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


Going to school every day also meant that everyone got to see their friends on a daily basis. The hallways were filled with the sound of lockers closing, and good friends gossiping once again.




















So between giving speeches, learning new vocabulary, and picking out symbolism, all English students have learned new skills that will be much valued in their future jobs.







"I like the variety of kids, teachers, personalities, and materials available." This is what Mrs. Adams, the Spanish II teacher, said that she enjoyed most about teaching.







In the 1980s, the national American Home Economics Association changed its name to the American Association of Family and Consumer Sciences to better define itself. Lisle requires every sophomore to take nine weeks of consumer education.

"Single Survival" is taken by Juniors and Senoirs. It is a second semester elective that focuses on insurance, using credit, getting a job, buying a car and preparing low-cost quick meals.

make better decisions about budgeting money and banking services, using a credit card, understanding taxes and social security, food shopping and buying things.

Each year the gym teachers try to add something new to the program. This year they have gotten more technical. They are using a computer with the program HealthFirst-TriFit. The program makes a profile of body fat and well-being of each student. "It's being tested by the students and making progress," said Mr. Sanko.

Another technically advancement is the Polarized Heart Monitor. These monitors include a wristwatch and a band that fastens around the participants lower ribs, just below the heart. The band sends the necessary information to the watch which displays the heart rate. Students have said that this program helps support self-awareness of physical fitness. 

THE REAL WORLD

To some, classroom work might often become routine and boring. At Lisle there are programs that allow students to explore learning in a different way. Students had the opportunity to take part in programs that counted as credits, but took place outside of the school. These programs are Co-op and Technology Center of DuPage, formerly known as DAVEA.



Art classes offered start with Art I and advance to more callenging courses, including Art II, Ceramics, Commercial Art, Drawing and Painting, and Art Workshop.


"I have a lot of good kids with lots of talent," says art teacher Mrs. Pietrantoni.












This group of people are people to lean on when in search of a resolution to a problem. They are willing to listen, share, and give their time.






























































CLASS OF '99

Freshmen still have a while to go until graduation. During this time, they will learn and grow from experiences and friends. While going on this journey through life, it is said to be the best time of their lives.












The members of the group are elected every four vears.













Competition season was from January to February. The theme to this year's competition routine was James Bond. The competitions that the flags participated in were at Elgin, Downers Grove North, and Palatine.



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
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
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


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Dear staff,






