





















'I'm So Glad You Came Into My Life'














Class of '76 Departs



The talent of the performers was appreciated by large audiences both nights.

















Counselors Guide Futures


Miss Loos and Mr. Anderson helped students determine their objectives in life and prepare for the future. Present and future problems disappeared when students had the counselors' help.


English Has Diversity

"Something for everyone" was the goal of the English department - a goal not very easy to reach.


























Study Of Cultures

Mr. Galovich's honor history class looked into the structure of Lisle township and DuPage County governments in order to become better acquainted with the many aspects of local government.




















Science Explores All


Science started off a new year offering many courses from which to choose.

There were no new classes to choose from, but next year Integrated Science will be taught. This course will cover biology, earth science, chemistry and physics in one uniform class.


This year the Regional Science fair was held in April of 1977 at Illinois Institute of Technology. The exhibits entered placed very well.






























Topics In Math



Participants in these programs appreciated the opportunity to learn relevent, useful skills while still in high school.
































The art department began the year with a new teacher, Mr. McCoy. He taught at Hinsdale South in the afternoons and taught art at Lisle in the mornings.





Co-op was a program designed for students who wanted to work after graduation. Participants went to school in the morning and worked in the afternoon. They earned two credits a year toward graduation.


Many students worked at part-time jobs in businesses such as SWIB, Walgreens, Dog-n-Suds, and Chicken Unlimited.







Band Hits High Note With Great Sounds




Something new to the schedule of events was the Madrigal Dinner. The dinner was held on December 21, and was presented in 17th century style.



















Through A.F.S. we had an exchange student from Thailand, Surasak Suparat. He stayed here for one year and lived with the Densfords.






Medical Club Raises Funds


FBLA Attends A State Conference










Valé Co-editors Win A First For Design






Student Forum Does The Job










Other members took lessons or just skied at Four Lakes during the year The club members sold doughnuts to help pay their expenses for the big trip to Michigan.



























A.V. Helps Out






Lisle's golf team, made up of predominantly underclassmen, managed a respectable finish after winning three meets and losing five.

A third place finish in the conference meet and a fourth place finish in the Seneca tournament provided a few bright spots for an otherwise disappointing season.





















Varsity Reigns

Soph Squad Places Second


The sophomore Lions ended a successful season, placing second to an undefeated Lemont team. Their final record was 7-2 with one of those losses to Benet.

This was the second time in five years that Coach Diesron and Pippen had a second place team. The other three years were championships.




















Change In C-C Format














Sophs Battle

The sophomore team, including seven freshmen, was coached by Mr Burns.













Tennis Gets A Start



Mrs. Dilacova was the coach for both of the winning teams.















Practicing weekdays at the Lisle Bowl, the girls' bowling team worked towards a very successful season.





A Christmas Dance and Valentine's Day flower sale were sponsored by the seniors. They also raised funds through bake sales and car washes.






