








Seniors Graduate




Enrollment Grows

















Math Has Variety

Faculty Enlarges











Sophs Learn


Languages Speak Out



A new Flexible Shaft Polisher machine was purchased for the jewelry department this year.













Gym Teacher Leaves



Gym classes were co-ed for the second year in a row. Co-ed gym classes enabled students to learn to work together while enjoying sports.











Bands Perform




Undefeated In NEC






Records Are Broken







Senior Phil Hlavac competed at State two years in a row. Last year he placed second and this year he placed third. Phil was the team captain and also had the most team points.











Lionettes Place First Overall
