


THE GRADUATE







STAND By ME






AND JUSTICE FOR ALL

Activities included Homecoming week, planting tulips, Thanksgiving O'Grams, and Christmans week.














SWISS FAMILY ROBINSON




THE THREE AMIGOS










SPLASH




MY TUTOR




