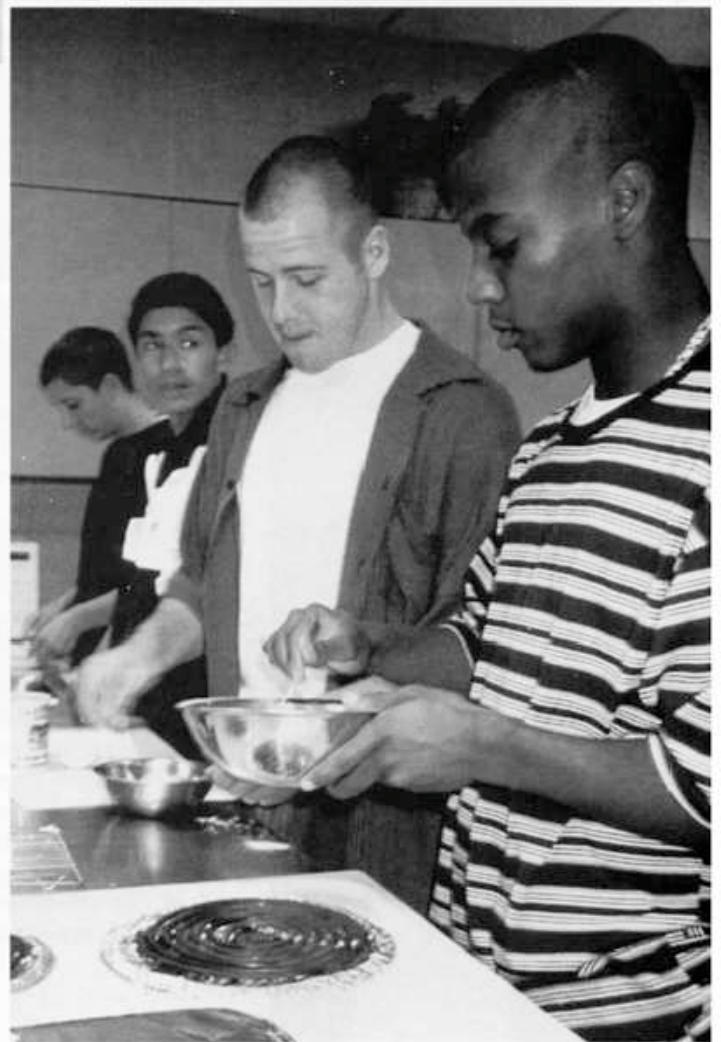
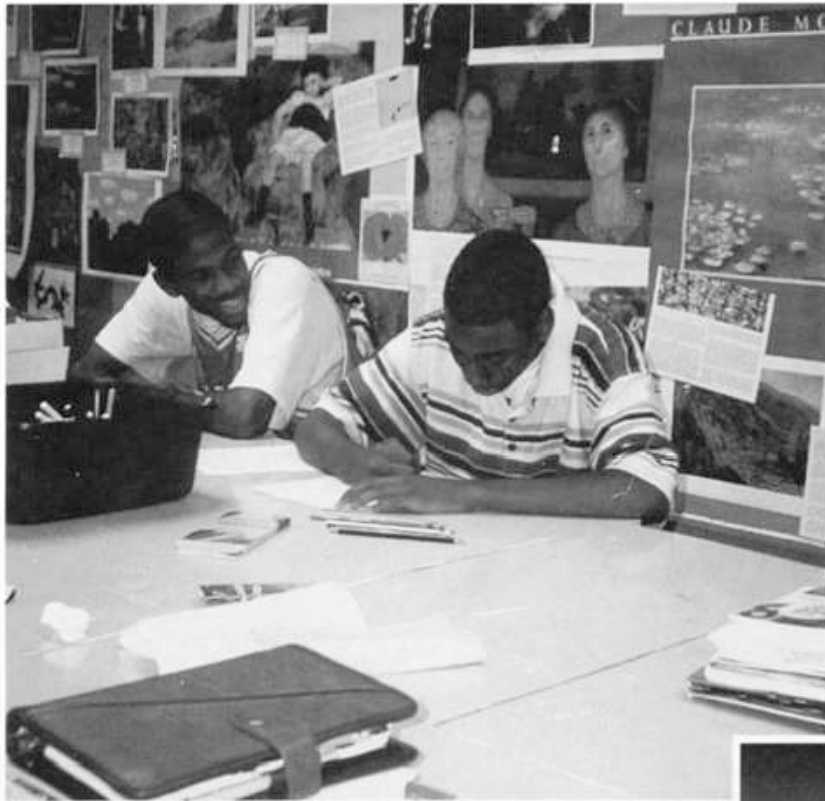

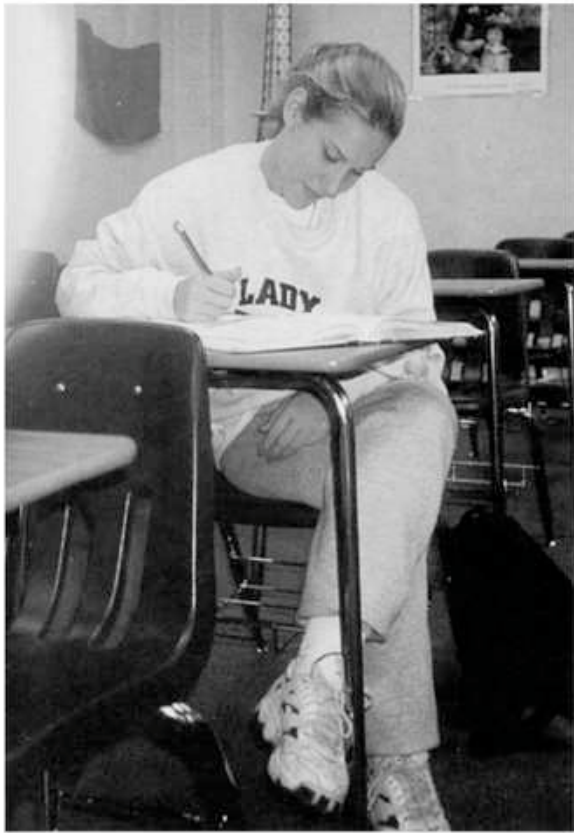
that the music was better this year than it has been at past homecomings.

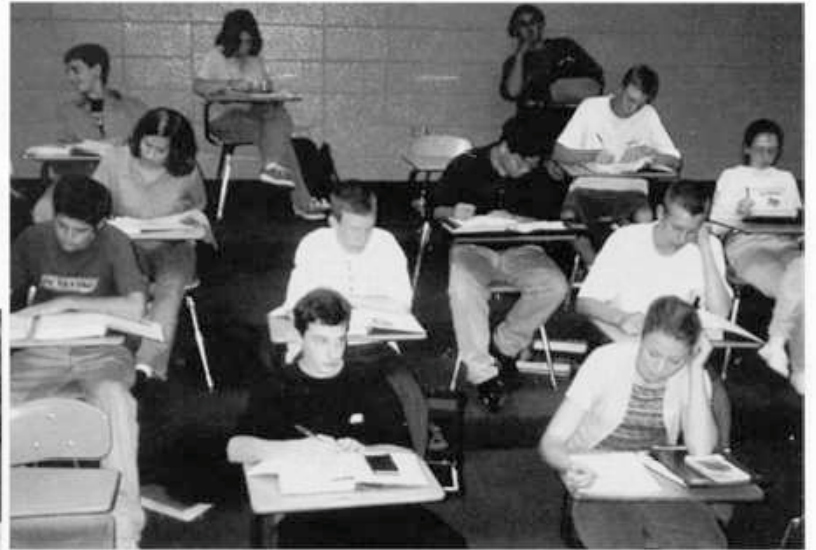
Overall, the 1997 homecoming dance was once again considered a great success. The majority had fun at the dance but everyone still had the rest of the night to sit back and relax in paradise.

SYMBOLIZE THIS

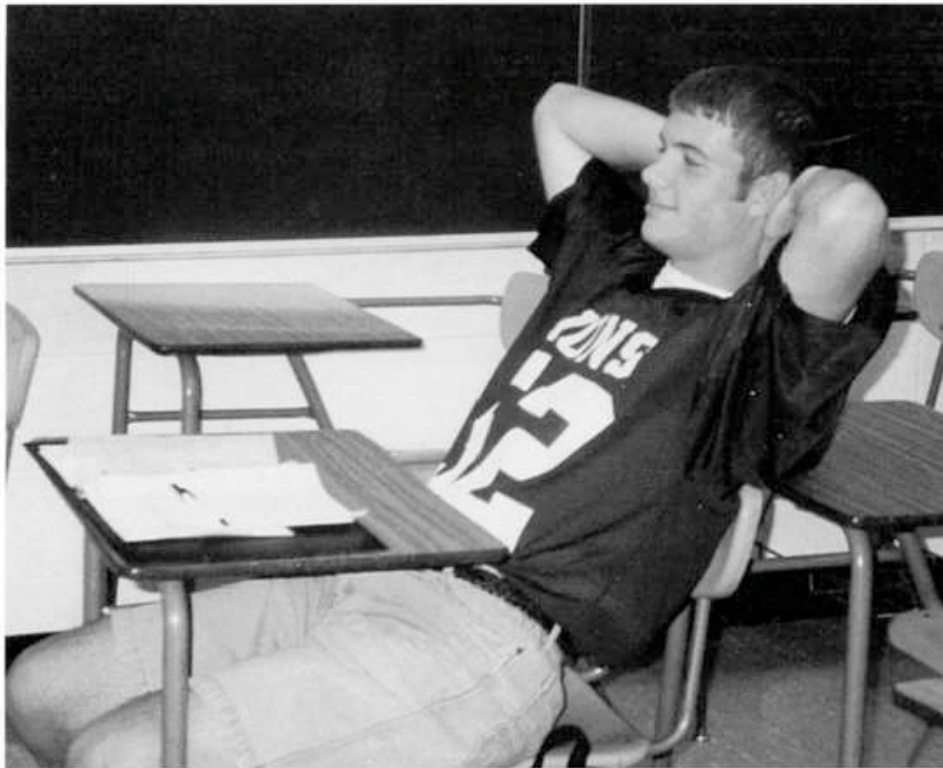

MAD ABOUT MATH

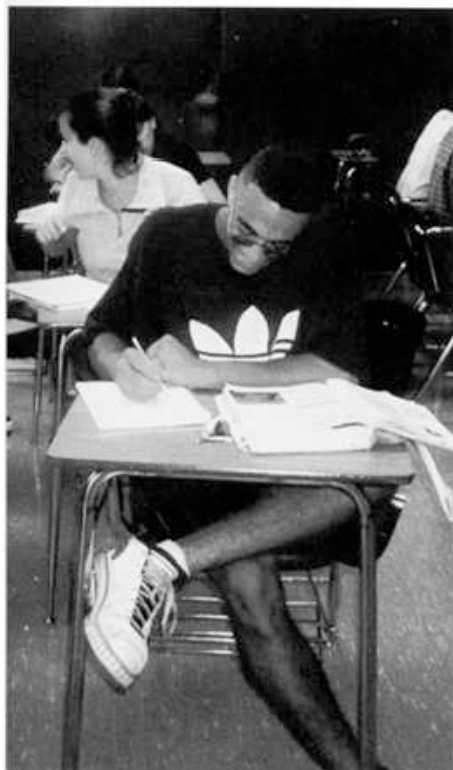
Everyone finds math challenging at one time or another. With so many formulas, functions, and other scary words beginning with F, students might feel intimidated,

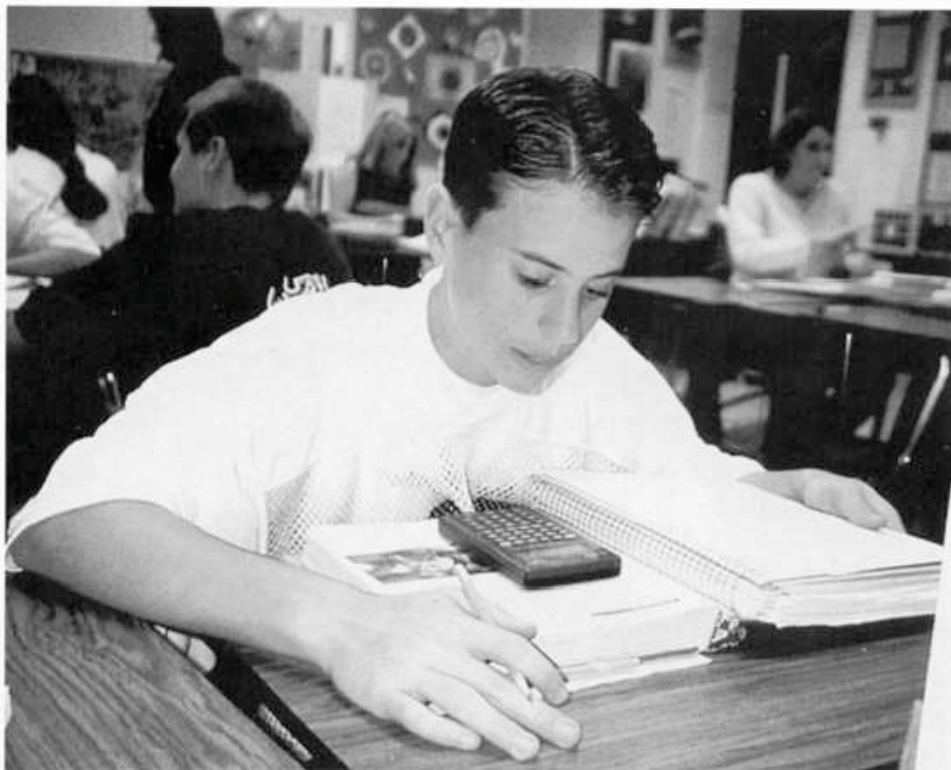

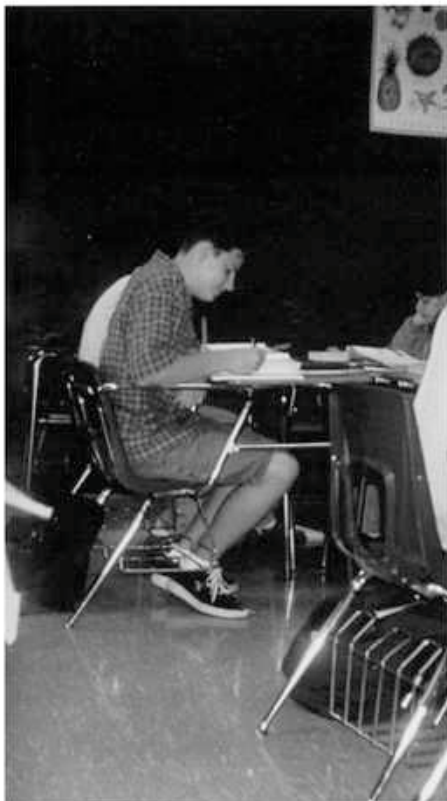

These young performers have taken band lessons since fifth or sixth grade. From learning about certain notes and keys to memorizing music, students put many hours into band. It seems so easy for

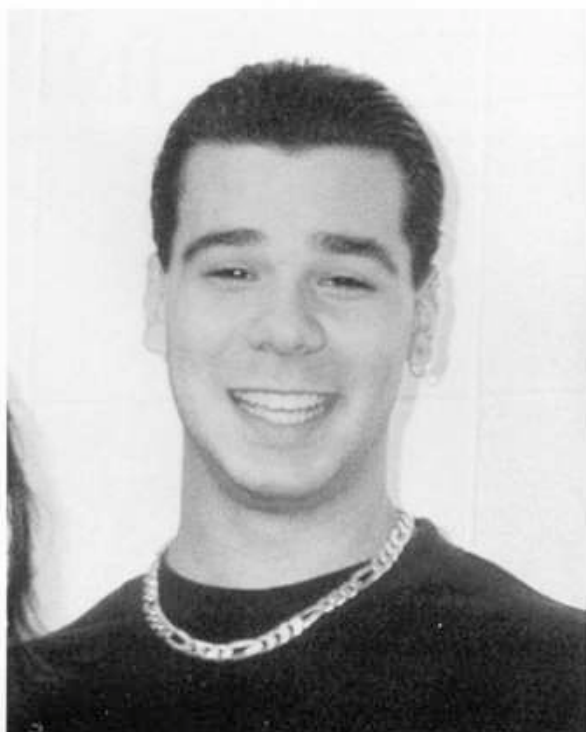
these young musicians. "Were a close group of friends," says junior Francis David, "We call ourselves 'the band family.'"

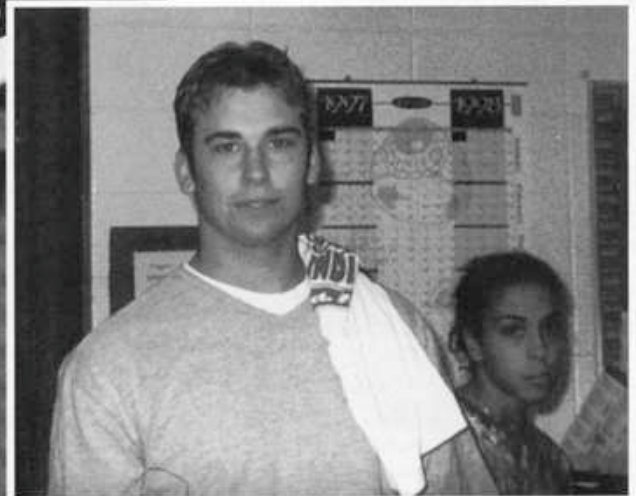

40th ANNIVERSARY

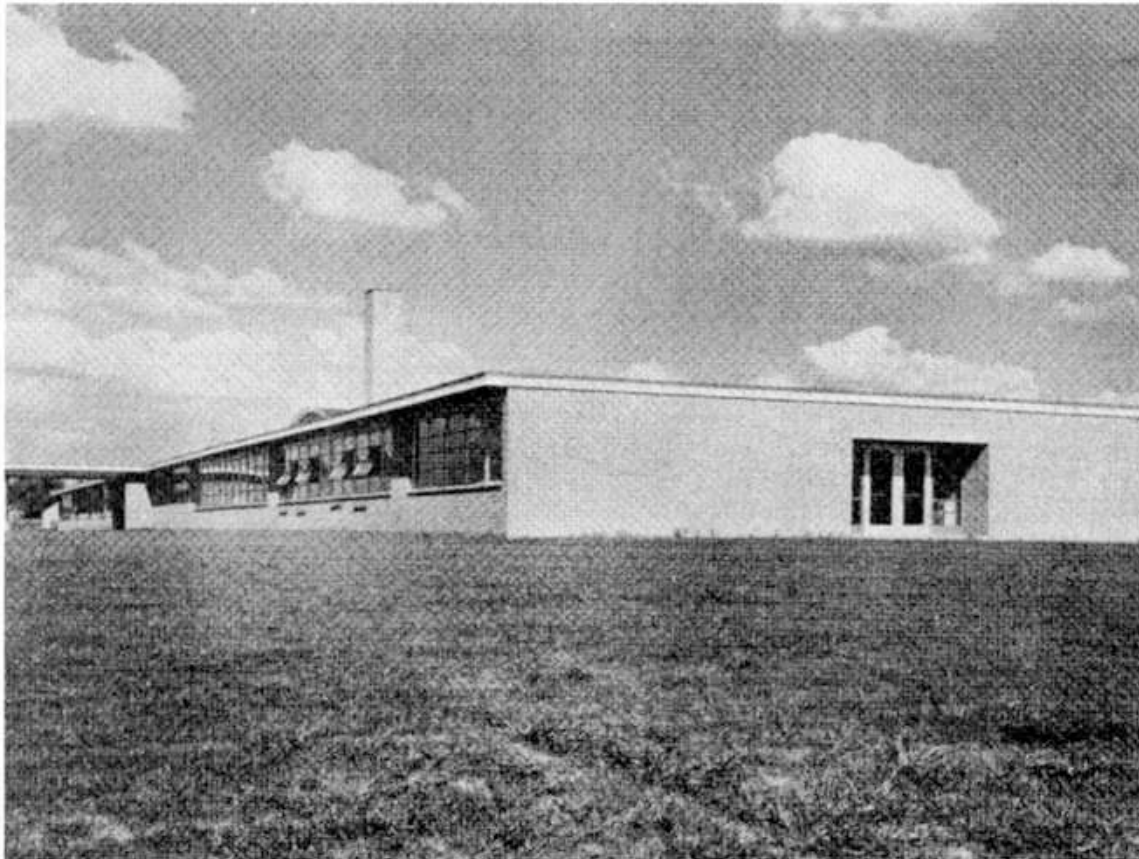
August, 1957, Lisle Community High School (what we now know as the Junior High) opened its doors for the first time. Before the opening of the new school, students that lived in Lisle attended Naperville and Downers Grove Schools. The enrollment that year was just a little over 200 students and 12 teachers, one principal, one secretary who doubled as the counselor, and one custodian.

Now it's 1997 and Lisle Senior High School's current enrollment is 565 students and 58 faculty, staff, and administrators. Through these 40 years Lisle has had many changes other than student enrollment. A new building in 1974, a completely new facility and staff, various clubs and activities. Computers with internet connections, T.V.'s in every room with Channel 1, a state-of-the-art technology center, and other technological advances that we have now that weren't even dreamed of in 1959.

Lisle saw the end of the 50's with poodle skirts and '57 Chevies rolling right into the 60's with the Kennedy assassination, civil rights movement, hippies, Vietnam, first man on the moon, and Woodstock. Lisle kept pushing through the years and into the 70's. Bell Bottoms, platform shoes, and disco were trends at school. Lisle with the rest of the country saw the end of Vietnam and the aftermath. 58,000 soldiers killed in the line of duty. The subject of Watergate with President Nixon was a topic talked about in every class. With the end of the 70's came the birth of some future Lisle students and with the 80's came the rest. Once again the trend had changed. Michael Jackson was in and Disco Duck was out. George Bush's election is the first Presidential election we remember. We saw the Challenger go up and witnessed the fatal explosion that claimed the lives of the entire crew, including a teacher. Soon came the 90's with the Gulf War. We sat in horror as we saw the news and what was left of the federal building in Oklahoma City. Many new medical advances have been made that might have or will save our lives.

Imagine all the people who have walked through the doors of Lisle in the last four decades. It's hard to imagine what it was like to go to school during turmoil, change, and accomplishments. Only 40 years have gone by and there will be easily another 40 to come.

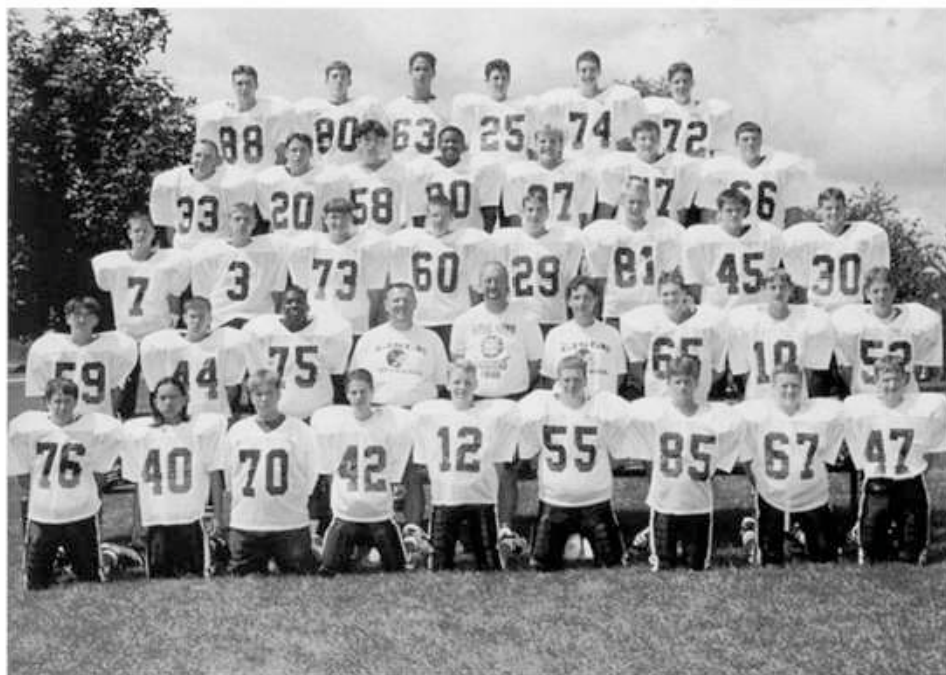
The team started practices two weeks before school began. As the season progressed practices were common for two hours after school. The junior varsity team also has games during the week unlike the varsity.

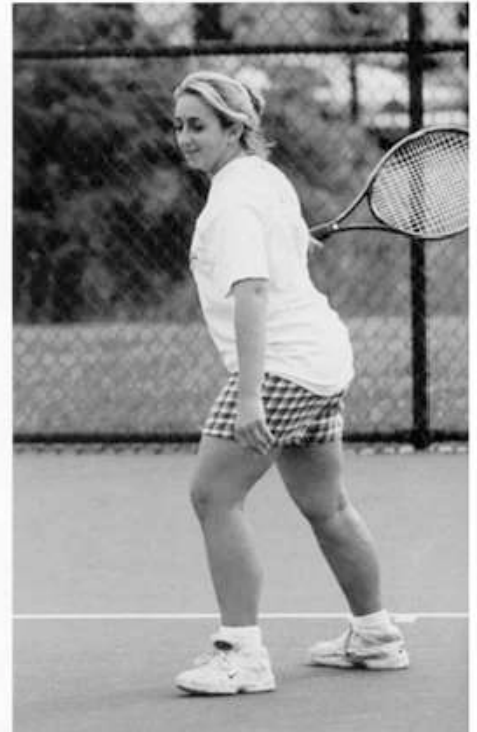

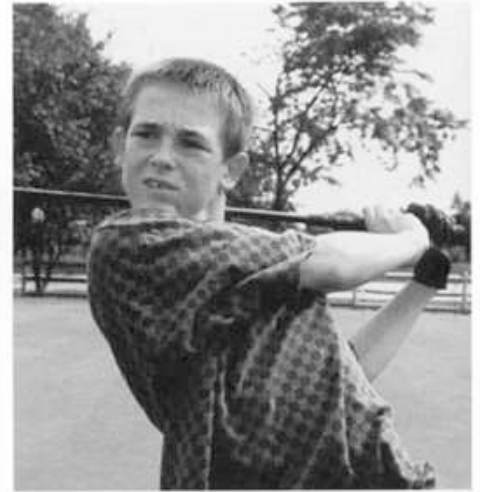

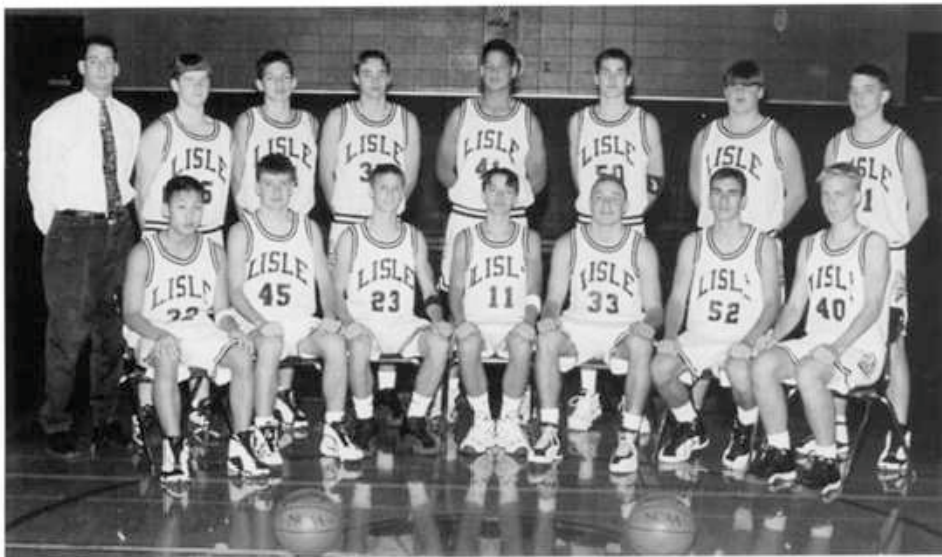

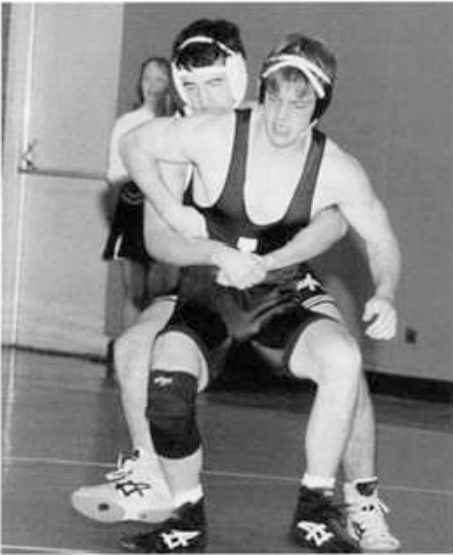

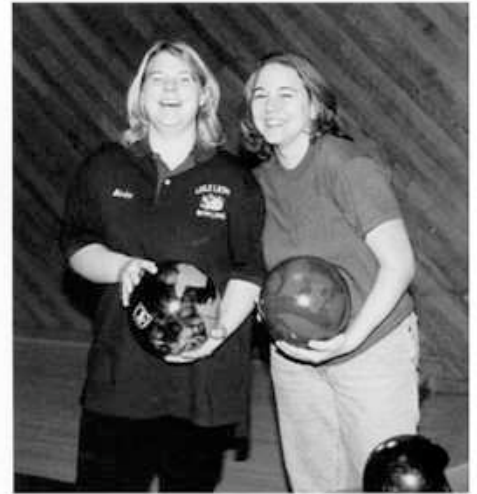

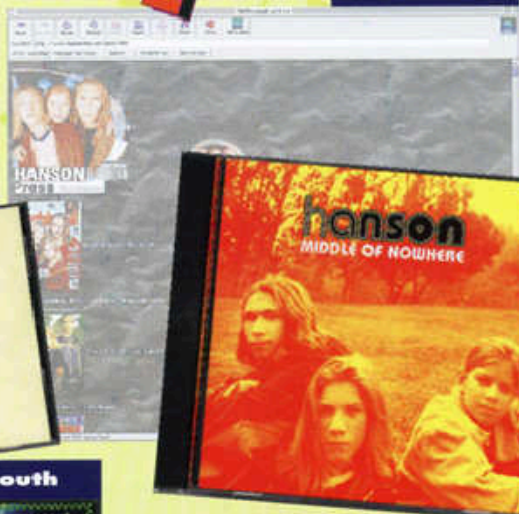
