



















"IF . . ." Paints Memories

Welcome To Dogpatch


The 1977 spring musical, "Lil' Abner," was presented March 18, 19, 25, and 26.

A Unique Duo


The seventh annual fall drama, "The Odd Couple," was presented November 18 and 19 at the LJHS auditorium.



















Policies Change


Mr. Burns was a faculty addition to the math department this year, as he came over from the junior high to help out teaching the newly arrived freshmen class.









Science Reaches Peak








Developing Techniques







Working For Credit



DAVEA Provides Skills




Music Heard All Year

The band finished the year by marching in the La-Grange Pet Parade on June 3 and playing for graduation ceremonies.











Gym Classes Go Co-Ed




Another new aspect was the absence of the seniors in gym. This was due to the increased number of students from the freshman class, which resulted in insufficient time to accommodate all the students.






Student Forum was active in improving the school for the students and faculty. In addition to the traditional sponsorship of homecoming, they studied and collected data on room temperature control.


The group was also involved with a Christmas drive, collecting 580 pounds of clothing, canned goods and toys. These items were distributed by a church agency to needy people.




FBLA Profits


NHS Tradition






VALÉ Editors Win A Prize For Theme

Club Rules Change





Actors Keep Busy
















Golfers Take Third





The Lions answered their critics with an undefeated conference title, Lisle's fourth in four years; this pushed Lisle's consecutive Conference victories to thirty.


















Sophs Look Ahead








Lions Gain Experince

This year marked the beginning of the Lisle Invitational Wrestling Meet, in which Lisle hosted seven teams.










Netters Now Compete

Working hard with the pep band to create original routines, they performed at all home football and basketball games. A new approach was added this year as the squad performed at wrestling meets too.



Netters Capture NEC























Seniors: "Still Crazy After All These Years"

Of the various fund raising activities for Prom, a swim party held at the Park District pool. A sockhop and many bake sales have also been held throughout the year.




Sophomores Move On
