























There they would spend approximately two hours a day taking classes from professionals in various fields such as cosmetology, culinary arts, and nursing.

Students also received credit for being involved in certain assignments or Saturday morning programs. This program earns students two and a half to three and a half credits and a head start in the career of their interest.

These classes gave students a creative, hands-on approach at subjects they were interested in for the future.

How would anyone ever know how much to tip a person without having ever taken a math course? This is one example of how math classes have all sorts of information that students will use later in life. Students were required to take at least two years of math, but most choose to take the full four years.

There was a variety of math courses that students could take. The first math course was applied mathematics, which was a basic review of previous math concepts already learned. Most freshmen students started with the Algebra I course, which started by introducing students into statistics and probability. There was also Algebra Parts I and II, the equivalent to Algebra I, with material split over two years. After algebra, students move on to geometry to learn about reasoning and solving proofs. Algebra II was an advanced algebra course combined with a little bit of trigonometry. Pre-Calculus dealt with extended concepts of algebra. Selected students could choose to go on to take the A.P. Calculus Honors class, in which college credit was given.

Students enjoyed performing many exciting labs such as making the Caspian Divers in freshman science and mixing different chemicals to see the reactions in chemistry.




















































Being Part of a World Wide Honor










