THESE ARE THE DAYS


THIS WAS THE NIGHT








At Lisle Senior High School, both French and Spanish classes are offered to students. In these classes, students not only learn how to speak the language, but they also learn a bit of culture.







EARNING MONEY

In what class can students earn money? Coop! That stands for cooperative education, a class taught by Mrs. Conroy and Mr. Bonomo. This special class combines a regular class hour with a paid part-time job. Getting out of school to go to work appeals to only 15 students (13 seniors and 2 juniors).

Some sample jobs include being a clerk at Blockbuster Video, a cashier at Dave's Car Wash, and a receptionist at a real estate office. Some other companies that employ Co-op students are Molex, the Chicago Tribune, and the Lisle Public Library. On an average, students make about \$100 per week, before taxes.

Classes during the school day are an essential part of Co-op. Class discussions focus on a wide range of topics including employment contracts, unions, investments, corporate hiring trends, current events, and guest speak-

The main purpose of Co-op is to give students the opportunity to go beyond "textbook" learning. When asked if she would recommend Co-op, Mrs. Conroy responded, "Co-op gives students something that all employers want-experience."


























GOING FOR THE GOAL CHAMPIONS ALL THE WAY




Two of Lisle's most talented, Chris Sally and Colin Mulacek received the honor of being named All Conference.








The major contribution to the outcome of the season was the fact that all of the players were willing and able to fight for a victory. This was evident throughout the season.




PRIDE ON THE COURT
