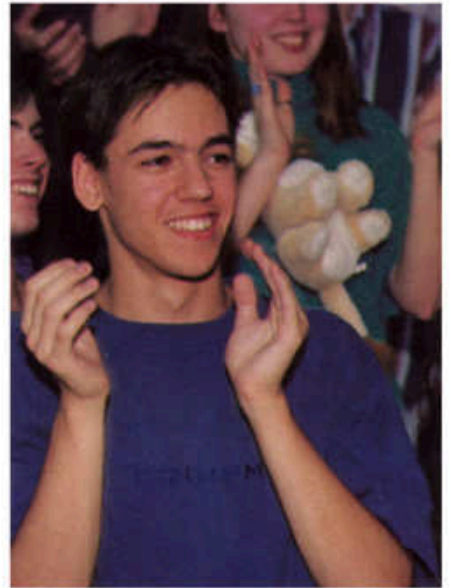

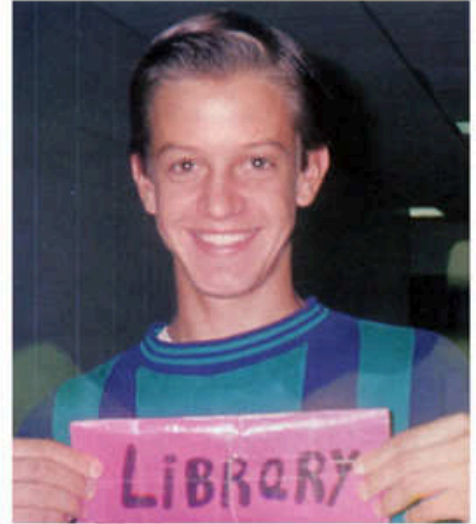
RETURN TO REALITY WELCOME TO OUR

Spirit days are a large part of the Lisle Senior High homecoming week. It is a time for everyone in the school to have the opportunity to show their own personal style and craziness.

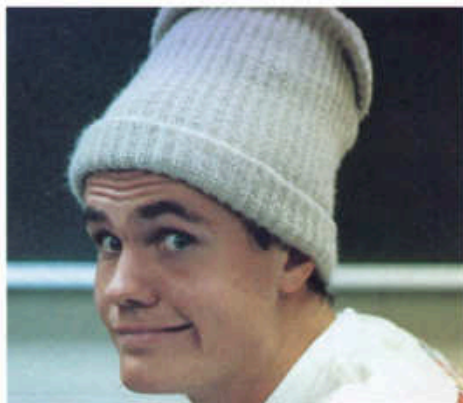
Every day each class was counted and calculated to figure out which class had the most participants. At the end of each day the cheers of ex-

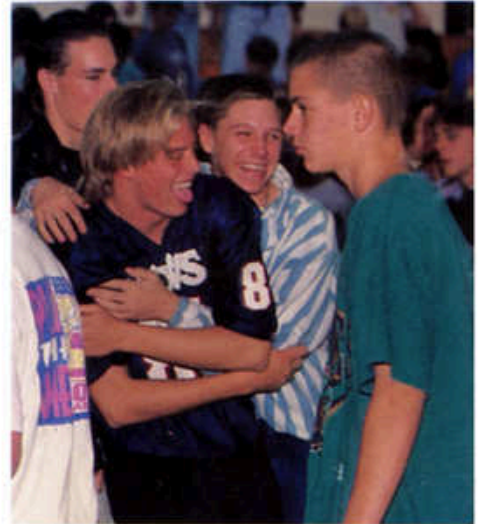

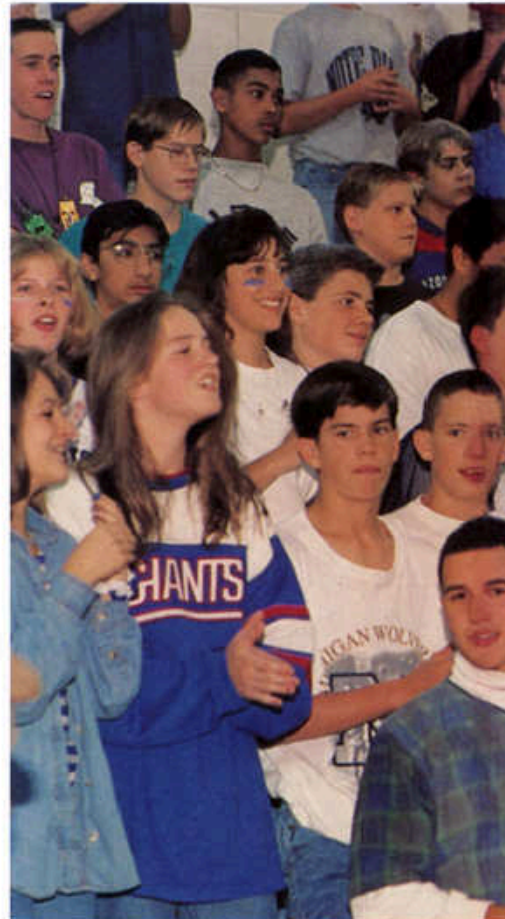

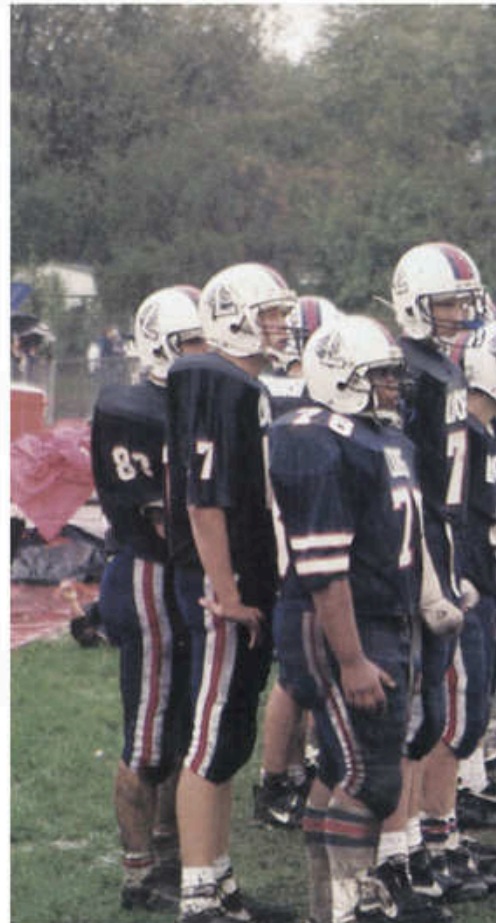

The PC lab is used for the Personal Computers course. The PC lab is used for English and other journalism classes. The PC lab is outfitted with Tandy 1000 computers.

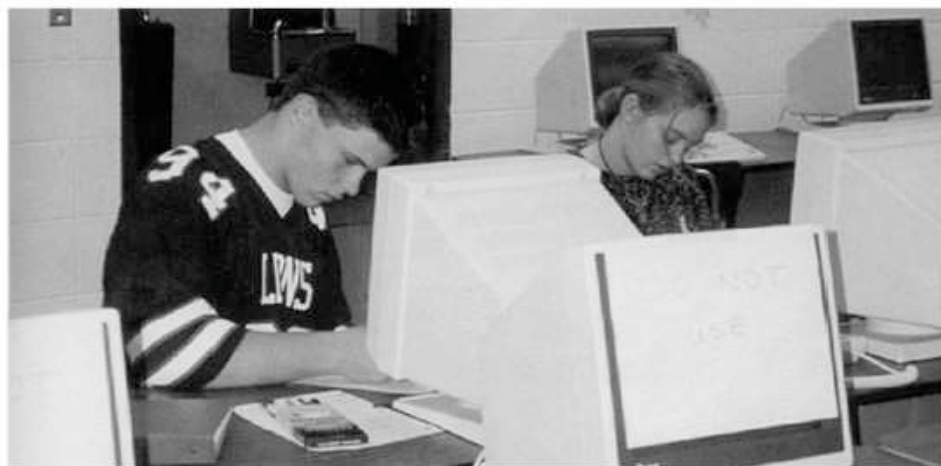

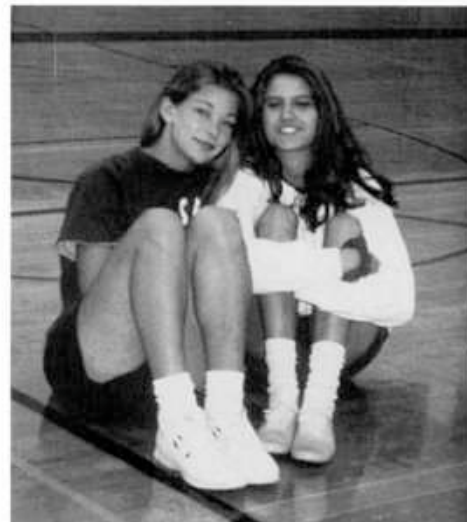

ment has also received a new art computer program called "Painting." Mrs. Godfrey is continually trying to expand the students' minds, and she feels that this is a great program to do just that. It

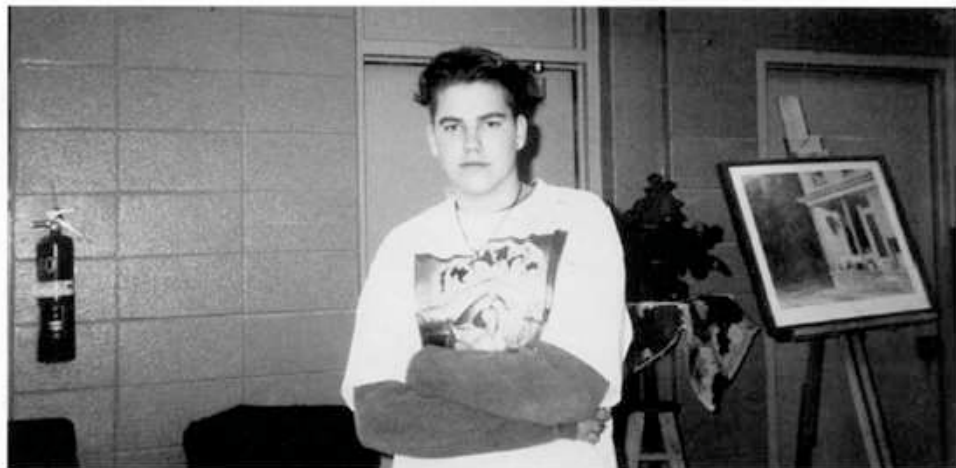
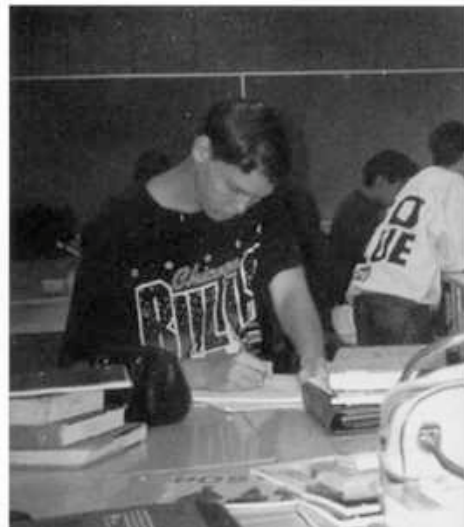

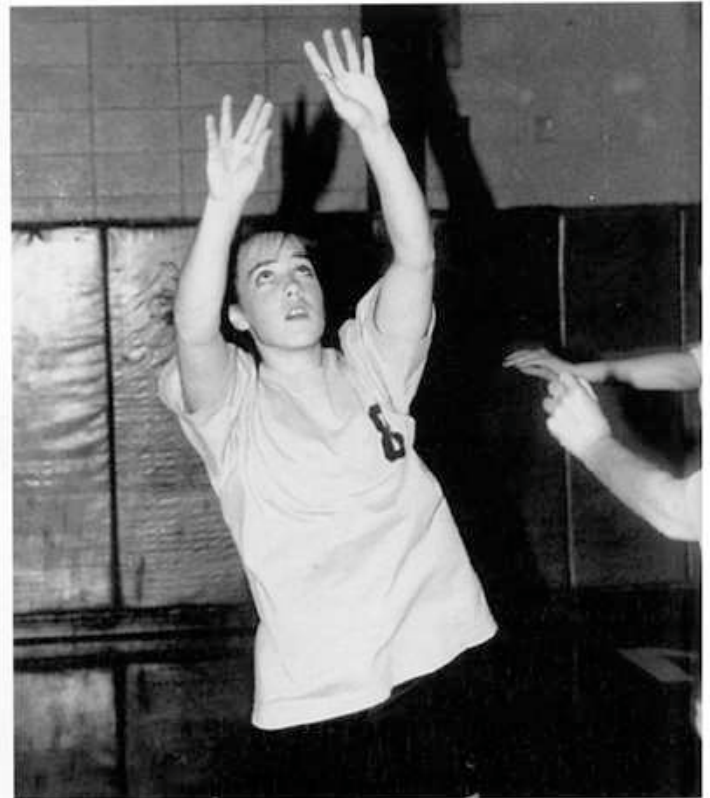
BUMP SET SPIKE SCORE

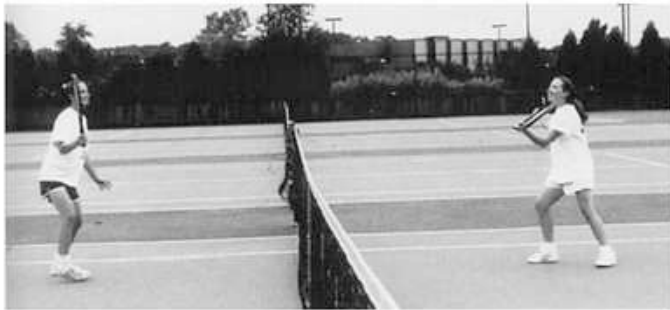

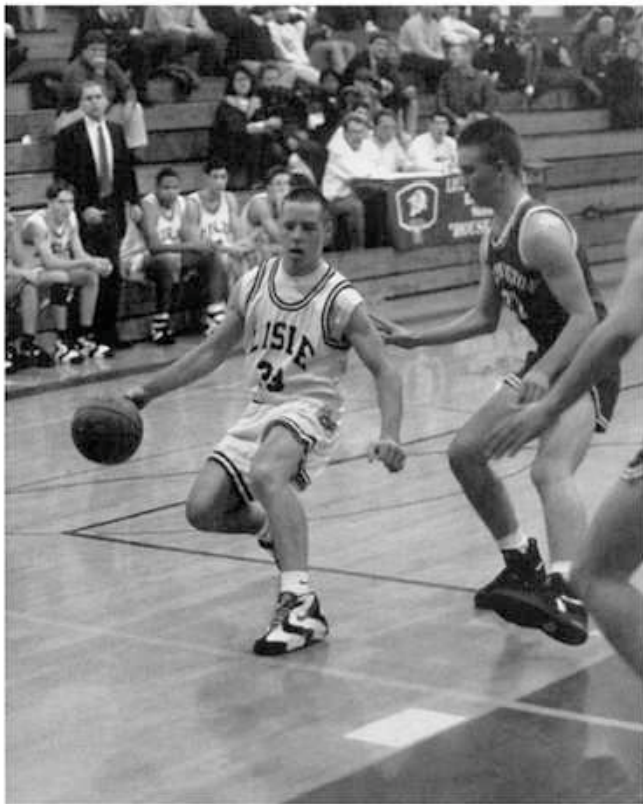

Overall the season was very productive and many look forward to an even better season next year.

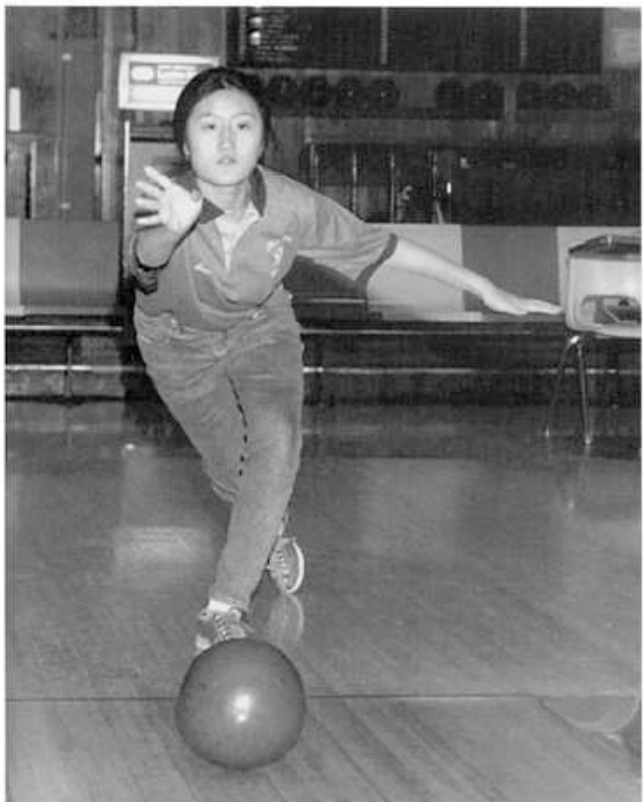

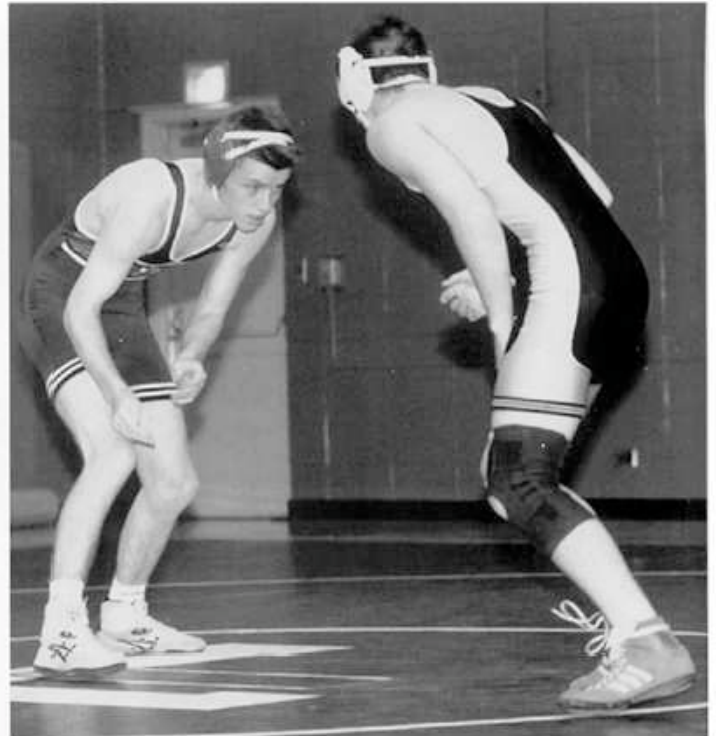

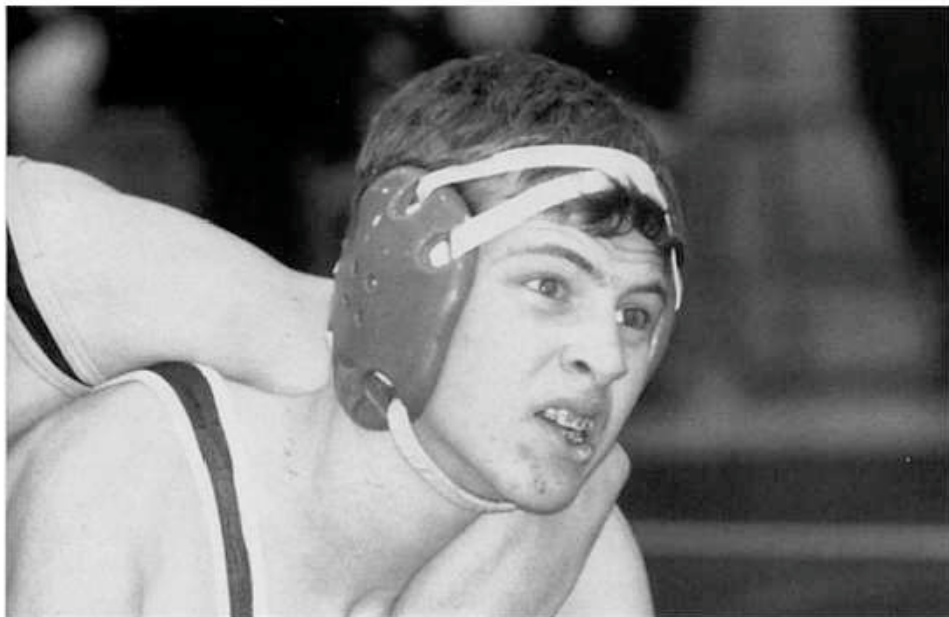

Performances at all home football and basketball games, pep rallies, competitions, and the bonfire, these girls are truly the highlights of the day.

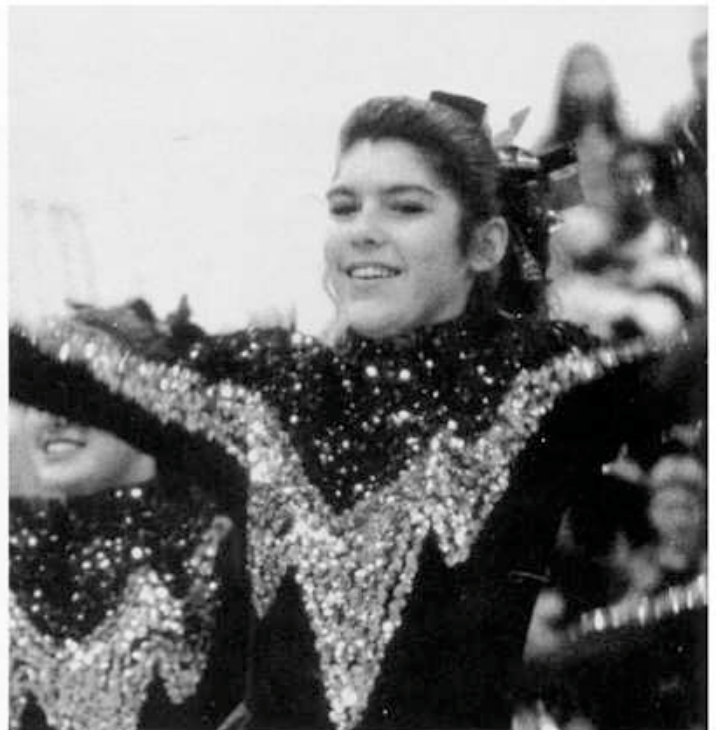
