







# "Into The Night"










#### The Graduates of '81

### Staff Works Hard



The custodians worked hard to keep the school in working order. In order to do this, they had to learn about the new equipment installed over the summer.

























# English Staff Adds Two







#### Team Does Well

United States History was required of all Juniors, and the Seniors were required to take American Government.








## Three Required of Sophs




#### Students Learn Skills




#### Band Shows Spirit

Both choirs preformed in the NEC Music Festival and the Chamber Choir preformed in the Lemont Jazz Festival.



























## **Undefeated Champs**






### F-S Play Tough

The frosh-soph team also had a new coach. Coach Bierman hopes for a much better season next year and is confident they will have one.









#### Lions Take Third

The class was led by president Karla Nalley and the representatives were Heather Carlisle and Tom Kaniff. Dave Coolidge was secretary-treasurer.




