
#### "American Pop"

Mrs. Pat Densford was the coordinator of the annual event which was held October 12th and 13th.










#### PRIDE is On The Move






#### Lions Take Third






### Lions Track ... NEC Champs



The Football and Basketball and Competition squads were coached by Mrs. Frias and Mrs. Schneideriet and the Wrestling squad by Mrs. Sullivan.



















### Flag Corps






# Slowly Evolving Changes Maximize

The Board of Education once again worked very hard to set effective school policy.











### Staff Helps Out



















# Math ... Adds Up





Mr. Clark taught some industrial arts classes in addition to P.E. classes.


