
Student Life



The play followed Mame's adventures in work, through the Depression, and in her marriage. She rocked the South with her riding abilities and her own methods of raising Patrick.





"Merry Christmas and Happy New Year" was heard through the halls as students prepared for vacation. Snow in the first week of December inspired a holiday mood.


Even though teachers were asked to keep room decorations to a minimum, there were still some decorations in classrooms and halls.

Honors Bring LSHS Recognition

Lisle Senior High School spread its name far and wide during the year. The most far reaching event was the '73 seniors' debt buster. Twelve boys broke the Guinness World Record for leapfrog by covering 50 miles and leaping 8,186 times. They raised \$300 with the stunt, in a time of 19 hours, 35 minutes. Rex Sprietsma and Dave Van Kampen were the only two to complete the cold, rain-soaked course.

The other leapers, were Gary Mol, Tom Purpur, Wayne Janovsky, Rick Scudder, and Eric Wills. Hopping right behind them were Dick Dooley, Frank Spokas, Scott Cawley, Bob Blazek, and Bob Jenkins, coached by Stu Bryan.

In the nation, Ho Epstein was included in the 1973 "Who's Who in American High Schools." He also received his citizenship papers in December.

In scholastic achievements, Steve West (Class of '73) was awarded a National Merit Scholarship. Jill Kunka, Paul Naprstek, Judy Nickels, and Pam Oberschelp received letters of commendation in the 1974 N.M.S. competition.

Junior Stephanie Ruff achieved membership in All State Choir. Tom Faust won first place in state competition with his "Hire the Handicapped" poster. For superior individual reporting, NIU awarded Bill King the "Golden Eagle."



























Follies Finalizes Winter Pleasure


Because of lack of interest the jamboree was cancelled. The fifties dance took its place.

The Fun Begins at School's End




It's a Long Haul until Springtime

Dining and dancing to the theme, "A Time For Us," eighty-one couples attended Lisle's first dinner-prom.








Basketball Is a Donkey's Game

Other activities for the club included bake sales, and a calendar sale in October. With the money earned, BOSS club members attended a business convention in Springfield.












Rooked Queen Is Quick Mover


PRESSing Matters for Journalists







To raise money, Lettermen's Club sold Homecoming buttons during football season and spirit buttons during basketball season.


Uses of the money included athletic equipment and scholarships for Fellowship of Christian Athletes camp. Money was also used for trips to the state baseball and track tournaments.

Money raising projects consisted of holding bake sales and selling concessions at all track meets.









Freshman initiation? Yes, there was an initiation for Girls Athletic Association newcomers, even though the school as a whole did not have one.



Varsity Marches to Greatest Year

"November 5, 1973 . . . 'Proud Monday' . . . Gentlemen, thank you for my greatest season . . . Thank you for the Lions of 1973, they were great, simply great." "The Lions Den" - a Coach Neahaus tradition. Before every game the assistant Varsity football coach handed out a printed inspirational message to the team.

"Proud Monday," however, came after the Northeast Conference championship game against Wilmington. Lisle lost to the Wildcats 7-6". . . on a pentalty that wasn't called," in the terms of one news writer. It was the identical score by which Benet edged the Lions out in the first contest of the year. But those two losses proved to be the only blemishes on the Lions' 7-2 record, the best season a Varsity football team at Lisle has ever had.

After a 22-8 stomping of Oswego, the "lynch mob from Lisle" proceeded to shutout six straight NEC opponents. John Jelinek, honorary co-captain, quarterbacked the team to such stampedes as a 38-0 romp over Plano in Lisle's Homecoming game. Shooting for a berth in the championship game, Lisle overwhelmed arch-rival Lemont 19-0, claiming the North Division title.

With the least average number of vards given up per game in conference action, Lisle's defense was rated number one in the NEC. Contributing to the formidable reputation of the "Big D" were all-conference selections Glenn Brooks, Dave Pillow, Bob Vodicka, Tim Doerr, and co-captain Pete Mastandrea. In addition to doubling on the NEC offensive team, Mastandrea also achieved Little All-State distinction for defense.

Sharing individual honors on the NEC offensive first team were Mike LaBianco and Bob Andrzejewski. Mark Kemerling was honored by the Lisle coaches with the sportsmanship award.

Head Coach Nalley, Suburban Life's 1973 All-Area Coach, cited the extra ingredient for the team's success. "You had to be pleased with the togetherness of the team," he commented.

The nucleus for a title club next year is there. North Division all-stars John Shamet and Rich Hampton will return along with leading NEC ground-gainer Jeff Payne, plus six more starters from last fall's club. Now there are two more traditions at Lisle: Coach Neahaus's pre-game speeches and winning football in Lion country.

A "total team effort" was the story for the young Lions. The toughest game played, according to Head Coach Jerry Diesron, was a toss-up between Wilmington and Benet.



Freshman Lions, like their Frosh-Soph brothers, also captured the NEC first place crown, compiling a record of six wins, two ties, and one loss.






Time Runs Out on Lions Squad

Pete Mastandrea was voted Most Valuable Player by fellow teammates. Pete was also voted as a co-captain along with John Jelinek.















F-S Trackmen Grab NEC First


















Golf Swings for Winning Scores

Pitching was another strong point,



'B.A.A.' Attracts Biggest Turnout









Guidance Helps Plan for Futures










English Expands Communication







History Classes Delve into Past







Science Creates New Awareness


Math Stimulates Logical Thought

New personnel in the department were Miss Fran Boehme and Mr. Jack Royhl. Both taught general business courses and co-sponsored BOSS Club.



















Vocation Classes Learn by Doing









Staff Keeps the School in Order

With the coming of graduation, seniors ordered announcements and were measured for their caps and gowns. Traditionally, the senior banquet and show brought the year to a close.



Proving the freshman get-up-andgo, the bake sale at the Bank of Lisle raised \$130 for their class treasury.






