
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

After all, this is a part of growing too.





























Student Council


Planning school activities and governing the student body is a large task—but the Student Council has successfully met their objectives

English and Art



The Freshman course, General Physical Science, offers a "preview" to the vast world of science in a modern world. The basics of life and its functions are the subjects of Biology, which is required of the sophmores. Biology students learn a variety of biological facts, from being able to recognize microscopic ameba

to understanding the complex systems of classification. Chemistry students "discovered" the theories of great scientists and put them to practice in the laboratory. Physics students study matter and energy and their transformation during their daily "hour of happiness". A new course, Physiology, was added to the program this year. 




The band provided half-time enter-















As the evening continues, more couples decide to dance, and soon the floor becomes a maze of dancing silhouettes.








French and Spanish Clubs



Students find means of expression in speech, debate, writing






Calling all future homemakers! FHA can provide plenty of work with lots of fun.





The layout editor can now put his scaleograph away and the copy editor can lay down her pencil. It is finished.










Lisle Lions defeat opposition to achieve Second Place in the Conference, setting a new record!












