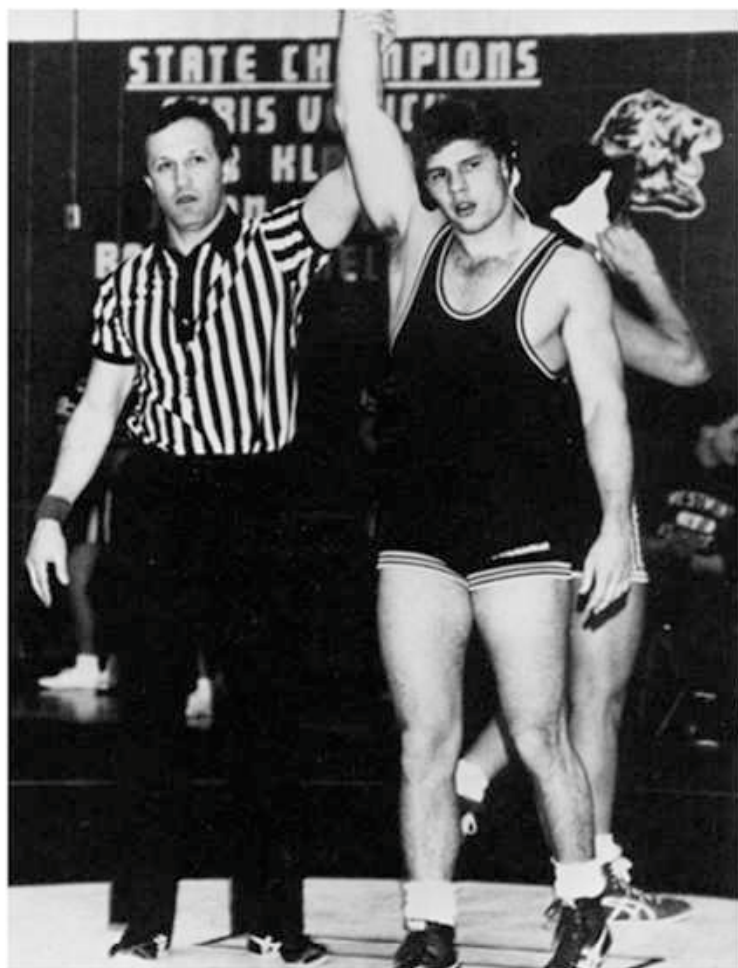


# A Victorious Season

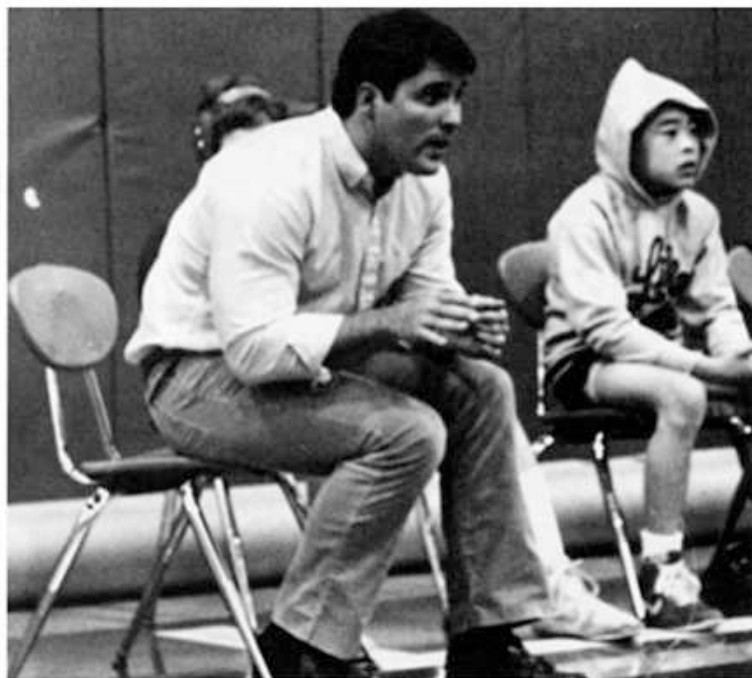
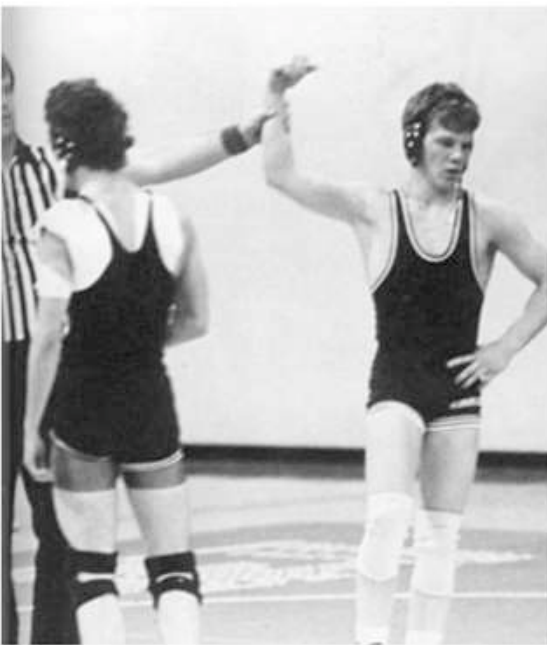

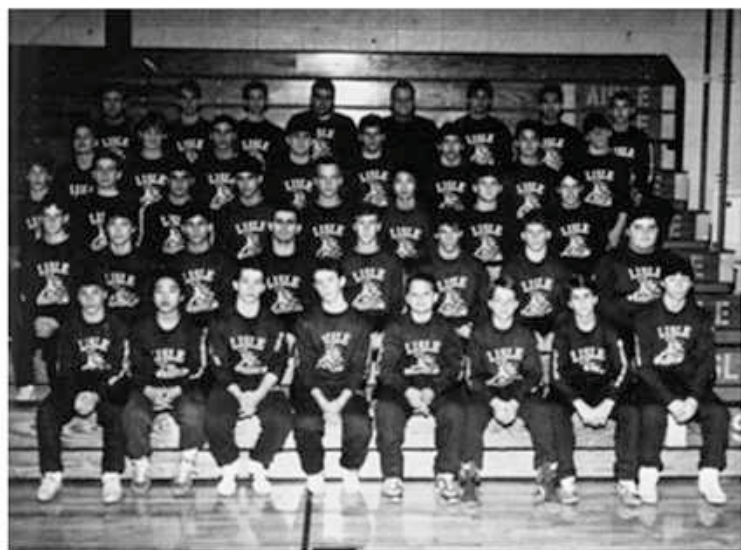
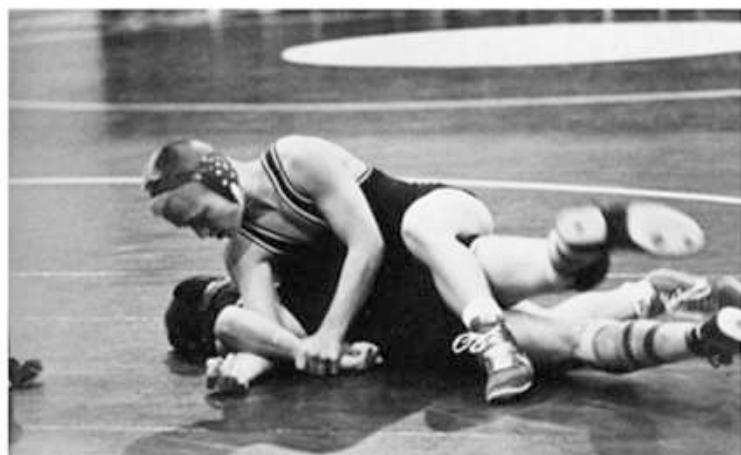

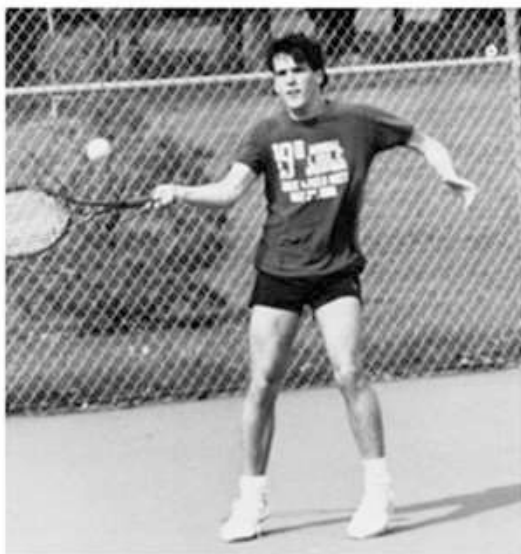
# THE PATH TO SUCCESS
