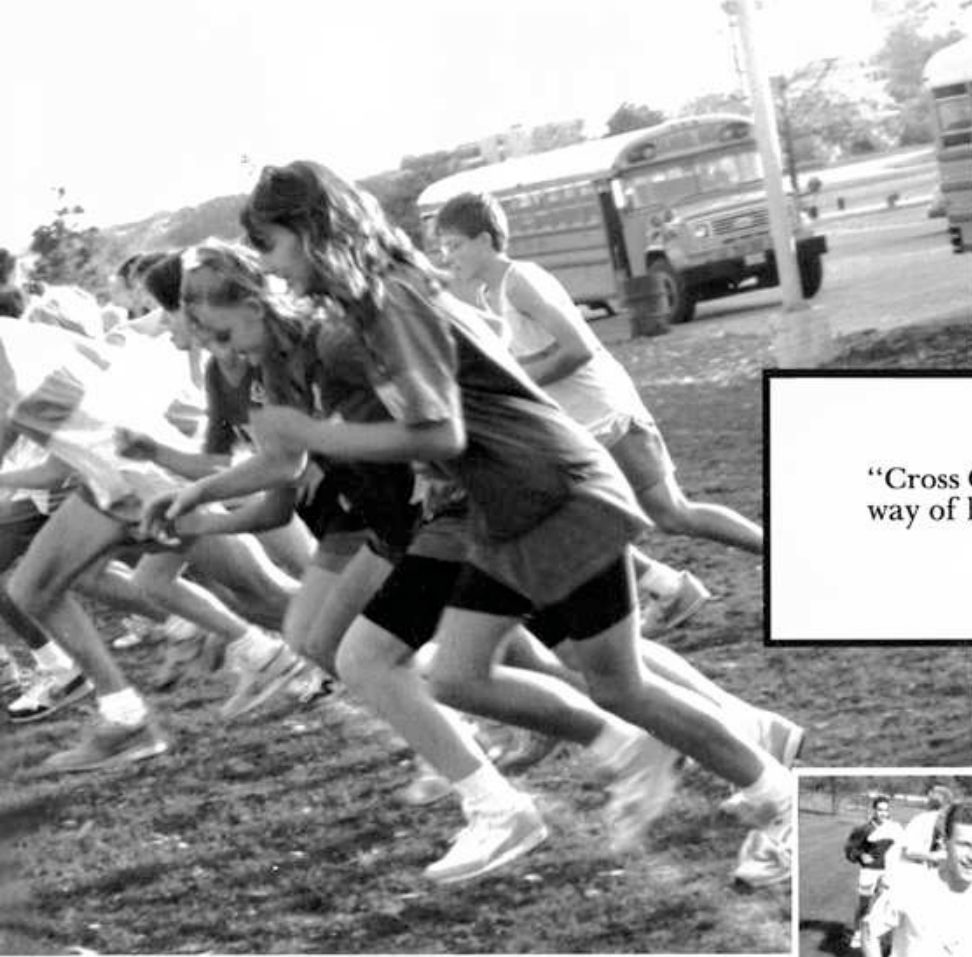

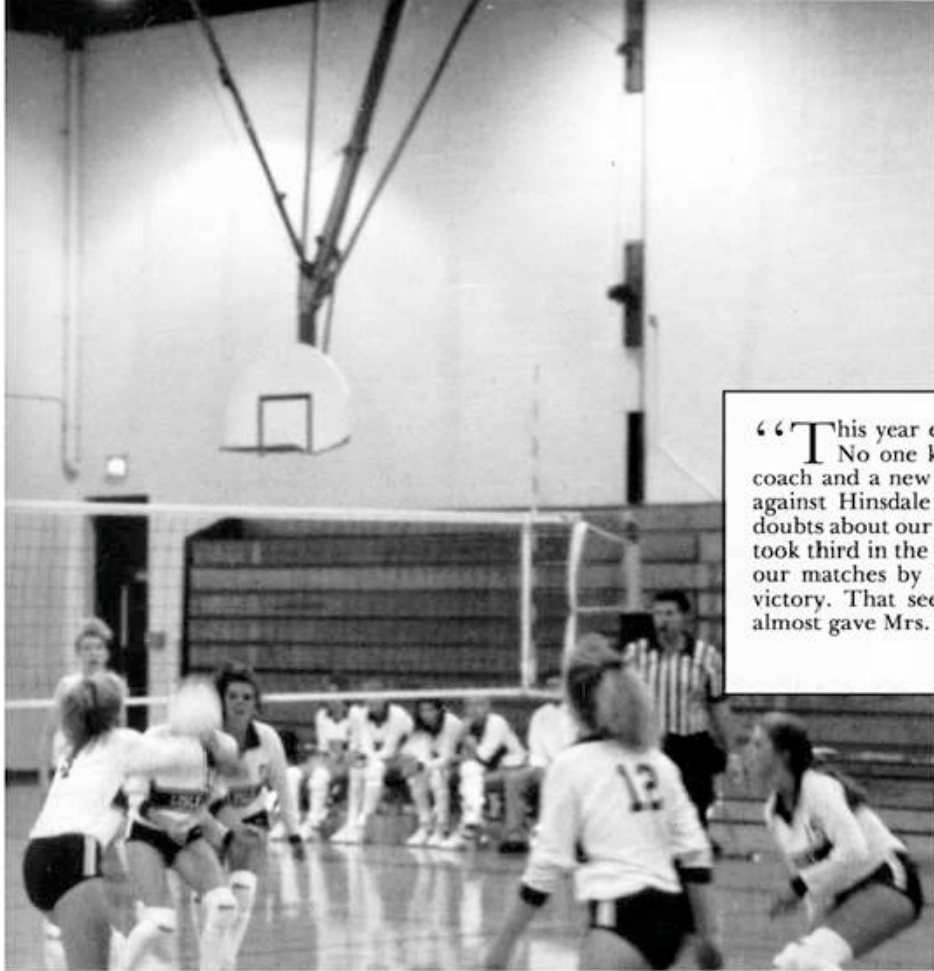
## NEW COACH NEW CONFERENCE

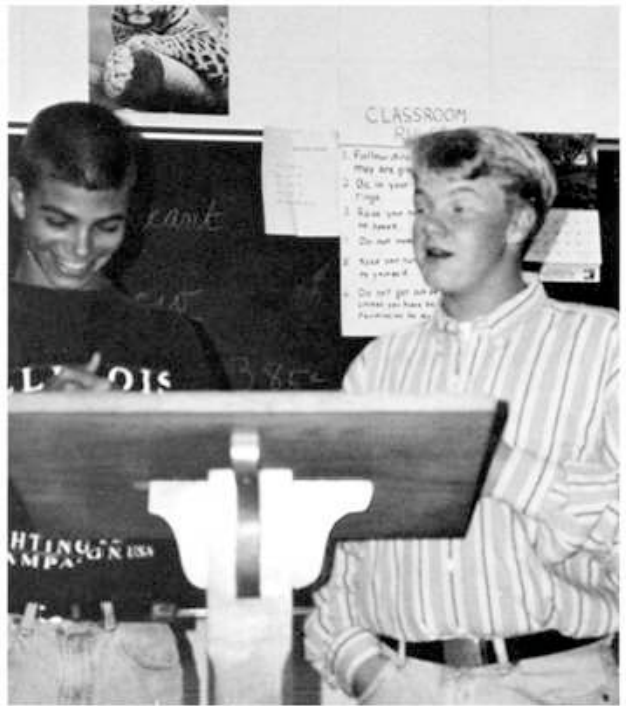
