










As always, Homecoming was opened with the Snake Dance followed by the bonfire, which took three tries to light.



Happily enough homecoming was climaxed with a victory for the varsity!






Yearbook Dance


dents, it was a time to collect famous last words to remember their friends by. This dance marked the end of another great year, and the Vale captured many of the wonderful memories.







Counselors help to Guide Decisions


A Look Into a World of Facts and Figures


With the growing emphasis on Math in our world, the need to "put two and two together" is not only being answered by reasoning, but by the efforts of our Math teachers.








What's Brewing in the Laboratory?


Out of the Past Came a Light to the Future


Young Team With Possibilities




Wrestling

A Proud Group of Sophomores Fights With All Their Might




The 1970-71 LCHS Band directed by Mr. Bartelt, consisted of 72 hard working members who participated in the IHSA Band contest.

For a trip the band went North to Wisconsin. They went on another trip to the Candlelight for a play and to have dinner.






