


#### Homecoming Week








#### Mathematics Department

The LCHS mathematics program offers students choice of classes. Freshmen may take their first year of secondary math in one of four levels: remedial, terminal non-terminal, and honors. The remedial program is aimed at students who have exhibited little aptitude for numbers. Terminal Algebra I is intended for those students who take math to qualify for college entrance. The non-terminal and honors sections are for those students who will need a skill in math for their futures. Sophomores may take geometry in either a terminal or non-terminal program. Juniors enrolled in Algebra II learn a lot of trigonometry while Seniors take Math Analysis.






# Science Opens Many Doors





# Journalism and Senior Speech Added to Curriculum

The English Department seeks to educate students in the fine art of speaking and writing good English.

Freshman Speech and Literature gives freshmen practice in speaking before a large group and an introduction to reading classic literature, as well as writing effective English.

American Literature familiarizes sophomores with classic and contemporary American writers and traces the growth of literature on the American scene.

English Literature gives juniors an insight into the beginning, growth, and analysis of English literature from early Gaelic manuscripts to T. S. Elliot and O. Henry.

Seniors study the gamut of the world's divers centers of literature from Greek and Roman mythology and drama to the Russian literature of Tolstoy and Dostoevsky.

Journalism gives students practice in newspaper and magazine writing and reporting as they publish issues of "The Roar", Lisle High's own newspaper.

Speech trains students in communication and information, and develops their speaking abilities. This year's Speech class directed and produced several mock-television shows and commercials, all of which were greatly enjoyed by those who viewed them.



gives students the opportunity to practice speaking and listening during their free time or during class time. The student who took a foreign language has broadened his scope for understanding foreign countries.






an in-depth study of American history.



more. The team's 5 wins show that there is great potential within the sophomores for the varsity team.






## Much Experience Gained by Frosh





# New Course Records Set









of the team for the past two years.



## Varsity Shots to Win




# Lisle's Cubs Battle to Score







Each club's membership and spirit increased greatly this year. For the first time, the French Club entered a float, "Arc of Victories", in the annual Homecoming parade.







# Students Help to Operate School




