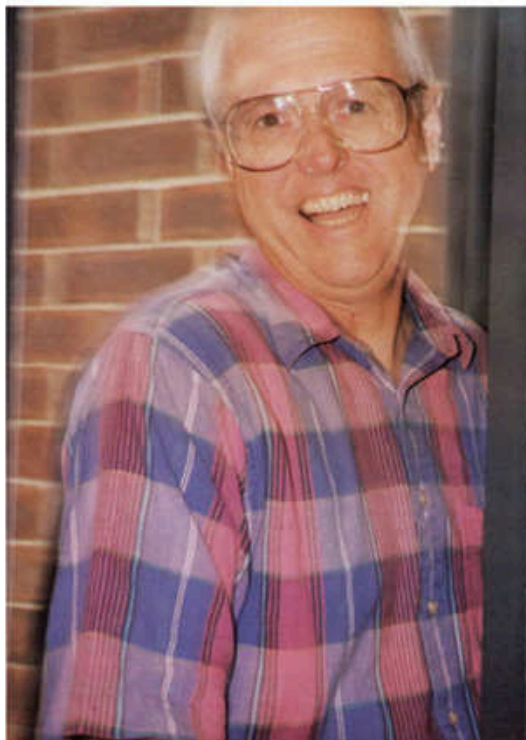

A TOUCH OF SPIRIT GOES A LONG WAY

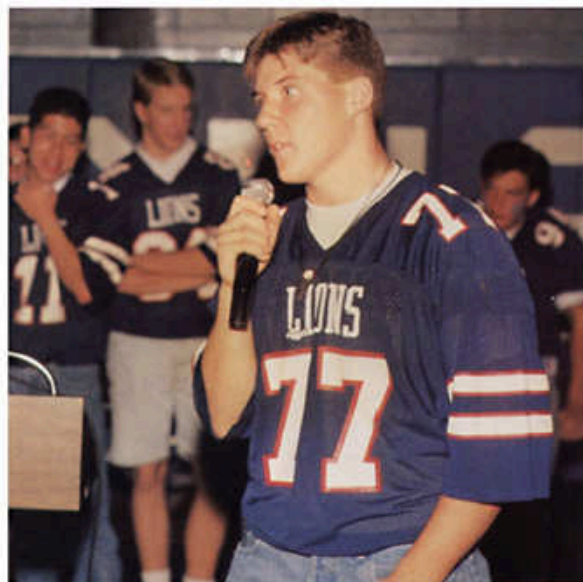

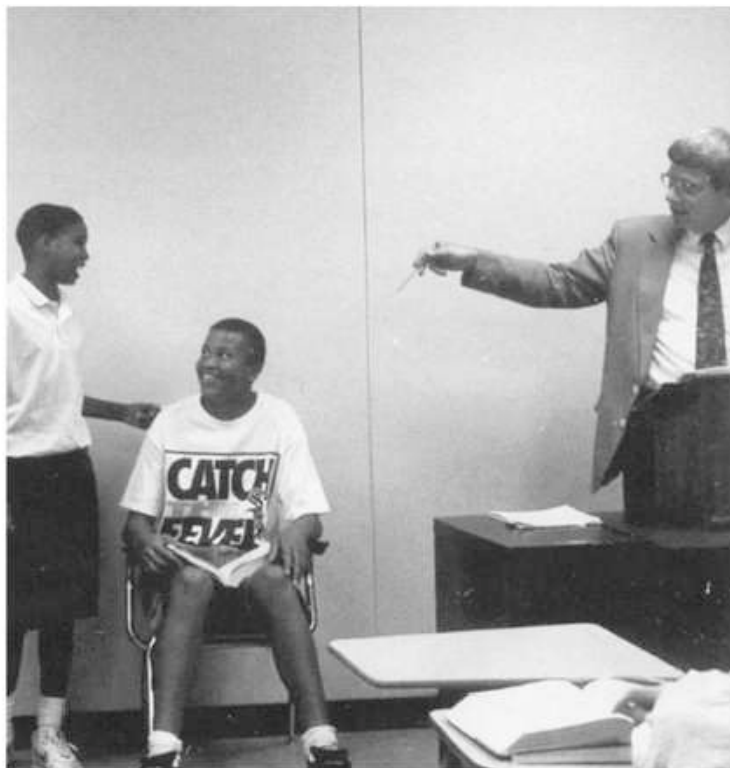

Mathematics. . .the word alone can strike fear into a student's heart. Whether it is algebra or calculus, Lisle's future mathematicians are constantly being challenged by the toughest teachers in town, the math department. Amid the frantic cries of "graph it!" and "How can I do synthetic division?" the calm voice of calculus teacher Mrs. Smith reassures students. AND THEN WHAT?

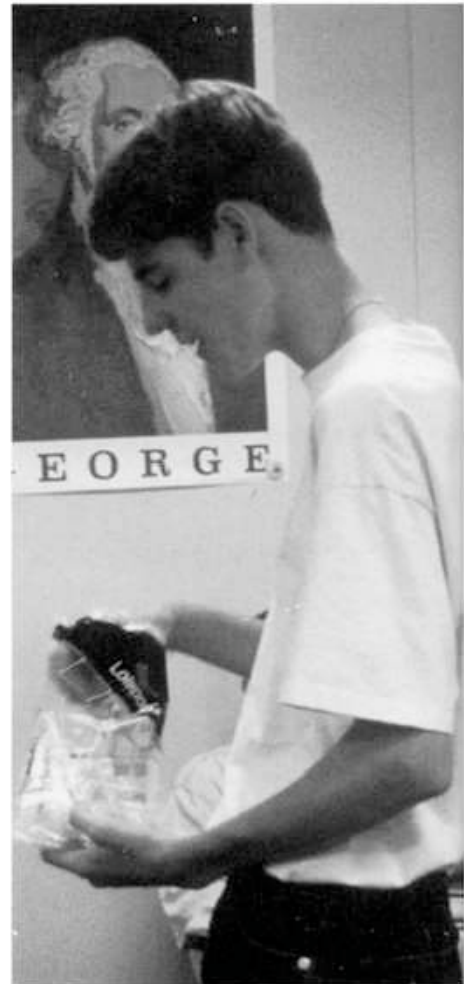

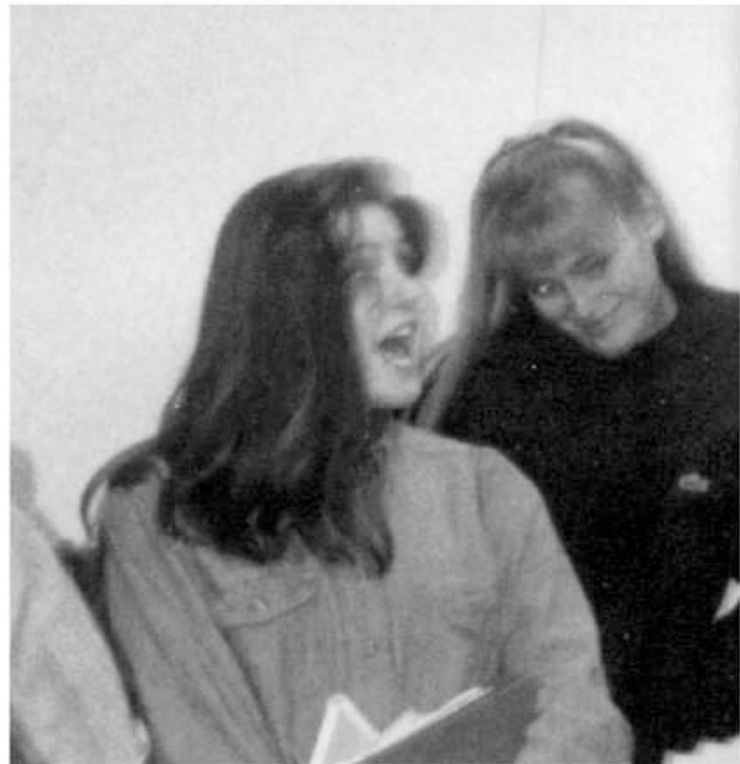

MYSTERIES OF THE UNKNOWN

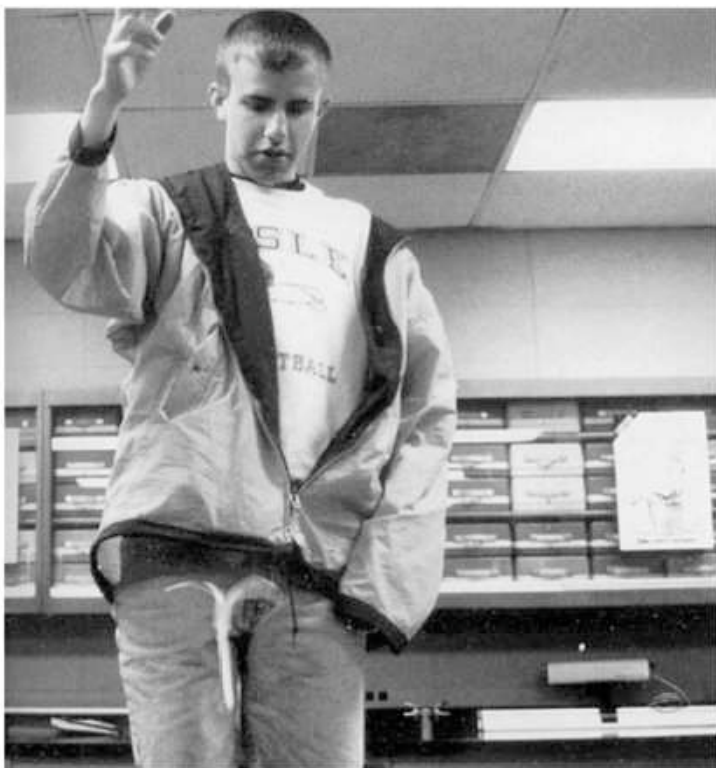

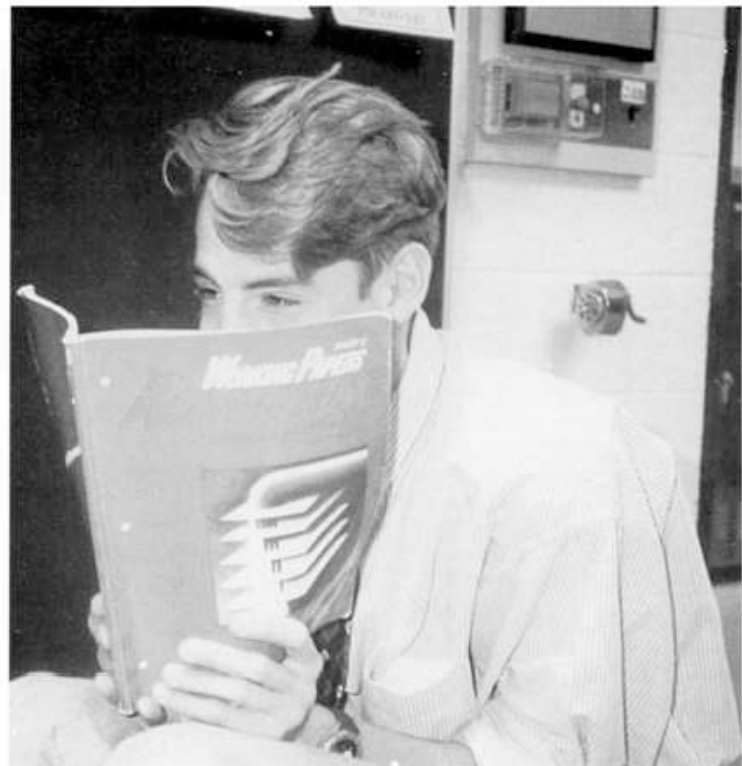
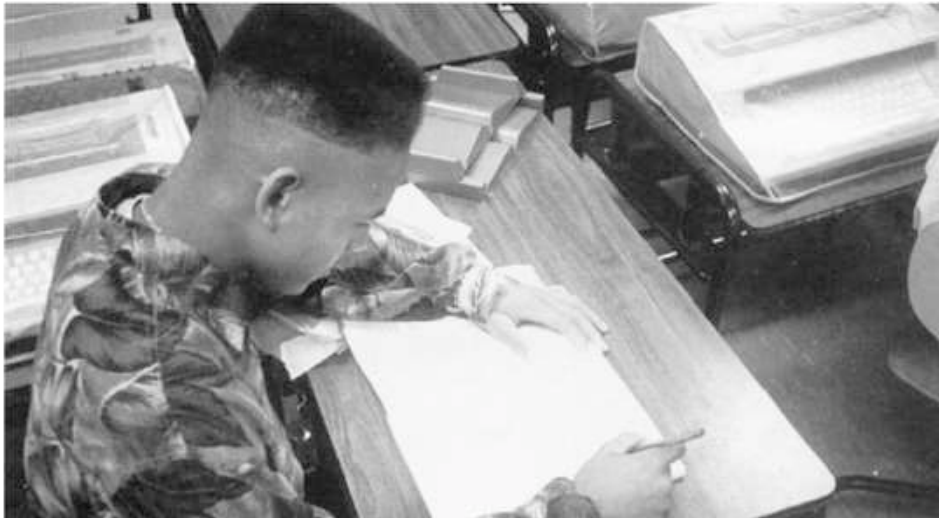
ACCOUNTING FOR THE FUTURE

COMPUTING WAYS TO THE FUTURE

Computers are improving by the minute. Just a couple of decades ago, computers were the size of refrigerators and occupied entire rooms. Now, they come built into a TI-82 calculator, which fits in your back pocket. Computers are being used more and more each day, and pretty soon everything we use may be computerized. 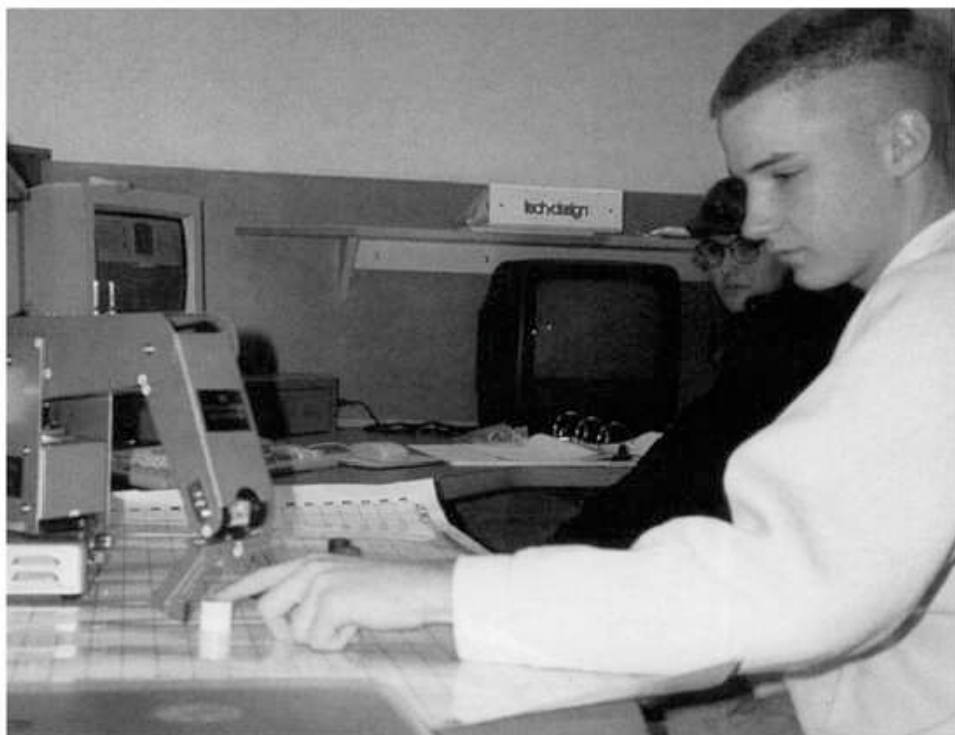

As for its fans, Lisle has no competition. According to one of the regulars, "Lisle fans are the best; they cheer their players on well and aren't afraid to go over the edge."

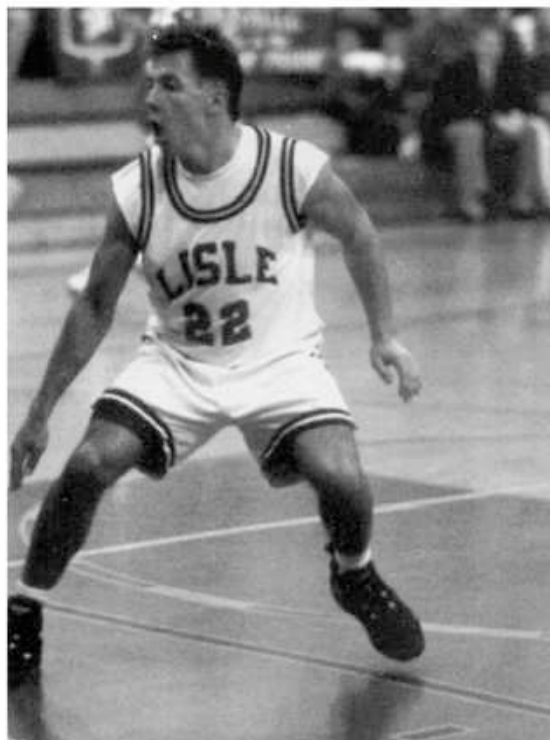
All in all, the team that was supposed have a "learning year" ended up surpassing many people's expectations.
